Water Flows, Crops Grow

Farmers continue to pour the water to crops, only a few weeks after most were asking the rains

Now most appear ready to see the sky cloud up again.

With the wheat harvest over, original dismal forecasts on the crop seem to have been disproved. Despite wet weather and wind at harvest time, total production appears to have been at least average, and much better than average in manylocations.

Two elevators in Hart reported nearly. .5 million bushels of wheat brought in.

And despite some early predictions about a labor shortage, there appears to be little difficulty in securing hoe hands.

Tractor drivers are still needed as cultivation gets into full swing, but heavy application of weed killer appears to have held weeds down sufficiently for hoe hands available to get around to different field.

Farmers have completed soy bean planting, some to raise as a cash crop on hailed out cotton ground, others to hold down the soil on diverted acreage and others to serve as a dual role, both as a cash crop and to hold down the soil on

wheat ground.
Soy beans appear to be at a premium. One elevator manager estimated the crop to be 50 per cent larger than last years' if all farmers who bought seed harvest the crop.

Another manager reported farmers from as far as 160 miles from the Hartarea buying soy bean seed for replanting purposes.

Some farmers have run into an unusual problem with lake pumps this year--they can't get to them because of the water.

Either the pumps themselves are under water, or stands built to hold pumps up have been washed out so badly that the pumps are inoperable.

Crops on the whole seem to be looking very good, with cotton from six to 12 inches tall, and sorghum two to four feet

Meanwhile, the long dry months of July and August have started and farmers continue to hope for rain, only three weeks after most of the were hoping for it to stop.

(Editor's note--This is one of a series of articles prepared by the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway on water and soil conservation, and what the Foundation is doing to solve the problems connected with these two areas.)

Farmers have searched many years for ways to produce crops on less water. This may be just around the corner for Tex-

as farmers.

Laboratory, greenhouse and field experiments currently underway at the Foundation may disclose the possibility of securing the same yield from cotton on 1/4 to 1/2 of the irrigation water now used.

A hormone applied in re-search by Dr. Arthur F. Gohlke assistant director and senior soil scientist for the Foundation, has been found to produce cotton plants with shorter stems thicker stems, and thicker darker green leaves than untreated plants. This change of the plant inhibits the evaporation of water through the leaves of the plant.

Treated plants undergo a great change, but this change does not reduce the yield or quality of harvested cotton. The application of the hormone in sufficient amounts shortens the internode distance between internode distance between leaves and stem.

This, in turn, produces a shorty dry weather cotton plant capable of possibly producing from one to two bales of cotton per acre on less irrigation

The Plains of Texas grows 16 percent of the nation's cotton on 1.6 million irrigated acres. Water alone has made this possible. It is hoped that by the full utilization of this chemical hormone, the productivity of the land can be maintained.

It is thought that yields on dryland cotton may be obtained, through the use of this hormone, similar to those now being harvested off irrigated acres. On irrigated land, the reduction of up to 50 percent of irrigation needs might not be too far in the future. Due to the dwarfeffect on the plant caused by the hormone, it is also thought that yields may be in-

Sidedressing Of Cotton Discussed By Agronomist

Cotton is off to a good start this season in some areas. It has been hit by wet weather and blight in some areas. This past week of warmer weather and higher soil temperatures has caused cotton to start growing faster. The question comes up as to whether to sidedress.

If your cotton is off to a good

start and a good stand, yield potential on cotton is good. This says that possibility of profit from fertilizer looks good.

First, lets look at nitrogen. If cotton follows grain sorghum, nitrogen is definitely needed. A good rate is 80# ammonia per acre on heavier textured soils. If cotton follows cotton or wheat, 50 to 60 # ammonia should be sufficient on heavier textured soils. On light textured sandy loam soils, increase these rates by 20# nitrogen.

Phosphorus can still be applied. The most convenient way to apply it now is as a liqplied. uid with a dual applicator. Sidedressed phosphorus by 4-6 leaf stage should be as beneficial as preplant. Sidedressed phosphorus could still be profitable up to first square. It should be applied soon, however. A suggested rate of phosphorus for cotton is 110 to 135# 11-37-0 or 200 to 250# 11-20-11S per acre on clay loam soils and 135-165# 11-37-0, 350 to 300# 11-30-11S per acre on sandy loam soils. When sidedressing cotton, be

careful not to prune roots. It would be desireable to apply fertilizer, particularly phosphorus, just ahead of new root growth. Applying it on 20-inch centers is still satisfactory for most cotton but it may be necessary on taller cotton to place it in the middles.






