## Joe Newman, Son Burned In Explosion Here Sunday

Terry Newman, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Newman, was burned seriously Sunday evening when the family car exploded while he was in it.

Young Newman had second degree burns over 25 per cent of his body—back, face, neck, arms and hands. Joe Newman suffered second degree burns on his hands, face and back while trying to get his son out of the burning car.

Apparently butane fumes from the delivery being made at the home collected in the car and were ignited by a short in the air conditioner in the car. The explosion and following fire happened about 7:40 p.m.

The Newman boy was the only occupant of the car at the time

of the explosion. His father was standing at the rear of the automobile.

The elder Newman drove to the Dimmitt hospital, where the two were treated for their injuries, and then were admitted to the hospital.

Terry will be in the hospital for about three weeks, while his father will be confined for an indefinite period of time.

The injured pair are currently reported to be doing fine, except for pain.

The only humorous note in the whole proceedings was the comment Terry made to his insurance-agent father coming from the hospital emergency room.

"Daddy, did you have insurance on the car?"

## Reservations Being Taken For Season Grid Tickets

Fans and supporters of the Hart Longhorns were promised last year that they could have the same reserved seats for the 1964-65 season if they so desired.

This promise will be kept, and reservations can be made at the Hart Beat office.

The preferred seating will be available for two weeks, starting Friday, Aug. 7. After the two-week period expires, the season tickets will be made available to anyone wishing to purchase them.

The season ticket price will be \$10, which will entitle the holder to a reserved seat for the entire home season.

However, the first game of the season—between Hart and

Nazareth—is not a home game. The Nazareth Swifts will be considered the home team.

The Swifts are competing in 11-man football for the first time this year and do not have adequate lighting facilities for the game. Therefore, they are borrowing the Hart field for this game.

Nazareth officials will be on the gate and have charge of the game. Admission to the Hart-Nazareth game will be \$1 for adults and 25 cents for children.

Longhorn season tickets also include admission to all home basketball games in the Hart High School Gym for the coming season.

## School Opening Schedule Slated

Thursday, Aug. 20 is the set date for registration of all high school freshmen and sophomores will register until noon. Freshmen will register from 1 to 4 p.m.

The Hart school year this year starts Aug. 31, which is a Monday.

The first day of school, buses will run their regular routes morning and evening. Buses arrive at the school at 8:30 a.m. and leave the school between 2:30 and 3 p.m. to take students home.

The school year will begin with a general assembly for junior and senior high students at 9 a.m., Aug. 31, in the new high school gymnasium.

Grade school students will also gather in a general assembly, at 10 a.m. in the grade school gym.

Following the assemblies, students will go to classrooms and be assigned to permanent rooms—the official signal to start classes.

School registration for children who will be six years old on or before Sept. 1 will Thursday, Aug. 27, in the old high school library at 9 a.m.

Parents will need to bring their child's birth certificate and a signed statement from their family physician that the child has had a successful smallpox vaccination. If the child has not been vaccinated, this will need to be done before the first day of school—which is Monday, Aug. 31, this year.

A workbook fee of \$2.75 will be charged this year for all first grade students.

Grade school principal G. C. Graves has requested that students bring no school supplies to school and buy NOTHING but pencil and paper for the first day of school. No pens of any description are used in the first three grades of the Hart schools.

A list of all necessary supplies will be given each child the first day of school, which starts at 9 a.m.

First grade teachers for the coming school year are Mrs. Shirley Tucker, Mrs. Nicholson, Mrs. Fredye King and Mrs. Mary Gray.

Mrs. Lunsford was driving the car at the time of the accident. The collision occurred on highway 84 in Littlefield when a car driven by an 18-year-old Littlefield youth pulled onto the highway from an intersection. He pulled into the path of the car driven by Mrs. Lunsford, who was taking her mother home in Littlefield.

Mrs. Tidwell was badly cut and bruised as a result of the impact.

The right wheel was knocked from the Witten car in the collision. Damages to both vehicles were extensive, but no one was injured.

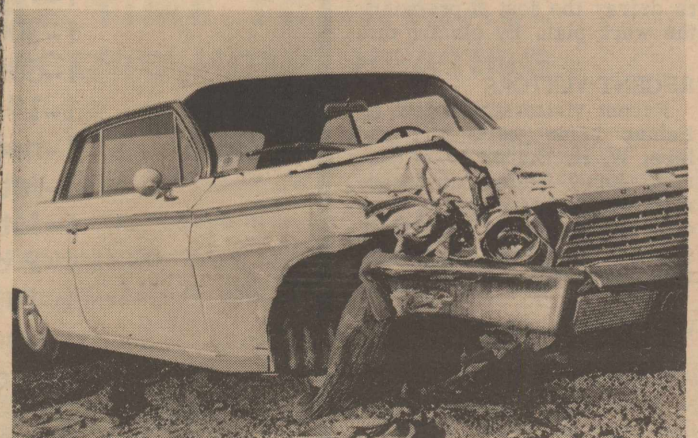

## Running Water Draw Plans Progressing

Progress is the password in regards to the proposed Running Water Draw Watershed Project in Curry County, New Mexico and Parmer, Castro, Lamb, Hale, and Swisher Counties in Texas. This is the report following a meeting at Plainview on July 22, 1964, attended by some 50 interested persons representing various local sponsoring organizations within the watershed.

At this meeting, Phil Grazier, Soil Conservation Service technician in charge of the Watershed Planning Party, reported to the group a summary of the findings of his staff during a two-week reconnaissance of the entire watershed. In addition to a report of his findings, he informed those present that January 15, 1965, is the planned date for the arrival of the entire Watershed Planning Party in the watershed to begin preparation of the work plan.

During the meeting, many questions were raised in regards to including other uses of water in the watershed project. Among questions received were queries on municipal, industrial and recreational uses of floodwater retarding structures. Several cities and counties represented voiced positive interest in installing structures that would include multiple uses.

Since the inception of this proposed project some three years ago, the password has been progress. Co-sponsorship agreements of the project have been secured from all County Commissioners Courts and Soil Conservation Districts involved. In addition, the City of Plainview and the City of Clovis have agreed to co-sponsor the project. The commissioners courts and the cities involved agreed to raise sufficient funds to defray the cost of preparing the work plan. By placing this

money into a trust fund and agreeing to reimburse the Soil Conservation Service for watershed planning, they were able to secure the services of the Soil Conservation Service. This Trust Planning Party, makes possible acceleration of watershed planning. Approximately \$70,000 has been pledged to the trust fund for this purpose.

In its finality, the project will encompass some ten to twelve flood prevention structures with a strong possibility of two or more recreation areas being included. In addition to preventing flood damage to crop lands located in the flood plain of the draw, it will offer much needed protection to the low-lying area of the City of Plainview. A final benefit will be the increased amount of water obtained for irrigation and potential underground recharge.

Of prime importance to most is the progress to be expected in the future. Once the work plan is completed, it must be submitted to Congress for appropriation of funds. Once the funds are available, the construction of the project can begin.

If you believe permission should be granted for you or some other person to graze or harvest hay on this land on your farm to alleviate a hardship caused by the unfavorable weather conditions in this area, please notify the Castro County ASCS office. A deduction for the value of the grazing or haying will be made from your program payments if this permission is granted.
