Fullback Charles Hammer made conversions on both the touchdowns for the Turks, so he may be another ball carrier for Hart to watch for.

Lane and Jim Robinson were the defensive workhorses for Turkey in both games, and both are again expected to carry a big lead for the Turks Friday.

urday evening knocked out several transformers in the Hart area, and along with the loss in electricity came a mediumsized rain.

The loss of power for about an hour late in the afternoon caused several stores to close earlier than usual, but no other harmful effects were noticed from the storm.

All together, weekend rain dropped from 11/2-2 inches of rain on the area, but the only result seems to be good.

C. G. Benningfield, manager of Hart of the Plains Gin said he thought the major result of the rain would be a successful start for newly-planted wheat, and, "If it stays dry and hot," for the next few weeks, farmers

Sorghum harvesting didn't seem to be affected very much by the rain, since DeWayne Brown at Farmers Grain Co. said some farmers were already test cutting Tuesday, and more would begin today and tomorrow.

In fact, he said the grain would probably thresh better than before the rain as soon as it dired out completely.

Wister Clevenger, Hart Grain manager, concurred with that opinion, and said grain was threshing well before the rain

He said the harvest wasn't actually delayed very much, since few farmers had started in earnest. He said some farmers had started sampling this week, but he didn't expect heavy work to begin until next week.

On the Edd Bennett farm, southwest of Hart, Mrs. Ben-nett estimated 1 3/4 inches of rain had fallen, but said she didn't know how the rain would affect crops.



New Deal Blas

New Deal's Lions rolled up a 24 point halftime bulge, then coasted to a 40-0 win over Hart, the second loss by the Longhorn squad in as many tries.

Lion quarterback Gary Winningham was the man of the hour for the Lions. The senior quarterback picked up two touchdowns in the first half and added another in the second to roll up nearly half of the total Lion point output.

Halfback Dwayne Agnew collected a single TD in the first half and another in the second to pick up another 12, and senior halfback Lawson Smith picked up the other touchdown in the second quarter.

Fullback Mike Heald ran one two-point conversion in the second half, and tackle Billy Mitchell ran another on the last Lion

The Lions had their hands on the ball for four sets of downs in the first half, and made the most of it by scoring all four

Two interceptions and two fumble recoveries by the Lions helped the New Deal cause considerably, and long gainers all night by Agnew and Winningham kept the Hart defense in turmoil.

Winningham rolled up 135 yards in nine carries, while Agnew collected 162 in 11 tries.

Fullback Heald, chosen be-fore the game as the "Lion of the Week" by his teammates, picked up 39 yards in 11 attempts, but his two points were far below his first game total of 20 against Roosevelt the previous week.

Smith picked up 53 yards in three carries, while halfback Sammy Darty collected 51 yards in 11 tries to round out the Lions

big gainers.

W. A. Hawkins III once again turned in a good rushing night for the Longhorns. The little sophomore picked up 86 yards in nine tries. Senior quarterback Doug Martin topped that mark by four yards in the same number of tries.

Fullback David Smith gathered up 20 yards in eight tries, while George Bennett had 31 yards in four carries.

The Lions drew their first Longhorn blood late in the first quarter of action, when Winningham pitched back to Agnew on the Hart 29. The speedy halfback then raced 21 yards for the first score.

Winningham's handoff to Daron the attempted conversion failed to get Darty through the Hart defense.

On the kickoff, Martinhadre-

turned the ball 19 yards from his own 15, when the slippery turf became a little too slippery, and his feet went out from under him.

Three plays later, the Longhorns were still a yard shy of the first down, and tackle Larry Huston booted the ball to the New Deal 15.

Darty returned the ball to the New Deal 22, but two more plays netted the Lions only six yards. Then Winningham once more took command, and with 2:29 still left in the first quarter, danced 72 yards for the second Lion TD.

Fullback David Smith foiled the second conversion attempt by downing Darty before he got through the Hart line.

The next kickoff proved to be a preview of things to come. The kick was short, and the ball bobbed around before Huston finally pounced on it to keep it in Hart's possession.

But on the next play, Martin's pass attempt went into the hands of Lawson Smith at the New

This time it took the Lions five plays to reach the magic stripe, with Smith racing 40 yards down the sideline for the Hawkins made a lastditch effort at the elusive halfback, but it was all to no avail.

A fumble on the conversion attempt once again blocked the Lion's efforts for a two-point-

Hart's efforts with the pigskins after the pickoff again last only four plays, ending with Huston's kick to the New Deal 35. A penalty against the Lion's on the second down put them in hole too deep to run out, but once again lady luck smiled.

Fullback Heald carried the major ball-carrying load to the Hart four, and Winningham went up the middle for the fourth Lion score of the half.

An offsides penalty on the conversion moved the ball back to the Lion eight, and Larry Bingham fumbled the ball on the final conversion try of the half.

Hawkins returned the ball 41 yards on the kickoff to the New Deal 48, but time ran out before the Longhorns could capitalize on their position.

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MRS. KIDD'S RECIPE FOR BAKED APPLE DONUTS

11/2 cup sifted all purpose flour

13/4 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

½ tsp. ground nutmeg

1/2 cup sugar

1/3 cup shortening

1 egg, beaten

1/4 cup milk

1 cup grated raw apple

1/2 cup melted butter or margarine

1/3 cup sugar

1 tsp. cinnamon

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, nutmeg and ½ cup sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture is fine. Mix together egg, milk and apple; add all at once to dry ingredients and mix quickly but thoroughly. Fill greased 21/2 x 11/4 inch muffin tins 2/3 full. Bake in 350 degree moderate oven 20 or 30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pans; immediately roll donuts in melted butter and then in cinnamon and sugar that have been mixed together. Serve warm.

up the hen for frying, dredge in flour, salt and pepper well, brown well in a skillet on both sides. Lay in a buttered baking dish, pour soup over it until it is covered. If there is not enough soup, add some milk. Bake covered at 350 degrees for one hour, then uncover and cook for 30 minutes.

- 1 c. shortening
- 2 c. brown sugar
- 4 whole eggs
- 2c. flour
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

1 lb. orange slice candy (cut up)

1 c. pecans (cut up)
Cream shortening, add sugar,
mix. Add eggs. Sift dry ingredients together and add to creamed mixture. Stirin candy and nuts. Bake in a lined pan (no shortening) for 45 minutes at 300 degrees. Take out of oven, cut and roll in powdered sugar.


Three inches of rainfall was measured Saturday and Sunday in Hart with some hail reported east of town.
