

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Fertilizer And Water Use Discussed By Agronomist

Last week, I wrote on fertilizer and water use efficiency tility rates under higher moison grain sorghum. Moisturefertility studies conducted by the Texas A & M South Plains Research and Extension Center at Lubbock also reflect these differences in water use efficiency on cotton.

Data from a 1958 experiment on a sandy loam soil shows that approximately four to 10 pounds more lint per acre can be pro-duced from each acre inch of water if properly fertilized. This range is for four differ-ent levels of irrigation ranging from dryland to preplant, plus four summer sprinkler irrigafour summer sprinkler irrigations.

Data from 1960-62 on heavier soil shows approximately four to five pounds extra lint cotton per acre inch of water when properly fertilized. This is for varying amounts of water applied by gravity ranging from

The studies showed that the cotton can utilized higher ferture levels. For example, under dryland conditions or limited water, cotton fertilized with 40-60-0 yielded best and produced more pounds of lint per acre inch of water. Additional nitrogen fertilizer did not increase yields or efficiency, With a preplant plus one irrigation, the 80-60-0 fertility rate produced the highest yield and water use efficiency. Additional nitrogen did not increase the yields or efficiency. With a preplant plus two or three applications, 120-60-0 gave best results. Yields or efficiency were not increased by additional nitrogen fertilizer.

Under dryland conditions, fertilizer helped to "stretch" the moisture. When compared to unfertilized cotton, the 40-60-0 fertility rate produced an additional four pounds lint cot-ton for each inch of rainfall received during the season. Since the average rainfall received during the test period was 13 inches, this meant an extra 52# lint per acre.

This data illustrates the im-portance of the proper mois-ture-fertility balance. The big problem on the High Plains is the inability to predict rainfall and the type of season. Conse-quently, most cotton fertilizer is applied with the idea of having an "average" season. Side-dressing of additional nitrogen can be made if the season turns can be made if the season turns out to be a good one for nitrogen response.







Home Gardeners Warned On Accident Prevention

Home gardeners by the hundreds and thousands emerge with the coming of warm spring weather to spade beds, plant seed, spread fertilizer, mow grass --- and the other countless minor tasks attendant to keeping the lawn neat and attractive.

And gardening is excellent thereapy for both mind and body. For those who enjoy digging in the dirt, gardening offeres good exercise, fresh air and sunshine after a winter of being cooped up indoors.

Remember, though, to follow a few safety pointers and precautions and your gardening will be a healthier, happier experience.

First, don't let your enthusiasm carry you away your first time out. Take it easy, at least for the first few sessions. Don't try to work a 10-hour day at hard manual labor on the first warm weekend. Take frequent rest breaks and work at a pace that isn't too tiring. As the season advances, your muscles will limber up and toughen, and you will be able to do more with less discomfort.

Cuts, scratches and bruises


are the fate of most gardeners. Usually they aren't serious. Clean minor cuts with warm water and soap and cover with a light bandage.

Tetanus lurks in the soil. If your immunizations are not upto-date, see your doctor about a booster shot of tetanus toxoid at the beinning of the gardening season.

Stop and think about safety before handling garden tools, especially power equipment such as lawn mowers. Always turn off the mower when you leave it, even if it is only for a few seconds. Always turn off the mower, saw or whatever when you add gasoline to the tank.

Never use electric equipment in wet or damp grass. And always read the safety instuctions that usually accompany power tools.

Pesticides can be a gardener's best friend if he uses them wisely, but careless use and storage of pesticides can cause serious accidents. Always read the instructions on the package carefully and obey their safety warnings. Pesticides are safe, if properly




