RIDING CLUB TAKES HONORS

Hart's Junior Riding Club brought back its usual large number of trophies and ribbons from a riding meet last weekend, but this one ranked a little higher than previous meets entered by the group.

Five first place trophies, a trophy for best all-around, and three second place ribbons were among the prizes brought back from the National Finals of the American Association of Sheriff's Posses and Riding Clubs, held in Altus, Okla., last weekend.

The group, rated last year as the second highest-scoring club on all overall entries in the

event, once again ranked in the top groups. In fact, the group had more participants in the contest, on a percentage basis, than in any other club in Texas' District I.

In addition, no member of the club placed lower than 10th in any of the events entered.

The 15-member team was among approximately 2,600 entries from Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas and New Mexico competing for prizes.

James McLain was the top winner of the group, picking up first place in both the wagon and relay races, and second in the potato race. As a result he also was named the outstand-

ing participant in the Pee Wee division of the contest.

Other first place winners were Gary McLain, first in the wagon race; Jerry Swindle, relay winner; Harley Malone, another relay winner, and Rex Henderson, first in the potato race.

Swindle also picked up a second place in the wagon race, and Malone another second in the wagon race.

The contests were held beginning Saturday night, until their conclusion Sunday morning.

Other members of the group participating in the contests were Dana McLain, Don Sanders, Margaret Swindle, Jim Swindle, Jerry Smith, Nelda Henderson and Retta Henderson.

Sunnyside Man Charged

In Area Shooting

A 47-year-old Sunnyside man was charged with murder with malice in the death of a Dimmitt man, Jimmy Tuttle, 35, after a shooting near Sunnyside Sunday morning.

Ben Derrick, 47, was freed on \$5,000 bond late Sunday after appearing before Castro County Justice of the Peace Earl Harrison.

Jim Ross of Dimmitt, Castro County Attorney, said Derrick had made a statement concerning the crime, which occurred about 3 a.m.

Officers said Derrick was at a party in Clovis, N.M., with a

friend, Norman Gibson, also of Sunnyside, earlier.

Officers said Tuttle joined them, and an argument began which ended in Gibson and Tuttle exchanging blows.

Derrick and Gibson said they left and were followed by Tuttle. They said they stopped to ask why Tuttle was following them when another argument broke out, and the shooting occurred.

Both men took Tuttle to the Dimmitt hospital, where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

He is survived by his wife and daughter.

Operating from a new "I" formation last week in attempt

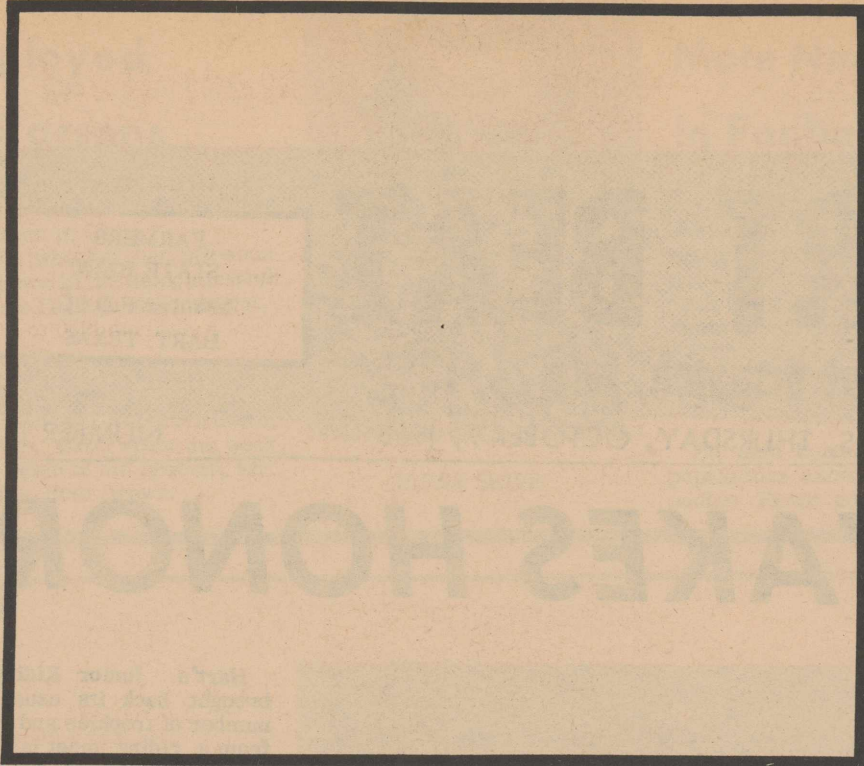
to overcome the weight disadvantage against Anton, the Hart crew was stung by the fumble bug, and work this week has been to cut down on the number of lost pigskins.

Recipe Of The Week

Our recipe this week comes from Thelma Joyce Martin, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Granville Martin.

She is a member of the Baptist Church, the FHA and the pep squad. Her hobbies are cooking and sewing.

PECAN PIE

SINGLE CRUST

1/2 c. shortening
1 1/2 c. sifted flour
1/2 tsp. salt
3 T. water

Sift flour and salt into bowl. Take out 1/4 cup flour and mix with water to form paste. Cut shortening into remaining flour until pieces are the size of peas. Add flour-paste to mixture. Mix and shape into ball. Roll the dough on floured board with short, light strokes, keeping pastry circular in shape, about 12 inches in diameter and 1/8

inch thick. Place in pie pan. Trim pastry allowing it to extend 1/2 inch beyond edge of pan. Fold and flue with fingers. Add pecan filling.

FILLING

1/3 c. shortening
1/2 c. brown sugar
1/2 c. milk
1 c. chopped pecans
3 eggs
1/2 tsp. salt
1 c. corn syrup
1/2 tsp. vanilla

Cream shortening and sugar. Add remaining ingredients and blend. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake in hot oven (425) 10 minutes then at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.

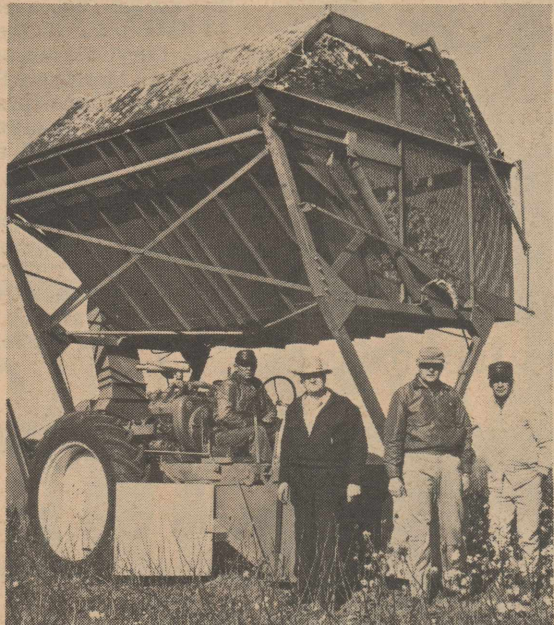

Hart Drops Fou Bow To Anton

Anton came to Hart with nothing but winning on their minds and they turned the trick going away.

The Bulldogs, led by fullback Nicky Biffle, almost ran the Longhorns off the field, gathering in a 42-6 win for their third straight win of the season.

Biffle ran four touchdowns and added two conversion points to lead the scoring attack, of the Bulldogs. The senior fullback also led the ground attack, accounting for more than half of the total rushing yardage of his team.

Biffle ran up 156 yards in 29 carries, then watched his teammates add two more touchdowns and four extra points to seal up the scoring spree.

Biffle scored for the Bulldogs on the first play from scrimmage, going 64 yards after taking the kickoff for a 16-yard return.

He later added six-pointers on a 19-yard run, a four-yard plunge and a six-yard gainer.

Rodger Mitchell added another score for the Bulldogs on an 11-yard effort, and added one of the two-point conversions.

Keith McGrew added the other Anton tally, racing 7 yards for a paydirt frolic.

McGrew then passed to Richie Reep for the final two point conversion.

Hart's lone TD came on a six-yard run late in the fourth quarter around left end by fullback David Smith.

McGrew was also the air attack leader of the Bulldogs, completing six of 12 attempts for 83 yards.

A rash of penalties in the second half held down total yardage for both clubs, with 16 miscues resulting in 145 lost yards for the two teams.

After Biffle's first TD, the senior fullback did the same thing again, this time from only 19-yards out, and at the end of the first quarter, the score was 16-0.

McGrew scored Anton's lone second quarter touchdown and the score stood 22-0 at half.

The third quarter opened like a new ball game, with neither

team moving the ball. But Biffle once again took charge, and with 5:07 left in the period, smashed four yards for his third end zone success.

Biffle picked up his last touchdown midway through the last stanza, sprinting six yards for the tally.

After a five yard penalty, McGrew passed to Reep for the conversion.

Hart then rolled from its own 25, racking up four first downs, and breaking the scoring ice.

Mitchell picked up the last Anton tally on a 11-yard run with less than three minutes in the game.

Biffle was also a standout on defense for the Bulldogs, but he was aided in the line by a pair of big tackles who put the big rush on Hart's backfield all night.

Ed Henson, 270 pounds, and Mike Snead, 235 pounds, both kept Hart quarterbacks from completing a single pass, and stopped any chances at running the center of the Bulldog line.

After the first Anton score, W. A. Hawkins III, acting as quarterback, returned the ball from his own 19 to the 38.

He then tried the first of seven pass attempts, but the ball went wide, and Larry McKay missed his chance at the pig-skin.

Smith then picked up a single yard and George Ed Bennett added two more before the Longhorns were forced to punt.

Larry Huston boomed the ball to the Anton 20, and Biffle got only four yards back before being swarmed under.

Mitchell advanced the ball 15 yards to his own 39 on the next play, when McGrew ran the ball all the way to the Hart 19.

But an offside penalty rubbed out the run and two passes from McGrew to Reep didn't find their mark and the Bulldogs had to kick.

After a short kick rolled dead at the Hart 35, Doug Martin advanced the ball to the 41 and Bennett took it to the 46 when

Anton fumble on the Hart 48. Joe Quiroz, moved to the offensive squad for Hart, drove the ball to the Anton 47, and another penalty sent the ball to the Bulldog's 26.

Two passing attempts by Hawkins failed to find their mark, and Anton recovered the ball on the 26, as Quiroz fumbled the ball on the next play.

But Anton returned the play three plays later, when a wide offense caused the Bulldogs problems.

Hart failed to capitalized on the luck handed them, and the ball went over on downs at Anton's 15.

The Bulldogs lost five yards on a dropped backfield handoff on their first play, and time ran out as the next play got underway.

The second half started out as if the Longhorns were trying to get back into the game, but once again it was no soap.

Hart managed to move the ball to their own 43 and one first down after the kick off, but an incompleated pass and a fumble cost the Horns, and Anton was once again in possession at their own 35.

Then Mitchell and Biffle alternated on ball carrying until Biffle capped the drive with his four-yard plunge for points.

A short kick after the touch-down effort once again gave the Bulldogs the ball on the Hart 49, but this time the Bulldogs were slated for a little disappointment, and the Horns took over on their own 36.

Hart had little luck on their set of downs, but Huston's kick rolled to the Anton 15, Mitchell and Biffle once more teamed up on the set of downs, however, and 11 plays later Biffle once again capped the drive with a short plunge for the money.

Then it was finally Hart's turn, as Bennett returned the kickoff from his own 25 to the 44.

Smith then moved the ball 30 yards to Anton's 26, and off-sides penalty cost the Bulldogs another five yards.

Hawkins inched the ball five yards closer and a short run by Smith and another penalty on Anton moved the ball to the nine.

Hawkins pushed the ball in six yards closer, and Smith added the three needed yards for the six-pointer.

Anton's final touchdown drive started on the kickoff, but Biffle gave an indication it might not be when he fumbled the ball on his own 25.

Mitchell made up for it on the next play, however, when he carried the ball 26 yards to Hart's 49.

Biffle advanced the ball five yards in two more plays, and a penalty on the Horns advanced the ball to the 28,

McGrew moved the ball three more yards, and Mitchell took the ball to the Hart 11 in two plays, before McGrew drove in for the final score.

Hart made exactly minus one yard on the five plays, although they did pick up another first down, and Huston's final kick rolled to the Anton six before time ran out.

STATE CAPITAL
Highlights
AND Sidelights



AUSTIN--A governor's committee soon will embark on the most-ambitious effort yet undertaken in Texas to find what's wrong with the public schools and to make them better.

Gov. John Connally rapidly is completing appointments to his 15-member committee on public school education which was authorized by the 59th Legislature. It is expected to be in operation with in the next month.

Activities, to a large extent, parallel those of the earlier Governor's Committee on Ed-

ucation Beyond the High School which probed needs of higher education. However, this new assignment necessarily is more massive.

A three-year study of the public school system and formulation of a long-range plan to make Texas "a national leader in educational aspiration, commitment and achievement;" was directed by the Legislature. Connally insisted the study requirement be made a part of the school teacher pay act of 1965.

State financing to the tune of \$100,000 this year and \$150,-

000 next year is provided for -- with additional funds expected from federal sources.

Every state agency and institution and all state and local school officials are directed by the Legislature to cooperate with the committee in a "pervasive inquiry into every facet of Texas public elementary and secondary education."

Meanwhile, the Coordinating Board for Texas Colleges and Universities-- a product of the earlier higher education study --has set Oct. 18 for its next meeting here. Session will be the powerful board's first real chance to get down to planning for higher education needs since its organizational meeting Sept. 20.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES

A person placed on probation for first-offense driving while intoxicated is not subject to automatic suspension of driver's license, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has ruled.

In an opinion requested by Fort Bend County Atty. R. A. Stallings of Richmond, Carr concluded that since a probated sentence is not a final conviction, there is not automatic license suspension. If probation is revoked and judgment becomes final, the license would be suspended at that time, Carr said.

Opinion settled widespread speculation on terms of the new Misdemeanor Probation Law.

In separate opinion, Carr held a newspaper printed by contract and mailed in one county for distribution in another county legally is eligible to publish Constitutional Amendment advertising. Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin requested the opinion, referring specifically to the Ganado Tribune, circulated in Jackson County, but printed and mailed in Lavaca County.

BIG GAME SEASON ON

Hunting season for big game opened -- for bow and arrow hunters and antelope shooters-- last weekend.

Regular season begins Nov. 13 for counties under regulatory responsibility of Parks and Wildlife Department and Nov. 16 in those functioning under separate laws.

P. & W Commission has held hearings and is setting seasons bag limits and methods of taking wildlife resources in 35 counties newly placed under its responsibility.

Free hunts of wildlife management areas will accommodate 2,680 hunters this year. Hunters have until Oct. 25 to apply to P&W Department. A public drawing will determine participants.

AGRICULTURE MEET

Representatives of the Texas and U. S. Department of Agriculture are planning a meeting with Mexican agricultural officials to discuss international lems in insect control. Meetings have been set to get working agreements back into effect as a protective measure for the Texas cotton industry.

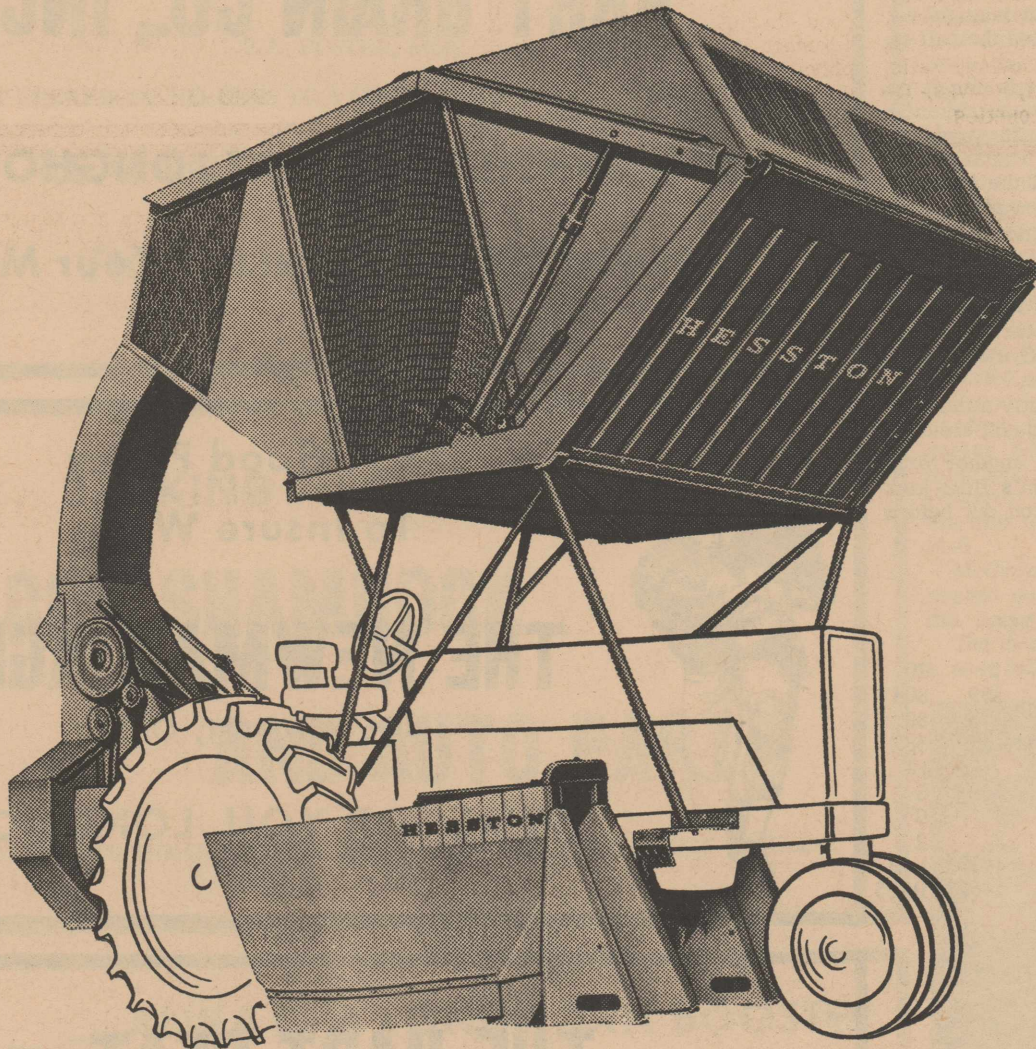

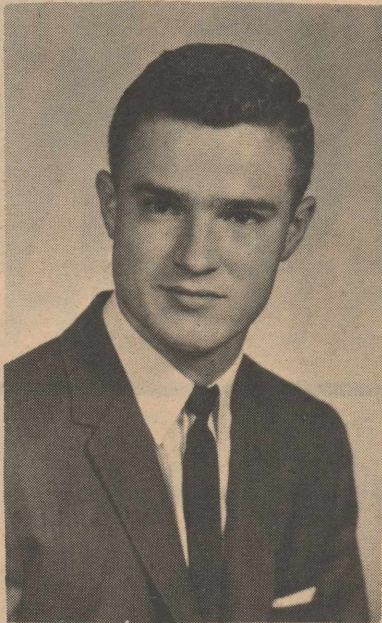

KITCHEN KORNER

October is always a month when we really begin to realize fall is with us and we do so much more baking and hot bread tastes so much better. I made an apricot roll last year that we really liked, so would like to share it with you.

One regular batch of hot roll batter will make four of these rolls. Divide roll dough into fourths and roll each into a rectangle very thin. Spread liberally with apricot preserves and sprinkle with chopped English walnuts, roll up as you would a jelly roll and seal all edges by pinching the dough together. Lay in a pan in the shape of a horseshoe, take scissors and cut slashes about two inches apart all around top, brush top with butter and let rise until double. Bake until well done. Frost with powdered sugar icing.

This is very pretty besides being good. I am sure any kind of preserves would be equally as good.

NEVER FAIL PIE CRUST

- 3 c. flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 5 T. water
- 1 1/4 c. shortening
- 1 egg well beaten
- 1 T. vinegar

Cut shortening into flour and salt. Combine egg, water and vinegar. Pour liquid into flour mixture all at once. Blend with a fork until flour is all moistened. This is a good crust. It will smell like vinegar before it is baked but doesn't after baking.

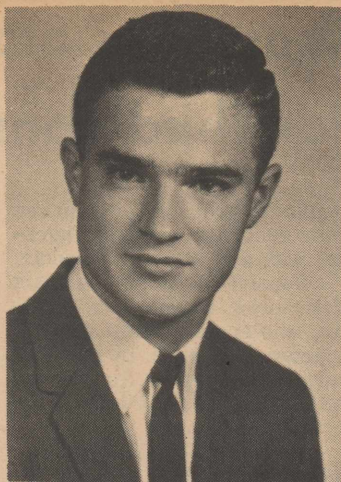

Pheasants Said More Numerous In Panhandle

SAN ANGELO--Preliminary surveys in northern Panhandle counties indicate pheasants will be more numerous than last year because of good spring and summer rainfall, according to Richard De Arment, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist.

He said huntable pheasant populations exist along the Canadian River and in isolated

areas southwest of Amarillo, but greatest pheasant densities are traditionally found in the irrigations areas of Dallam, Hartley, Moore and Sherman counties.

The 1965 pheasant season extends from Dec. 1 through Dec. 7. The bag limit is two cock pheasants per day, four in possession.

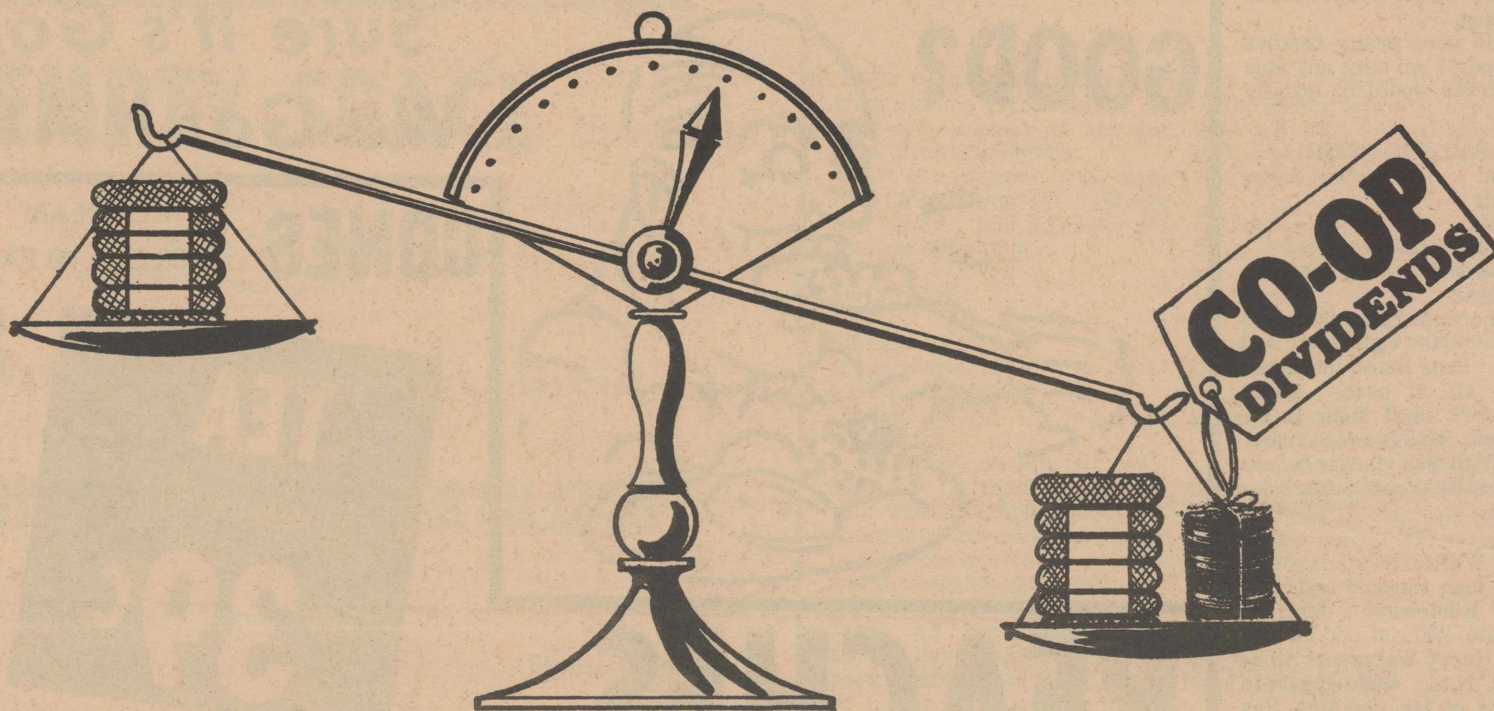
