KENNEDY HART MAN OF YEAR

Paul Kennedy, Hart's school superintendent, with a long record of service to the community, Monday was honored as Hart's "Man of the Year." Rev. Denzil Leonard made

the award presentation at a meeting of the Hart Lions Club in the school cafeteria. The award highlighted a

Ladies Night meeting of the club.

Following the dinner and the award, entertainment was furnished by a trio of folk singers -- the Rum Rollers -- from Canyon. The group's presenta-tion included probably the liveliest versions of Goodnight Irene and Three Little Fishes ever heard in these parts.

Paul Kennedy joins a select group of "Men of the Year" in the community. Mayor Ed Harris was Hart's "Man of the Year" in 1963. Roy Pyeatt was se bened in 1969 so honored in 1962.

The school superintendent has come a long way since his birth in Alvord, Texas, in 1910. There was high school graduation -- in 1927 at Estel-

line. And there was college at Decatur Baptist, Texas Tech and West Texas State -- leading eventually to a Master's degree.

He began a long teaching career in 1931 at Carey. Though the teaching career was interrupted for service during WWII, he has taught at Panhandle, Sam Norwood, McLean and Borger.

The career included administrative positions as well as teaching, and it was ad-ministration that brought Paul Kennedy to Hart seven years ago -- as superintendent of

Married, with one daughter -- Mona Jean -- and a grand-daughter --Rue Beth Ford -was described at the banquet as "in many ways old, but forever young both at heart and in outlook."

And the school superintendent was presented a plaque for his "young at heart" civic work for the community.

Old Man Winter finally paid a long-overdue visit to the Hart area toward the end of last week, and he came in a big way when

he got around to coming. The first killing freeze of the season finally hit the area Friday morning, almost two weeks behind schedule. Then things warmed up, and

a harder freeze hit early Saturday morning.

Temperatures dropped in a hurry late Friday -- dropping toward a low of 26 degrees. At 5:30 p.m. Friday the temperature was a brisk 52 degrees, but it had dropped to a chilly 34 degrees by 8 p.m. The temp-erature at 6:30 a.m. Saturday was 26 degrees, and three hours later at 9:30 a.m. it had risen to only 28 degrees.

area cotton was still too wet to strip well.

Harvesting operations, which had been at a standstill during the wet weather preceding the freeze, started the fluffy crop rolling in to the three Hart gins this week.

Every day without rain, every day with winds and every day of sunshine help dry out the crop and speed up the harvest. About ten days to two weeks

of the drying weather, and the area cotton harve should be in full swing.

to a cotton farmers prayer, and was perhaps the most welc me visitor the area has enterta ned in quite some time.

Cotton producers were beginning to get back into the fields by Monday, though much of the

day later than the record late freeze last year, according to weather records -- which list the average freeze date as Nov.

Experiment station records, however, which go back to 1911 list the latest area freeze as Nov. 26--hit in 1944.

The late freeze was good to. grain farmers, for almost all of the sorghum crop was in by the time'the freeze came along.

According to area ginner, the late freeze should not have hurt cotton quality; the wet weather before the freeze, however, might have lowered some cotton quality as much a a full grade.

Schedule Of School Nurse **Has Varied Ingredients**

knows this fact of nursing life any better than Mrs. Corene Comer -- Hart's school nurse.

This is Mrs. Comer's seventh year as a school nurse, though she has been in the profession since her graduation from nursing school in 1947. The school nurse says she

sees fewer students each day here than any other school where she has worked. She estimated that about 10 students visit her office for first aid and medical reasons each day. The old saying points out that there is no substitute for experience, and Hart's school nurse has experience -- and more experience if need be.

In the seven years of tending students, she has seen more than 25,000 pupils in her office for medical reasons. This figure does not include the larger number of students who have been in for routine matters -- such as having eye examinations.

Asked about the daily schedule for a school nurse, Mrs. Comer points out that a schedule is rarely followed. But

The life of a school nurse some of the ingredients of a if not always as orderly as daily schedule are routine it might ideally be, and no one paper work, routine examinations, first aid for an assortment of ailments, detection of esses who were Mmes. Presstudent illness, health education, home visits.

Asked the impossible question reporters delight in asking, the school nurse replies that she is a school nurse because she enjoys the work and finds the job "gratifying."

She points out the problems -- the biggest problems being simple education and convincing mothers not to send sick children to school just to get a few minutes of peace and quiet.

She points out that one sick child can infect a whole class before being detected -- and then all the mothers in town have to put up with sick child-

School nursing is not a profession for the nervous or highstrung, for high blood pressure and ulcers could easily result from the hectic pace if the school nurse were not able to relax and enjoy the amusing aspects of her often overworked, under-appreciated position.

West Texas Telephone **Expansion Plans Told**

West Texas Telephone Company has announced plans for a gigantic expansion of telephone servcie in the entire Castro County area.

One of the most important features will be free dialing between all four of the Company's exchanges in the county. This will enable someone in Dimmitt to call a phone in the Hart, Nazareth or Sunnyside exchange at any time without a toll charge.

This system, known as the Extended Area Service or EAS, will be made possible by the installation of new equipment in all four exchanges. A great deal of outside construction will also be required.

Already work has started on this project.

Since the equipment must be ordered and built especially for this installation, company offi- pleted," cials indicated they are giving an A-1 prioity to this program. Bill Woodard, local manager, had this report as of today:

"We have engineered and stakes 52 miles of new toll line in Castro County and between Dimmitt and Plainview. Construction will begin within two weeks on this line and the contractor will have 60 days for completion. This will enable us to have the new line in operation sometime in January. This new toll cable will provide a 33 percent increase in Hart to Dimmitt toll facilities and a 25 percent increase in Dimmitt to Plainview access. Also adequate space is being made available for further call availability expansion as the need arises. By doing this outside work now we will be ready when our new equipment arrives to provide eas as quickly as possible."

Woodard also gave details of the new buildings to be built in Dimmitt and Nazareth. Architects are completing plans for both buildings and contracts will be let in January.

The Dimmitt structure will be on the present telephone property and will be several times the size of the existing building. It will be faced with an attractive brick front and provide parking facilities on the south side. Room is provided for present planned equipment and also for later expansion. As Mr. Woodard stated, "We are going to do our best to give the residents of Dimmitt and Castro County the very finest possible telephone service. The planning and construction may take a little time but we are sure they will be proud of these facilities when they are com-





Of Hart's 60 points, 46 came from free throws -- enough to defeat the Kress girls without any other scoring.


Coach Haden Moore singled out Rene Brooks as the outstanding defensive player in the action against Kress.









First Baptist Church Saturday night. The guest speaker was Lt. Col. Guarneno from Dallas. There were about 125 youth attending the rally.
