'65 Feed Grain **Signup Begins**

Signup for the 1965 feed grain program now is under way in the ASCS county office.

Signup period started Feb. and will continue through March 26.

Program for 1965 is basically the same as in 1964. It is voluntary, and combines corn, grain sorghum, and barley in a single feed grain base. Participating farmers will qualify for diverted-acre and price-support payments, and they will be eligible for pricesupport loans.

Farmers who take part in the program may divert for pay-ment as small an acreage as 20 percent of the farm's feed grain base or as large an acreage as 50 percent of the base-or 25 acres, if this is larger.

Two rates of diversion payment are offered. The lower rate applies to the first 20 percent of the feed grain base act-ually diverted. The higher rate applies to diverted acreage in excess of the minimum. If both the intended diversion and the acreage actually diverted are equal to at least 40 percent of the base, the higher rate applies to the entire acreage diverted.

New provisions in the 1965 program include:

(1) An opportunity to substi-tute feed grains for wheat or wheat for feed grains by growers who take part in both programs;

(2) A special provision for designated varieties of malting barley.

Small Farms Exempt From Signup

Signup to be held soon for the 1965 domestic allotment program for upland cotton will be only for operators of farms where the domestic allotment is less than the effective allotment, according to the county ASCS office. This is a change from original sign-up plans, Signup began Feb. 8 and continues through March 26.

This means that the operators of small farms -- where the domestic allotment is 15 acres or less and no acreage is released -- do not need to sign up in order to receive the benefits of this year's domestic allotment program. On these farms where the domestic allotment is the same as the effective allotment and plantings need not be reduced in order to participate in the domestic allotment program.

The only change that has been made is that small farmers are not required to sign an agree ment to participate.

Each exhibitor will be allowed to sell only two animals of any one division.



REDISTRICTING RESOLU TION PASSED -- Both houses of the Legislature overwhelmingly adopted a resolution calling for a federal constitutional convention to permit one legislative chamber to be apportioned on factors other than popula-

tion. Thirty-four states must adopt the identical proposal before

Congress has to consider call-ing a convention on a specific amendment. Three-fourths of the states must ratify any amendment thus submitted.


