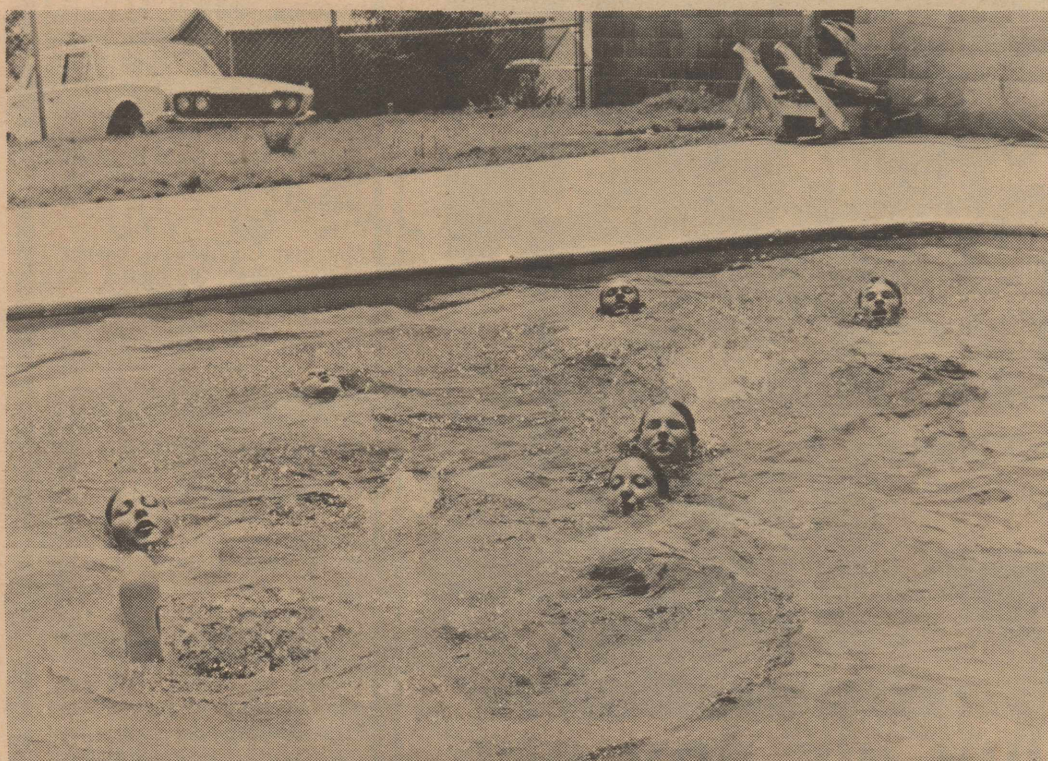

Six Complete Life Saving Course At ORC

Five youths from Hart and one from Olton completed an 18-hour water safety instruction course at Olton Recreation Center swimming pool June 17.

Two, Rebecca Futrell and Clifford Ray, both of Hart, completed the junior water safety course. Four others, Judy Graves, Bruce Futrell and Becky Burrell, all of Hart, and Billy Roy Smith of Olton, completed requirements for the senior course.

G. C. Graves, who has taught the course for 16 years, said the six began a six hour water skiing course Monday.

During the safety lesson, the group learned how to teach swimming, how to carry and release drowning victims, diving and artificial respiration.

Completion of the course qualifies each of the youths as waterfront directors and to teach swimming lessons.

Hart Scouts Restore Marker

Boy Scout Troop 246 of Hart camped out over the weekend in Tule Canyon, east of Tulia.

In this area, history was made in 1874 when Gen. R. S. McKenzie was engaged in probably the last Indian battle in Texas. The cavalry, under his command, captured 2000 horses from the Indians, and after picking out the best 500 horses, the remaining 1500 were executed in order to keep the Indians from regaining them.

A marker was placed at the site around the year 1930 by a group of Swisher County residents interested in preserving history in the area.

The Scouts replaced the deteriorated fence around the marker with a metal fence.

Rex Rogers, present owner of the ranch on which the marker stands, came to the ranch Sunday afternoon and lectured to the scouts about the history of the area.

Mr. Rogers came to live on the ranch in 1899, about 25 years after the McKenzie-Indian battle. He told how the McKenzie Trail could still be plainly seen when visitors enter the canyon from the south.

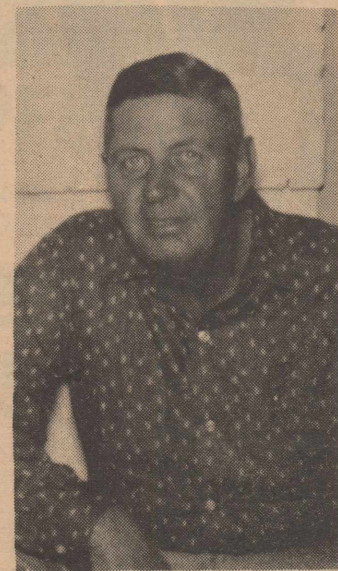
Many relics have been found in the area, including 50 cal. bullets used when the horses were shot.

Although the main purpose of the scout trip was the erection of the fence around the marker,

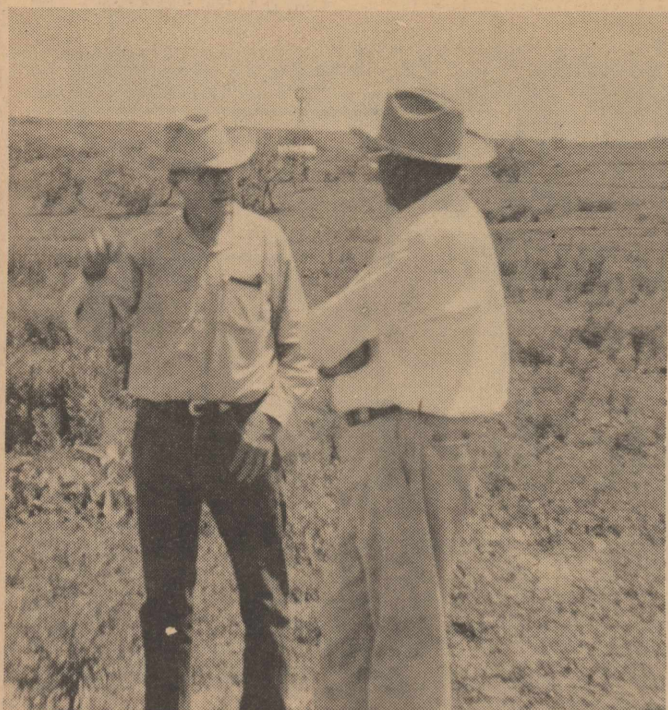
they also did some camping, fishing and relic hunting.

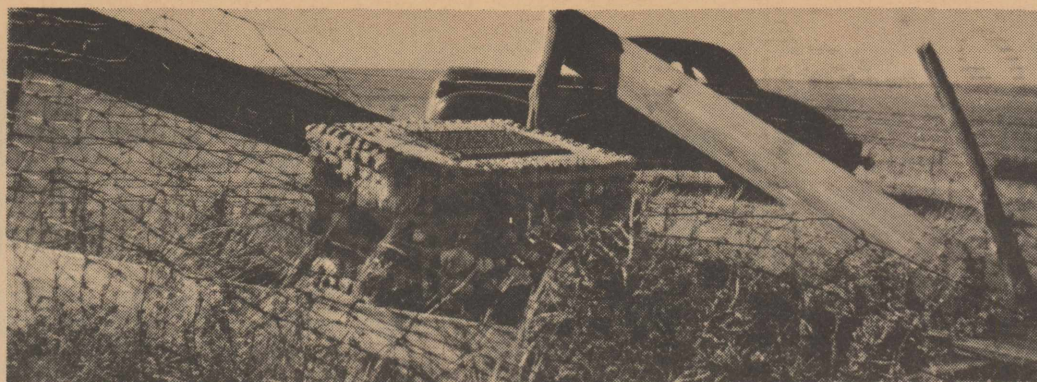

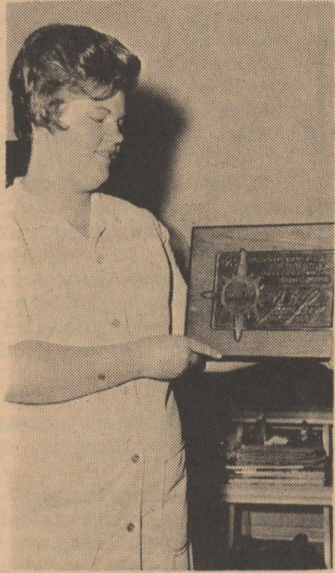

She is the daughter of Mrs. Ernest L. Brooks and was sponsored to Girls State by the local American Legion Auxiliary Unit No. 311.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and non-political, the purpose of the Girls state Program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults.

They learn the problems of

government by performing the same duties as real office holders in the everyday world. Citizens are selected at local levels principally on a basis of character and leadership from students who have just completed their junior year in high school each year.

The 1965 Session of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls, held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the largest single extra-curricular educational program for high school girls in Texas.

This year, 400 girls are in attendance, plus two from Mexico City, making a total of more than 6,800 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program.

Associate Justice Meade Griffin of the Texas Supreme Court administered the oath of office to the various elected state officials of Bluebonnet Girls State Monday in the Ro-

tunda of the State Capitol. Climaxing the session will be the selection of two outstanding Citizens of 1965 who will be sent to Girls Nation in Washington, D. C. by the American Legion Auxiliary, where the two young representatives will continue their study in responsibilities of the Republic.

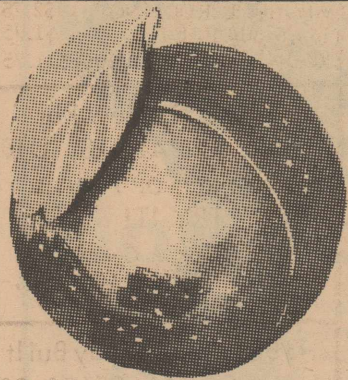

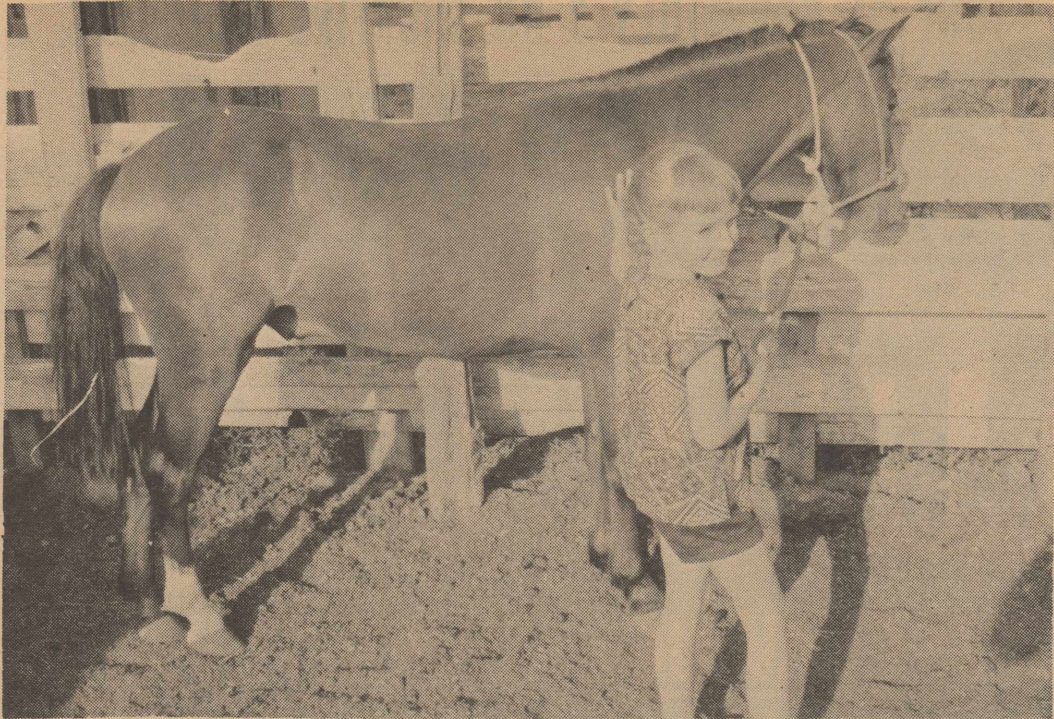

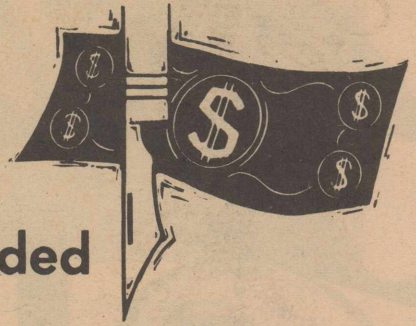
