Hart Area Cotton Harvest Rolls! 6,500 Bales Ginned

Although the official start of winter is still more than two weeks away, it is winter in Hart.

The weather has been perfect cotton harvesting weather during the past week, and area cotton growers have been taking advantage of the weather to boost the area harvest.

The three Hart gins have turned out more than 6,550 bales of the 1964 crop.

Comment from the three gins was a unanimous verdict that the harvest is "really rolling along now in the area -- IF it just doesn't rain."

And the weatherman, back to his usual tricks, was predicting rain for late Thursday or Friday.

Temperatures through the early part of the week dropped into the freezing range during the early morning hours, but rose to a generally comfortable working range by mid-afternoon.

Saturday the low temperature reading was 26, and the high reading for the day was 56.

Sunday the mercury dipped only to 31, and rose to 58 during the afternoon.

Monday was a chilly day on the Plains region. The thermometer dropped to 18 during the night, and managed to climb only to 42 during the day.

A short warming trend set in Tuesday. Tuesday's low was 24; but the mercury rose all the way to the 70 degree mark during the afternoon.

Phone Company Asks Increase With Expansion

Representatives of West Texas Telephone Co., meeting with the Hart City Council Monday night, proposed rate increases to coincide with a \$600,000 expansion program now under way at the Dimmitt-headquartered facility.

Although the council took no action on the proposals, Mayor Ed Harris reported:

"Consensus of the council was that, if service can be improved as explained to us, the company is justified in its proposal."

Harris said the rate increases already have been approved by the city council at Dimmitt. He added that the new rates proposed by the company "seem to be in line" with those in other area communities.

Meeting with the Hart Council were Bill Woodard, manager of the Dimmitt phone facility, and Frank Field of Dumas, vice president, North Plains Division of Trans-Continental Telephone and Electronics, Inc. which recently purchased West Texas Telephone.

The two company spokesmen explained that a new toll cable to Plainview will be installed, calling for a capital expenditure of more than \$100,000.

Completion of this part of the project is expected soon after the first of the year.

Rates are set tentatively to advance sometime in early January, in the following manner:

Business 1-Party, from \$8 to \$11.50; business 2-Party, from \$6.50 to \$10.00; residence 1-party, from \$4.75 to \$6.25; residence 2-party, from \$4.00 to \$5.25.

After installation of new central offices in Dimmitt and Nazareth, with extended area service between Dimmitt, Nazareth, Hart, and Sunnyside, the rates are proposed to increase again.

The second increase would take place in the latter part of 1965, after an expenditure of approximately \$500,000 by the company.

Business 1-party service would then go from \$11.50 to \$12.50 per month; business 2-party from \$10.00 to \$11.00 until upgraded to 1-party; residence 1-party from \$6.25 to \$6.75; and residence 2-party from \$5.25 to \$5.75.

In addition, business extension rates would go up from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per month and residence extension rates would increase from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per month. These increases would be effective in the latter part of 1965, along with the others following the expenditure of \$500,000.

Extended area service would allow free dialing between all four of the company's exchanges in the county. It will enable someone in Dimmitt to call a phone in the Hart, Nazareth or Sunnyside exchange at any time without a toll charge.

Company representatives stressed their firm planned to do its best to give residents of Castro County the finest possible telephone service.

Farm Census Underway

The 1964 Census of Agriculture in Castro County is now underway.

Census questionnaires have been mailed to all rural boxholders in the county and enumerators are busy at work calling on farmers.

Farm and ranch operators, who are required by law to fill out the forms, are requested to do so before the visit of the enumerators in order to save time.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and production.

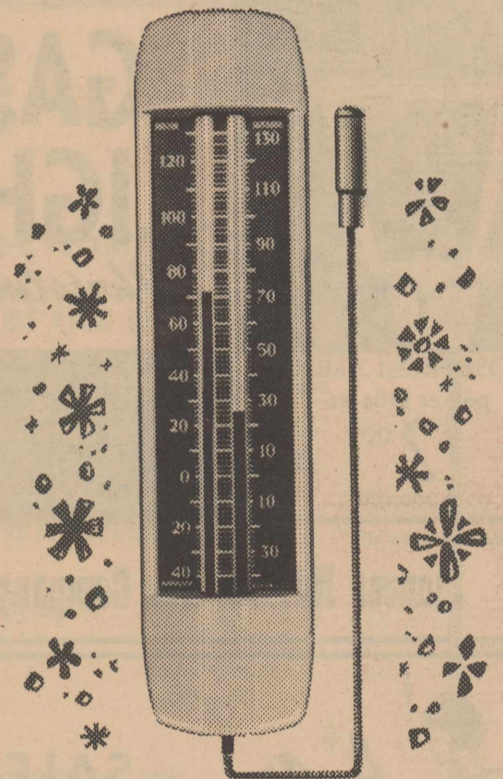

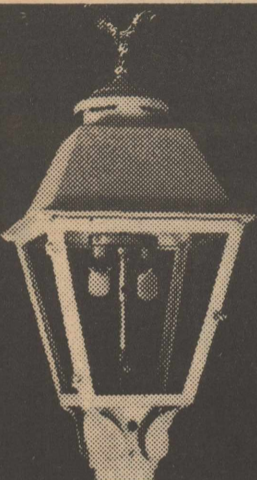

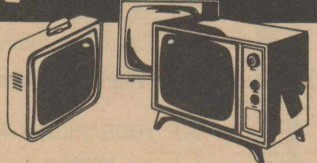

Three Vega basketball teams came to Hart Tuesday, and only one of them went back north with a victory.

The Hart girls went two games from the visitors, but the Longhorns fell 44-37 before the Vega onslaught.

The "B" team girls took the floor first Tuesday and defeated the Vega girls 24-18.

Vega led 7-2 at the end of the first period of play, but the Hart girls managed a 12-10 lead at the half. Then Vega came back to take an 18-15 lead at the end of the third quarter, but again the Hart girls rallied to a 24-18 final score -- holding Vega scoreless in the final quarter of play.

Pam Houston led the Hart offense with 11 points. Rosemary Lee added eight points to the effort, and Robbie Rice tossed in five points to finish the Hart scoring.

Martha Sharp was the defensive standout for the "B" girls.

The "A" girls took the floor for the second game of the evening.

The Hart girls opened up an immediate lead and never relinquished it. They led 18-7 at the close of the first quarter, 27-20 at the half, 45-33 at the end of the third period and 49-42 at the final buzzer.

Connie Bailey led the offensive effort with 27 points. Dixie Kendrick added 16. Verletta Crick tossed in four points, and Sherry Morrison put two points through the basket.

Sherry Morrison put in double duty -- spending about half the game at a guard position.

Linda Popejoy and Judy Humphrey led the defensive effort for the Hart girls, getting fine help from Retta Henderson.

The Vega boys popped out to a fast lead over the Hart boys, and the Longhorns had to spend the entire game trying to play catch-up basketball.

Vega led by nine points at the end of the first period. They led by ten points at the half, and still led by seven points when the game ended, holding a 44-37 lead.
