





1888 Cook Book Recipes

Are Printed In Article

Recipes copied from a cook book, published in the year of 1888 are listed below.

SLAW DRESSING

1 cup sweet milk; 3 eggs; a little butter; 1 talbespoon corn starch; l tablespoon sugar; l leaspoon mustard; salt to taste. Cook until thick like a custard and add 1/2 cup vinegar and 1/2 cup sweet cream.

SALAD DRESSING

3 eggs; 3 tablespoons sugar; l tespoon mustard; l teaspoon salt; I teaspoon pepper; butter size of an egg and 1/2 glass vinegar. Mix all together and set in ice box.

BUTTERMILK PIE

1 cup sugar; 1 1/2 cups but-

ter; l tablespoon flour, Mix well together, flavor with a little nutmeg and bake in a pie crust.

RHUBARB PIE

Peel the stalks and cut in small pieces, cover with boiling water and let cool. When cool spread on pie crust and add l cup sugar; ltablespoonflour and some butter, Half an orange improves the flavor.

QUICK BEEF STROGANOFF

1 pound round steak 1/4 inch thick; 1/4 cup butter; 6 ounce mushroom, about 2 cups sliced. 1/2 cup chopped onions; 1 can beef brother; I cup sour cream 2 1/2 tablespoons flour.

Trim fat from meat and cut across grain in strips one half inch wide. Brown quickly in butter and push meat to one side and add mushrooms and onions Cook until tender on low heat, add broth and heat to boiling

Blend sour cream and flour, and stir in to broth. Cook until mixture thickens a little season to taste and serve over hot buttered noodles or rice.

SPANISH RICE

Take 1/2 cup salad oil; 2 cloves garlic crushed; 1/2 cup chopped celery; 1 1/2 cups rice 1 number 2 can tomatoes; 1 small can tomato paste; 21/2 teaspoon salt; 1/2 bay leaf; dash cayenne pepper; 2 cups water; 1 pound ground beef; 3/4 cup chopped green pepper; l teaspoon chili powder; 1 teaspoon sugar; 1-10 ounce beef bouillion.

Heat oil in heavy skillet, add garlic and celery and brown. Mix rice, tomatoes, paste, salt and bay leaf, cayenne pepper and hot water and add to skillet, stir well and cover. Bring to a boil and reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes. Brown beef and green pepper, remove from heat and add chili powder sugar and beef bouillion.

Combine rice and meat mixture in a 3 quart baking dish and bake in a moderate oven, 350 temperature for 35 minutes. Add water or tomato juice if necessary and stir occassion-
