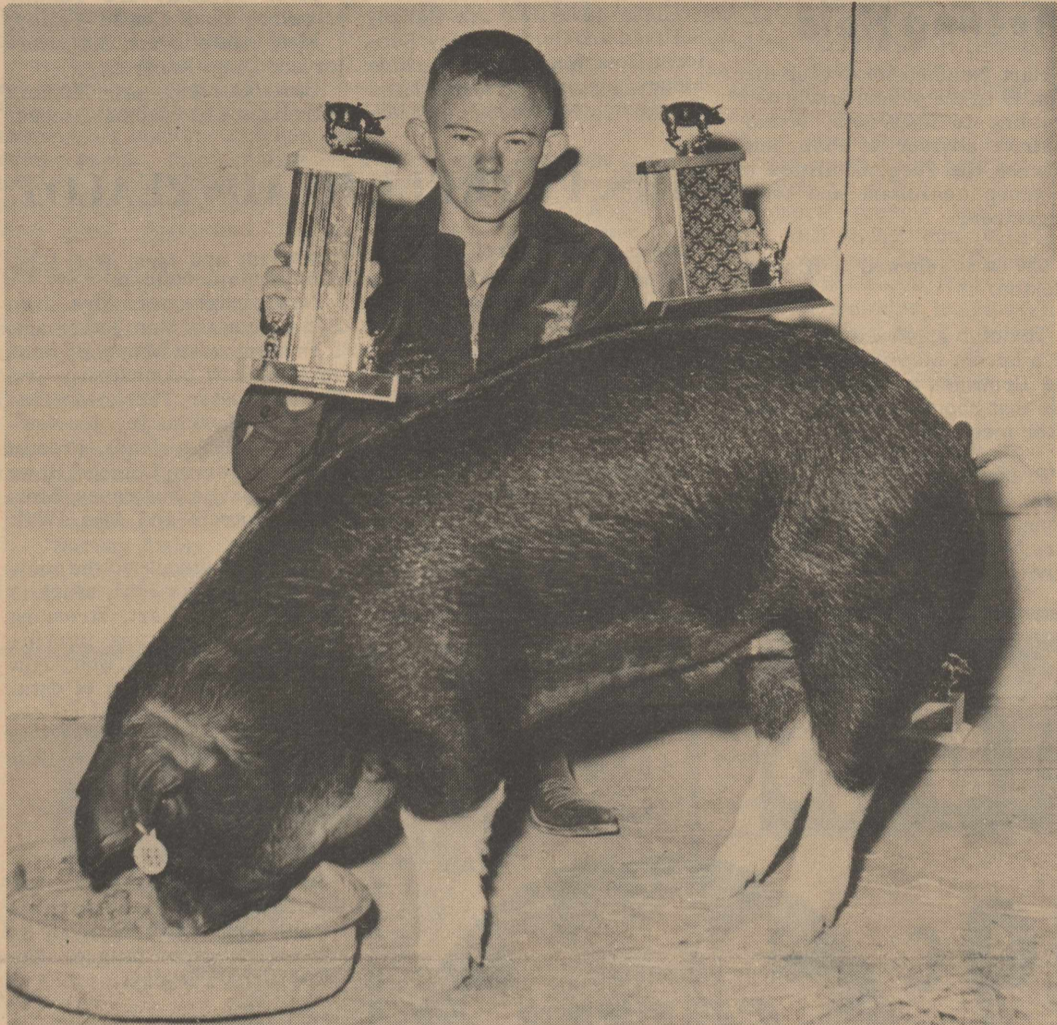

## Desegregation Policy Approved By Hart Board

Hart school trustees unanimously approved school policy on desegregation Monday night, voting full compliance with the non-discrimination section of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

The action opened the doors for integration here next fall, but it does not make it mandatory.

"If students want to go to the school next fall that they are now attending, they may do so, or they may enter at Hart," said Supt. Paul Kennedy.

About 18 Negro students living in the Hart district are now transferring out of the district and attending Bohner School at Olton.

Vote on compliance with the Civil Rights Act came as a result of federal notification to the Texas Education Agency on Jan. 3 that all schools must be in compliance or forfeit federal aid.

Hart school district is receiving about \$35,000 in federal funds this year, through school lunch, vocational and National Defense Education Act programs.

Board members explained that in Hart's case, "It is simply a matter of complying with the law or raising taxes." The board felt it had no choice other than compliance, according to school officials.

Supt. Kennedy explained that the Texas Education Agency must have a statement from each school district to determine eligibility for federal funds.

The state agency mailed "compliance forms" to all school districts this month, and each district must reply in one of four ways:

1. District in full compliance.
2. District under final court order for desegregation.
3. District with locally initiated plans for desegregation.
4. District not in compliance.

Approximately 10 percent of Hart's annual budget is supplied each year by federal funds.

In normal years, about \$25,000 comes to the school because of federal programs.

In this particular year, the amount is higher, because of the school building program.

1/2 lb. butter or l  
1/2 lb. butter or oleo  
5 eggs  
2 cups flour  
1 tsp. vanilla or lemon extract

Cream sugar and butter until creamy, beat eggs into creamed sugar and butter one at a time and beat thoroughly after each egg. Add flour in three equal parts, add extract. Bake in loaf pan or angel food cake pan at 325 degrees approximately 35 minutes.

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## New Zip Code 'Readers' To Be Installed By PO

Postmaster Jewel Brooks said today she has received word from Postmaster General John A. Gronouski in Washington, D. C. that a big "break-through" has now been made on electronic machines to "read" ZIP-code addresses on mail.

"The Postmaster General said he expects to begin installing these sophisticated new machines in major post offices starting in about a year," the postmaster explained.

Mrs. Brooks said each machine will be able to sort, as well as read, at the rate of 35,000 letters an hour.

The offices to get the address readers have not been announced, but the local postmaster said they will have significant effects on the mail in and out of each community regardless of whether it gets the new machines.

This is because they will speed incoming mail to smaller offices from major cities and step up the dispatch of mail deposited in smaller communities but which must be processed enroute at major mail massing points.

The postmaster emphasized, however, introduction of the "seeing eye" device next year does not mean ZIP Code isn't useful already.

"ZIP code," she explained, "is important in mail handling under the system of mail processing already in use which will continue to be in use as the basic system at most points. These machines will be just another step -- in conjunction with the mechanical mail sorting machines we have developed -- to help keep pace with the growing volumes of mail. Neither will the machines endanger jobs -- they will only help us meet mail expansion with minimum manpower expansion."

## Pineapple Cheese Cake For Valentine



### PINEAPPLE CHEESE CAKE

This melt-in-your-mouth pineapple cheese cake heart carries its own special Valentine message. A rich cream cheese filling, baked in a graham cracker crust, is topped with a golden crushed pineapple glaze. The cool, refreshing flavor of canned pineapple is just right for this festive dessert. Serve it in a setting of hearts and flowers for a special Valentine Day party.

Keep the recipe handy to use year 'round. A regular cheese cake pan may be used instead of the heart shaped mold.

### DELUXE PINEAPPLE CHEESE CAKE

2 cups fine graham cracker crumbs  
1/4 cup softened butter  
3/4 cup plus 2 table spoons sugar  
3 (8-ounce) packages cream cheese  
3 eggs  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 teaspoon unflavored gelatin  
1 (1 pound 4 1/2 ounce can crushed pineapple

Blend together graham cracker crumbs, butter and 2 table-spoons sugar; press firmly in bottom and sides of heart shaped pan or mold. Thoroughly beat cream cheese with eggs, 3/4 cup sugar and vanilla; pour into graham cracker crust. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) 30 minutes. Chill. Invert onto lightly greased cookie sheet, then onto serving plate. Sprinkle gelatin over 2/3 cup syrup drained from pineapple; place over low heat stirring until gelatin dissolves. Cool until slightly thickened. Spoon drained pineapple over cake top and spread with gelatin glaze. Chill thoroughly. Makes 1 cheese cake.

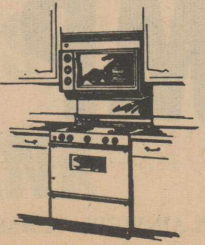
