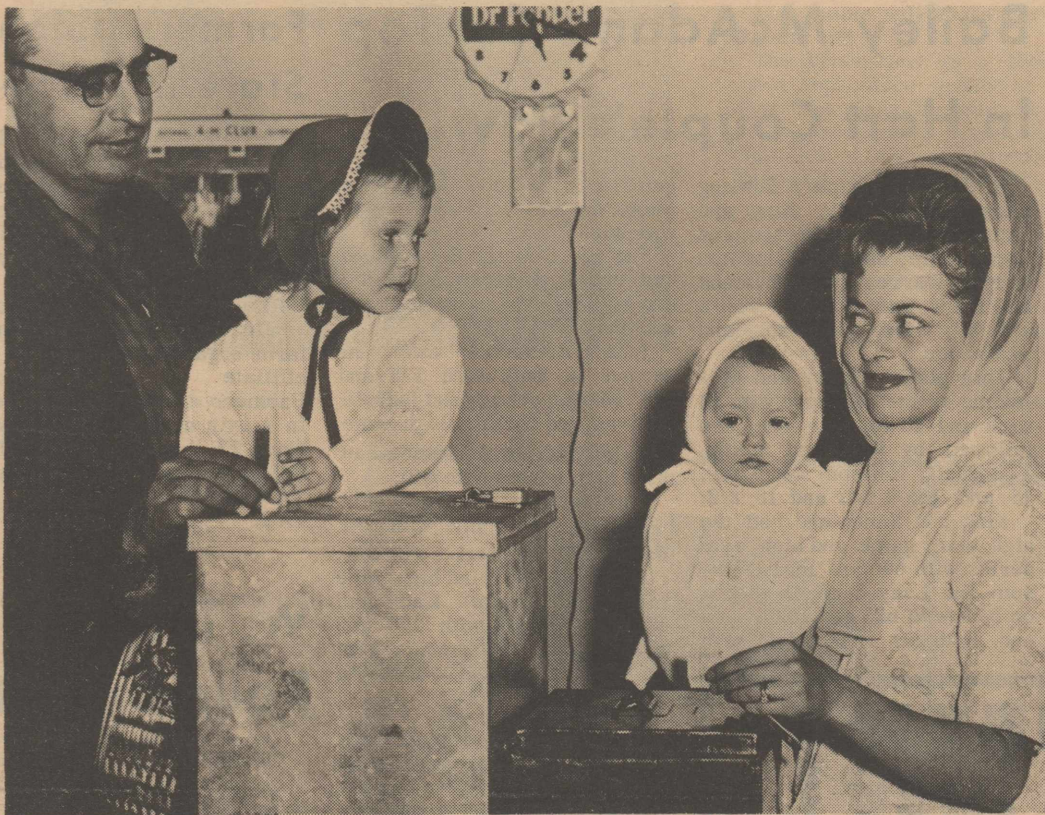

LBJ LANDSLIDE HERE, TOO

Hart voters turned out in droves Tuesday, casting a total of 423 ballots in the general election, and the results could all be summed up in one word -- Democratic.

Democratic in Hart.
Democratic in Castro County.
Democratic in Texas.
Democratic throughout the nation.

With a popular vote margin approaching the 15 million mark early Wednesday, Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson seems assured of returning to the White House with a history-making popular vote percentage.

Hart voters cast 366 for the President, while tallying only 51 votes for Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater. Johnson got 87.8 per cent of the Hart vote -- a seven to one majority.

Throughout the county the Johnson-Humphrey team rolled up almost three to one majority over Republicans Goldwater - Miller.

Ralph W. Yarborough earned a second term in the Senate by a landslide, but it was by the smallest of the Democratic landslides in Hart, Castro County and the State.

Across the state Yarborough polled 56.2 per cent of the vote. In Castro County he had better than a two to one margin over Republican George Bush. And in Hart Sen. Yarborough got 327 votes, or 80.4 per cent for a four to one margin.

Congressman at Large Joe Pool was re-elected in the state, with a large majority in the county and a whopping 385-45 vote in Hart.

Walter Rogers won his race with Bob Price for a seat in Congress -- again -- with a

355-47 run in Hart and a 1941-593 vote in the county.

Gov. John Connally won easily over GOP challenger Jack Crichton. Hart gave Connally a 369-25 majority, and the county went Connally 2081-355.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith of Lubbock ran even better than did the governor. Smith won 373-26 in Hart, and 2081-365 in the county, and easily in the state returns.

Attorney General Waggoner Carr ran the best race of any opposed Democratic candidate. Carr's Hart majority was 378-26, and the county went Carr 2151-368.

John C. White will remain commissioner of agriculture, and Jerry Sadler will continue to head the general land office.

Robert Calvert will continue as comptroller, and Jesse James remains treasurer.

Jim C. Langdon, railroad commissioner, and Jack Pope, Supreme Court seat, continue in their positions.

Three constitutional amendments were on the ballot and all three carried easily.

Hart voted for all three of them. The vote on the school fund amendment was 152-85. The amendment on conservation districts passed here 155-75. And medical care for the aged passed by the largest majority of all -- 181-68.

So complete was the Democratic sweep throughout the state that the two Republican members of the House of Representatives -- Bruce Alger of Dallas and Ed Foreman of Odessa -- were unseated and replaced by Democrats.

The only remaining national representative of the Republican party in Texas is Sen. John Tower -- and he was not up for re-election this year.

The count in the Presidential race Wednesday showed Johnson-Humphrey leading with 40,653,046 votes to the Goldwater - Miller total of 25,664,322. These results were reported to be about 95 per cent complete.

The LBJ-HHH count in Texas was 1,479,079 to the BG-BM total of 870,169.

The Democratic candidates were taking 61.4 per cent of the national vote -- more than one per cent better than the 1936 popular vote margin, which was the greatest in the history of the United States.

In the senatorial race, Yarborough had built up a lead of almost 300,000 votes over Bush. Yarborough leading 1,301,664 to 1,014,172.

The current electoral count is 486 for Johnson and 52 for Goldwater. Goldwater is leading in his home state of Arizona. He has won in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina -- the traditionally Democratic "Solid South."

But the rest of the nation is in the Democratic camp.

Phone Co. Sale Told

The selling stockholders were Mrs. T. A. Singer, widow of T. A. Singer, a long time pioneer in the independent telephone industry. Elton Singer, Robert Singer, Estate of Jimmie Singer and Juanita Singer Stiff.

Trans-Continental Telephone and Electronics, Inc. whose first public stock offering was in June, is based in Dallas and operates, with this acquisition, 60 telephone exchanges in Texas and Oklahoma. Thomas L. Anderson, President of the firm stated, "Dimmitt will fit nicely into our organization since we are already operating in eight Panhandle counties. We expect great things in that part of Texas since irrigation plays such an increasingly important role in agriculture. We are very proud to become owners of this property and will certainly give the finest possible service to the people."

Bill Woodard has been transferred to division manager of this county. He was formerly working as manager of the telephone company in Lancaster, Dallas County.

Horns Go To Texline

The Longhorns take to the road this week for the last and longest road trip of the current football season -- traveling to Texline to take on the Tornados.

The Longhorns will be taking a 1-3 district record with them, and Texline will be waiting with a 0-3 district record.

Texline and Lazbuddie share the conference cellar, but a Tornado victory would move Texline ahead of Hart in the standings.

Texline dropped a game to Happy last week -- 20-12. And Hart will close out their season against Happy at Hart.

The Longhorns have been improving throughout the season, and, in spite of the strange twists always present in the game, they made a very good second-half showing against a

strongly favored Vega team last week.

Four quarters of such play against Texline could quite conceivably give the Longhorns a 2-3 district record when they tackle pre-season favorite, Happy, here.

VEGA TOPS HO

The Vega Longhorns came to town last Friday to match wits with the Hart Longhorns, and when the dust settled around the football field, the visitors had escaped with a 40-22 victory.

Vega scored first and last in a game remarkably free of penalties.

Vega seriously outclassed Hart in only one category -- rushing -- but came up with more than twice the Hart total in that category.

Vega proved both explosive and lucky on offense, and extremely stubborn on defense throughout the first half.

The first half of the game was all Vega's, and Hart came out ahead in the second half. But the first half advantage was too great for the Hart eleven.

Vega scored the first time they got the ball, and they got the ball to start the game.

Larry McKay kicked off for Hart, and Perry Kirkland returned the ball 19 yards to the Vega 38.

Three plays later Vega had the first first down of the game -- at the Hart 46.

Keeping the ball on the ground, Vega picked up another first down at the Hart 34 three plays later.

Roy Jackson and Ken Purcell were doing the carrying job for Vega. Jackson picked up the first two first downs, and Purcell picked up the third at the 15.

Jackson moved the ball to the 7-yard mark in two carries, and quarterback Johnny Haliburton took the ball in for the score with two more carries.

The kick for extra points was good and Vega led 7-0 with 7:07 left in the first period.

McKay took the kickoff at the 21 and returned it to the 38 for Hart.

Three running plays later, Hart was back at the 38. Danny Rodriguez booted the ball to the 5-yard line of Vega, and Purcell brought it out to the 15.

Then disaster -- in the form of Roy Jackson -- struck. An 85-yard gallop on the first play from scrimmage in the series brought forth a quick second touchdown for Vega.

The kick was missed, and Vega took a 13-0 lead with 4:45 left in the first quarter.

Rodriguez took the kickoff for Hart at the 15. David Smith

bulled his way to the 17, and Rodriguez gained to 20. Then Heller aimed a pass for Larry Houston, but Vega's Lloyd Brandes hauled it in at the Hart 43.

Purcell lost to the 45 and then gained to the 42. Haliburton passed incomplete and then punted to the 24. But a penalty on the fourth-down play gave Vega a first down at the 27.

After another pass attempt -- incomplete -- Jackson starting trying his luck. He gained to the 18, but then Billy Bell, Larry McKay and David Smith trapped him back at the 22. On fourth-and-five Jackson carried once more -- to the 17 -- but he was snowed under just inches short of the first down.

Rodriguez punched out to the 20, but then disaster struck again at the Hart group. Vega's Mike Richardson recovered a missed hand-off at the line of scrimmage.

Jackson gained a yard to the 19, and then Haliburton started passing. The first aerial try was incomplete, but Brandes snagged the second one for the the touchdown.

The kick for extra points was good, and Vega took a 20-0 lead with 11:51 left in the half.

The Hart offense started to come to life, and the game ceased to the slaughter it started out as.

Hart put the ball in play at their own 27.

Smith gained to the 32, and Heller picked up the first Hart first down at the 39.

W. A. Hawkins scampered to the 45, and Smith moved the ball into Vega territory -- at the 48 yard line.

Rodriguez gained four yards, and Smith picked up a third Hart first down at the 38.

Rodriguez gained a yard, Heller gained five, and Smith collected another first down.

Hawkins gained to the 21, and Rodriguez went to the 20. A penalty gave Hart a first down on the 15.

Smith carried twice, and went in for a touchdown from the 1-yard line.

Heller ran the extra points, and Hart trailed 20-8 with 6:20 left in the half.

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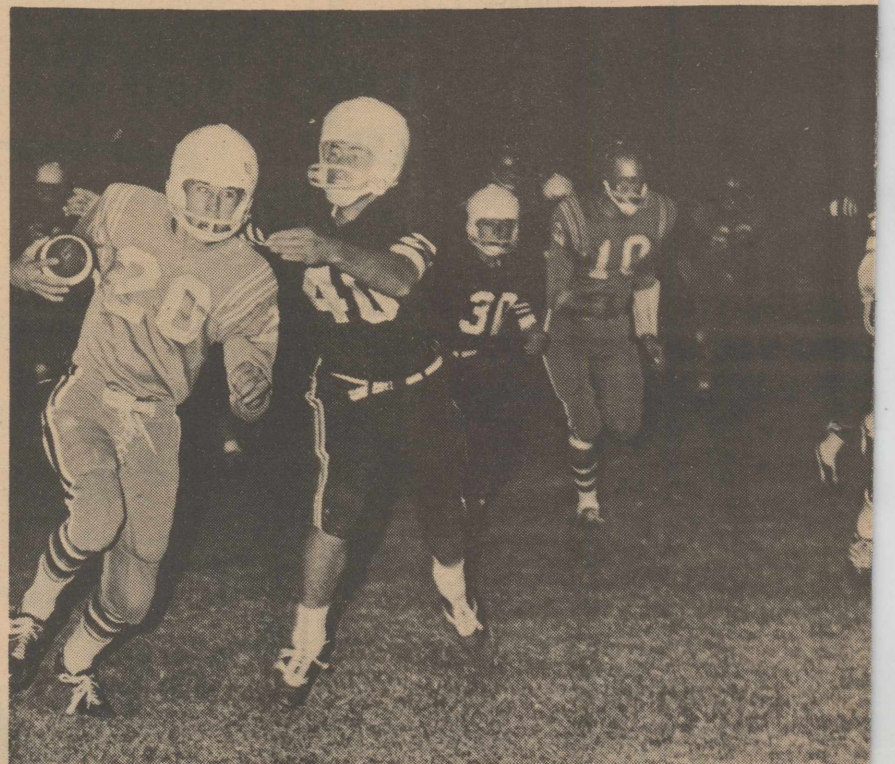

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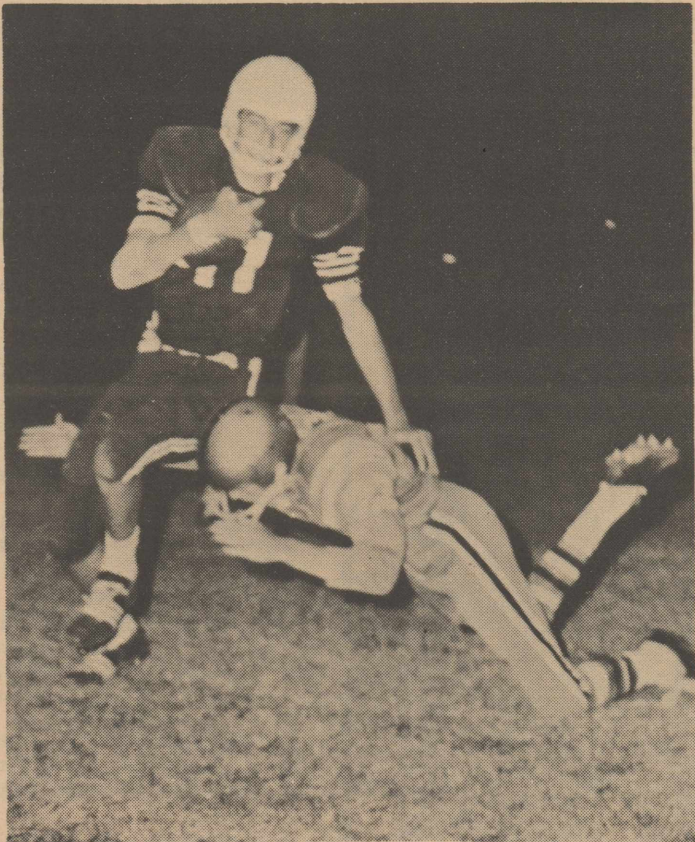

But Lady Luck smiled on Hart. Purcell bobbled the ball, and Hawkins hit him just about the time he was starting to figure out where the handle was. Larry Houston recovered the fumble at the Vega 41.

Three plays later, Heller hit Rodriguez with a pass -- good to the 22.

Heller gained to the 18, and then lost to the 28, and then lost to the 31. And then a fourth-down Heller to Rodriguez pass was good to the 11-yard line.

Three plays later Smith went in for the score.

The try for extra points was no good, but Hart trailed only 33-22.

But then here came Vega again -- finally brought to life.

Vega started a long march down the field -- staying on the ground and using up lots of time.

Five first downs and twelve plays later, Vega punched over the final score of the ball game.

The kick was good, and Vega led 40-22 with one minute left in the game.

Hart fought back out to the 49 but time ran out before they could get into Vega territory.

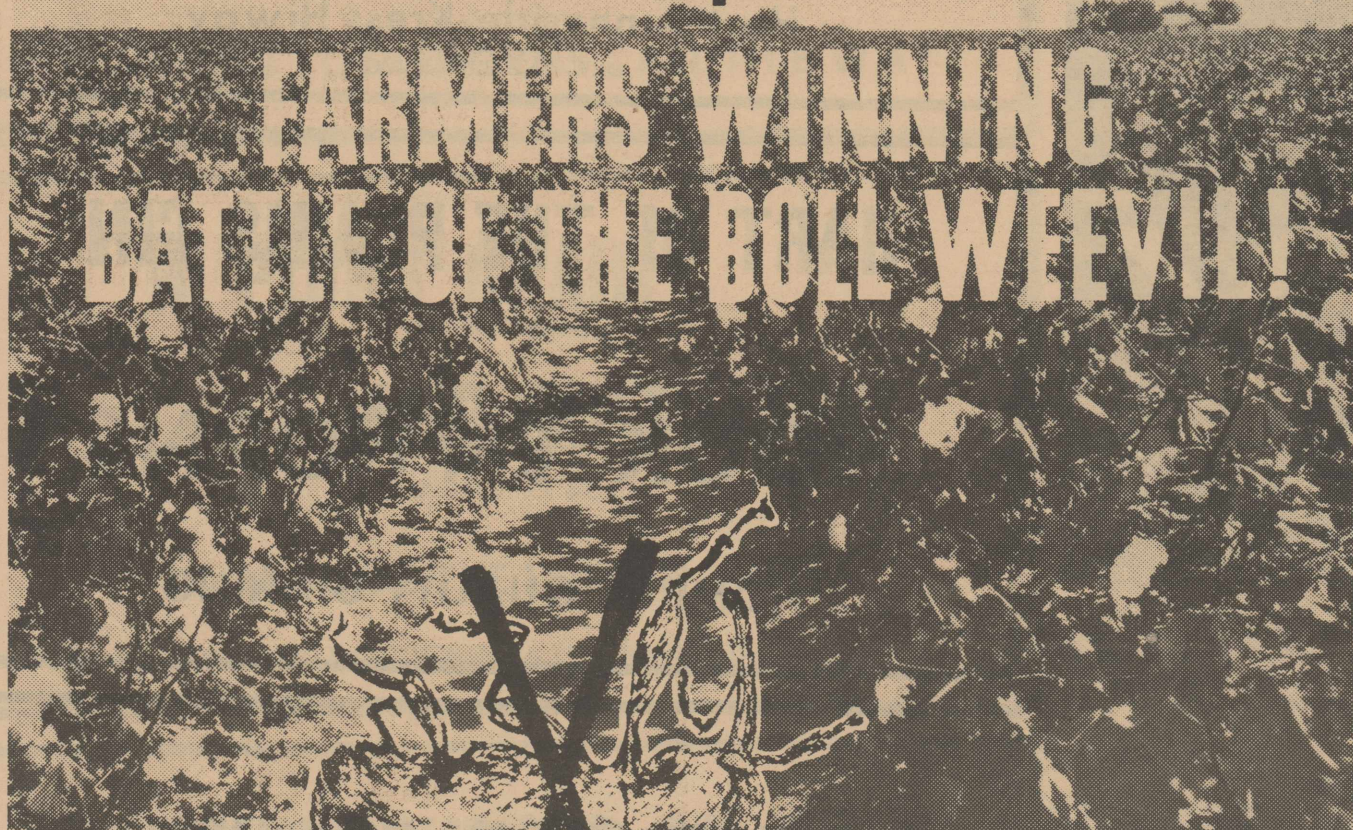

Official Communique:

FARMERS WINNING BATTLE OF THE BOLL WEEVIL!



BATTLE RECORD TO DATE

SPRAYING	ACRES SPRAYED	COMMENT
Number 1 (Beginning Sept. 15)	303,000 acres (Originally estimated 240,000 acres. Total includes Skip-row)	First application was hampered by rain, wind, etc. Migrating weevils caused increase in size of control zone. Extremely high adult and unemerged weevil populations encountered.
Number 2 (Beginning about October 4)	281,000 acres (Reduction due to acreage desiccated or harvested)	Field checks indicated effective kill of adult weevils but continuing emergence kept new weevil population up. Additional planes brought in to speed up sprayings.
Number 3 (Beginning about October 13)	230,000 acres (Continuing harvest and desiccation)	Field examination showed great reduction in number of adult weevils, with low occurrence of weevils in diapause stage. Also fewer unemerged weevils.
Number 4 (Beginning about October 21)	190,000 acres	Few unemerged and very young weevils left. Practically no weevils in diapause stage.

CONCLUSION: Remaining unemerged and young adult weevils will be kept from going into hibernation either by frost or a fifth spraying. Entomologists agree that hibernating weevils will have been reduced by more than 90 percent by end of this year's program.

Financial Arrangements

- Compresses to collect 50c per bale, and remit to a special boll weevil control fund in bank — no connection with P.C.G. regular funds.
- While compresses collect on all cotton, the contribution is voluntary for individual farmers who may request and receive refund.
- All funds are under direction of a Certified Public Accountant firm.
- Monthly financial reports by U.S.D.A. and Boll Weevil Steering Committee will be made — Complete audit will be published at the end of season.
