Hart Woman Burns Candle In Quest To Finish Schooling

Mrs. Claude Cox of Hart is "moonlighting" in a big way these days -- and successfully, too -- as she tackles the many full-time jobs of being housewife, mother of four and student.

Irene Cox started back to school seven years ago -- shortly after the birth of the youngest of the Cox children. Now seven years later, with all the children -- Veronica, 12; Steve, 10; Mike, 8; and Larry, 7 -- in school, she is plunging into a full-time academic schedule.

In the seven years of slow part-time education, she has reached just past the junior stage in high school (and done a little college work on the side), but now the pace has quickened.

Presently nine courses face the Hart housewife. She is taking algebra, geometry, and chemistry and typing at Hart

High School; and she is also taking correspondence English algebra, geometry and ancient history from American Correspondence Schools. Piano lessons fill out her already full course load.

The piano lessons serve a functional purpose, as Mrs. Cox has also volunteered to play piano and substitute teach in Sunday School at the church.

As far as the courses themselves are concerned, she says, "All are about equally difficult -- but geometry does have its own problems."

And future plans are perhaps even more hectic than present activities for her. She says she plans to start her college education next year at either West Texas State University or Texas Technological College in Lubbock.

The actual choice of institution will hinge heavily on recommendations of the American Chemistry Society, as Mrs. Cox is figuring on a degree

series with a primary major in the field of chemistry.

She says she plans to obtain BS and MS degrees at the college where she starts her chemistry curriculum, and then she plans to go on and get a PhD in chemistry at Texas Tech (as West Texas does not presently have a doctoral program in their chemistry dept.).

To go with her chemistry major, she figures on working toward a physics minor on at least the first degree.

With research chemistry as a final goal, she hopes to be able to get the PhD degree in eight years -- going to school summers. If she is not able to go to school during summer sessions, she says it will probably take at least 10 years to get the final degree in the series.

She says her basic interest is in the medical applications of the field, and that she eventually hopes to be able to do medically oriented laboratory research.

A typical day in the life of this housewife mother student begins at 5:30 a.m. From the 5:30 start, the activities begin to fall at a rapid rate -- breakfast, exercises; and go to school.

Mrs. Cox spends four hours each school day in classes and three and a half hours at the school in other study for her four local courses. The school-going members of the family arrive at home about 4:15 p.m.

The final session with the books lasts for Mrs. Cox until she falls asleep.

Housework and shopping are saved for the weekends, and on Monday the "5:30" til exhaustion schedule" is started once again.

Accident Claims Ernest L. Brooks

Services for Ernest Lee Brooks, 35, of Hart were held at the First Methodist Church in Hart at 3 p.m. Sept. 25, with the Rev. Lyman P. Wood of Borger, former pastor of Hart, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. E. H. Phillips, pastor.

Brooks was killed in an automobile accident Wednesday night, Sept. 23, near Strawn. Others involved in the accident were Furch Riley of Springlake who is in serious condition at the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock; Douglas Higgins of Hart, son-in-law of Furch Riley; and Jack Sanders of Hart, nephew of Furch Riley. The four had left Hart at 11 a.m. Wednesday Sept. 23, for a short fishing trip to Possum Kingdom.

Brooks was born Feb. 26, 1929, at Plainview. He moved with his parents to Hart in 1942. He was married to Geneva Louise Aven, April 18, 1947. He farmed three miles east of Hart. He became a member of the First Methodist Church at the age of seven years, and at the time of his death was a member of the First Methodist Church at Hart.

Brooks was an active director of the Co-op Gin.

Surviving are his wife, Geneva; a daughter, Rene, 16; three sons, David, 14; Robert and Roger, 13; all of the home; a brother, Bobby Edd of Plainview; a sister, Betty Armstrong of Clovis, N. M.; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Brooks of Hart; a grandmother, Mrs. A. T. Matsler of Plainview; and a great-grandmother, Mrs. Mary Francis Lackey of Brownfield.

Horns Play At Anton

Still looking for their first victory, the Hart Longhorns head for Anton this Friday.

The Anton Bulldogs, also seeking their first victory of the season will be waiting to continue Hart's losing streak.

The Bulldogs lost their season opener 18-6 to the Nazareth Swifts, and then they lost to Ropesville 32-14.

Against Ropesville the Bulldogs didn't get a touchdown until the third period, when Ron Biffle managed two yards and Larry Crews ran for the extra points. Larry Conklin finished the Bulldog scoring on a three-yard plunge in the final period.

Last week the Bulldogs gained a tie in a hard-fought battle with the Cooper Pirates. Cooper picked up six points right off the bat, but the Bulldogs had to fight into the last period before they managed to tie the score 6-6 on a three-yard blast by Conklin.

Anton gained 199 yards in securing the tie -- 71 of them in the air. And Paul Swanson, Nicky Biffle and Willie Bell proved standouts on defense, as the Bulldogs held the Pirates scoreless for the final three quarters of the game.

It looks like the Horns will be going up against another strong defense this week -- at least strong in comparison with the Longhorn offense. And the Bulldogs have been more successful so far this year offensively than have the Longhorns, picking up 26 points to the Horns 20 on offense.

However, it appears that the two teams are fairly evenly matched on offense; and that once again defense will be the determining factor in the game.

The Longhorns have gone throughout three games now without serious injury, and they will be heading south at full strength.

With both teams trying to get into the win column, the game be hard-fought all the way. It will be the last chance the Horns will have to pick up a victory before starting conference play against the Nazareth Swifts here next week.

Hart Gets Rain, Cold

Cold weather got it's best blast of the seige early Monday. The lowest temperature of the season was recorded when the mercury skidded to a chilly 41 just before dawn.


The early arrival of cold weather has led to some speculation on an early winter -- and an accompanying early freeze.

- 1/2 cup shortening
 - 1 2/3 cups granulated sugar
 - 2 teaspoons vanilla
 - 2 eggs
 - 2 1-oz. squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
 - 2 cups sifted flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1/3 cup milk
 - 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
 - Imperial 10X powdered sugar
- Thoroughly cream together shortening, imperial granulated sugar and vanilla. Beat in eggs. Add melted chocolate; blend well. Sift dry ingredients together and add to first mixture alternately with milk. Blend well. Stir in nuts. Refrigerate 5 hours. Form in 1" balls; roll in imperial 10X powdered sugar. Place 3" apart on greased baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees about 15

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TURKS DROP

A hard-fighting group of Turkey Turks invaded Hart Friday night, and corralled themselves a herd of Longhorns. Once corralled, the horns were rapidly slaughtered to the tune of 33-0 -- the worst defeat of the season.

Showing a very strong defense, the Turkey horde held the Horns to a single first down during the first half of the game, and allowed only four Longhorn first downs through the entire contest.

The Turk offensive attack could be summed up in three names -- Young, Lane, Stephens.

Quarterback Jack Young turned in a brilliant job of guiding the invading Turks -- losing 19 yards on the ground, but scoring one touchdown and passing for 136 yards; while also doing the punting when needed.

Halfback Roy Stephens provided a big running punch -- scoring the first three Turk TD's, while gaining 200 yards on 22 carries and ramming over the first extra points.

Fullback Barry Lane added a second running punch to give the Turks a one-two combination. He gained almost 80 yards, while proving an ever-present threat on kick-off and punt returns.

The Horn offensive attack, on the other hand, never got off the ground. The Horns managed only a single first down in the first half, gained only seven yards on their only completed pass of the game, and they even started off by losing the ball on a fumble the very first series they had possession of it.

Gary Heller took the opening kick-off on the 15-yard line and returned it to the 24. Harvey Sullivan banged out to the 25, but a penalty to the 20 wiped out the 1-yard gain. Heller went to the line of scrimmage, Danny Rodriguez lost one to the 19, and then the Turks recovered a Horn fumble on the 11-yard line.

Fullback Barry Lane started the Turk drive deep in Horn territory by driving for four to the 7-yard line, but he lost one on the second play. Attempting to pass on the third play of the series, quarterback Jack Young was spilled back on the 11-yard line. Lane boomed down to the 4-yard line on the fourth down attempt, and the Horns took over again.

Hart picked up its lone first down of the first half on two-yard gains by Heller and Doug Martin, a five-yard penalty and a three-yard gain by Heller.

Sullivan gained five-yards on two carries, but Heller was spilled for a two-yard loss -- and Danny Rodriguez punted out of bounds at the Horn 40-yard marker.

Four plays and three first downs later the Turks had their first score of the game.

Roy Stephens, making his first carry of the game, picked up a first down on the 30 before Heller managed to bring him down.

Stephens then banged down to the 24, where Sullivan managed to haul him in. Lane moved the pigskin down to the 15-yard line, with Sullivan again making the stop.

Stephens took the handoff and went into the end zone for the six-pointer with 5:12 remaining in the first quarter. Stephens ran the points, and the Turks jumped out to an 8-0 lead.

Rodney Mullin again kicked off for the Turks, booming his kick to the 10-yard line.

Rodriguez returned the kick to the 28, and three plays later the Horns were bogged down at the 29. Rodriguez punted out of bounds at the Turk 46-yard line.

Stephens immediately moved the ball into Horn territory, and a 15-yard penalty moved it to the Horn 32.

Nine more plays, three more first downs, and the Turks had another six points. Stephens rammied the ball across from the 9-yard line with 59 seconds left in the first quarter. Tim Saiem attempted the points after, but his kick was no good.

Mullin again kicked to the Hart 10-yard line, where Rodriguez gathered in the ball and returned to the 22. Sullivan gained one yard, Heller lost two, Rodriguez gained to the 28 and then kicked to the Turk 45.

Three plays later, they were sitting first and 10 at the 31. Young passed incomplete. Young hit Hammer, good to the 24. Young passed back to the 31. With fourth and 10, Stephens ripped around his left end for the TD -- with 4:19 left in the half.

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

Four plays and a five-yard penalty later the Horns were on the 23, and Larry Houston punted to the 40.

Barry Lane picked up the punt and moved to the 29 before Tommy Morrison hauled him in. Young passed incomplete, and Lane lost a yard. Young completed a pass to Case, but the Turks lost five more on the play. Young punted out of bounds at the 30-yard stripe.

Heller gained to the 35, and then he passed to Mark Martin at the 42; but offsetting penalties wiped out the gain. Two consecutive off-sides penalties moved the ball back to the 30 and knocked off a down. On third and 10, Heller gained to the 33. Houston punted out of bounds at the 39 of Turkey.

The Turks then picked up a TD the hard way. The Horn defense tightened and 13 plays, two penalties and three first downs later the Turks suddenly found themselves pushed back 25 yards to the Horn 45.

The Horns got the ball with only 17 seconds left in the game. Heller passed incomplete -- the play being broken up by Jerry Lane with :07 showing on the clock. Heller made a desperation pass to W. A. Hawkins, and it was almost good -- but once again Jerry Lane was right on the play to knock Hawkins away from the ball as he got his fingertips on it.


