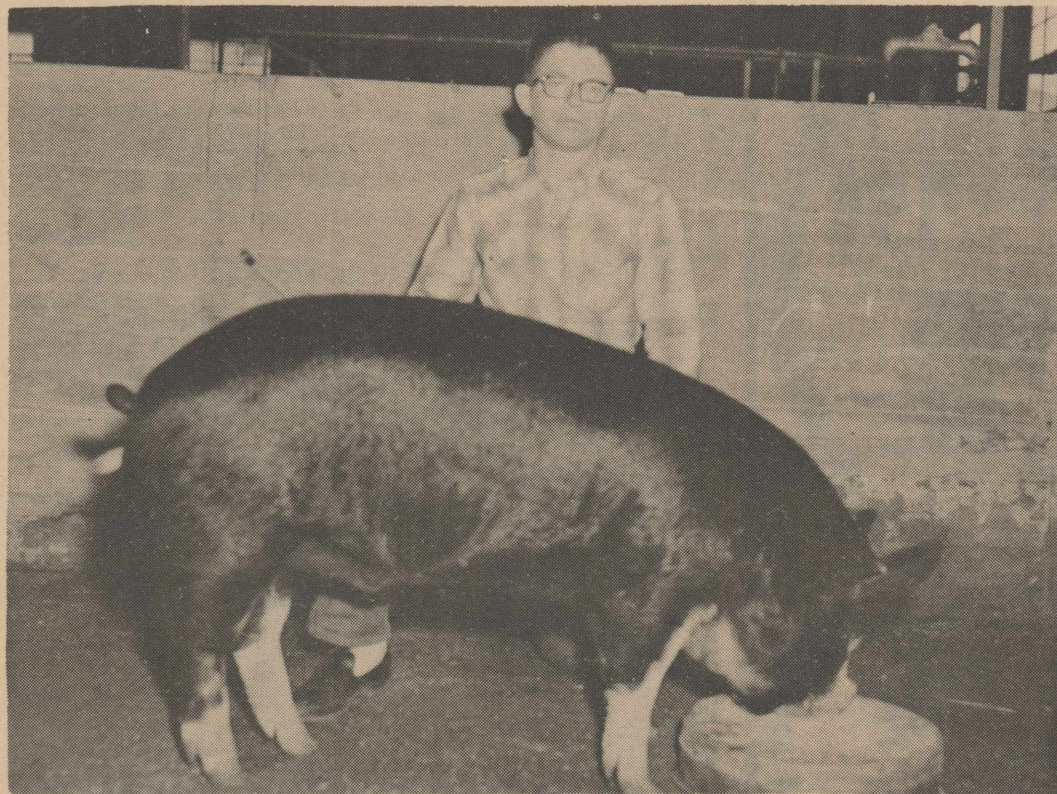

## Small Farms Exempt From Signup

Signup to be held soon for the 1965 domestic allotment program for upland cotton will be only for operators of farms where the domestic allotment is less than the effective allotment, according to the county ASCS office. This is a change from original sign-up plans. Signup began Feb. 8 and continues through March 26.

This means that the operators of small farms -- where the domestic allotment is 15 acres or less and no acreage

is released -- do not need to sign up in order to receive the benefits of this year's domestic allotment program. On these farms where the domestic allotment is the same as the effective allotment and plantings need not be reduced in order to participate in the domestic allotment program.

The only change that has been made is that small farmers are not required to sign an agreement to participate.

## '65 Feed Grain Signup Begins

Signup for the 1965 feed grain program now is under way in the ASCS county office.

Signup period started Feb. 8 and will continue through March 26.

Program for 1965 is basically the same as in 1964. It is voluntary, and combines corn, grain sorghum, and barley in a single feed grain base. Participating farmers will qualify for diverted-acre and price-support payments, and they will be eligible for price-support loans.

Farmers who take part in the program may divert for payment as small an acreage as 20 percent of the farm's feed grain base or as large an acreage as 50 percent of the base -- or 25 acres, if this is larger.

Two rates of diversion payment are offered. The lower rate applies to the first 20 percent of the feed grain base actually diverted. The higher rate applies to diverted acreage in excess of the minimum. If both the intended diversion and the acreage actually diverted are equal to at least 40 percent of the base, the higher rate applies to the entire acreage diverted.

New provisions in the 1965 program include:

(1) An opportunity to substitute feed grains for wheat or wheat for feed grains by growers who take part in both programs;

(2) A special provision for designated varieties of malting barley.

Under certain circumstances, producers may apply to over plant their barley base acreage by 10 percent. A producer electing this option will

be eligible for the full count barley support rate, based on a national average of 96 cents per bushel, but he will not be eligible for barley diversion or price-support payment.

## Hart Cagers Divide With Lazbuddie

Hart basketballers split a pair of games with Lazbuddie here Tuesday night, the girls winning by 68-45 and the boys falling, 53-51, on a last-second basket.

The victory brought the Hart girls' record to 21-8 for the year, while the loss put the Longhorns at 4-20 for the season.

Final games of the season are scheduled Friday night at Happy.

Connie Bailey led the scoring in the Hart girls' win over Lazbuddie, counting 31. Dixie Kendrick hit for 18.

Larry McKay scored 24 to lead the Hart boys, who lost a two-point heart-breaker on a basket in the final two seconds.

Last Friday night, both Hart teams traveled to Nazareth and found the Nazareth home court too much to cope with.

The boys fell, 83-43, and the girls lost, 46-32. Gary Heller led the Longhorns with 19, while Miss Bailey led the girls with 20.

Fouls spelled a big difference, with the Hart girls drawing 24 to Nazareth's nine, and the Hart boys getting 34, to Nazareth's nine.

Livestock must be in place by 5:30 p.m. Thursday March 4. Weighing will begin at 1 p.m.

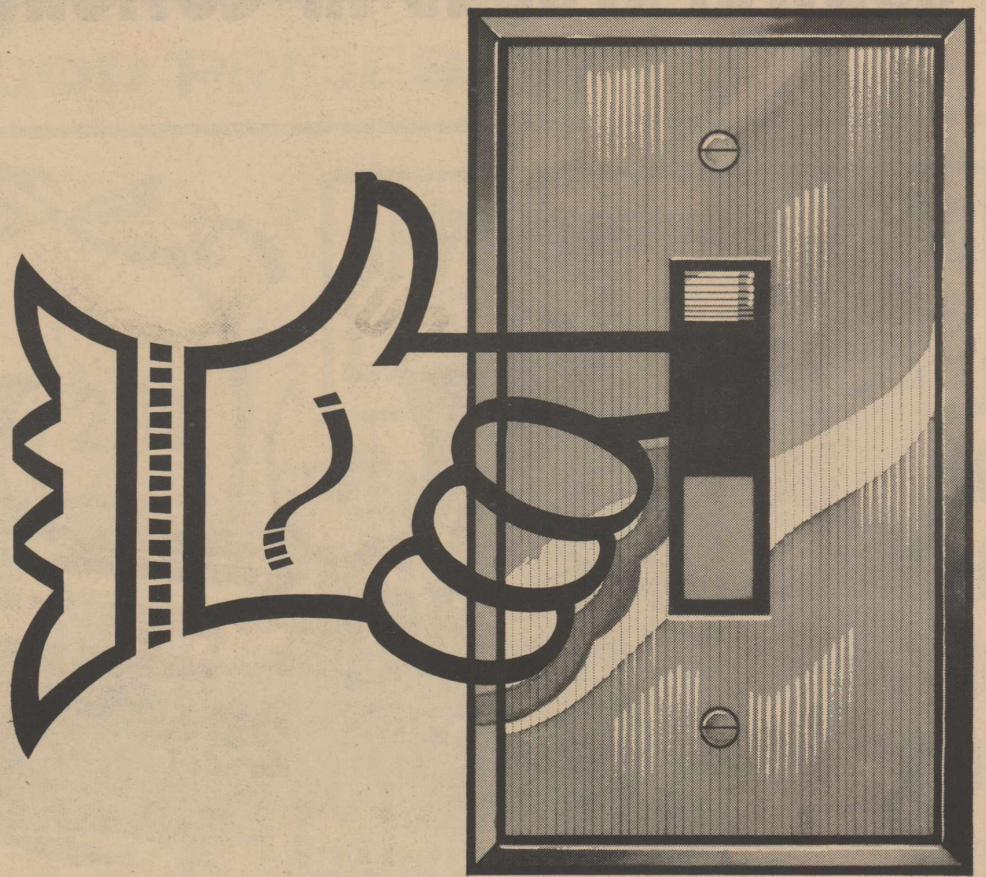
gether. Return mixture to refrigerator till firm.

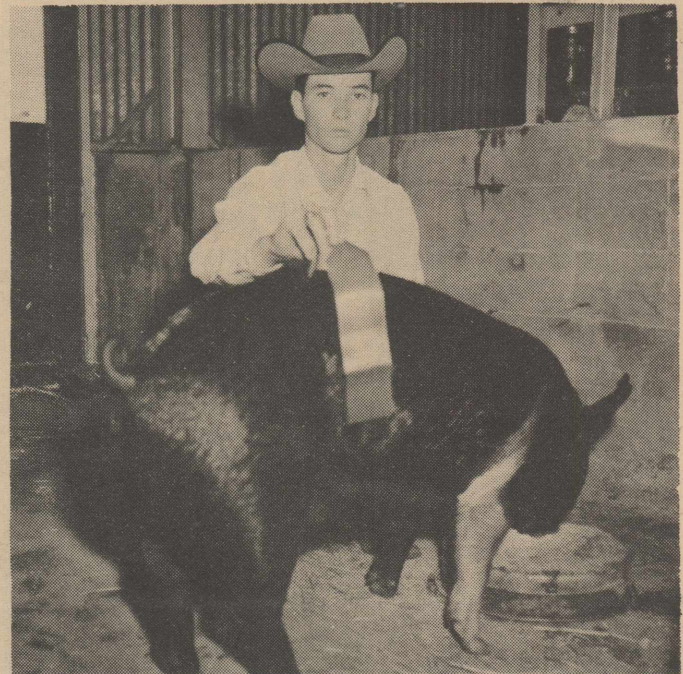

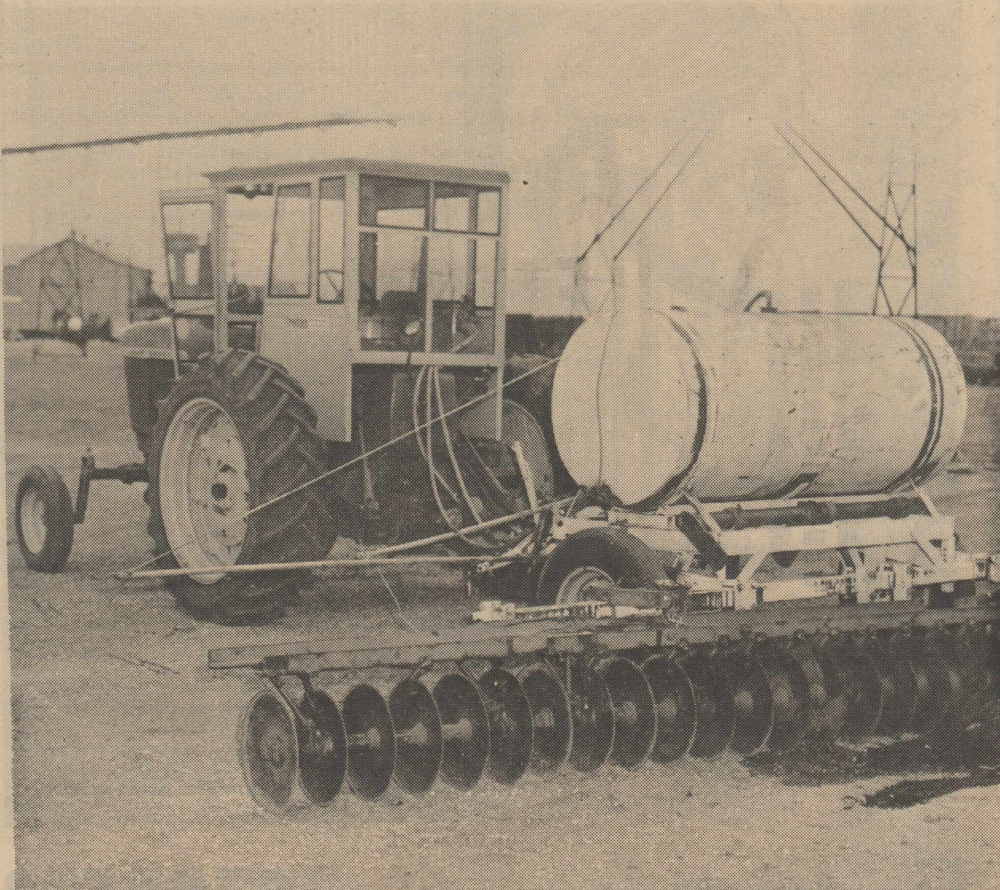

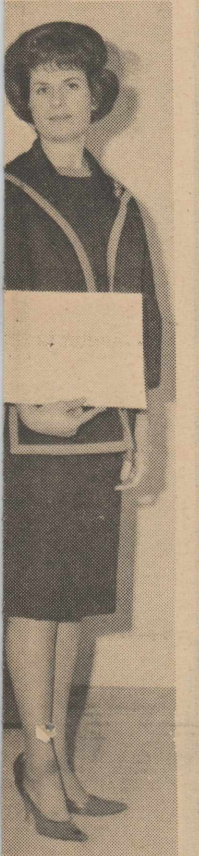

**REDISTRICTING RESOLUTION PASSED** -- Both houses of the Legislature overwhelmingly adopted a resolution calling for a federal constitutional convention to permit one legislative chamber to be apportioned on factors other than population.

Thirty-four states must adopt the identical proposal before

Congress has to consider calling a convention on a specific amendment. Three-fourths of the states must ratify any amendment thus submitted.

At least half a dozen proposals for congressional redistricting have been filed so far, plus bills for Senate redistricting and House redistricting.

Rep. Gus Mutscher of Bren-

ham told his House Committee on Congressional and Legislative Districts he will canvass all representatives for their views on reapportioning the state.

House members are trying to work out a cooperative House redistricting plan, taking into consideration those who do not plan to run next time and those

who plan to run for other offices.
