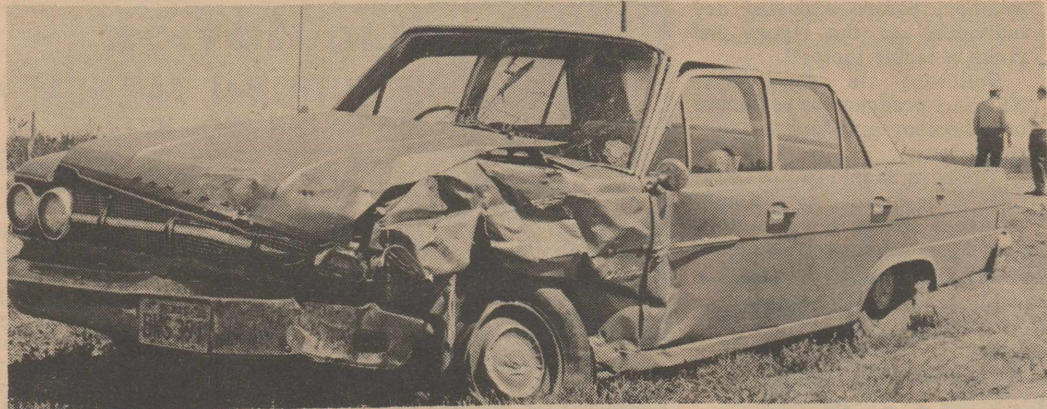

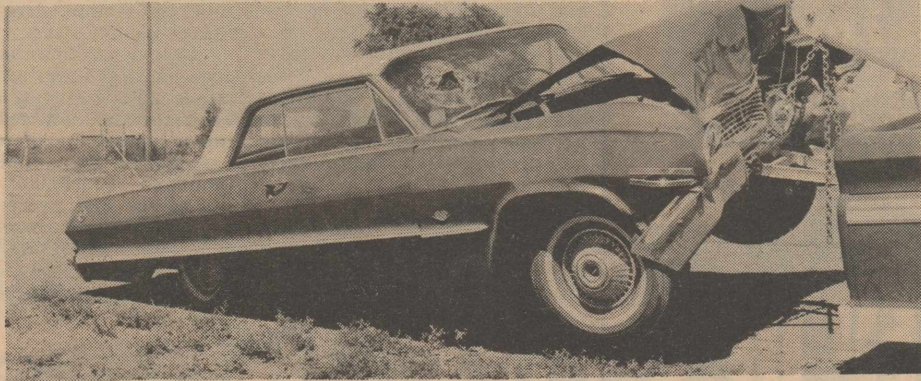

Three Injured In Two-Car Crash



HOBSON CAR—This is the car driven by Mrs. V. C. Hobson, which was involved in a two-car collision on Farm Road 168 approximately five miles north of Hart Monday.



RODRIQUEZ AUTO—This is the car driven by Mrs. Jesse Rodríguez in the same accident. Mrs. Rodríguez, a passenger in her car, Mrs. Epimínio Hernández and Mrs. Hobson were hospitalized as a result of the wreck.

Three persons were hospitalized and four others received emergency treatment after a two car collision five miles north of Hart about 1:30 p.m. Monday.

Mrs. V. C. Hobson of Dimmitt, driver of one of the cars, was taken to Plains Memorial Hospital with a fractured ankle and leg.

Driver of the other car, Mrs. Jesse Rodríguez of Hart, along with five passengers in her car, were taken to Olton Community Hospital following the accident.

Three Rodríguez children, Dora, Armando and Dolores, were treated and released, Mrs. Epimínio Hernández and her son, George, were also treated.

Both Mrs. Rodríguez and Mrs. Hernández were kept at the hospital. Mrs. Rodríguez complained of chest pains, while Mrs. Hernández suffered several lacerations apparently sustained when her head hit the windshield of the car.

Mrs. Hobson was acting as a substitute mail carrier for Route D, Nazareth, when the accident occurred. She was headed south on Farm Road 168 and Mrs. Rodríguez was headed north.

The two autos collided on the west side of the highway, with the left front side of the Rodríguez car striking the left front side of the Hobson auto.

Both autos suffered extensive damage in the wreck, with damage to the Hobson auto estimated by Highway Patrolmen Larry Snider and Darryl Howell as approximately \$1700. The two officers estimated damage to the Rodríguez car at \$1800.

Officials at the Dimmitt Hospital said Mrs. Hobson's condition was good and improving.

Both Mrs. Rodríguez and Mrs. Hernández were said to be in good condition at Olton Hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Martin returned to Hart last month after completing a six week Canadian vacation which Mrs. Martin called "just fabulous."

The trip took them into northwestern Ontario, approximately 400 miles north of Lake Superior. Sunshine was the only problem, according to Mrs. Martin.

She said the sun was completely up for 16 hours a day, and "it never did get completely dark." She said they would just forget how long they had been fishing or traveling, and wind up exhausted before they realized it.

Although the Martins did not hunting, they called the area, "A hunter's paradise," and said the variety of animals were "a joy to watch."

The Martins said the area was composed of an abundance of lakes, granite hills and valleys and lush growth of natural cover due to the long hours of

sunlight and natural water.

At one camp, they said a black bear wandered into camp and helped himself to some salt pork rind dipped in honey, which they had taken along to lure a bear into camp so they could see it.

They didn't get to see the animal however, but said it left "quite large tracks."

Returning home, they traveled the southern edge of Manitoba, which they said had an abundant amount of copper and Durham wheat—the latter used in making macaroni.

They also traveled through 11 states and visited several National Parks.

Most of their fishing was for muskie and northern pike, and Mrs. Martin recalled one particular pike with mixed feelings.

She said when she hooked the fish, she also hooked herself, and for a while she didn't know whether she had the fish or the fish had her.

Her husband cut the end off the hook in her hand, and she said, "That pike is still some place in that lake, a free fish today."

AMA Gives Football Player Health Tips

Is your boy one of the several hundred thousand American youngsters who will soon be "going out" for football at his junior high or high school?

If so, you will be vitally interested in the new six-point joint recommendations of the American Medical Association and the National Federation of High School Athletic Associations that will help to insure that your boy is properly conditioned for this vigorous contact sport.

Beginning with a satisfactory pre-season medical examination, there is no substitute for requiring a standard of physical fitness that assures sufficient strength and endurance, a good level of skill, and acclimation to hot and humid weather, before exposing any individual to the rigors and risks of tackle football.

Following is the AMA-NFHSAA program for readiness of schoolboy gridders for participation:

The boys should follow faithfully a personal conditioning program during the summer, based on information gained

through the school's health and physical education classes plus some specific training for the demands of tackle football.

At least the first week of practice should be limited to non-contact drill with emphasis on conditioning and fundamentals. Shorts, T-shirts and football shoes are the recommended training uniform in this period because of the heat. The boys should also wear their mouth protectors to begin to become accustomed to them.

The second week should include only controlled body contact drills and avoid wide-open play.

Practice games or game-condition scrimmages should be prohibited until after at least two weeks of practice.

A minimum of three weeks of carefully planned practice should precede the first regularly scheduled game.

The two organizations also pointed to two factors that should be considered in school-boy football.

Participation in interscholastic football is not a right but a privilege for those who can demonstrate the high level of physical and emotional fitness necessary to play aggressively, skillfully and with sportsmanship.

Participation in high school football should not detract from keeping up with a broad-based physical education program and from sampling other sports during the off-season.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the exemption from local ad valorem taxes of the property of certain charitable organizations, provided such organizations meet certain conditions and requirements and expend at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually on free medical and hospital care for the indigent within the State of Texas; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publications.

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS, The Legislature finds and declares that there is a need for the operation of hospitals by private charitable enterprises which will furnish free medical and/or hospital care for the indigent in Texas; and

WHEREAS, The operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent in Texas will add to the welfare and well-being of the State of Texas and its residents and citizens; and

WHEREAS, The need for the operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent is especially great in counties having a population in excess of one million two hundred forty thousand (1,240,000); and

WHEREAS, It is found and declared to be the Public Policy of the State to foster and encourage such operation of hospitals as aforesaid; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. The Constitution of the State of Texas is amended hereby, by the addition of a new Section to Article VIII thereof, to be numbered Section 2-A, and reading as follows:

"2-A. The properties of any charitable trust or organization, if such trust or organization is dedicated to, and operates a hospital furnishing free hospital and/or medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas, shall be exempt from all ad valorem taxes levied by any taxing entity, except by the State of Texas itself, provided:

"(1) such trust or organization has expended for free hospital and/or medical care within the State of Texas, during the calendar year next preceding, a sum of not less than

One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00); and, further provided,

"(2) after such exemption has been in force and effect for one full calendar year, the amount expended for free hospital and/or medical care, within the State of Texas, amounts to not less than One Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,800,000.00) for the calendar year next preceding; and, further provided,

(3) such trust or organization is exempt from United States income taxes;

"(4) such charitable trust or organization maintains its domicile and operates a hospital or hospitals in a county having a population of more than one million two hundred forty thousand (1,240,000) according to the last preceding Federal Census, and such exemption shall apply only to the properties of such charitable trust or organization located within the county of its domicile.

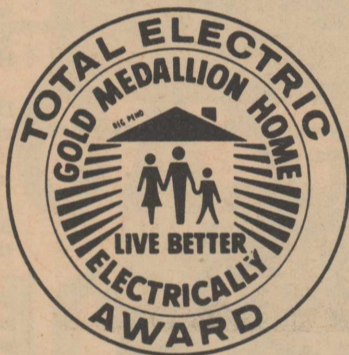
"Proof of compliance with all applicable conditions stated above, shall constitute a complete defense to any suit for ad valorem taxes levied or attempted to be levied by any taxing entity other than the State of Texas itself.

"This Amendment shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

FOR the Amendment exempting the property of certain charitable organizations from local ad valorem taxes provided any such organization meets certain conditions, and expends at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually for free hospital and medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas. Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47 proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide four-year terms of office for State Representatives.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new House of Representatives shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the members elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the members of Class A shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of Class B at the expiration of four years, so that one-half of the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Except in case of an election to fill a vacancy, and except in the first election following each re-apportionment, a person who has been elected to the House of Representatives shall not be eligible to be a candidate again for membership in the Legislature until the term for

which he was elected has less than one year remaining."

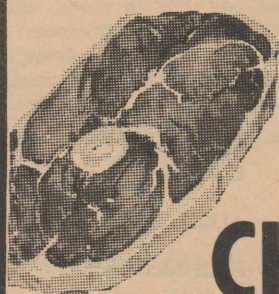
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. In the event the Constitutional Amendment proposed in this Resolution is adopted by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, the Governor of Texas is directed not to issue a proclamation for the election and not to publish notice thereof for the Constitutional Amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 1 of the 59th Texas Legislature, since the provisions of said House Joint Resolution No. 1 are included in this Resolution. But, should this proposed Amendment be rejected by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, then the terms and provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 1 shall be and remain in full force and effect and shall be proclaimed published and submitted to the electorate in November, 1966, as provided in said House Joint Resolution No. 1.

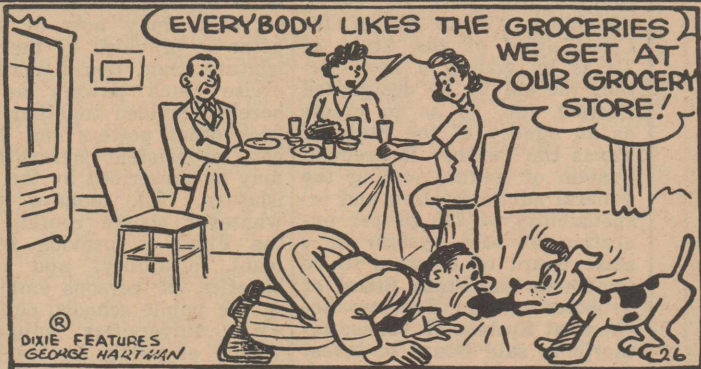

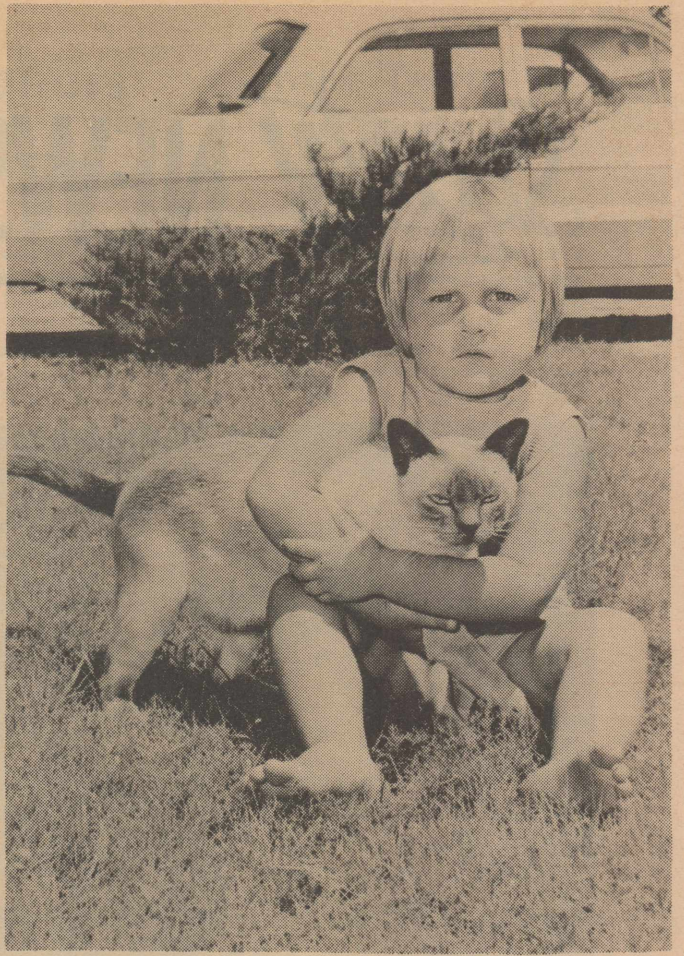
SHORT SNORTS

**PROPOSED CONSTITU-
 TIONAL AMENDMENT
 TO BE VOTED ON AT AN
 ELECTION TO BE HELD
 ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLU-
 TION NO. 27** proposing an
 Amendment to the Constitu-
 tion of the State of Texas,
 amending Article III of the
 Constitution of the State of
 Texas by adding a new Sec-
 tion thereto to be designated
 Section 48b, so as to create
 as an agency of the State of
 Texas the Teacher Retirement
 System of Texas, vesting the
 general administration and re-
 sponsibility of the proper op-
 eration of said system in a
 state board of trustees to be
 known as the State Board of
 Trustees of the Teacher Re-
 tirement System of Texas, au-
 thorizing said Board to invest
 assets of said system in vari-
 ous obligations and subjects
 of investment, subject to cer-
 tain restrictions stated therein
 and such other restrictions as
 may hereafter be provided by
 law; providing that such
 Amendment shall be self-en-
 acting and shall not alter,
 amend or repeal Section 48a
 of Article III of the Constitu-
 tion of Texas or any legisla-
 tion passed pursuant thereto
 except insofar as such legisla-
 tion may limit or restrict the
 provisions of this Amend-
 ment; providing for the nec-
 essary election, form of bal-
 lot, proclamation, and pub-
 lication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
 LEGISLATURE OF THE
 STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III
 of the Constitution of the
 State of Texas be amended
 by adding Section 48b there-
 to which shall read as follows:
 "Section 48b. There is here-
 by created as an agency of the
 State of Texas the Teacher
 Retirement System of Texas,
 the rights of membership
 in which, the retirement priv-
 ileges and benefits thereunder,
 and the management and op-
 erations of which shall be
 governed by the provisions
 herein contained and by pres-
 ent or hereafter enacted Acts
 of the Legislature not incon-
 sistent herewith. The general

administration and responsi-
 bility for the proper opera-
 tion of said system are hereby
 vested in a State Board of
 Trustees, to be known as the
 State Board of Trustees of
 the Teacher Retirement Sys-
 tem of Texas, which Board
 shall be constituted and shall
 serve as may now or here-
 after be provided by the Leg-
 islature. Said Board shall ex-
 ercise such powers as are
 herein provided together with
 such other powers and duties
 not inconsistent herewith as
 may be prescribed by the Leg-
 islature. All moneys from
 whatever source coming into
 the Fund to provide retire-
 ment, disability, and death
 benefits for persons employed
 in the public schools, colleges,
 and universities supported
 wholly or partly by the state
 and all other securities,
 moneys, and assets of the
 Teacher Retirement System
 of Texas shall be adminis-
 tered by said Board and said
 Board shall be the trustees
 thereof. The Treasurer of the
 State of Texas shall be cus-
 todian of said moneys and se-
 curities. Said Board is hereby
 authorized and empowered to
 acquire, hold, manage, pur-
 chase, sell, assign, trade,
 transfer, and dispose of any
 securities, evidences of debt,
 and other investments in
 which said securities, moneys,
 and assets have been or may
 hereafter be invested by said
 Board. Said Board is hereby
 authorized and empowered to
 invest and reinvest any of
 said moneys, securities, and
 assets, as well as the pro-
 ceeds of any of such invest-
 ments, in bonds, notes, or
 other evidences of indebted-
 ness issued, or assumed or
 guaranteed in whole or in
 part, by the United States or
 any agency of the United
 States, or by the State of
 Texas, or by any county, city,
 school district, municipal cor-
 poration, or other political sub-
 division of the State of Texas,
 both general and special obli-
 gations; or in home office fa-
 cilities to be used in admin-
 istering the Teacher Retire-
 ment System including land,

equipment, and office build-
 ing; or in such corporation
 bonds, notes, other evidences
 of indebtedness, and corpora-
 tion stocks, including common
 and preferred stocks, of any
 corporation created or exist-
 ing under the laws of the
 United States or of any of the
 states of the United States, as
 said Board may deem to be
 proper investments; provided
 that in making each and all of
 such investments said Board
 shall exercise the judgment
 and care under the circum-
 stances then prevailing which
 men of ordinary prudence, dis-
 cretion, and intelligence exer-
 cise in the management of
 their own affairs, not in re-
 gard to speculation but in re-
 gard to the permanent disposi-
 tion of their funds, considering
 the probable income therefrom
 as well as probable safety of
 their capital; and further pro-
 vided, that a sufficient sum
 shall be kept on hand to meet
 payments as they become due
 each year under such retire-
 ment plan, as may now or
 hereafter be provided by law.
 Unless investments authorized
 herein are hereafter further
 restricted by an Act of the
 Legislature, no more than one
 per cent (1%) of the book
 value of the total assets of the
 Teacher Retirement System
 shall be invested in the stock
 of any one (1) corporation, nor
 shall more than five per cent
 (5%) of the voting stock of
 any one (1) corporation be
 owned; and provided further,
 that stocks eligible for pur-
 chase shall be restricted to
 stocks of companies incorpo-
 rated within the United States
 which have paid cash dividends
 for ten (10) consecutive years
 or longer immediately prior to
 the date of purchase and which,
 except for bank stocks and in-
 surance stocks, are listed upon
 an exchange registered with
 the Securities and Exchange
 Commission or its successors;
 and provided further, that so
 long as less than \$500,000,000
 of said Fund is invested in the
 government and municipal se-
 curities enumerated above, not
 more than thirty-three and
 one-third per cent (33 1/3%)
 of the Fund shall be invested
 at any given time in common
 stocks. This Amendment shall
 be self-enacting and shall be-
 come effective immediately up-
 on its adoption without any

enabling legislation. This Sec-
 tion shall not alter, amend or
 repeal the first paragraph of
 Section 48a of Article III of
 the Constitution of Texas as
 amended November 6, 1956,
 or any legislation passed pur-
 suant thereto. This Section
 shall not alter, amend or re-
 peal the second paragraph of
 Section 48a of Article III of
 the Constitution of Texas as
 amended November 6, 1956, or
 any legislation passed pursu-
 ant thereto, except insofar as

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57 proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution. **BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy-five (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not prevent

him from serving the remainder of said term nor be applicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years.

"(2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iiii) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for, the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified for his respective class of membership. Commissioners of classes (i) and (ii) above shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Directors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, and those of class (iiii) by appointment of the Governor with advice and consent of the Senate.

"(3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iiii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. Commissioners may succeed themselves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years.

"(4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The Legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission.

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceed-

ings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to misconduct or disability of particular Justices or Judges, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary.

"(10) All papers filed with and proceedings before the Commission or a Master shall be confidential, and the filing of papers with, and the giv-

ing of testimony before, the Commission, Master or the Supreme Court shall be privileged; provided that upon being filed in the Supreme Court the record loses its confidential character.

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the judge in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No Justice or Judge shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to, and cumulative of, the methods of removal of Justices and Judges provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such judges in cases of disability.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such judges in cases of disability."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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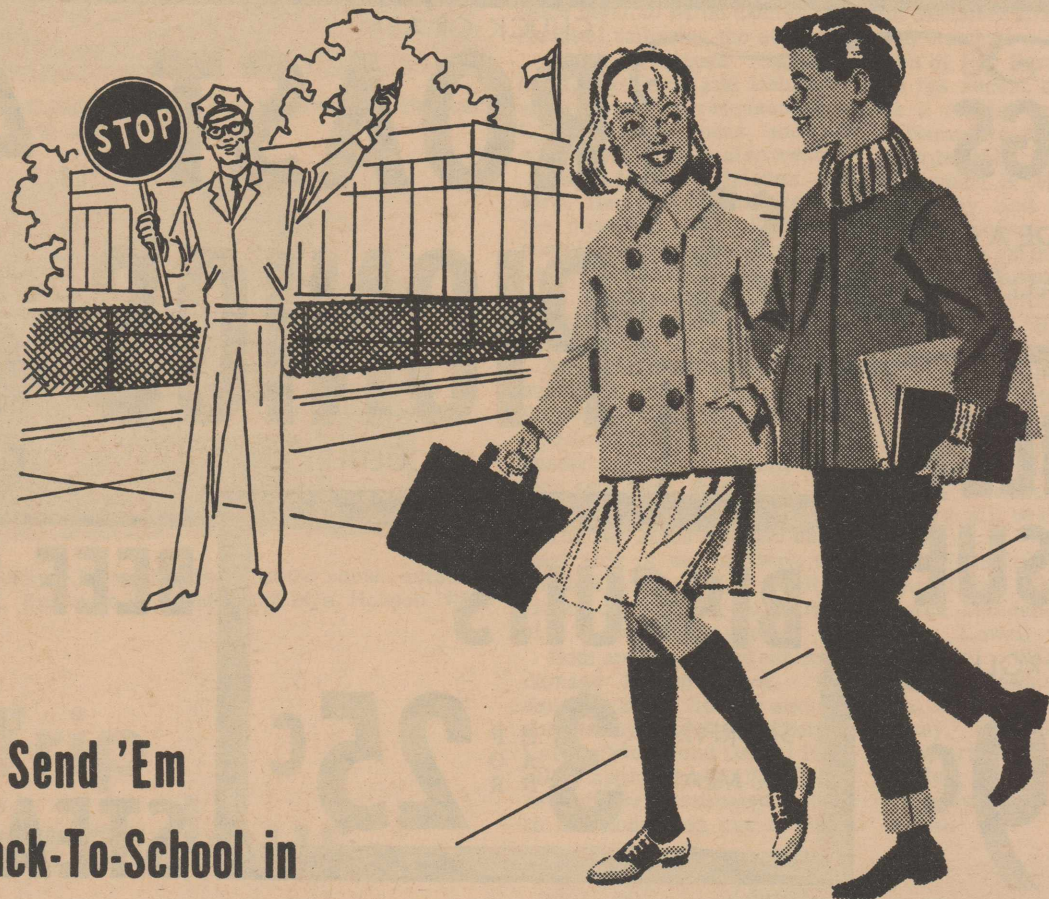
