Hart Population Now Tops 800

How fast is the population of Hart growing?

That could depend on with whom you're speaking or just what figure or estimate is used. One thing is certain, however, along with Hart's general growth, the population of the town is showing some increase.

According to a statistical analysis figured by this newspaper at this time last year, Hart's population was set at 753 persons.

Using the same type of analysis, The Hart Beat figured

this week that Hart now has a population of 807 persons. Here's how it's figured.

The federal government's procedure in figuring the statistical population of any given city is to take the number of gas, electric and water meters at the time of the last census, divide it by the number of persons officially counted in that census and thus arrive at the mean average number of persons per meter.

That average figure, multi-

plied by the present number of meters, gives those figuring an accurate approximation of the population.

Because three different meter figures are used, the total of each is added and then divided by three for a population average.

The 1960 Federal Census gave Hart a population of 577. At that time, Hart had 286 electric meters in service, 158 gas meters and 193 water patrons, according to Southwestern Pub-

lic Service, Pioneer Gas, and city officials.

Applying the official population, 577, to the number of electric meters in service at that time, shows that there were 2.02 persons per electric meter.

Applying the same ratio of residents to meters in service today, 415, gives an electric meter population of 843.

At the time of the census, there were 158 gas meters in Hart. Today there are 234. Using the above means of computation, these figures give Hart

and average of 3.65 persons per gas meter. Multiply that figure by the present figure and the answer is 854.

In 1960, Hart had 193 water patrons and today the city has 250. Using the same method, this gives Hart an average of 2.90 persons for each water unit. Multiplied by the present figure, the answer is 725 persons.

The average of 725 and 843 and 854 gives Hart a present statistical population of 807 persons.

Height was born Jan. 28, 1898 in Ottumwa, Iowa. He married Zella M. Witt on Oct. 19, 1924 in Olton. He was a veteran of World War II and a member of the Baptist Church for 18 years. He was a well-known Hart farmer.

Survivors include his wife; a son, W. C., Lubbock; a daughter, Mrs. Charles Taylor, Waxahachie; three brothers, L. C., Tulia; Marvin, Odessa; Ira, Broadview, N.M.; a sister, Mrs. Fritz Graeff, Alice; five grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Progress Noted In Hart's Year

Hart residents prepare to begin a new year tomorrow, following a year of great progress for the community as a whole.

One of the most obvious signs of this progress is the new high school building which opened for classes this fall.

Constructed at a cost of \$360,000, the new building is windowless and completely air conditioned.

The old high school building has been converted to an elementary school with the addition of the new structure.

Tide Products also located and established a new plant in the Hart area this year to serve an area of 20-square miles with custom blended fertilizers. The new plant east of town represents an investment of between \$150,000 and \$175,000.

Early in the year, area farmers got together and formed the Hart Sugar Beet Assoc., with Charles Martin as president. The farmers then planted the first sugar beets ever planted in the Hart area -- some 640 acres all totaled of the sweet crop.

Farmers State Bank of Hart has continued its rapid growth, starting the year with deposits of \$1,818,279.80 -- up from \$1,535,079.65 one year earlier. Also the bank's capital structure was increased \$50,000 to a total of \$150,000.

Late in the year, the telephone company was sold to Trans-Continental Telephone and Electronics, Inc., in Dallas. Then on Dec. 1, the company asked the Hart City Council to approve rate increases to coincide with a \$600,000 expansion project of telephone facilities.

The purchase and installation of new traffic signs by the city council certainly brightened certain areas of the town and hopefully, made Hart Streets safer.

Even the agricultural community had a good year.

The year's first wheat was

harvested by Harry Young. The 14,280 pounds of grain came from Mrs. I. C. Sharp's farm.

Sept. 1 Cleve McLain brought in 13,360 pounds of grain to get credit for Hart's first load of sorghum.

B. H. "Boots" Rogers brought in the first bale of cotton Sept. 18, but the cotton harvest didn't readily get under way for more than two months.

The first freeze of the season arrived in the Hart area Nov. 20 -- two weeks later than average.

Cotton harvest operations got underway immediately, and the bales total topped 14,000 by the end of the year.

1964 was a year for politics across the nation, and things were no different in Hart.

Poll tax receipts totaled 452 in Hart, and residents were prepared for the long political battles.

Lorenzo Lee, Doyle Davis and Ralph Futrell won the first battle -- being elected to the school board in April.

The next battle was the Democratic primary in May, and that one ended in a couple of run-offs. On the local level, incumbent E. I. McLain won his race with John Rice to retain his seat as Precinct 1 county commissioner.

Even the local clubs and organizations got into the act. The American Legion Post elected Bill Swindle commander, and the Lions Club elected Wade Mills president.

The high school got into the spirit of things, too.

Tommy Morrison won the senior class presidency, and Connie Bailey won the vice-presidency. Dixie Kendrick is the class secretary, and Naomi Brooks is the senior treasurer.

George Bennett was the choice of the sophomore class for president, and Jerry Smith won the vice-presidency. Class

secretary is Rosemary Lee. Rene Brooks won the junior class presidency, with David Smith as class vice-president. Junior secretary is Charlene Moses, and treasurer is Verletta Crick.

Down in the freshman ranks, David Harris won the top spot -- and W. A. Hawkins filled the vice-presidency. Freshman secretary is Lynda Shive.

Then in November, came the final battle of the political war, and the Democrats won in a landslide in Hart -- as in much of the rest of the nation. Hart had the distinction of voting a straight Democratic ticket to go all the way with the winners.

Back during the early part of the year, class favorites were named at the high school.

Konnie Bowden, daughter of Mrs. Edna Bowden, and Dennis McLain, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. McLain, turned out to be the senior class favorites.

Junior class favorites were Carol Nivens, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Nivens, and Carl Ward, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Ward.

Favorites in the sophomore class turned out to be Rene Brooks, daughter of Mrs. Ernest Brooks, and Steve Myrick, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Myrick.

Billy Farris and Betty Galyon discovered the pleasures of reigning as Mr. and Miss Hart High School during the spring.

Meanwhile Konnie Bowden topped a field of 14 to win the Hart Lions Queen title.

Twelve seniors graduated during the spring at Hart, and Robert Wright, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Q. Wright, was valedictorian of the class.

James Mitchell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Mitchell, was salutatorian.

High school cheerleaders were elected for the coming school year just before classes were dismissed for the summer holidays.

Connie Bailey won head position, with Dixie Kendrick, Rene Brooks, Martha Sharp and Linda Popejoy filling the other four positions.

During the simmering summer, Tommy Morrison attended Boys State, as the representa-

tive of Hart's American Legion Post.

And the school administration was making news during the year, too.

Early in the year the school board renewed the contracts of Malcolm Atwood, high school principal, and G. C. Graves, grade school principal.

At the same time Robert C. Hudson, school business manager, resigned to take a similar position in Shallowater.

The next month the board renewed contracts for coaches W. L. Cleveland and Eddie Nicholson, and hired Tom Ed Benton as school business manager and tax assessor-collector.

Early in June, Malcolm Atwood resigned as high school principal to accept a teaching position with the Tulia school.

June 23 the school board met in special session to select W. A. Gardenhire to replace Atwood. Gardenhire was, at the time of his selection, principal of the O'Donnell high school.

At the same time, Haydon Moore was hired to coach at the school during the approaching year.

In August, head coach Dub Cleveland resigned to accept a position at Panhandle.

A week later, Paul Kennedy, school superintendent, announced that Jeff Smart had agreed to make a change from head coach at Clayton, N. M. to head coach at Hart High School.

In less than a month the two new coaches and the 17 boys out for football got quite a baptism, as the Silverton Owls squelched the Longhorns 30-14 in the season opener.

The only really bright spot in an otherwise unhappy season came, fittingly enough, Oct. 16, when the Horns won their homecoming game 24-14 from the Lazbuddie Longhorns.

Though it was the only victory of the season, it came timed perfectly to make the 1964 Homecoming a success.

Rene Brooks, daughter of Mrs. E. L. Brooks, reigned as Homecoming Queen. The queen also managed to fill her cheerleader position following the coronation.

Gary Heller, selected as outstanding contributor to the football team, reigned as Bon Fire King following the home coming bon fire and rally Thursday before the game.

In early December, Harvey Sullivan, Longhorn co-captain, ended up as a linebacker on the all-district 1-B defensive football team.

Tommy Morrison, Larry McKay, David Smith and Gary Heller got honorable mention in the all-district selections.

In late April, Wade Mills of Hart, named outstanding conservation farmer for 1963 in the Running Water Soil Conservation District, won the Fort Worth Press' Outstanding Conservation Farmer in Region 1 of Texas award. Region 1 covers 51 counties in the Texas Panhandle.

Nov. 23 Hart's "Man of the Year" award for 1964 was pre-

sented. The 1964 plaque went to Paul Kennedy, Hart's school superintendent and a seven-year resident of the community.

Hart had its share of break-ins and burglaries during the last year, too.

Thirteen county burglaries -- five of them in Hart -- were cleared up in mid-December with the arrest of two Plainview men in Tulia. The men arrested were Charles Clayton, 21 and O. H. Young, 22.

And Hart had its share of tragedy through the year, too.

Six serious accidents around Hart or affecting Hart residents, took four lives and seriously injured six.

Ernest Brooks was killed in an auto accident in September while on a fishing trip to Possum Kingdom.

G. W. Suggs, a Lockney attorney, was killed Aug. 13 in an auto accident near Hart.

I. C. Sharp died from burns suffered May 13 in the explosion of a house on his farm.

April 19 a 17-year-old Negro youth, Ernest Williams, drowned as he and his brother were attempting to swim in a pond on the Paul Armstrong farm.

Aug. 2 Terry Newman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Newman, was badly burned when the family auto exploded and burned in the driveway of the Newman home. His father was also burned rescuing him from the flaming car.

An Aug. 12 railroad crossing accident on the east edge of town sent four members of a bridge construction gang to the hospital.

In late December Santa Claus visited Hart, with candy and nuts for the children who came to him with their Christmas requests.

The spirit of good will settled peacefully across the country, and now with the approach of a new year comes the challenge of each new year -- an increase to progress with a decrease of tragedy.
