'Horns Will **Test Texline**

While neighboring Nazareth travels to Vega in a clash of District 1-B powers, in a deciding game of the district race, another pair of teams meet in Hart Friday night to fight out another type of contest.

This one is to see who will in all probability wind up on the bottom of the same district contests.

Extra incentive for the Hart team will be the fact that this Friday is Homecoming on the Longhorns' stomping grounds, and the game will probably be the last chance the 'Horns the last chance have to pick up a win.

Another reason the thin squad has to top the Tornadoes is last year's score, a 20-0 affair with the Texline squad coming out on the long end of the

But after viewing the optimistic side of the picture, thoughts turn to the other side,

For the season, Hart opponents have been rolling up points at the rate of 39.5 a game, while the Hart squad has managed to

average just less than five. In district competition, the record is even worse, with opponents picking up 42 points on the average, while Harthas col-lected a 3.5 points per game

To top all that, the Longhorns will be operating without the services of two, and possibly three, of the starting backfield members.

W. A. Hawkins III, who missed the Vega game because of a broken hand last week will probably also miss this week's contest as well, and halfback Joe Quiroz, who suffered a leg injury in the first quarter of the Vega contest, will be out for the rest of the season.

Vote Goes With State

Hart and Castro County residents went with the state in state amendment votes Tuesday with the exception of one.

While the state voters were rejecting amendment No. 2. to increase the veterans' land fund, Hart voters voiced approval of the measure, as did Nazareth and Castro County voters as a whole.

In the rest of the voting, Hart, Castro and state voters approved Amendments No. 1, No.

3. No. 5, No. 6, and No. 8. tirement of state court judges at age 75, and also provides for removal of judges from office in case of disability.

The two Nazareth districts just north of Hart, however, disagreed with the state trend.

Nazareth voters rejected the college building fund amendment, and approved three other amendments which were rejected on the state level.

Amendments approved by the two district were No. 2, which was the veterans land fund increase; No. 7, which was to allow tax exemptions from certain state taxes for hospitals which contributed as much as \$150,000 a year for medical aid to indigent persons, and No. 4, which would have given the top state officials four- year

terms instead of two-year jobs.
Two amendments, No. 9 and N. 10, were rejected by Hart, both Nazareth districts, Castro County and the State.

The first, No. 9 would have allowed the legislature to set the salary of the Lt. Governor and the House Speaker, and also give an increase in pay to state legislators, while No. 10 would given four-year office terms to state representatives.



Buffs Last Home Game Is Saturday

CANYON---After winning its first five games, West Texas State will take a two-game losing streak into this Saturday's final home game of 1965 against University of Des Moines, Iowa. The Bulldogs' record is also 5-2.

Although the Buffs dropped a 27-12 decision to Memphis State in Memphis last weekend, the coaches felt the team played pretty well overall and was mostly just "outhorsed."

Drake, just as have the five previous opponents of the Panhandle team, has an outstanding quarterback in Ron Royer. For the past five weekends, the West Texas State defense has had to contend with John Goodman of Arizona State, Les Obie of Trinity, Jon Henderson of Colorado State University, Sal Olivas of New Mexico State and Billy Fletcher of Memphis State. Royer's record ranks with any of the aforementioned group and he may be just as hard to stop. He has amassed 1,038 yards in total offense in seven games, 199 of which has been gained on the ground, His passing record is 51 completions in 98 tries. for 839 yards and seven touchdowns.

Buffalo quarterback Hank Washington hit 10 targets at Memphis to bring his season's total to 88, two more completions than former record-holder Jim "Corkey" Dawson of Borger had in 1960. Both Buff ends, Ted Wheeler and Roy Armentrout, surpassed the record for catches in one season against the Tigers. Wheeler now has 25 receptions for 227 yards and Armentrout has 24 for 343. The record was 23 set by Bill Cross in 1950. Cross still holds the yardage mark of 456 although Armentrout needs only 114 in the final three games to shatter that mark.

One big thing the Bulldogs will have going for them this weekend is momentum while the Buffs will need to build some. Drake has lost only to Iowa State, 21-0, and Western Kentucky, 28-21, this season. Since they won their last five games in 1964 that means the Bulldogs have won 10 of their last 12. They handled Abilene Christian with ease, 24-7, last weekend, and as a matter of fact, all of their wins have been by at least 14 points.

Only in their opening loss to Iowa State have the Bulldogs been held to less than 17 points. Their average output is 20.7 compared to 18 for WTSU. Reports from Des Moines say the ports from Des Moines say the victory over Abilene Christian was "the Bulldogs' best game of the year." Fullback Ray Brown (437 yards rushing) and end Manley Sarnowsky (29 catches; 51 points) complement Royer very effectively and will certainly be a stiff challenge certainly be a stiff challenge to the "Unfriendly Society," the WTSU defensive unit which was pushed about a bit in the re-

cent defeats.

Another gloomy note in Canyon is the fact that Buffaloes lost two members of the Society to injury. Safety Steve Haterius suffered a dislocated shoulder and guard Marc Allen, who won the MVP award for his work against New Mexico State, received a broken bone. Both are probably out for the season.

Southwestern Finishes New Major Project

Southwestern Public Service Company construction crews have finished a major transmission line construction project, representing an investment of nearly \$1,500,000, designed to provide additional electrical power capacity for the Dimmitt-Hart area.

Two new transmission lines, a new interchange substation and rebuilding of an existing transmission line were the major projects in the improvement program.

A 115,000 volt line was constructed from Plant X, near Earth, to the new Castro County Interchange, seven miles west of Dimmitt. Eventually, this line will be completed from the new interchange station to Hereford and be an additional strengthening factor in local electrict service in the future.

At the interchange station, the voltage is stepped down from 115,000 to 69,000 volts and the power is carried to Dimmitt on a new 69,000 volt transmission line, of H-Frame Construction. The transformer used to stepdown the voltage at the interchange station can carry a load of 40,000 kilowatts, and virtually triples the amount of electric power that will be available to customers in the Dimmitt-Hart area.

The final step in the transmission line and interchange station phase of the new construction was the rebuilding of the 69,000 volt transmission line from Dimmitt to Hart. This power artery is now of H-Frame type construction, replacing the previous single pole wishbone type line.

In addition to the transmission work a new distribution substation was constructred at Hart and that community's distribution system
rebuilt and major improvements were made to the distribution system at Dimmitt to
complete the coordinated pro-

HPRF Reports Are Released

Tascosa wheat was the top in yield with 69.4 bushels in the 1965 wheat variety test at the High Plains Research Foundation according to Loyd Langford; associate agronomist. This variety has been consistently high in yield for the past five yars at Halfway. It has also been consistently high in baking qualities, Langford said. Caddo and Bison varieties

were not significantly lower than Tascosa in the 1965 test. Seven wheat varieties tested in 1965 were: Tascosa, Caddo, Bison, Commanche, Improved Triumph, Kaw and Triumph.

The tests were planted Oct. 23, 1964, at a seeding rate of 100 pounds per acre and harvested June 23, 1965. All varieties received a fertilizer application at planting time of 125 pounds of 11-48-0 per acre and a topdress application of 46 pounds of nitrogen from ammonium nitrate on March 8, 1965.

A 6-inch post plantirrigation was applied Oct. 30 for germination. Irrigations during the growing season were applied at jointing, March 16; early boot on April 24; and when grain was milky, May 10.

Bronco oats was the top yielding variety with 98.7 bushels per acre in 1965 in a test of six varieties of oats at the High Plains Research Foundation. The oat varieties tested by Loyd Langford in 1965 included: Bronco, Cimarron, Alamo X, Alamo, New Nortex, and Mustang.
