

USDA Research Group Meets

"To the High Plains of Texas, profitable cotton production is the difference between farming and not farming, and profitable cotton production is dependent not only on the success of cotton research but on the speed with which such success can be achieved," according to Donald A. Johnson, executive vice-president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

This statement is a part of Plains Cotton Growers recommendations for future USDA cotton research, made by Johnson in Washington before an open session of the Cotton and Cottonseed Research and Marketing Advisory Committee.

Johnson's presentation urged an all-out effort by USDA in research on such items as cotton quality, ginning, instrument classing, utilization and an instrument for accurate, rapid fiber length testing. He cited the quality improvement research being carried on by Plains Cotton Growers, State, and private research institutions, and requested increased participation by the USDA in this field. "We need more genetic research, more plant breeding and physiological studies directed toward im-proving not only our staple proving length but our Pressley and Micronaire," he added.

The PCG recommendations pointed out to the committee that at present almost all basic utilization research done at the Government's Southern Regional Research Laboratory in New Orleans is done on cotton with staples of one and one-sixteenth of an inch or longer, and that more research should be directed toward use of the shorter stapled cottons such as are grown in this area. In this respect, Johnson reminded the committee that at least onethird of all U.S. produced cotton is one and one-thirty-second of an inch or shorter, and that much of this cotton goes to foreign mills who spin it into fabrics which then return to the U.S. as competition for fabrics spun in our own mills with longer staple, more expensive cottons.

To justify PCG's recom-mendations for stepped-up research on instrument classing of cotton, Johnson highlighted the contrast between the accurate and precise information supplied to mills by rayon and synthetic manufacturers with the fact that cotton buyers will not accept the green card classification of cotton as a reliable base for cotton purchases. He said: "Cotton spinning mills greatly need reliable information about the cotton they buy, and instrument classing carried out under conscientious and expert supervision can supply that need, thereby making cotton a more attractive and competitive raw material."

Also attending the meeting from the High Plains was Dr. Harold Loden, general manager of Paymaster Farms, of Plainview, who was recently appointed to the committee by Secretary of Agriculture Freeman.

RED VELVET CAKE 1/2 c. shortening 11/2 c. sugar 2 eggs

2 oz. red food coloring 2 T. cocoa 2 1/4 c. plain flour 1 scant t. salt

1 t. vanilla

1 t. soda 1 c. buttermilk

1 T. vinegar

Cream shortening, sugar and eggs. Make a paste with coloring and cocoa and add to mixture. Add salt and flour with buttermilk and vanilla alternately. Add soda and vinegar

and blend. (Do not beat) Bake in two 8-inch pans(that have been greased and floured) for 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Layers may be split to make four.

SEVEN MINUTE FROSTING

1/2 c. water 1/2 c. white syrup 1 c. sugar

2 egg whites l t. vanilla

Beat egg whites stiff. Boil together the water, syrup, and sugar until it forms a long thread. Add the mixture to the beaten egg whites then add vanilla. Beat to correct consistency.



SMALL LOAN HEARING--houswife from Dallas told members of the House Committee on Banks and Banking that a \$50 loan, which she later decided she did not need in the first place, cost her \$1,500 over a three-year period by the time she went through renewals and additional loans to meet high interest rates.

Texas public school teachers are facing more teaching pro-blems today than every before. High on the list of reasons

for this situation are the difficulties involved in presenting instruction on whole subjects or portions of subjects which cannot be properlytaught using normal classroom methods.

The library offers the largest selection of films in the Southwest and makes the films available in an easy, effective manner. Any teacher, or any interested person, forthat matter, may request and use a film on a topic related to health by and to civic groups. contacting the Health Depart-

A catalogue listing 6ll titles was recently published and is available on request from the Film Library, 410 East 5th Street, Austin.

A part of the Health Depart-ment's Division of Public Health Education, the library shelves 2,015 films for 611 titles. It contains films with viewing times ranging from four to 57 minutes, covering practically all phases of personal and community health.

Most of the films were produced commercially, but many of them were written and produced for specific Texas application. All films are aimed at return postage.

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
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


