## Longhorns Battle Anton Bulldogs

After a 22-6 loss, most football teams suffer a slight morale loss.

But the opposite seems to be true of the Hart Longhorns, after losing by that score to Turkey last Friday.

For, although the score might seem lopsided, the young team seems to have found that other football teams are not invincible.

And practice for the upcoming Anton game seems to bear out the idea.

According to Jeff Smart, head coach of the Longhorns, practice has been spirited.

But once again the team has little hope of doing other than just making a good impression, and hopes for a win are slim.

Anton stands 2-1 for the season, and their lone loss came at the hands of Hart's nearby rival, Nazareth. The Swifts downed Anton 14-6 in the season opener for both squads.

Anton followed the loss with a 34-6 rout of Ropesville, then came back the next week to take a 30-22 decision from Cooper.

Anton's most potent scoring threat comes in the form of a big fullback, Jack Mitchell. Mitchell is the Bulldogs leading scorer, and is the only Anton back to score in all three games. He picked up the lone Anton touchdown against Nazareth.

Then he picked up a touchdown and a conversion against Ropesville, then added two touchdowns and a conversion in the Cooper contest.

Halfback Nicky Biffle is another scoring threat for the Bulldogs, and with 24 points is only two shy of Mitchell's mark.

Biffle picked up two touchdowns and two conversion points against Ropes, then added another touchdown and two con-

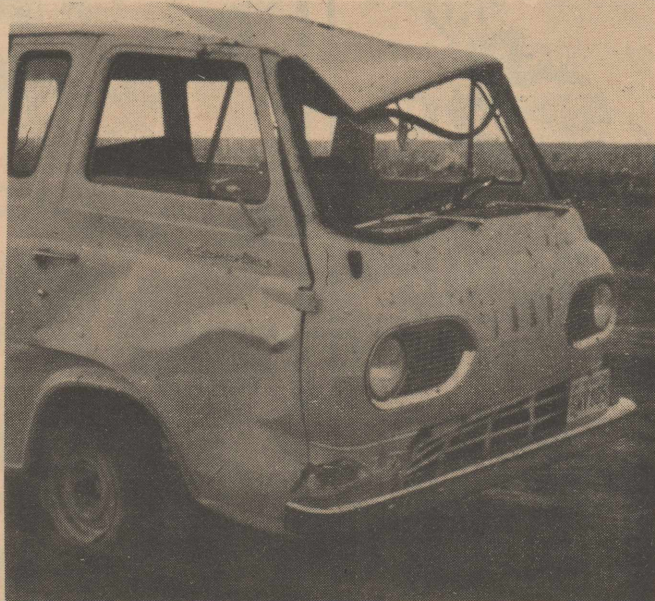
version attempts for four more points.

Quarterback Mike Couch also holds a scoring threat in reserve. Couch can both pass and run, completing a 42-yard pass to Keith McGrew against Anton, and adding a touchdown and two points by conversion against Ropes.

Big defensive problem for the Hart squad will be Biffle and lineman Ronnie Glass, both of whom have been standouts for the Bulldogs in all three games.

Smart plans some minor changes in the Hart line and backfield, but injuries were kept to a minimum in the Turkey game, and no major strategy moves seem to be in the book.

Fullback David Smith, injured on a fourth quarter play against the Turks was back in practice Monday, with no apparent bad effects from his head-on collision last Friday.

## First Bale Is Ginned

While most farmers were still counting squares on their cotton, C. P. Gamblin started pulling bolls and took first bale honors in Hart.

Gamblin brought the load of cotton into Hart Gin Saturday afternoon, and the bale was out in 14 minutes.

Gin manager Roland Sheppard said Gamblin brought in 2,140 pounds of Gregg cotton, and

from that a 585-pound bale and 1,000 pounds of seed were ginned.

In addition to the honor, Gamblin picked up a 50-cents per pound premium for the big bale.

Sheppard also said Gamblin was paid \$100 a ton for the seed.

So that works out to \$342 for the whole works, and the ginning was thrown in for nothing by the gin.

# Turks Stamped

The records will read 0-3 through the first three Hart football games, but in a lot of people's books, it will be 1-2 after the Turkey battle last Friday night.

Given little chance going into the contest, the Longhorns drew first blood and without a pair of costly fumbles, might have pulled the upset of the year in class B football.

But the miscues hurt, and Turkey took the game, 22-6.

After holding the Turks the first three times the highly-rated eleven had the ball, Hart capitalized on a fumbled attempted kick, and David Smith scooted nine yards for the opening touch down in the first quarter.

But after an exchange of fumbles in the last minutes of the first stanza, halfback Johnny Mullin broke loose for a 50-yard touchdown scamper, and fullback Barry Lane added the two-point conversion to take away the first Hart lead of the season.

Then Lane recovered a partially-blocked punt midway through the second quarter to race 24 yards down the sideline for the second Turkey tally, and once again added the two pointer to make it 16-6.

There the score stayed until the opening minute of the final stanza, when Lane scooped up the ball and trotted 11 yards for the final touchdown of the game.

Twice the Hart crew drove to inside the Turkey 10-yard line, but the first drive ended with the ball going over on downs, and the second when the Longhorns ran out of time.

And the last two drives came without the aid of fullback Smith, who was shaken up on a play earlier, and was taken out of the game.

Turkey had the first opportunity with the ball, taking Larry Huston's kick to the Turkey 10 and moving it to their own 24-yard stipe.

Lane then scampered 64 yards to the Hart 24, and it seemed as if the contest might be a repeat of the New Deal ordeal.

But the Turks had a surprise coming, as Hart defenders swarmed over the Turkey backfield, limiting them to a total of five yards in four attempts.

Once again lady luck turned her head from the Hart squad, as quarterback Doug Martin fumbled the ball on the first Hart play from scrimmage.

The Turks took over on Hart's 16-yard line, but guard Billy Bob Bell evened the odds a little, when he sneaked through the line to drop Mullin for a six-yard loss on the 20.

Turks another minus two yards and the Longhorns took over on their own 22.

W. A. Hawkins III moved the ball out another yard, and Smith grabbed six more, before an off-sides penalty moved the ball back to the Hart 24.

Smith then surprised the Turks with a quick kick that rolled to the Turkey 19, and tackle Larry Huston smothered Lane at his own 20 as he tried to field the ball.

Then, on an attempted punt, Huston and Bell crashed through to smother Alton Setliff and give the Longhorns the ball on Turkey's 16.

The gift was good enough, with Smith moving the ball to the 11 on the next play. Hawkins plowed through the line for two more hard yards before Smith traveled nine for the first touchdown.

The Turkey line burst through to drop Hawkins before he could make the needed yardage for the conversion points.

Only two plays later the Horns were in possession of the ball, recovering a fumble on Turkey's first play from scrimmage.

But the favor was returned on the next play, and the Turks recovered on their own 27-yard stipe.

Then, after two quick first downs, Mullin found daylight and ran 50-yards for the first tally, and Lane added his first two points to put the Turks into the lead.

George Ed Bennett took the kickoff on his own 25 and ran it out 20 yards, but there the ball stayed until Huston booted the ball to Turkey at the 20.

Turkey had about as much luck, but Hart ran into trouble on Turkey's return punt.

Halfback Charles Hamner booted the pigskin into the end zone, and Smith elected to try the return. But he managed to get only to his own three-yard line before being dropped.

Two more plays netted the Hart team only six yards, so the kick was decided on.

It was here that Huston's kick was partially blocked, and Lane fielded the ball to return it 24

yards for the touchdown.

Lane added 1 pointer, and the numbers on reading 16-6.

Hart.

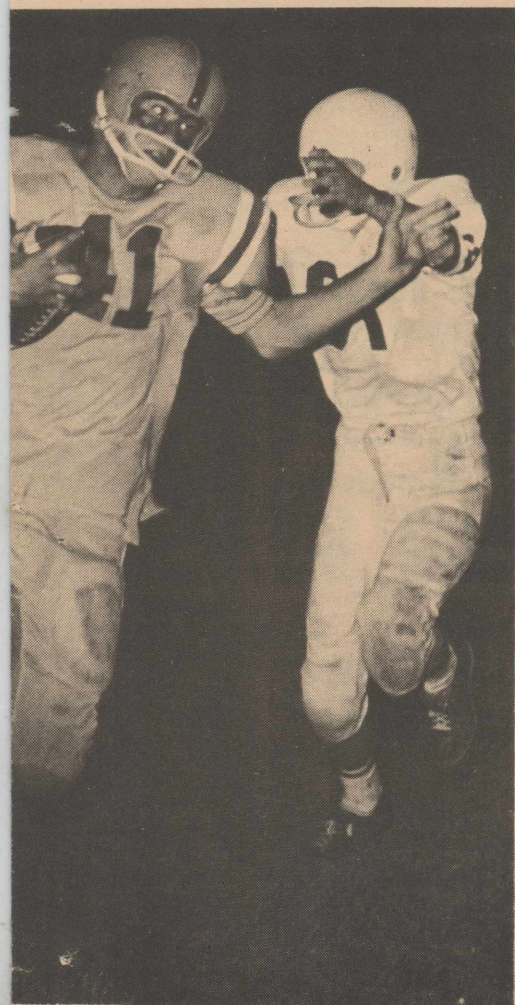
Halfback Jerry Lane brought

1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. baking powder

Add above ingredients to creamed mixture then add:

2 c. oats  
2 c. Rice Krispies  
1 c. chopped nuts or  
1 c. coconut, or both

Use hands to mix--form into balls the size of a walnut. Place on an ungreased cookie sheet. Press with fork and bake 10 minutes at 325 degrees. Makes seven dozen cookies.

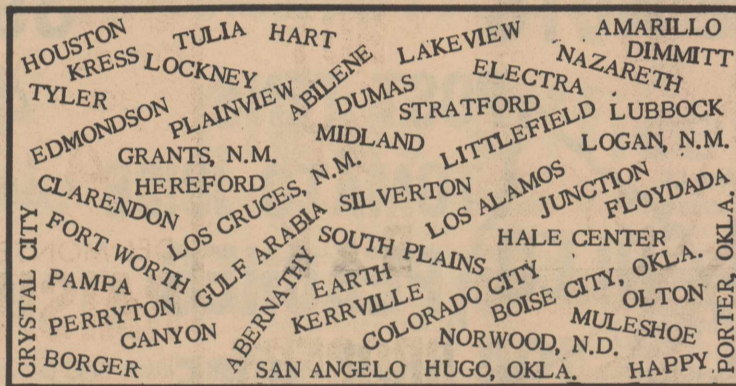

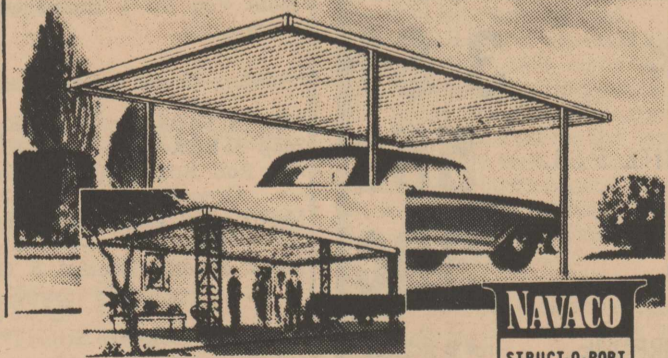
