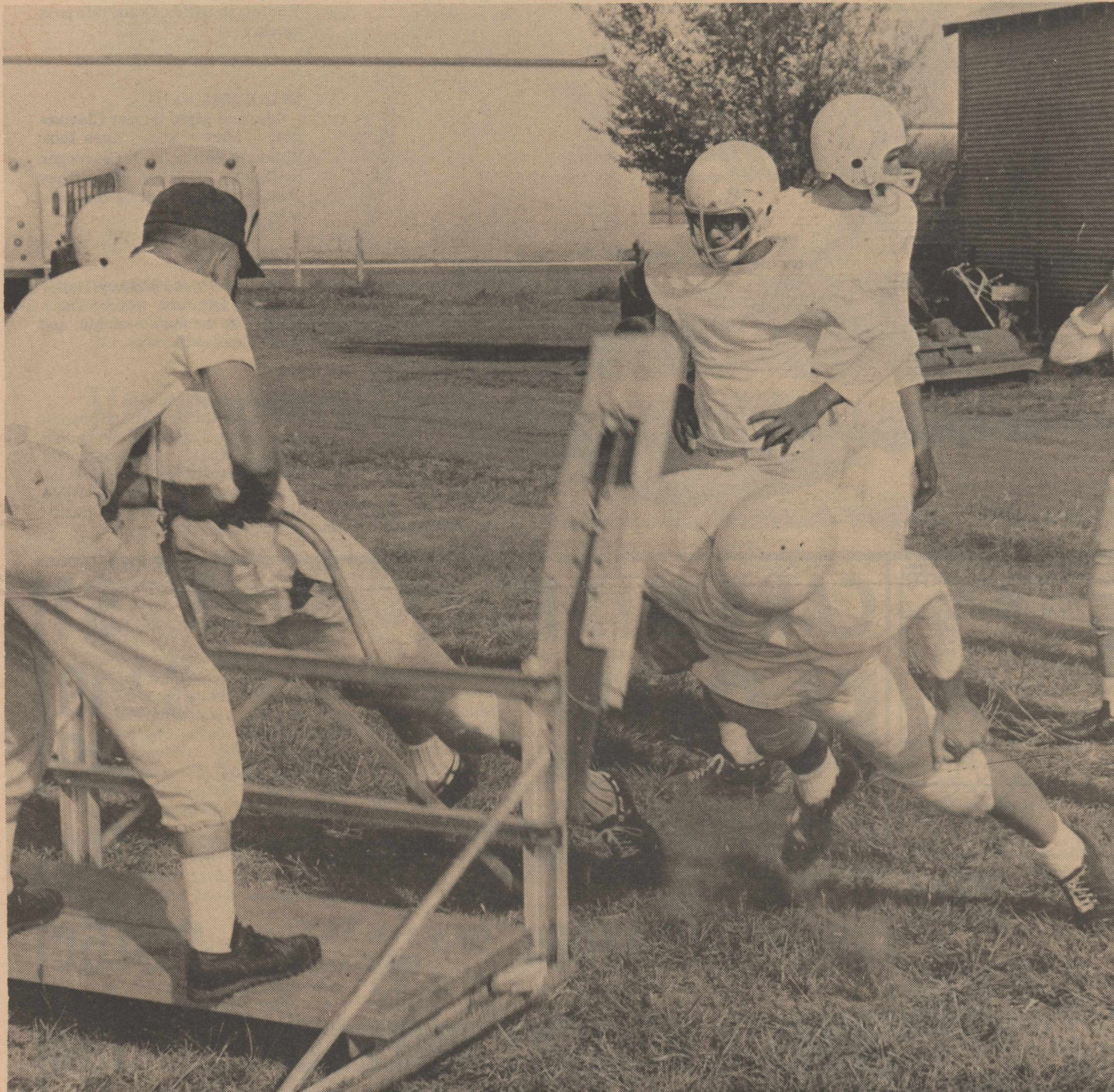

## Expect 700 As School Opens



LONGHORNS WORKING HARD FOR SEASON OPENER

Silverton Sept. 10. The Longhorn squad is small this year, but is showing plenty of enthusiasm in early workouts.

### Registration Is Under Way

With the opening of school set Monday, Hart six-year-olds were getting their first taste of the scholastic routine today as they registered for the first grade.

Registration for grades two through eight is scheduled tomorrow from 9 a.m. to noon.

High school students registered for the school year last week. However, no figures on this enrollment were available Wednesday.

Andy Gardenhire, superintendent, said he is expecting approximately 700 students to enroll in Hart schools this year. Maximum for last year was set at 671.

Among the new students will be approximately 14 Negroes who attended school at Olton.

Hart High School will offer three new subjects this year—Spanish, physics and typing II.

Two additional teachers have been added to the staff.

Classes will start at 8:30 a.m. Monday with the first four grades dismissing at 3:15 p.m., the fifth and sixth grades at 3:35 p.m. and junior high and high school at 3:55 p.m.

The annual school budget meeting was held Tuesday night. No figures were available at press time.

Repairs on city streets are underway here now with new dips to aid water drainage being put in.

### Contract Let For Parsonage

Contract has been let for the Baptist parsonage and construction is expected to get underway soon.

## Voters Decide On Amendments

Voters get their turn at making or not making laws in a big way this fall in Texas.

There are 11 amendments to the state constitution to come up for voter consideration this year.

One special election is called for Sept. 7. It calls for voting on only one amendment, a proposal to enlarge the size of the state senate from 31 to 39 members.

The purpose is to ease the

pains of re-districting according to population figures.

If the amendment is approved by voters, the legislature will meet in a special session to redraw the state senatorial districts.

On Nov. 2, there will be ten proposals. They are as follows:

\* Increase from two to four

years the terms of state representatives.

\* Permit full state participation in federal medicare programs.

\* Authorize the legislature to set salaries of the lieutenant governor and speaker.

\* Set up an \$85 million student loan fund.

\* Require district and appellate court judges to retire at 75, and set up a system for removal for misconduct.

\* Expand the investment authority of the public school retirement system.

\* Increase the state property tax from 42 to 47 cents and allocate the extra five cents to college buildings.

\* Exempt from the property tax locally a hospital which expends as much as \$1.5 million a year on the care of indigents.

\* Authorize \$200 million in veterans land loan bonds.

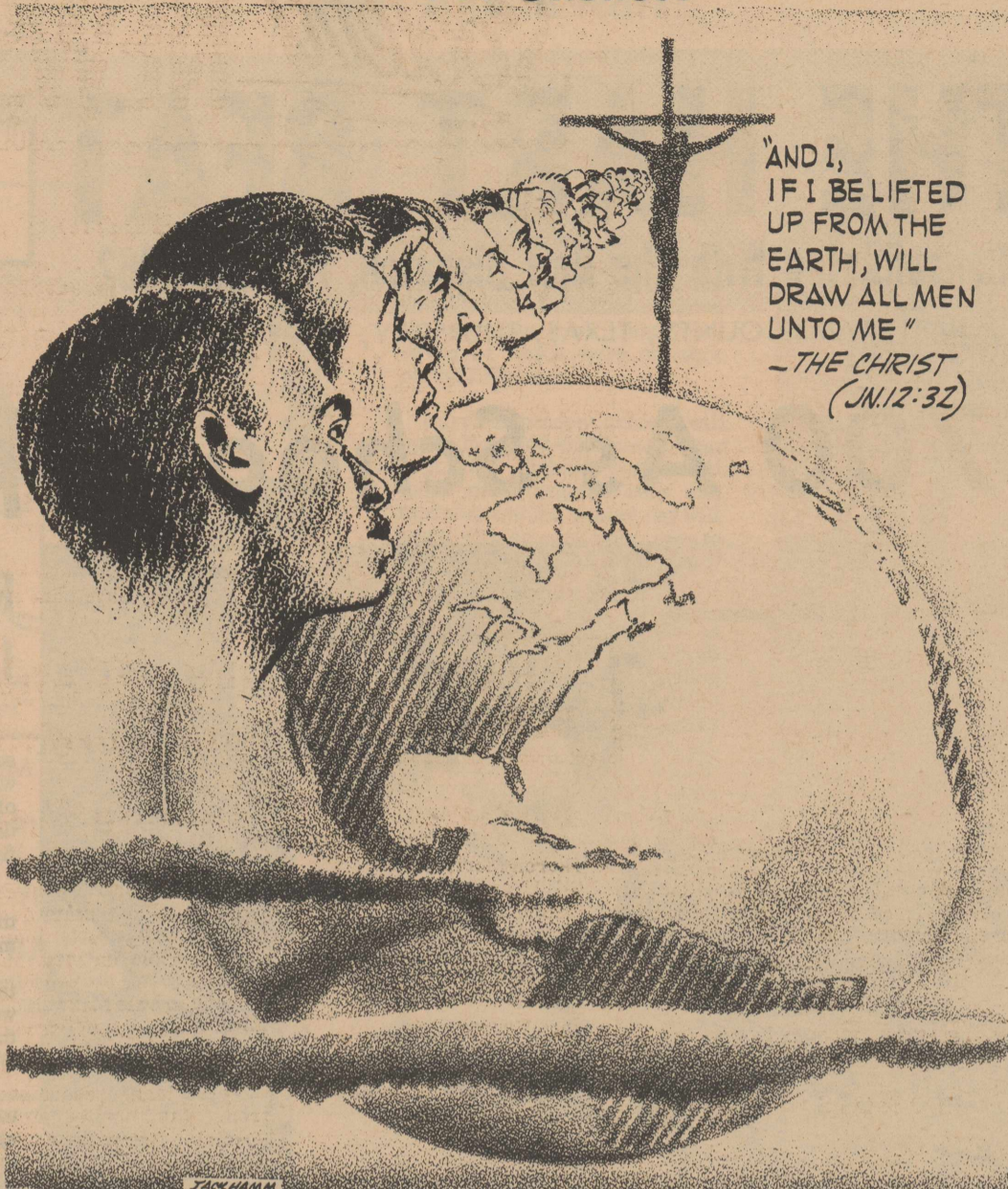

2 eggs well beaten  
1 c. chopped pecans  
1 c. Grape Nuts  
1 small box vanilla wafers  
1 9 oz. can crushed pineapple  
Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs, pecans, Grape Nuts, and pineapple with juice. Crush wafers. in 8 inch square pan, make alternate layers of crumbs and pineapple mixture. (Start and end with crumbs.) Chill at least 8 hours.

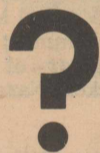

# KITCHEN KORNER

There are so many fresh vegetables and fruits on the market this time of year it is much easier to get a variety in our meal planning. There are lots of home grown products available right now too, and they do taste so much better.

We all do so much outside cooking and barbecuing in warm weather, have you tried putting your potatoes, carrots, and roasting ears in aluminum foil and cooking in the coals while your meats cook on the top?

## BARBECUED MEAT LOAF

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef  
3 eggs  
1 medium sized onion  
1 can tomatoes (No. 303)  
Enough cracker crumbs to hold together good.  
3 tbsp. Barbecue sauce  
Mix all together. Form into individual servings. let set in refrigerator 2 hours then put on the grill and cook until done, basting with sauce every few minutes.

## VANILLA WAFER CAKE

2 sticks oleo  
2 c. sugar  
6 eggs  
12 oz. vanilla wafers  
1/2 c. milk  
7 oz. pkg. flaked coconut  
1 c. pecans (chopped)  
Cream oleo and sugar, add eggs one at a time and beat well, after each addition. Crush vanilla wafers and add alternately with milk, add pecans and coconut. Bake in tube pan 1 hour and 15 minutes at 325 degrees.

If you have a teflon skillet with something stuck to it, use the nylon net scratchers on it.



# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN—As absentee voting gets under way for the Sept. 7 election on the proposed constitutional amendment to increase size of the Texas Senate from 31 to 39 members, battle lines are drawn.

Shute AFL-CIO is leading the opposition. It charges that the proposal is a "pig in a poke" offering no guides as to where the new districts will go.

"Committee for Fair Representation," made up primarily of trade and industrial association representatives, contends that Texans would get "proper representation without jeopardizing the interest of sparsely-settled areas" by adding eight new members to the Senate.

Lobby groups acknowledge they favor the plan because increased membership would cut down a senator's work load somewhat and make it easier to communicate with him.

The enlargement amendment, which triggered one of the 59th Legislature's most bruising battles, was intended to take some of the sting out of legislative redistricting by making it possible for most incumbent senators to keep their jobs.

Big city forces are divided, while most rural interest tend to favor a 39-member Senate.

Whether either campaign affects the expected light voter turnout remains to be seen. Most predictions are that the amendment will fail.

#### CRIME NEWS STUDY

First three members of the Legislature's 11-member "Interim Committee to Study News Media on proceedings in Criminal and/or Civil Courts" have been named by Lt. Gov. Preston Smith.

They are Sens. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, Culp Krueger of El Campo and Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi. Yet to be named are three members from the House of Representatives, three from the news media and two from the State Bar of Texas.

Panel resulted from controversy over deletion of a provision from the new Code of Criminal Procedure which would have severely restricted pre-trial news coverage. New code takes effect Jan. 1.

#### SCREWWORM BATTLE INTENSIFIED

Federal-state air invasion against the screwworm fly was stepped up during July with the release of 632,000,000 sterile screwworm flies over Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, California and 12 Mexican states.

Dr. S. B. Walker, Director

of the Texas Animal Health Commission, and Dr. John Wilbur, Veterinarian for the Animal Health Division of U. S. Department of Agriculture, report that 115,800,000 sterile flies were released over Texas where 63 confirmed cases of screwworm were reported. Special "hot-spotting" was directed in Texas and northern Mexico river beds.

Largest number of confirmed cases in Texas -- 25 -- was

in Zavala County. New Mexico confirmed 29 cases; Arizona, 94; California, three; and Mexico, 800, where 438,600,000 sterile flies were released.

#### LABOR DAY TRAFFIC TOLL PREDICTED

Department of Public Safety estimates 35 will die in traffic accidents in Texas during the three-day Labor Day holiday.

Violations of Texas traffic laws will be apparent in nine out of 10 of these accidents, says Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director.

As part of stepped-up efforts to curb the toll, DPS will add 150 men from other uniformed services to supplant its regular Highway Patrol force.

**Three Years Ago In Hart**

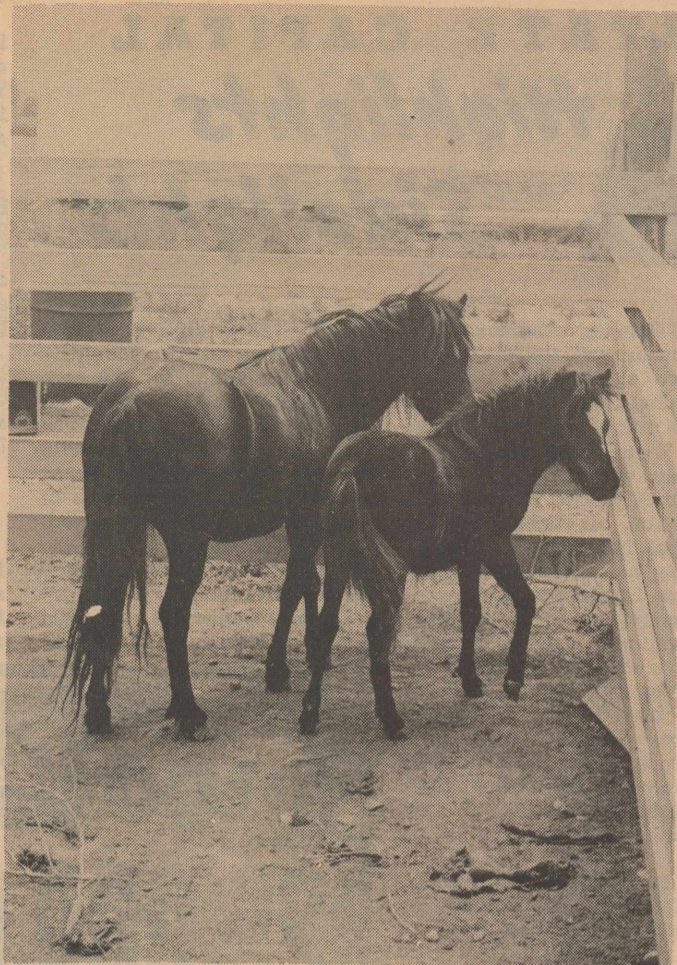
Approximately 32 farmers and grain men met for breakfast at Lilly's Cafe Wednesday to map plans for expansion of grain sorghum promotion efforts.

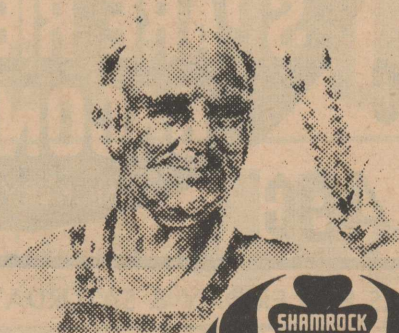
