Boots Rogers Brings In Hart's First 1964 Bale

Hart's first bale of cotton is in, ginned and set out in front of Farmers State Bank. B. H. Rogers brought in the first load of cotton to Hart Producer's Co-op Gin from the Perry farm five miles east of

town on the Kress highway Friday, Sept. 18.

According to E. E. Foster, manager of the gin, the Rilocot cotton was pulled in the rain and brought in to the gin lot.

The gin was being prepared for its formal opening on Saturday, and the cotton was not ginned until late Tuesday.

The load of cotton weighed 2100 pounds, and produced a 530-pound bale and approximately 900 pounds of seed, according to Foster.

Premiums for the first bale of cotton in the area were 50 cents a pound on the bale, \$100 a ton for the seed and free ginning for the whole works. On that basis, the first bale brought a total premium of \$310.

The bale is currently in plain sight in front of the bank for all to see.

Between 100 and 125 people turned out Saturday for the formal opening of Hart Co-op Gin north of town.

Gifts were given as visitors registered, and refreshments were served.

During tours of the gin from 1 to 5 p.m., visitors saw the latest in gin machinery.

Longhorns Host Turkey Friday

The Longhorns will face District 6-B Turkey here Friday in the third game of the season and the second home game of 1964.

Turkey's Turks promise to provide rough competition for the Horns. The Turks stand 0-1-1 in season play, but the tie was with Happy and the loss was to Silverton.

Both scores in the 8-8 tie with Happy were scored in the final period of play. And all but one of the touchdowns in the 24-6 loss to Silverton last week were scored in the first period of play.

The Happy-Turkey tilt was hard fought all the way, and the Turks were threatening in the final seconds of the game.

Barry Lane scored the Turk TD in the game, and quarterback Jack Young passed to Charles Hamner for the conversion.

After the first quarter scoring spree, the Silverton Turkey contest turned into a defensive battle. Roy Gene Stephens scored the Turk TD in the Owl-Turk tilt.

The Turks have a stiff defense -- as shown by their holding the Happy Cowboys scoreless for three quarters and holding the Silverton Owls scoreless for a full half.

The Turk offense, however, is not as potent as its defense. Of course, the same thing could be said of the Longhorns. Like the Horns, the Turks have had trouble with their aerial game.

Against Silverton, the Turks attempted 19 passes -- completed five and had five stolen in mid-air. Against Happy, Young was able to complete only three aeriels out of 19 attempts, but only one was intercepted.

The game Friday, then, appears to match twoteams which are having to rely on defensive

play to keep their opponents score down -- while they are having trouble running up a large score of their own on offense.

Once again, however, the Longhorns will be having a larger team and will be outnumbered on the bench. And in a rough game -- as most primarily defensive games are -- a good supply of fresh talent on the bench is a big advantage.

The Longhorns have been lucky this year; they have not had any serious injuries. And through they may feel battered after each game, they remain at full strength going into the third game -- 17 strong.

The starting lineup will remain basically the same.

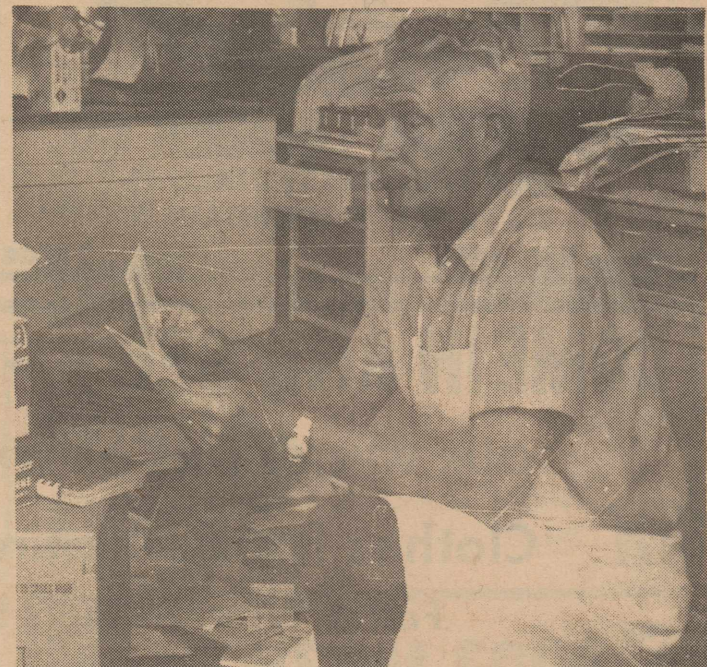

EDITORIAL

More Officiating Needed For Football Games

The football game between the Hart Longhorns and the New Deal Lions was a hard-fought but not a well-fought, game.

One of the most noticeable things about the game was the large number of penalties against each team. Unfortunately one of the most noticeable things from the vantage point of the sidelines was the larger number of serious, uncalled penalties against each team.

Both teams were guilty of extra short tempers and extra-rough behavior, as both players and coaches can testify.

Uncalled "penalties" only increase the rate of behavior needing penalizing. And obvious four play going virtually unnoticed much of the time is surely infuriating to the team on the short end of such play each time.

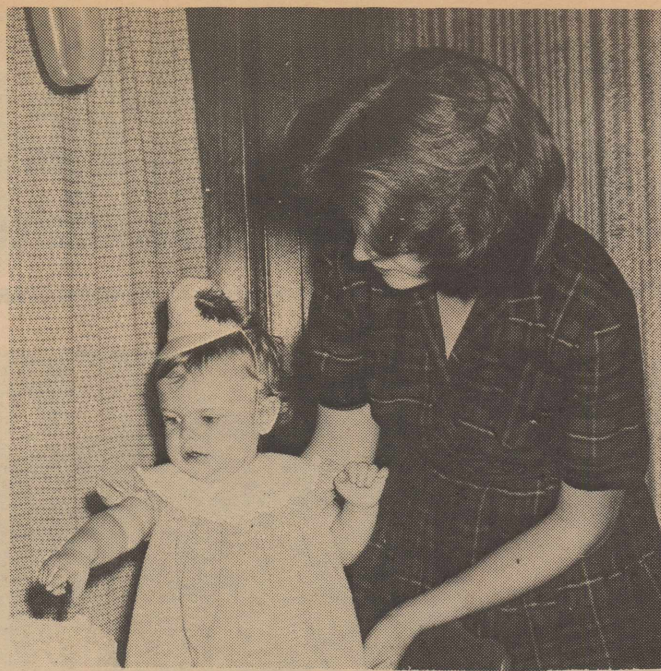
Much of the blame in such a situation will be turned on the officials of the game. But in this case, the situation was not wholly the fault of the officials.

Only three officials were on the field during the home opener. Quite obviously three officials must try to follow the play, but a pass or a long run can leave all three officials a long way from the action.

The solution to the problem is relatively simple -- four officials on the field during the home games (as there were on the field at Silverton for the season opener).

The presence of the extra official not only allows the play to be watched more carefully, but tends to prevent a lot of unnecessary roughness on the field.

As long as football is to remain a sport--rather than a mild form of all-out war--the game needs to be played on a plane of good sportsmanship (and it appears that it does), by all means let's put four officials on the field for the rest of the games.

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ALWAYS A LONGHORN BOOSTER

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HORNS FALL TO

The home opener was somewhat spoiled for the Longhorns here Friday night, as they won several battles but lost the war 24-6 to the New Deal Lions.

The Longhorns played an improved defensive game, but they couldn't seem to mount a consistent offense against the heavier Lions.

The Lions were operating with only two seniors on their squad, but both seniors made their presence painfully obvious throughout the game. Randy Peeples, the much praised Lion halfback, scored a TD early in the first quarter on a pass play covering 12 yards, and Jerry Brown, the other senior halfback accounted for 12 points on two five-yard plunges.

Gary Winningham, the junior quarterback who alternated between that position and halfback with Peeples, threw the pass to Peeples for the first Lion TD and plunged over from the 1-yard line for the final Lion TD.

Gary Heller scored Hart's lone touchdown on a one-yard dive as the first half ended. The situation was almost a repeat of the last-second scoring effort Harvey Sullivan made against Silvertown in the last quarter of the season opener.

The Longhorns' weakness in the air was graphically demonstrated during the game which resulted in 50 per cent of the Hart aeriels being intercepted and only four yards being added to the Hart offensive yardage.

Several aspects of the game were unusual -- to say the least. One such aspect was the penalty rate, with each team being penalized some 60 yards. Another was the added half-time attraction of Lion blocking in the west end of the field while the Lion band was performing in the middle of the field.

Hart won the toss before the game and elected to receive the pigskin. The Lions choose the east end of the field, which gave them a slight wind advantage.

Randy Peeples started things off by booting the opening kickoff to the 5-yard line. Danny Rodriguez moved to the 25-yard stripe on the return.

On what appeared to be a pass attempt, Heller lost to the 23. Doug Martin regained the original line of scrimmage on the next play. With third and 10 facing them, the Longhorns made the first fumble of the game; and Gary Reiken jumped on the ball at the 24 for the Lions.

The Lions wasted no time in picking up their first score. Four plays later the Lions shoved across for the six points.

Peeples started the short drive, moving to the 16. Jerry Brown carried it to the 12, picking up the first first down of the game. Peeples went to the 12, and then Winningham hit Peeples for the TD -- with 9:16 remaining in the first period.

The points after attempt was stopped short when Winningham was downed short, and the score remained 6-0 -- with the Longhorns on the short end of things.

Peeples again booted the ball to the 5 yard line, and Rodriguez again returned it up the field. This time the Horns put the ball in play from the 40-yard line.

Sullivan was stopped at the of scrimmage, but an off-sides penalty -- the first of the game -- moved the ball to the 45 (still first down, but only five yards to go).

Heller was nabbed at the 38; Heller gained to the 42; Heller passed -- and Peeples hauled it in for the Lions on their own 43-yard line.

Fullback Mike Heald gained nine to the 48. Peeples passed incomplete, but a penalty moved the ball back across the 50 yard line. Winningham then moved out to the Horn 44 for a first down.

A penalty moved the ball back to the 49. Brown gained to the 45. Peeples lost to the 48. Winningham passed incomplete.

Peeples punted to the 5-yard line where once again Rodriguez headed back up the field. This time the Horns put the pigskin in play from their 45-yard line.

Four plays later, the Horns had their first first down of the game on the Lion 42-yard line.

Martin gained to the 40, but a penalty wiped out the gain and put the ball on the 47. On the next play -- first and 15 -- Heller recovered the fumbled ball on the 46. Sullivan gained one to the 45. Heller passed incomplete, and the short offensive drive was through.

Rodriguez kicked to the 12, and Brown got all the way to the 17 before he was nailed.

The Longhorn defense began to stiffen and come alive late in the first quarter. Winningham gained two and was stopped. Brown gained one before he, too, was nailed. A penalty backed the ball down to the 15, and Peeples got plastered back at the 3-yard line.

The first quarter ended before the next play could be made -- the score remaining 6-0.

After the long walk to the west end of the field, Peeples punted from the inside of his own end zone to the Hart 39, where the ball was killed.

Rodriguez scooted into Lion territory for a first down on the 49.

It looked as if the Horns were finally on the move. Sullivan gained three to the 46. Martin gained three more to the 43, and Sullivan boomed over to the 37 and the first down.

Larry McKay gained two to the 35. Martin added seven to the 28, and then two more to the 26 and another first down.

Then things fell apart for the Horns. McKay gained two to the 24, but Martin was stopped for one at the 23. Heller recovered the ball -- after a fumble -- on the 27, and he gained only four yards to the 23 on the fourth and 11 attempt.

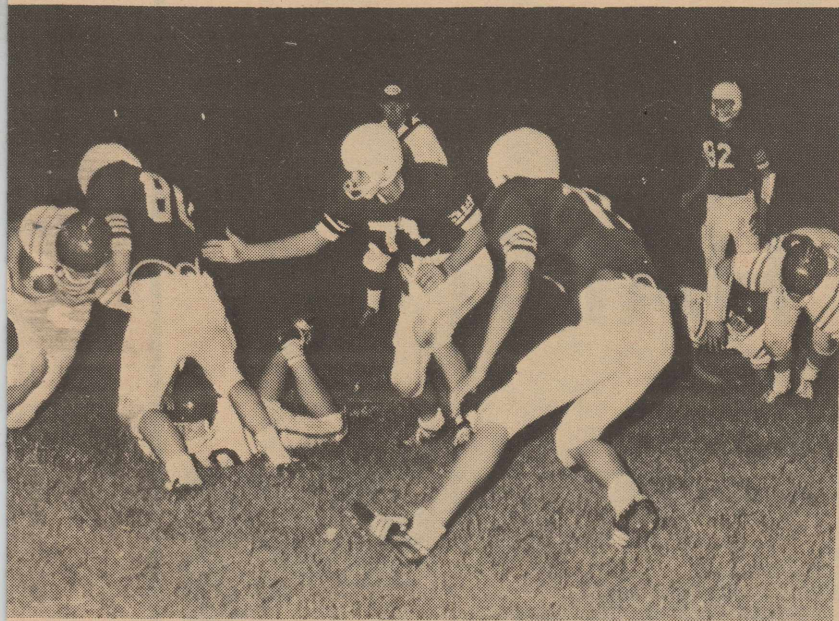

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ler pushed to the 1-yard line -- with :05 on the clock. Heller quickly moved again, and he inched into the end zone as the half ended.

Rodriguez was stopped on the run for extra points, and the Horns headed for the dressing rooms at the half trailing 12-6.

Sam Mayo, the Lion coach, charged on to the field immediately and proceeded to tell the Lions all about the game of football. When he had finished

delivering his lecture to those on the field, he called the remainder of the team from the bench to the field and had blocking practice throughout the half time period.

At the start of the second half, McKay kicked to the 25 and Peeples returned to the 33. Two plays later the Lions were back at the 27. Peeples passed incomplete and was forced to punt -- Gary Heller breaking up the third down pass play.

Rodriguez picked up the ball on the Longhorn 27 and returned it to the 41, but the Horns couldn't get moving. Sullivan lost to the 38; Heller recovered a fumble back at the 31; and forced to run on a pass attempt, Heller gained only to the 33.

Rodriguez kicked to the Lion 38, and Brown returned all the way to the Horn 28. Peeples passed to Brown and Brown gained to the 10 before Rodriguez stopped him.

Then the Horn defense came alive once again. David Smith hauled in Winningham back on the 13. 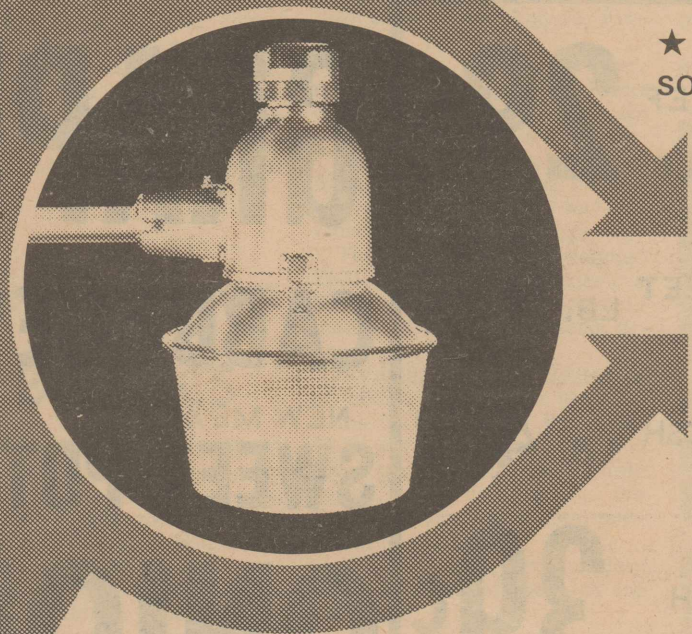
