



Quarterback for the club still is undecided, with either John Montague, 160 pound senior, or Lynn Edwards, 130 pound senior, scheduled to run the club.


Two lettermen hold down the halfback slots, with Wayne Rampley, 145 pound senior at one, and Bailey Loyd, 135 pound senior at the other.


