North Spade Ranch Marker Is Authorized

The historic Old North Spade Ranch Headquarters in Spade has been designated a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, John Ben Shepperd of Odessa, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, announced today.

This award comes with the announcement of the award of an interpretive plate to be placed by the Official Texas Historical Building Medallion which was awarded three years ago. It is sponsored by Lamb County Historical Survey Committee

Having completed the requirements for the Landmarks award, this structure will be noted on a special certificate to be presented by Mrs. Paul Burrus, chairman of the Lamb County Historical Survey Committee.

The plate states that the North Spade Ranch Headquarters, 1910-1924 was on the ranch bought in 1891 by I. L. Ellwood, barbed wire developer, and sold in 1924 for farms. It was a social center in its day.

The Medallion and accompanying plate marker is part of the five-year program of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee to Record, Appreciate, Mark, Preserve and Survey (RAMPS) history in Texas. This marker is designed to recognize and interpret the historical, cultural or architectural significance of the homes and buildings of Texas and cite them as worthy of preserva-

Survey Of Colleges Shows Hart Ser 567 With Room For More Freshmen This Fall

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 1, the work. Room for more students in the nation's colleges is the finding of a survey report just released. An impartial survey of 714 colleges and universities show that 567 still have room in this autumn's freshman class in 1966 to admit more than 62,500 additional freshmen.

These and other findings are in Changing Times' special report based on its seventh annual survey of accredited four-year colleges with room. The copyrighted report recognizes that getting into college is more difficult this year than it has ever been. "Many schools say applications are up 50 percent to 100 percent over last spring."

For the seventh consecutive year, however, the Kiplinger magazine shows that scores of accredited colleges still have room for more students. Openings are scattered around the country with fewest in New England and the most in the Midwest and the South.

On the whole, fewer spaces for women than for men are available, far more for day students than those who want to live in a dormitory and more colleges than ever are giving special consideration to underprivileged students.

Looking into costs for campus, day and out-of-state students at the 714 colleges reporting, Changing Times found 53 per cent planning to boost tuitions and fees again during the next two years. Others admitted they

Openings for transfer students and two-year college graduates were also surveyed and an encouraging report is-sued for both. "There is still lots of room for students who are now in college but want to switch schools. Graduates of two-year colleges are given special preference by many schools."

An increase in the number of colleges participating in the magazine's survey has been interpreted as an effort to help reduce confusion in admissions. Reprinting its editorial, "Clean up the chaos in college admissions," in the published edition of the "Colleges with room" survey, Changing Times again calls for "a major national effort...to take the chaos out of college admissions. The job should be done by the large educational organizations," according to the Kiplinger editors. "Parents," they say, "can help by just calming down. And, most important, parents must recognize that guidance begins at home and ought to begin early."

In recognizing that "never has choosing a college been so difficult or admission so un-predictable," the magazine concludes, "qualified students can find suitable colleges to go to even if not as presitgious ones as the family would like."

AUSTIN--Texans will go to the polls on November 2 to vote on at least six, and perhaps 18, amendments.

Six proposals for Constitutional amendments already have cleared the Legislature. Ten to 12 others appear to have a good chance of being approved before the end of the session. Senators and representatives introduced 128 proposals for amendments.

Major interest at the Nov. 2 election will be on the proposal to increase to four years the terms of the Governor, Lieu-tenant Governor and other officials elected statewide.

Voters also will approve or defeat amendments to:

Farm Land Tax Relief

A constitutional amendment to allow a farmer whose property has become urbanized certain tax relief as long as he remains a bona fide farmer passed the House after big-city representatives attacked the measure as a "tax dodge for speculators."

Bill Dungan of McKinney, Alonzo Jamison of Denton and Wayne Connally of Floresville, a farmer with land in an urbanized area could pay taxes based on a valuation of the land's worht for farming purposes. When he decides to sell the land, he'll pay the difference between that value and the value of the land for development purposes for three years back.

Connally has approved nearly a dozen Neighborhood Youth Corps programs, involving Federal grants for projects in Rio Grande; Los Fresnos; Harris County; Beaumont; Dallas County; Galveston County; Lagrander, Olten, Lockberger, Control of County; Career, Control of County and County of County and County of County redo; Olton; Lockhart and San Marcos.

Grants are authorized by the U. S. Department of Labor in Washington, but are subject to final approval by the Governor.

Terrell Blodgett, director of the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity, has announced appointment of two consultants to help communities organize local action programs. They are Bertrand Adams of Austin and Robert Watts of Lufkin.

Criminal Code Bill Docket


House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee has approved a 145-page bill overhauling the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure. It is set for debate late next week.







Emotions Can Play Role In Accidents, Injuries

What part do emotions play in accidents and injuries?

Is the housewife who has just had a violent argument with her husband more likely to slash her finger with the bread knife or scorch her hand on the skillet?

Is the careless, preoccupied home gardener more likely to slip a hand into the whirring blades of a power mower or gash his foot with an axe?

This problem is studied from the viewpoint of the athlete in "Tips on Athletic Training," a publication of the American Medical Association and the National Federation of State Athletic Association. Although these bodies are primarily concerned with sports injuries, most of their conclusions are applicable to all.

One of the psychological factors thought to be involved rather frequently in injuries might be labeled the "aggression conflict", the pamphlet says. The sports arena offers the only peace time area of American life in which the physical expression of aggression is socially sanctioned. In all other phases of daily living there is considerable pressure to sublimate aggressive action. Thus, in some instances, being injured may provide a subconscious escape from the conflict of behaving in Jekyll and Hyde style in athletic and other life roles.

Another aspect is the chronically careless individual. This kind of person, possessed of a feeling of invulnerability both in sports and other facets of his living, acts with reckless disregard for his own safely and that of others. Either he fails to sense or is unconcerned with the consequences of fool-hardy behavior.

The individual who passively permits himself to be injured or even seeks situations likely to bring about physical injury presents a different problem.

clues that may be used to identify individuals with a psychological predisposition to injury have been suggested. Among these are excessive aggression, overtimidity, injury concealment and injury exaggerations.

Some individuals evidencing such problems may be helped by careful counseling.

Health Habits Are Stressed

What parent wouldn't insure his child good health for life... if he could?

Although no parent can guarantee his child good health always, a parent plays an important role in the health of a child.

A parent can teach his child the basic principles of good health. Certain fundamentals, learned early and continued through life, can do a great deal towards promoting the health of the child.

Good health can become a habit. And this is where the parent comes in: teaching his child good health habits early in life.

A habit is an action you've done so often you don't even think about it, you just do it. Help your child develop good health habits.

Hand washing is a fundamental in disease prevention. Teach your child to wash his hands after he visits the toilet. Teach him to wash his hands before he eats.

Little hands - or big ones for that matter -- go many places. They may carry out the garbage, handle a fly-swatter, or touch many potential germ sources.

Hot soapy water can wash many disease-causing germs off hands before they enter the mouth and body where they can grow and cause the most harm.

Teach your child to make hand

washing a habit.

Tooth brushing after meals is important to good dental health. Otherwise, bits of food lodge on and between teeth allowing bacteria to grow and eventually cause decay. Teach your child to rinse his mouth with water if he can't brush his teeth right after eating.

A daily bath and clean clothes are important, too. Hair should be washed often, and combed with your own comb. Head lice are no respectors of persons and can easily travel from person to person on a "borrowed comb."

Borrowing towels, lipstick, or sharing food or drinking glass is a good way to borrow trouble -- or other people's germs.


True, you may neglect to wash your hands one time, or you may skip a bath one day. But remember to teach you children the good health habit.
