son. The Lazbuddie crew sports a 1-4 season total, while Hart's team has yet to pick up a single win in five outings.

Fullback David Smith ran his point total for the season up to 24, picking up a six-pointer on a 58-yard run, while end Larry McKay scored his first points of the season on a 70-yard kickoff return.

Doug Martin assisted in his first points of the season when he passed to McKay for the two-point conversion effort.

Neither team could be said to boast a back with a breakaway potential on every play, but Hart coach Jeff Smart is especially concerned with the starting trio for the Lazbuddie eleven.

Fullback Johnny Mitchell has thus far been the leading Lazbuddie ground gainer and picked up the lone Longhorn tally in the Happy game.

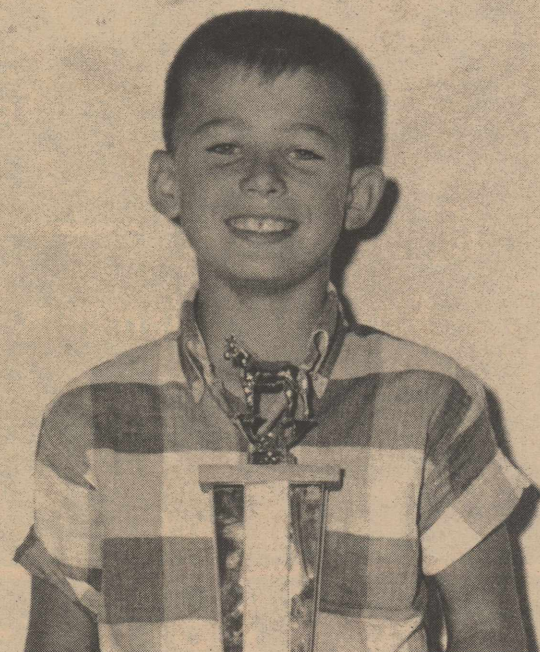
Quarterback Timmie Foster is also considered a threat because of his passing ability.

Foster teams with another worry for the Hart squad--Bobby Morris--to complete the pass run combination, and last week the combination worked on the extra point try.

Lazbuddie's big strong point is its defense, an area notably lacking in the Hart picture.

Lazbuddie has allowed its opponents 67 points through four games, while Hart has allowed its opposition 192 points in five contests.

But Hart has collected 38 points offensively, while the Longhorns from Lazbuddie have managed to collect only 16.

### BUTTERMILK CAKE

3 c. sugar  
1 c. shortening  
2 tsp. lemon or vanilla flavoring  
6 eggs, separated  
6 T. cornstarch  
2 c. flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 c. buttermilk  
1/4 tsp. soda

Cream together sugar and shortening. Add flavoring. Add egg yolks, one at a time. Put cornstarch in a cup and finish filling with flour. The add 2 cups of flour and salt that have been sifted together three times. Combine and add alternately with flour mixture, buttermilk and soda. Beat egg whites well and fold in last. Bake 1 1/2 hours at 325 degrees using a tube pan for baking. Let cool partially before removing from pan.

### TOMATO AND APPLE RELISH

12 apples  
12 ripe tomatoes  
9 onions  
3 c. sugar  
1 qt. vinegar  
2 T. mixed spices  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
1 tsp. cloves  
1/4 c. salt

Mix all ingredients. Cook one hour. Put mixture into hot sterilized jars and seal. Yield: 6 to 8 pints.

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# Swifts Explode To Take District C

Nazareth, led by quarterback Marvin Hoelting, stamped by Hart in the second quarter for 26 points, and took the first District 1-B contest, 44-14.

The speedy play-caller ran up 369 yards, more than the total for the entire Hart squad, and at the same time picked up 12 points and passed for another 18.

First quarter play indicated a close ball game, with neither squad able to cross the goal stripe the first three times they had possession of the pigskin.

Then Hoelting and halfback Gerald Brockman alternated on running plays to the Hart one-yard line, and Hoelting plunged over for the initial touchdown.

Brockman then crashed over for the conversion.

Then a fumble on the kick-off gave the Swifts the ball again, and less than two minutes later, Hoelting handed off to halfback Rickie Gerber for the second TD.

Hoelting's conversion kick was good, but a penalty moved the ball back five yards, and Hoelting's second kick was blocked.

The same hardluck story awaited the Longhorns on the next set of downs, when a pass from freshman quarterback Gary Rambo went into the ever-present Hoelting's arms, and on the first play on the new set of downs, Hoelting passed 35 yards to Brockman for the third TD of the stanza.

Hoelting's second conversion attempt was also blocked.

Hart's next attempt with the ball met no headway, and Nazareth took Larry Huston's kick on their own 32.

Five plays later, Hoelting once more stepped back to pass, and connected with his favorite target, Brockman, for a 44-yard pass-run touchdown combination.

Hoelting's conversion kick attempt met its usual result, with a fast rush by Hart resulting in a partial block and no score the result.

At the start of the game, Nazareth returned Larry McKay's kickoff to the Nazareth 40, and Brockman managed to move the ball two more yards on the first play from scrimmage.

But the big rush put on by Huston dropped Brockman for a two-yard loss. Hoelting's attempted pass to Brockman fell incomplete and he kicked to Hart's 17.

Hart's biggest gain on the series was a five-yard penalty against the Swifts, and Huston was forced to punt from his own 24.

Hoelting returned the kick 15 yards to his own 45.

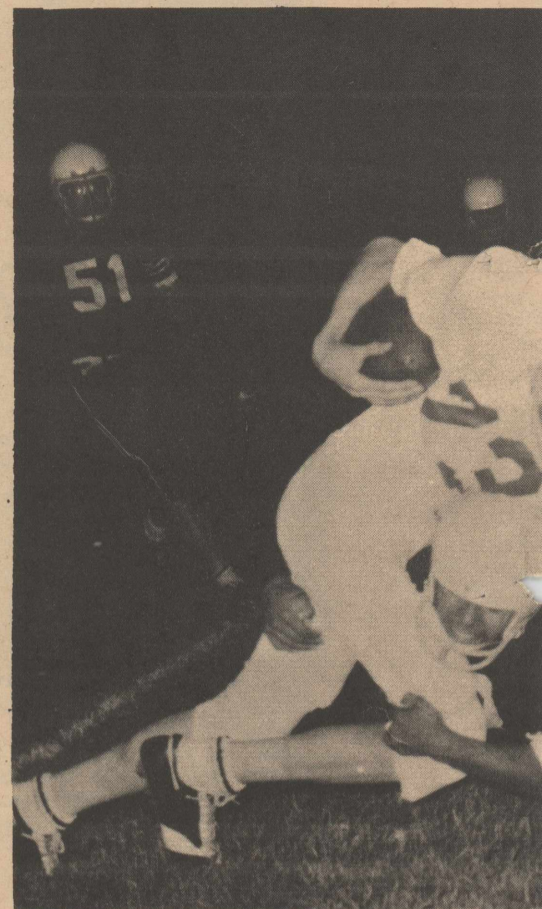
Huston and Larry Smith broke through to drop Hoelting on his own 39, and Hoelting also handled the punting chores, and the ball rolled dead on the Hart 26.

Hart gained exactly no yards on their series, and the Swifts took over on their own 37.

Nazareth also had no luck on their series, and W. A. Hawkins III returned the kick from his own five to the Hart 19.

Hart picked up a single first down with the aid of another ever-present Nazareth penalty, but then had to kick from their own 34.

Brockman returned the kick 49 yards to the Hart 26, but another penalty, this time on both Hart and Nazareth, forced the

play to be ran over. This time, Brockman ran the ball back to the Nazareth 34, and another penalty, this time for clipping, moved the ball to the Nazareth 22.

The Swifts were not to be stopped on the series, however, and the 78-yard drive was capped by hoelting's one-yard plunge.

On the kickoff, Hawkins bobbled the ball, and Hoelting recovered on Hart's 31.

Hart's Larry Parker and Hawkins dropped Gerber at the Hart 46, but Brockman ran the ball to the Hart's 14, and Hoelting passed to Brockman at the Hart five, before Gerber ran it over for the second Nazareth TD.

Hoelting then intercepted Rambo's pass for the third TD of the period, and the Swifts took over on the next series of downs on their own 26.

Hoelting ran the ball to the 49, and Brockman took over on the next play and went over for a score. But another of the Nazareth rash of penalties brought the ball back to the Swift 43.

But Hoelting wasn't buying the TD callback, and ran the ball to the Hart 44 before passing it to Brockman for the fourth touchdown of the period.

A fumble by Doug Martin gave the Swifts the ball once more again before the half ended, and the Nazareth crew wound up on the Hart four-yard line and a first down.

But Hart's defense held this time, and the Nazareth team ran out of time and downs at the same time.

The third quarter started out like a repeat of the second, with Hoelting passing to Gerber, who was wide open, for 36 yards and the fifth Nazareth TD, all before three minutes of the second half were gone.

Hart then started a march of its own, and got to the Nazareth 23 before a pass by Martin went into Hoelting's hands, and the speedy back ambled 77

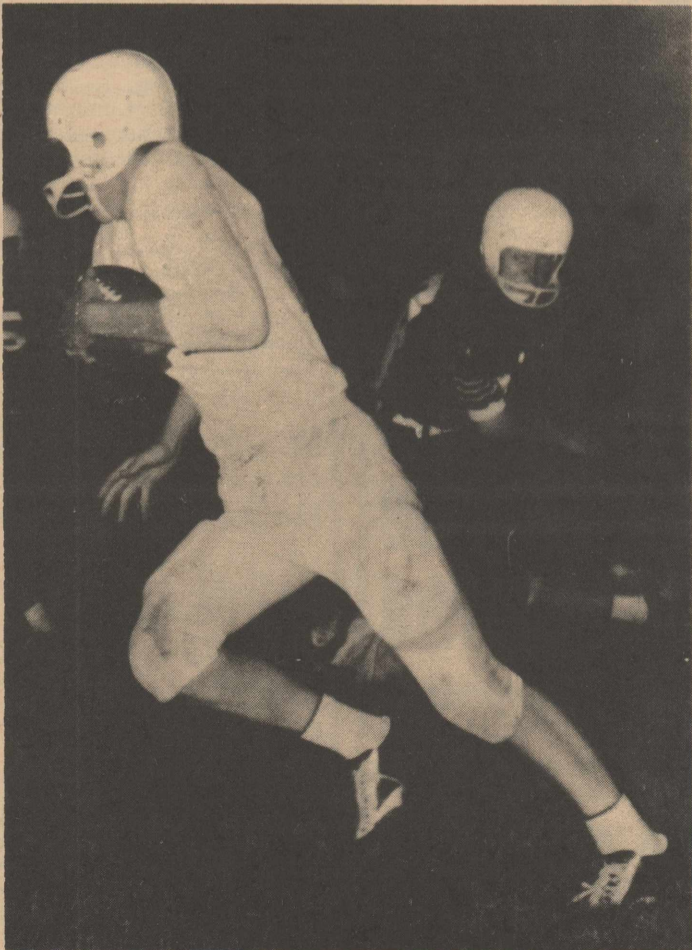

# KITCHEN KORNER

There are so many nice apples on the market to cook and eat and they can be used in so many ways. It is a good time of the year to cook lots of apples. When I think of apples I always think of the old saying, "An apple a day keeps the doctor away." Do you? Have you tried frying apples? We like them real well. Here is a menu we like real well this time of the year.

Ham Loaf, Fried Apples, Cottage Cheese Salad, Baked Potatoes, Hot Rolls and Plain Cake with Topping.

### HAM LOAF

- 1 lb. ground ham
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 lb. ground fresh pork
- 1 can 303 tomatoes
- 2 eggs
- 1 T. prepared mustard
- 1 medium onion (optional)
- cracker crumbs.

Mix all ingredients as for a meat loaf and bake 2 hours at 350 degrees.

### FRIED APPLES

Wash and slice apples with peeling on and fry in skillet until done thru. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup sugar and continue frying until lightly brown.

# Salvation Army Committee Holds Service Branch Meet

The Service Branch of The Salvation Army does no religious work other than charity. It tries to meet the need rather than giving cash. A service order slip must be signed by a committeeman, who can authorize up to \$10 for one call. Two committeemen can authorize up to \$25.

The bearer presents the signed certificate for the service or product needed. Then the person or company who supplied that need presents the certificate to the treasurer, Bob McLean of Dimmitt for payment.

Committeeman for Hart is the Rev. Douglas Gossett, pastor of the Methodist Church.

The committeemen are usually those pastors and laymen who attend committee meetings and who are approved by the committee and the supervisor. The committee usually meets about twice a year. Other committeemen in Dimmitt include about three pastors and several laymen, including the county sheriff.

Russell Nelson of Dimmitt was elected by the committee to head up the Salvation Army drive for funds for this work this fall. Where there is a Community United Fund drive, the Salvation Army requests to be included. The treasurer reported a bank balance of \$400 after the Committee voted to send \$200 to the Salvation Army state treasurer.

State funds were depleted re-

lieving the victims of catastrophes at Hale Center, Sanderson and other communities.

Catastrophe work is not done by the County Committee. This is done by special Salvation Army Workers.

Muddell emphasized the importance of this kind of work, saying, "When 'this man' is without food, clothing, shelter or medical necessities, that is a catastrophe to him."

Hart came back in the third stanza when quarterback Lonny Davis pitched out to fullback Porter, who ran 35 yards for the TD.

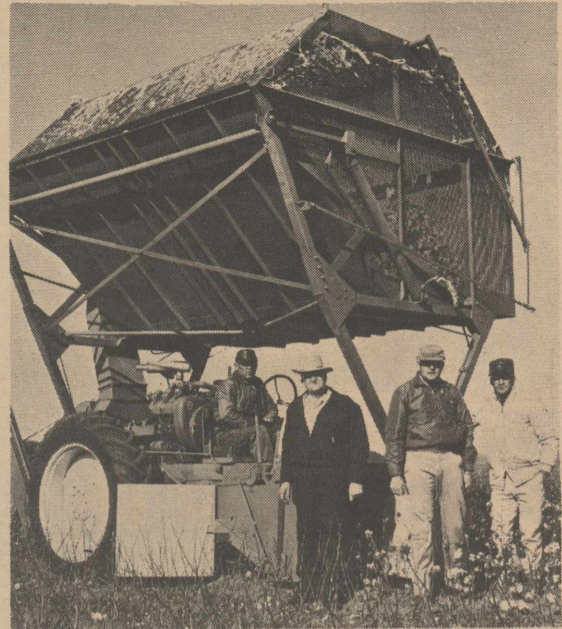
## Given Party After Winning
