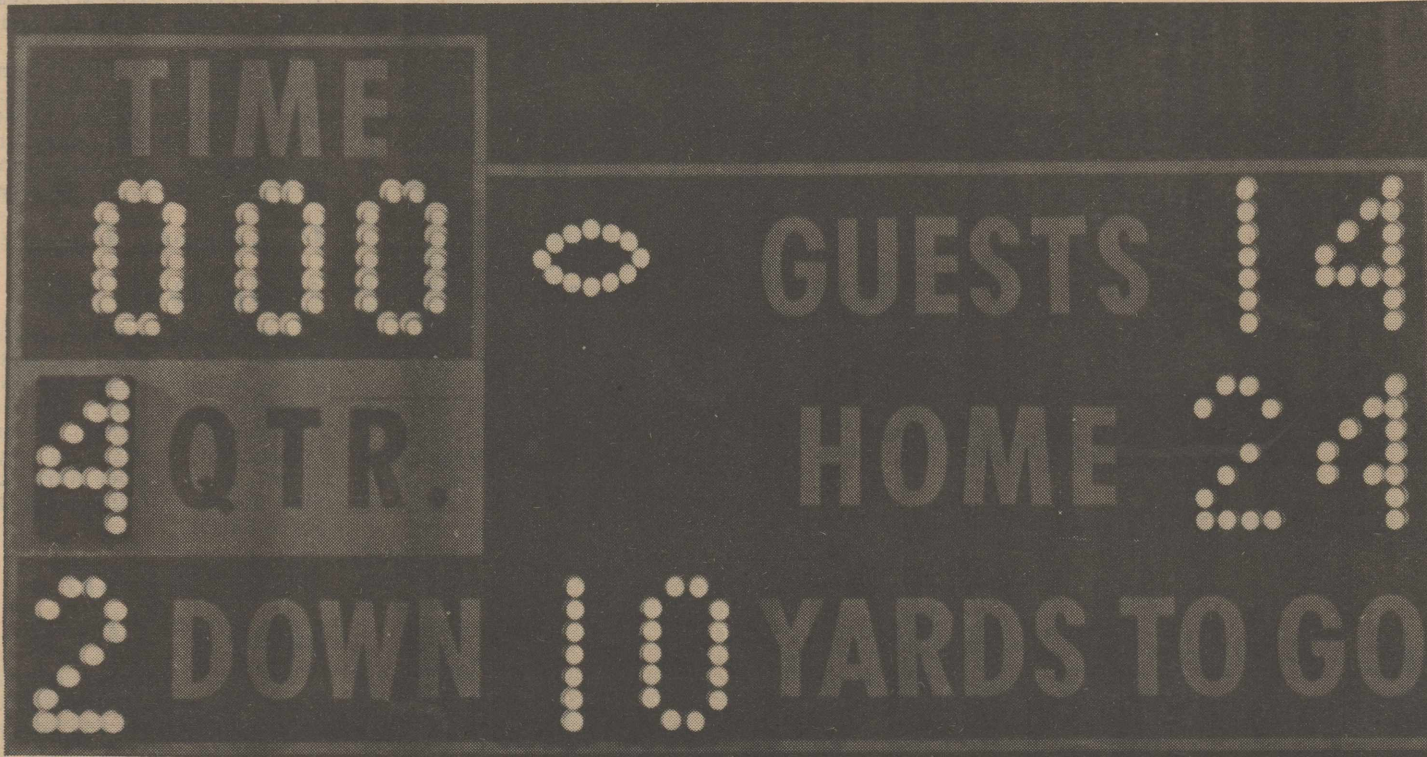

The three queen candidates were escorted onto the field prior to the game by members of the football team -- Mark Martin, Gary Heller and Harvey Sullivan.

Co-captain Tommy Morrison presented the queen's sash and bouquet to the homecoming queen, and co-captain Harvey Sullivan presented the queen with her crown.

Each of the co-captains was rewarded with a kiss, and then they went forth to lead their team to victory.

### .....A Sweet Hart Victory

The Hart Longhorns locked horns with the Lazbuddie Longhorns here Friday, and Hart's homecoming was enhanced with the first victory of the season.

Hart is no longer at the bottom of the district standings. The conference victory over Lazbuddie left Lazbuddie all alone in the conference cellar.

Prior to the game, Rene Brooks, Hart Cheerleader, was crowned Homecoming Queen. Longhorn co-captains Tommy Morrison and Harvey Sullivan presented crown, bouquet and sash to the new queen.

Other queen candidates were Dixie Kendrick and Becky Burress.

Larry McKay got the game underway by booting the ball down the field. Lazbuddie's Mike Tree fielded the ball on the 1-yard line and returned to the 14-yard point.

Two minutes and four plays later Hart had the ball on the Lazbuddie 42 -- following a 21-yard punt by John Mabry.

Four plays later Danny Rodriguez punted 35 yards to the 7-yard point. Lazbuddie was again unable to come up with a first down, and Mabry punted 35 yards.

Rodriguez fielded the ball at the 45 and returned it to the 33. He then gained to the 27, and David Smith picked up the first first down of the game at the 22 -- with 5:51 remaining in the first period.

The Hart Horns were off and moving with the ground game which provided them with both the first touchdown and the first victory of the year.

Rodriguez gained to the 18, Smith moved to the 14 and Heller got down to the 11. A penalty moved the ball down to the 7-yard line.

Gary Heller carried to the 2 yard line, and Smith went in for the six points with almost four minutes remaining in the first quarter. Heller fumbled on the attempt for extra points and Hart had a 6-0 lead

-- the lead which held through the first half.

### HORNS MEET BOVINA

With a victory to spur them on, the Hart Longhorns travel to Bovina this week to tangle with the Mustangs.

Bovina's Mustangs are likely to prove themselves very rough competition indeed.

Bovina started out the season with some rather bad losses -- falling 21-0 to Farwell, going down 42-14 to Springlake and tripping 25-20 to Amherst.

But since that Amherst defeat, the Bulldogs have piled

up a district game and 20-12 over Meadow, 26-0 over Texline in the first district game and 20-12 over Happy last week.

So Bovina will enter the game with a 2-0 conference record, while Hart will be carrying a 1-1 district record.

Bovina also started the season with a new coach -- as did the Horns. But the Mustangs returned six regulars to this year's squad, to Hart's four.

Both teams have been steadily improving, but the Mustangs have a better record to show for their improvement.

The Mustang's offensive threat is centered around an experienced quarterback -- David Anderson, 156-pound senior letterman.

The Horns should start with the same team which picked up the victory over Lazbuddie.



by fumbles and incomplete and intercepted passes.

Following the Hart touchdown at the 39. On the second play from scrimmage Mabry boomed across to the Hart 43 before Hart's Larry Houston stopped him. Two plays later quarterback Terry Parham fumbled, and Hart's Danny Rodriguez ended up with the ball at the 36.

Rodriguez moved out to the 45, and David Smith got the first down at the Lazbuddie 49.

Two plays later, Lazbuddie's Mike Tree hauled in a Doug Martin pass and returned to the Hart 46.

Bradshaw, Parham, and Mabry co-operated for a first down, at the 20-yard line, in three plays.

Tree went to the 18, and Mabry was stopped at the 18 by Houston and Harvey Sullivan. Mabry tried to pass to Parham, but the pass fell incomplete and Hart took the ball when Mabry could gain only to the 16 on the fourth down at the 28.

A penalty on the next play set Hart back at the 23, and Lazbuddie's Jimmy Foster intercepted a pass at the 32.

Four plays later, Mabry was at the 9, but he lacked just more than an inch of having the first down.

Hart moved out to the 18 1/2 before Rodriguez punted to the 44.

Lazbuddie started moving -- with first downs on the 31, 20 and 10 -- but Parham fumbled, and Larry Houston jumped on the ball at the 20-yard line.

Rodriguez gained to the 25 -- with 26 seconds left in the half. Smith went to the 28 -- with 12 seconds left. Smith lost to the 24 -- :05 left -- and Heller scampered to the 39 for a first down as the half ended.

Hart led at the half 6-0. And it was the first time this season that the Hart Horns were able to go to the dressing room with a half-time lead.

Rodriguez returned the second half kick-off 21 yards to the 26.

Although David Smith had his finest night this season, he fumbled the first play from scrimmage in the second half -- and Lazbuddie's Craig Shoeman recovered the pigskin at the 31.

The recovery and a penalty were practically all the Lazbuddie Longhorns needed to take the lead in the game.

Mabry gained to the 26, and a penalty on Bradshaw's gain to the 24 moved the ball to the 12 yard line.

Mabry went to the 8-yard line.

Bradshaw gained another yard. Then Mabry went in for the touchdown, and Bradshaw ran the conversion.

With 9:23 left in the third quarter Lazbuddie was in the lead 8-6.

Hart came right back to take the lead again.

Sullivan fielded the kick on the 20 and moved up to the 39-yard line.

Rodriguez gained to the 40, and Smith went 14 yards for the first down at the Lazbuddie 46.

Heller went to the 38, and a penalty on the tackle moved the ball to the 23-yard line.

Smith moved to the 15, and then he went in for the touchdown. Heller was stopped on the extra points attempt, but Hart had a 12-8 lead with seven minutes left in the period.

Lazbuddie marched right back. The third quarter ended with Hart enjoying that 12-8 lead, but it only took one play into the fourth quarter for Lazbuddie to move back into the lead.

Starting on their own 40 with seven minutes remaining in the period, Lazbuddie started down the field.

Mabry to the 48, Bradshaw back to the 4, Mabry for the first down at the Hart 40.

The drive almost stopped when W. A. Hawkins almost intercepted a Parham pass, but Mabry picked up a first down at the 30 on a fourth down play with seven yards needed for the first down.

Mabry to the 25, Bradshaw to the 23 and Parham passed incomplete -- but a penalty provided the first down on the 20-yard line.

Bradshaw moved to the 12, and Mabry picked up a first down at the 8-yard line.

Two plays later Parham hit Bradshaw with a pass at about the 5-yard line. Bradshaw hauled in the pass and started for the end zone, but Hawkins and Larry McKay tripped him up at the 1-yard line. It was all for nothing, however, because a penalty on the play set Lazbuddie back on the 10. Bradshaw went to the 4-yard line, and Mabry pushed to the 1-yard point -- and the quarter ended with Hart still leading 12-8.

On fourth and goal to go -- the first play in the final period -- Bradshaw went in for the touchdown. Mabry was stopped on the conversion attempt, and Lazbuddie led 14-12 with 11:52 left in the game.

If the first half had been a defensive game, the second half was all offense. Hart came right back for another TD and the lead again.
