Hart Short-Handed As Grid Year Nears

Football season is fast approaching in Hart, and action on the practive field is beginning to pick up as the Longhorns prepare for the first game of the season.

With only five returning lettermen from last year's team, the outlook for football is not the brightest in Longhorn history.

Jeff Smart, new head mentor for the Longhorns, had this to say, "The season doesn't look too good for the Longhorns right now."

The coach went on to say, "I am pleased with the way the boys are working out, but it looks like we're going to have a rough time of it this year."

Having lost eight starters during the past year, the new coaches face a rebuilding job, and the difficulty facing them can be recognized from the turnout for football practice—it's averaged about 15 boys so far this fall.

With 11 players on the field, the Longhorns will not have large reserve on the bench this season.

A scrimmage has been set with Amherst today at 7:30 p.m. The scrimmage starters will average 153 lb. per man across the board. The 153 lb. average will make the Longhorns one of the lightest teams in the district.

As if the picture wasn't dark enough, the Longhorns have already had to start thinking about injuries. A knee injury in practice put one of the potential Longhorns out of action for at least a week.

As the coach put it, "We're picked at the bottom of the barrell in the district, and we're really going to have to hustle not to end up there."

Returning starters this year are Tommy Morrison, Harvey

Sullivan, Mark Martin, Larry Heller and Larry McKay. McKay is the only junior in the returning group.

Captains for the forthcoming season will be Tommy Morrison and Harvey Sullivan.

The Longhorns will take to the field against Silverton for the first game of the season to be played at Silverton, Sept. 11. The first home game will be against New Deal Sept. 18.

Hart Enrollment Is Almost 600

After three days of school, enrollment in the Hart Schools stands at 589 pupils—404 in elementary school and 185 in junior and senior high school.

Superintendent Paul Kennedy in releasing the figures said that final enrollment should easily top 600 by the time peak enrollment is reached in late October.

The superintendent also said that more than 600 people attended the open house ceremonies during the weekend at the new school building. The open house began with a dedication ceremony, where Homer Garrison of Plainview spoke. Garrison, a Plainview banker, is a former resident of Hart.

In spite of the conversion of the old high school building to a completely elementary school, certain problems are arising from sheer force of numbers in the grade school.

As the school superintendent put it, "We're busting out at the seams over there-especially the second, fourth and fifth grades." There are two teachers in each of the three grades mentioned, and there are 75 students in the second grade, 74 in the fourth and 66 in the fifth.

The main problem is in the second and fourth grades, which are taught in self-contained

classes. Facing almost 40 pupils for the entire day is proving something of a strain on the teachers in those two grades.

Kennedy said that something would have to be done to reduce the sizes of the largest classes in the elementary school in the very near future.

First Grain!

Hart's first load of grain of the year was delivered Tuesday at 5:15 p.m. by Cleve McLain, who farms four miles soth of

McLain delivered the 13,360 pound load to Farmers Grain Co. The milo tested 16.0 per cent moisture.

The Hart farmer said he planted the Pioneer 846 milo on April 28 and watered three times after planting. Before planting, he put on 300 pounds of dry fertilizer and prewatered once.

McLain said he expected the milo to average between 5,000 and 6,000 pounds per acre.



1 1/2 tsp. chili powder 1/4 tsp. tabasco sauce 1 garlic bud.

Cut three chickens in half. Place over charcoal fire and baste with sauce every 5 to 10 minutes. Cooking time over charcoal is 1 1/2 ro 2 hours.
