Election For PCG Is Set

Castro County directors to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., will be elected at a meeting Sept. 22. The election will be held immediately after the noonhour in connection with the annual Castro County Farm Tour.

According to Edd C. McLeroy and Ray Joe Riley, current PCG directors, one cotton producer and one businessman will be elected for the 1965-66 year as required by PCG by-laws.

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. is a cotton producer organization representing some 25,000 members in 23 High Plains counties. The stated purpose of the organization is to "promote and protect the interests of cotton producers on the Texas High Plains." Directors, two from each county, are responsible for setting all policies, budgets and projects undertaken by Plains Cotton Growers.

In addition to the election, a staff representative from Plains Cotton Growers will be on hand to review and answer questions on PCG activities.

McLeroy and Riley are urging all those in Castro County who have a stake in the future of cotton to attend the meeting and have a voice in the election of Castro County directors.

'Horns Test Lion Eleven Friday Night

Hart's Longhorns, victims last week of the Silverton Owls, face an opponent that may be as tough as Silverton was.

New Deal's Lions last week opened their season by downing class A Roosevelt 30-7.

And the New Deal eleven will have the advantage of playing on their home field for this one. Main worry for Hart coach

Jeff Smart will once again be trying to defense an all-around backfield.

Quarterback Joe Sherman will be one of the Longhorn's main problems. Last week against Roosevelt, Sherman scored two touchdowns and picked up another two points on a conversion

One of Sherman's TD runs was a 26-yarder up the middle.
Gary Justin ran 30 yards for the Lions on a second quarter touchdown effort and Smith Law-

son ran over for one conversion.

Mike Hill may also try to get into the scoring act. Against the Eagles, he crashed through the middle for 15 yards and six points.

Hill later scored two more points on the conversion after Sherman's final touchdown run.

David Smith and W. A. Hawkins III are once again likely to provide the offensive spark for Hart, Hawkins collected six points for Hart last week on a 56-yard run and Smith another six on a 30-yard effort.

The 'Horns main problem doesn't seem to be offense, since they rolled up 302 yards in the Silverton game. But fumbles and deep kicks by the Owls never let the Hart team out of their own territory for long.

Smart may try the airways a few more times this week in an effort to put more points on the scoreboard. Senior quarterback Doug Martin connected on only two of eight attempts in the first encounter.

Smith and Larry Huston are expected to see heavy duty for the Longhorns defensively. Both were standouts in last week's game.


George Bennett is also expected to see quite a bit of the defensive side of the playing in the secondary of the Long-







Silverton Owls T Capture Season

It was a long, long night for the Hart Longhorns, as Silverton's Owls trampled the Hart crew,

The Owls picked up a pair of touchdowns in both the first and last stanzas, and added a single TD in each of the other periods to completely overwhelm the hapless Longhorns.

David Smith and W. A.. Hawkins provided the only bright moments offensively for the Longhorns.

Hawkins broke away for a 56yard touchdown run early in the second quarter, and Smith added the other Hart TD with a 30-yard scamper in the third stanza.

The Owls big weapon was bench strength. With almost three complete teams, the Silverton crew wore down the slim Longhorn crew, and almost made a rout of it in the last quar-

Big Monty Smith scored enough points for the Owls singlehandedly to win the ball game, scoring twice on plunges of one and four yards, and add-ing four extra points via the kicking route.

THe 200-pound fullback racked up 136 yards rushing, averaging 5.2 yards in 26 car-

Silverton quarterback John Montague did even better in the 228 yards in 22 carries.

Montague picked up two touchdowns, one on a 49-yard run, and one on a 9-yard carry.

For Hart, Smith was the offensive workhorse, gathering up 126 yards in 15 attempts.

Silverton started out to make it a runaway game, when they scored the first time they had the ball. Montague handed off to Smith, who plunged four yards for the score, then added insult to injury by kicking the extra

period, capped a 67-yard drive by going 49 yards for the second Owl TD.

Montague handed the ball to freshman Larrie Arnold for the next TD. Arnold plunged two yards for the score.

End William Henriques then added the two extras when he caught a Montague pass and carried it over.

Then it looked like Hart's troubles were over and Silverton's just beginning.

Smith took the kickoff on the Hart 32-yard line and moved it out to his own 44.

Then, on the first play after the kickoff, Hawkins broke away for his 56-yard scamper, dodging straight through the line and outrunning his pursurers to the corner of the field and the goal

On the next series of plays, Silverton picked up two consecutive first downs and seemed to be on their way to touchdown number four.

Eight plays netted the Owls a total of two yards on their next series of downs, and Hart took over on their own 35-yard

Tackle Larry Henderson decided to change that by pouncing on a fumble by Montague. Yard line.

Hart then moved to Silverton's 49 on a 16-vard run by Smith and quarterback Doug Martin passed to end Larry McKay for three yards, and handed off to Hawkins for six more before the half ended.

Silverton started the third quarter like he first, scoring the first time they had the ball. The Owls picked up five first downs and went 89 yards, ending when Montague trotted nine yards for the TD. Smith kicked the extra point to make it 29-6, with 4:06 left in the period.

Quarterback Lynn Edwards singled out fullback Buddy Comer for ball-carrying chores, and ran with the ball four times to pick up a first down for Silverton on Hart's eight.

Comer moved the ball another yard on the next play, but a penalty scooted the ball back to the 12. Halfback Tommy Edwards almost broke into the clear on a sweep around left end, but tripped over his own feet back to the 15.

Fullback Smith went back into the game to give the Owls a lift, and apparently did. He moved the ball back to the 12 on the next play, and Edwards slipped the ball to halfback Tim Matthews, who ran over for another Owl TD.

Smith added his final kicking point of the night to end the scoring for both clubs.

Hart took the ball and despite an apparent tiredness, promptly marched to the Owl 40. But a penalty knocked the Horns back

A penalty moved the Owls back to their own 48 and they were their 39-yard stripe, but Mon- forced to kick.

The boot rolled into the end zone before Bennett could pounce on it, and the ball was brought back out to the 20.

An Owl drive stalled on their own 48, and Hart quarterback Martin brought the ball back to midfield on the punt.

Bennett moved to quarterback for a last-minute passing attempt, but time ran out at the Silverton 26.

Defensively, Bennett was the standout for Hart in the secondary, while Smith and Hustonheld down line and linebacker spots.

Despite a noticeable lack of first downs, the Longhorns rolled up 302 in the encounter.

But Owl ball control kept the 'Horns from getting more, and the Owls rolled up 482 of their own.

Fumbles hurt the Hart team, with three lost chances coming when they were least needed.

Passing also hurt the young club, with Martin scoring only two completions on eight attempts. The Owls, meanwhile, picked up five completed on double that number of attempts.

Fumbles especially showed up in number of plays ran, with the Owls holding on for 85 running plays, while Hart managed to get off only 36.

Neither team had a pass intercepted.


