Longhorns Battle Anton Bulldogs

ball teams suffer a slight points. morale loss.

But the opposite seems to be true of the Hart Longhorns, after losing by that score to Turkey last Friday.

For, although the score might seem lopsided, the young team seems to have found that other football teams are not invincible.

And practice for the upcoming game seems to bear Anton out the idea.

According to Jeff Smart, head oach of the Longhorns, coach practice has been spirited.

But once again the team has little hope of doing other than just making a good impression,

and hopes for a win are slim.
Anton stands 2-l for the season, and their lone loss came at the hands of Hart's nearby rival, Nazareth. The Swifts downed Anton 14-6 in the season opener for both squads.

Anton followed the loss with a 34-6 rout of Ropesville, then came back the next week to take a 30-22 decision from Cooper.

Anton's most potent scoring threat comes in the form of a big fullback, Jack Mitchell. Mitchell is the Bulldogs leading scorer, and is the only Anton back to score in all three games. He picked up the lone Anton touchdown against Nazareth.

Then he picked up a touchdown and a conversion against Ropesville, then added two touchdowns and a conversion

in the Cooper contest.

Halfback Nicky Biffle is another scoring threat for the Bulldogs, and with 24 points is only two shy of Mitchell's

Quarterback Mike Couch also holds a scoring threat in reserve. Couch can both pass and run, completing a 42-yard pass to Keith McGrew against Anton, and adding a touchdown and two points by conversion against Ropes.

Big defensive problem for the Hart squad will be Biffle and lineman Ronnie Glass, both of whom have been standouts for the Bulldogs in all three games.

Smart plans some minor changes in the Hart line and backfield, but injuries were kept to a minimum in the Turkey game, and no major strategy moves seem to be in the book.

Fullback David Smith, injured on a fourth quarter play against the Turks was back in practice Monday, with no apparent bad effects from his head-on collision last Friday.



The records will read 0-3 through the first three Hart football games, but in a lot of people's books, it will be 1-2 after the Turkey battle last Fri-

Given little chance going into the contest, the Longhorns drew first blood and without a pair of costly fumbles, might have pulled the upset of the year in class B football.

But the miscues hurt, and Turkey took the game, 22-6.

After holding the Turks the first three times the highlyrated eleven had the ball, Hart capitalized on a fumbled attempted kick, and David Smith scooted nine yards for the opening touch down in the first

But after an exchange of fumbles in the last minutes of the first stanza, halfback Johnny Mullin broke loose for a 50yard touchdown scamper, and fullback Barry Lane added the two-point conversion to take away the first Hart lead of the season.

Then Lane recovered a partially-blocked punt midway through the second quarter to race 24 yards down the sideline for the second Turkey tally, and once again added the two pointer to make it 16-6.

There the score stayed until the opening minute of the final stanza, when Lane scooped up the ball and trotted ll yards for the final touchdown of the game.

Twice the Hart crew drove to inside the Turkey 10-yard line, but the first drive ended with the ball going over on downs, and the second when the Longhorns ran out of time.

And the last two drives came without the aid of fullback Smith, who was shaken up on a play earlier, and was taken out of the game.

Turkey had the first op-portunity with the ball, taking Larry Huston's kick to the Turkey 10 and moving it to their own 24-yard stipe.

Lane then scampered 64 yards to the Hart 24, and it seemed as if the contest might be a repeat of the New Deal ordeal.

But the Turks had a surprise coming, as Hart defenders swarmed over the Turkey backfield, limiting them to a total of five yards in four at-

Once again lady luck turned her head from the Hart squad, as quarterback Doug Martin fumbled the ball on the first Hart play from scrimmage.

The Turks took over on Hart's 16-yard line, but guard Billy Bob Bell evened the odds a little, when he sneaked through the line to drop Mullin for a six-yard loss on the 20.
