Horns Travel To Silverton

It's that time of year again! Sept. 11 brings the first presentation of the 1964 version of the Hart Longhorns to the field.

Unfortunately the field where this debut will occur is in Silverton, but it's still the first game of the year for the Longhorns.

This year's Longhorn team will have trouble matching last year's record, when the Hart team took second place in their district and almost took the district championship--falling, however, to district champ Vega 62-20 in the last game of the season.

The main problem seems to be that eight starters from last year's Longhorns are no longer with the team.

That leaves quite a rebuilding job facing the two new Hart coaches, Jeff Smart and Haden Moore.

Silverton gave the Longhorn a rough time when the two teams met last year. The Hart gridders came out with a 6-0 victory in one of the hardest fought games of the season.

Last year's battle was basically a defensive contest, with the only score in the game coming early in the first quarter on a long 69-yard run by Joe Rubalcaba--who graduated this past May.

Class A Silverton should be more than capable of providing the Longhorns a battle this year. The Owls were not hurt nearly so badly by graduation as were the Longhorns, and they consequently return more of their 1963 power.

Silverton has already played one game; so they should have an advantage of experience. That game was a 14-0 loss to Claude, but the Owls had lost to Claude 14-0 prior to last year's Silverton-Hart game and still proved to be rugged foes.

Come what may, the game Friday at Silverton should not be dull. The 1964 Longhorns have shown lots of hustle and spirit in practice this year, and what they lack in size, speed and experience is offset to a certain extent by desire.

Friday promises to be quite a baptism of fire for the 17 Hart boys out for football.

Board Buys Equipment

In a general session meeting Monday, Hart's school board disposed of several items of routine business and approved purchase of several needed pieces of equipment for the schools.

Included in the approved items was some \$600 worth of PE equipment, needed in the physical education program.

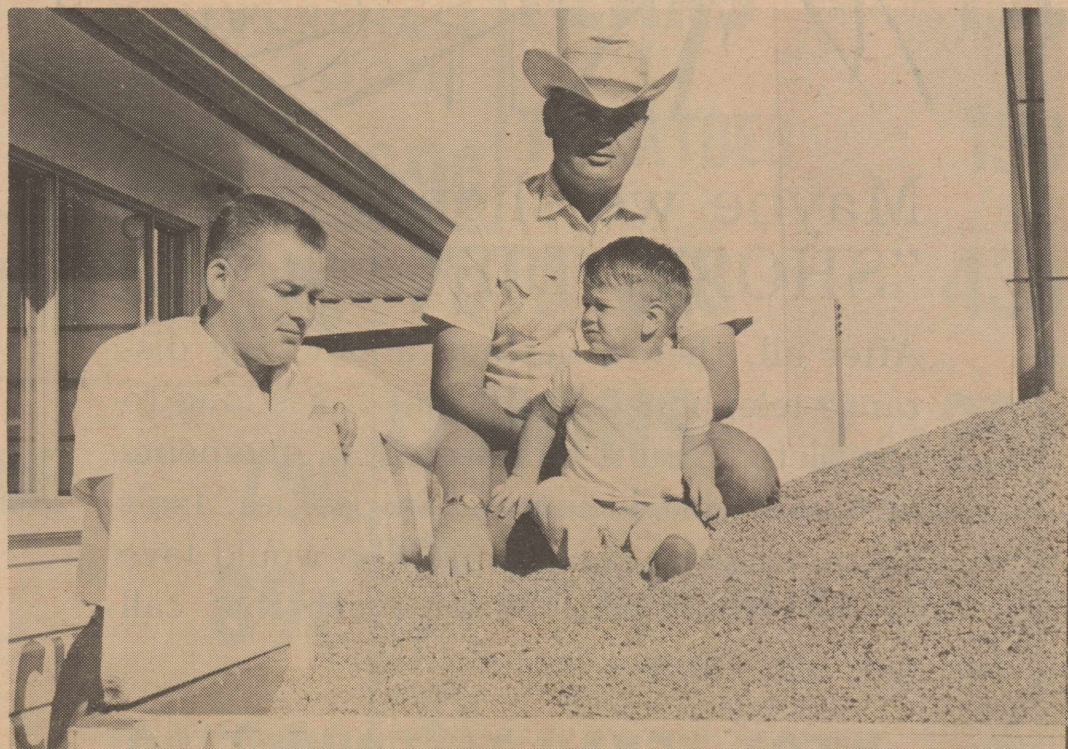
Chili Supper Is Planned

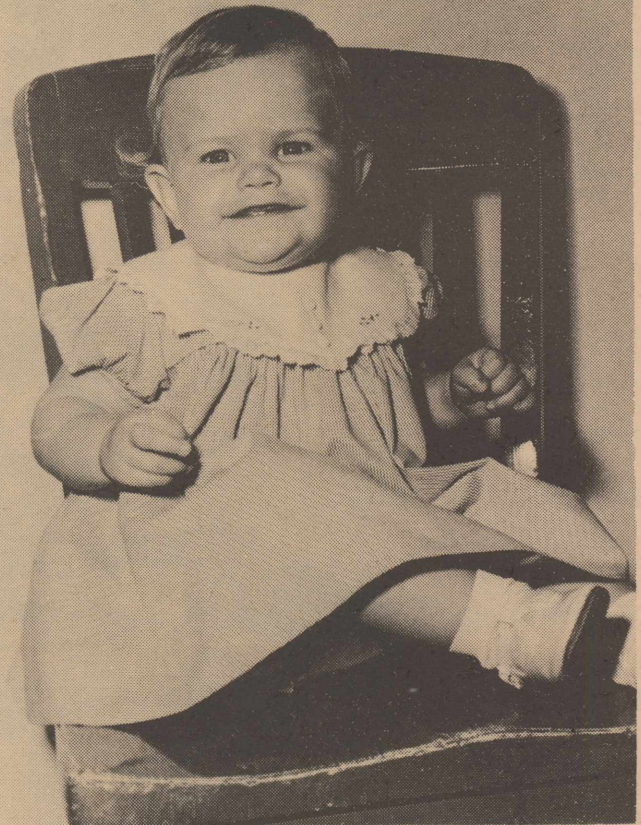

Let's Go Longhorns

HART HOPES TO

It appears this year that the Hart Longhorns are learning first hand about the ups and downs of high school football.

Last year the Hart team came in second in the district, and came within tantalizing reaching distance of the district flag.

It was great, but unfortunately it was last year. This year the Longhorns have only 17 out for the grid crew, and only three of those have seen any regular action--eight starters from last year have departed the hallowed halls of Hart High and they'll be missed.

Noting the dismal prediction that several of the top Class B teams in the state will be coming from this area, and noting also that Hart was definitely not among the favored few, new coaches Jeff Smart and Haden Moore face a strong rebuilding job with not an overly great amount of material to work with.

Smart, at one time an assistant coach in Olton, may have a few wishful thoughts about the personnel situation at Olton--where the Mustangs are picked to win their Class AA district.

Pre-season bright spots in what might easily be a drab picture have been hustle and hard work from the 17 potential players. The schedule is another somewhat favorable sight. The Longhorns will have four games to gather experience before starting in on conference foes. And that first

conference game will be against Nazareth in Hart on Oct. 9.

But no matter how high hopes may run, the overwhelming favorite to take home all the district honors is an extremely powerful Happy squad--some observers even peg Happy to pick up all the honors in the state in Class B.

With Happy at the top of the pile, Hart is relegated to the bottom of the stack.

Several key problems show the reason for the pre-season placing of the Longhorns. The Longhorns this year are still looking for somebody to punt or place kick, and so far nobody has shown up. And the coach looks for a lot of running this season, as the passing game just doesn't appear to be one of the Longhorns are going to be able to handle.

But if spirit, hustle, hard work and desire count for anything--state championships have been won on less in past years--the Longhorns might possibly surprise quite a few of the pre-season handicappers.

The big problems are still if finding replacements for those eight graduating starters from last year's crew. The graduating group included all-district honor winners Kenneth Fincher--who kicked the football black and blue--and James Mitchell. Winning all-South Plains honors and graduating were scatback Billy Joe Farris

and pass-catching end Carl Ward.

Returning guard Larry McKay may be switched to the backfield this year, hopefully to provide a stronger scoring punch behind the line.

As seen by the new coach, best prospects to help make the team this year more successful than generally expected are McKay, end Tommy Morrison, halfback Danny Rodriguez and tackle Joe Bob Sanders.

So far, position-by-position, the Longhorns look like this:

CENTER--David Smith, 160-pound junior, fills the spot here, but is pushed by David Harris, 138-lb. sophomore, and McKay 152-lb. junior, are the present choices here. But if McKay, as is highly possible, is shifted to the backfield, Larry Henderson, 180-lb. freshman reserve may be moved into the guard spot on the right side of the line.

TACKLES--Joe Bob Sanders, 175-lb. sophomore, and Billy Bob Bell, 154-lb. junior, are currently in reserve for this spot.

ENDS--Tommy Morrison 165-lb. senior, and Mark Martin, 140-lb. senior, are stationed here. In an almost fully running attack, they may find little to do in the way of catching passes, but the coaches have been quite pleased with Morrison's blocking in prac-

165-lb. junior, is the welcome third end on the squad.

HALFBACK--Unless McKay makes it into the backfield, it looks like Doug Martin, 130 lb. junior, and Danny Rodriguez, 140 pound junior, will have their hands full. David Brooks and David Follis--Brooks, a 110 lb. freshman and Follis a 153 lb. sophomore --will be used to back up Martin and Rodriguez.

FULLBACK--It looks like Harvey Sullivan, a 156-lb. senior, may have to handle all the chores here alone, but the blasting captain of the team (along with Morrison) should be able to contribute to the running game substantially.

QUARTERBACK--Gary Heller, 150-lb. senior, is alone in the driver's seat, and there just isn't anyone around to replace him. Heller's passing is not his best point, but his ball handling is good and experience could turn him into a more than adequate signal caller by the end of the season.

Smart said that the Longhorn running game would probably be launched from straight and wing T formations, with a 5-4 lineup on defense.

He said that he didn't know yet how the team would shape up against competition, but he added, "We'll get a real test Friday at Silverton."

So, by complete consensus, Friday is the night when the new 1964 Longhorns will get their baptism of fire.

Grid Tickets Now On Sale

Athletic Director Frank Kimbrough announced today that single game tickets for each of West Texas State's six home games are now on sale.

Season tickets are still on sale and Kimbrough stated the school is experiencing a record advance sale. He said he expected the remainder of the chair seats to be sold out this week.

Single game tickets range in price from \$4 for a reserved chair seat down to \$1 for school children. The other reserved seat prices are \$3.50 and \$3 while the adult general admission is \$2.

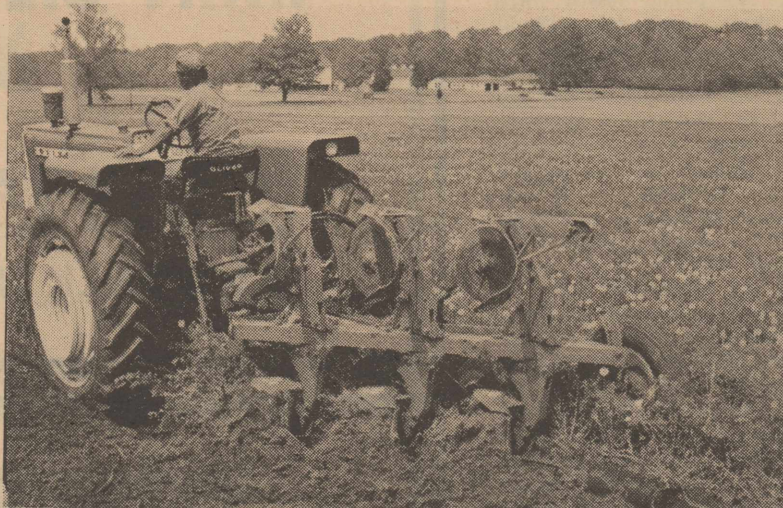

Punt, Pass, Kick Contest Is Set In Olton Oct. 10

Olton and Hart area grade and junior high school boys from eight through 13 can pit their football skills against thousands of other boys throughout the fourth annual Punt, Pass and Kick competition which will culminate with a trip to Washington, D. C., and to an appearance at a National Football League championship game for the top 12 winners.

Sponsored nationally by the Ford Dealers of America and the National Football League, the Punt, Pass and Kick competition--or PP and K--will be staged in Olton by Fisher Ford Center.

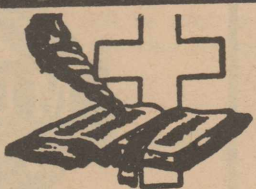

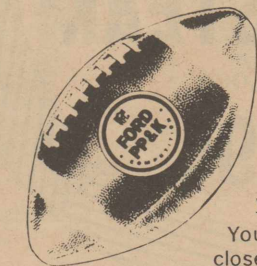
