Running Water Draw Plans Progressing

By Pete Wright Soil Conservation Service Dimmitt, Texas

Progress is the password in regards to the proposed Running Water Draw Watershed Project in Curry County, New Mexico and Parmer, Castro, Lamb, Hale, and Swisher Counties in Texas. This is the report following a meeting at Plainview on July 22, 1964, attended by some 50 interested persons representing various local sponsoring organizations within the watershed.

At this meeting, Phil Grazier, Soil Conservation Service tech nicain in charge of the Watershed Planning Party, reported to the group a summary of the findings of his staff during a two-week re-connaisance of the entire watershed. In addition to a report of his findings, he informed those present that January 15, 1965, is the planned date for the arrival of the entire Watershed Planning Party in the watershed to begin preparation of the work plan.

During the meeting, many questions were raised in regards to including other uses of water in the watershed project. Among questions received were queries on municipal, industrial and recreational uses of floodwater retarding structures. Several cities and counties represented voiced positive interest in installing structures that would include multiple

Since the inception of this proposed project some three years ago, the password has been progress. Co-sponsorship agreements of the project have been secured from all County Commissioners Courts and Soil Conservation Districts involved. In addition, the City of Plainview and the City of Clovis have agreed to co-sponsor the project. The commissioners courts and the cities involved agreed to raise sufficient funds to defray the cost of preparing the work plan. By placing this



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

If you believe permission should be granted for you or some other person to graze or harvest hay on this land on your farm to alleviate a hardship caused by the unfavorable weather conditions in this area, please notify the Castro County ASCS office. A deduction for the value of the grazing or haying will be made from your program payments if this permission is granted.
