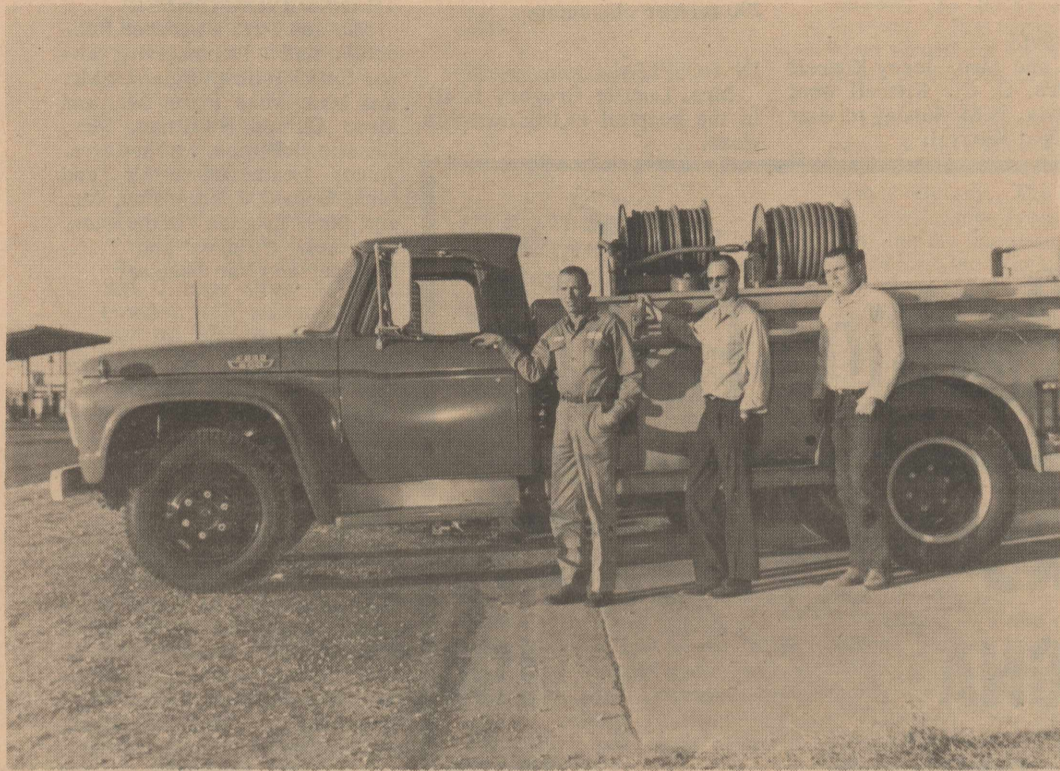

Hart Basketball Teams Drop Contests At Plainview

Hart's varsity basketball teams ran into some rough sledding Tuesday in Plainview.

The girls were downed by the Wayland Queen Bees, 71-34, while the boys dropped their

contest to the Plainview B-team, 5-42.

The losses left the girls' mark at 3-3 for the season, while the male record is 0-3 thus far.

So far, the girls have beaten Spade three times and dropped contests to Lockney, Vega and the Bees.

On the boys' scorebook, the losses have been from Spade, Vega, and the Plainview group.

Coach Haden Moore praised the effort given by the girls in the game with the Wayland freshmen girls, saying, "They gave a fine performance."

Rebecca Futrell was high point scorer for the Hart girls, collecting 18, while Linda Popejoy was the defensive standout.

For the boys, Larry McKay hit the basket for 20 points in the Plainview contest, while David Smith had 10 and Doug Martin nine.

In the Vega contests, the girls were downed 42-23, while the boys lost 48-34.

The boys lost their opening game to Spade in the last six seconds when a last-try shot sent the boys to a 51-50 defeat.

The next games for both the girls' varsity and the boys' varsity and B-teams are against Amherst there Dec. 3.

Then the girls' varsity has a return match with the Wayland

group Dec. 6, while the boys' tackle the Plainview B-group once again, both games scheduled at Hart.

Then the boys' varsity and B-teams and the girls' varsity travel to Friona the next day for a set of games there.

Both boys' and girls' varsity teams then travel to Roosevelt Dec. 9, 10 and 11 for the tournament there, while the B-teams of both groups will be in Spade on the same dates for that tournament.

Hart Banker Is Honored

Norlan Dudley, Hart banker, has been awarded the Degree of Honorary State Farmer by the Plainview District Farmers of America.

Award was made at a district banquet held in Floydada.

The award is the highest honor that can be given to an individual by the Texas Association of Future Farmers.

Dudley has long been active in his support of the FFA, including the Castro County Show, the Hereford Fat Stock Show and the Plainview Fat Stock Show.

In his capacity as bank president, he has assisted many local boys with financial backing and takes great pride in the fact no FFA boy has ever "disappointed" him.

He noted that the bank has 100 percent collection on all loans made to Hart FFA boys.

Community Chest Drive To Begin

Kickoff meeting for the community chest drive in Hart, Dec. 6-11, has been set Dec. 6 at 7:30 p.m. at Alford's Cafe with Dwight Miller as drive chairman.

Representatives of nine clubs are expected to attend the Monday meeting. Hart's goal is

set at \$2,000.

Community Chest includes the Red Cross, Salvation Army, Muscular Dystrophy Fund, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

Miller asks "community-wide participation" in the drive and that residents "give generously."

Hart Area Voters OK Cotton Quotas

Hart voted "yes" with farmers throughout the county and the state in the national cotton allotment referendum last week.

Hart farmers cast 70 votes favoring the allotment system, while 10 disapproved of the quotas.

On a side issue, allowing cotton allotments to be transferred across county lines, Hart voters were evenly split, with 40 in favor of the measure and a like number against.

But since two-thirds majority vote was needed to approve both measures, the transfer

question failed.

In the county as a whole, there were 301 votes in favor of the cotton allotment quotas, while 48 voted against the measure.

In the allotment transfers, 185 voted for the measure, while 164 voted against.

The vote on whether or not to allow transfer of allotments was the first time that farmers have had a chance to voice an opinion on the subject.

The question was decided on a county-to-county basis, with only one county in the 23-county High Plains cotton district, Gaines, getting the two-thirds approval vote required.

Cotton Harvest Pace Quickens After Freeze

With freezing weather getting to the Hart area this week, cotton harvesting is finally beginning to get fully underway.

Cotton ginning is still running far behind last year, but since the first freeze last week, the bale total has been increasing steadily.

So far, 2,366 bales have been brought into the three Hart gins, and the figure more than doubles last week's total.

One ginner reported "little difference" in activity at his gin since the freeze, but another said his yard was "swarming" since the mercury took its dip.

Sophomores were David A. Harris and David D. Harris. Gloria Zavala was the sole freshman on the list.

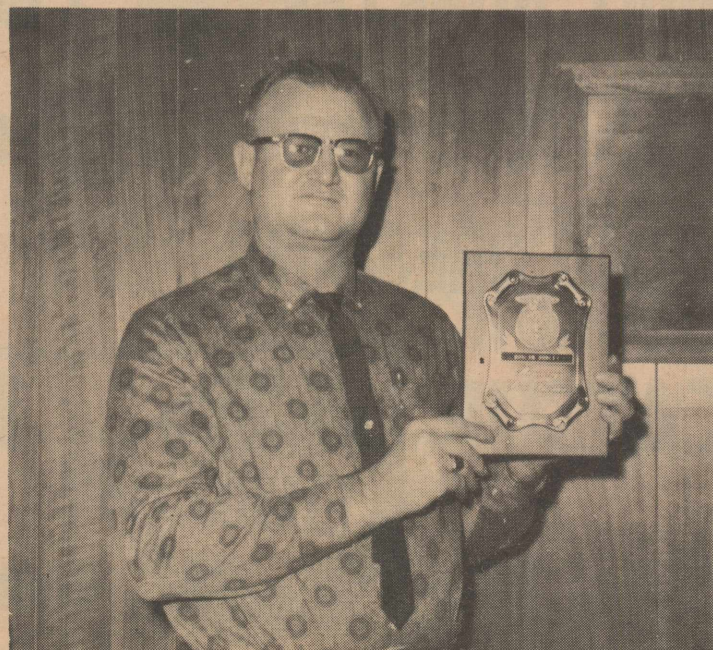




KITCHEN KORNER

Now is the time to bake your Christmas fruit cake if you haven't done so already.

GERTRUDE'S FRUIT CAKE
 1 c. Wesson oil
 1 1/2 c. brown sugar (packed)
 4 eggs
 2 c. sifted flour
 1 tsp. baking powder
 2 tsp. salt
 2 tsp. cinnamon
 2 tsp. allspice
 1 tsp. cloves
 2/3 c. pineapple or orange juice (finish filling with wine to make 1 cup)
 1 c. more sifted flour
 1 lb. of candied fruit mix
 1 c. whole red cherries
 1/2 c. green cherries
 1 c. raisins
 1 c. chopped figs
 1 c. chopped dates
 1 c. currants
 1 c. each, pecans, English walnuts and Brazil nuts.

Combine Wesson oil, sugar and eggs, beat for 2 minutes. Sift 2 cups flour with baking powder, salt and spices. Mix into oil mixture alternately with 1 cup juices. Mix remaining cup flour with the fruits and nuts in a large bowl, coating well with the flour, pour batter over fruits and nuts, mixing them slowly and thoroughly. Pour into greased tube pan or loaf pans. Line bottoms with heavy brown paper. Bake large cakes 6 hours at 275 degrees, smaller ones, 3 to 4 hours. Put pan of water on lower rack in oven (cooking over water makes them moist). Cover cake pans with heavy brown paper after baking, let stand 15 minutes. Remove from pans and cool on racks. Let stand over night.

GLAZE -- Combine 2 T. brown sugar, 1 T. corn syrup and 2 T. water. Bring to a boil and boil 2 minutes. Brush over tops of cake. Decorate with candied pineapple, cherries, nuts. Blanched almonds make the cake real pretty.

This will make one large 7 and one half pound cake or 2 medium and one small cake.

Here is an unusual recipe and very good.

1 c. thick applesauce
 2 c. sugar
 1 1/2 envelopes plain gelatin
 1/3 c. cold water
 1/2 package lemon jello
 1/2 c. walnut chopped fine
 1 heaping tsp
 1 heaping T. cornstarch

Dissolve gelatin in cold water. Combine cornstarch and suar. and stir until well mixed. Put applesauce, sugar and cornstarch into pan and bring to boil, add dissolved gelatin and lemon jello and stir until well dissolved. Cook slowly for 20 minutes over low heat. When cool, add walnuts and turn into a buttered pan. Let stand overnight before cutting into squares. Roll each piece in powdered sugar.

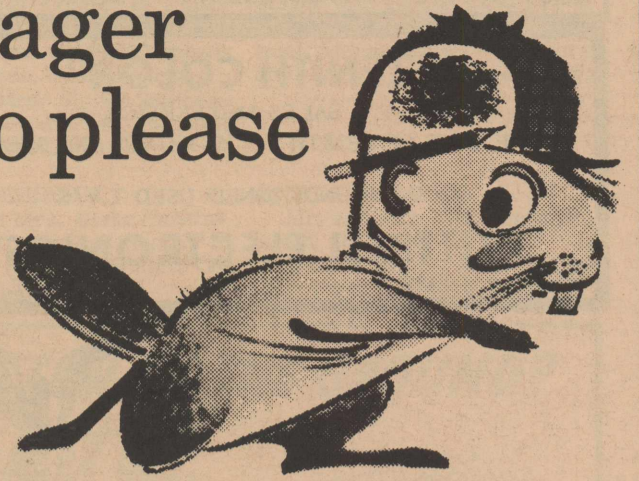

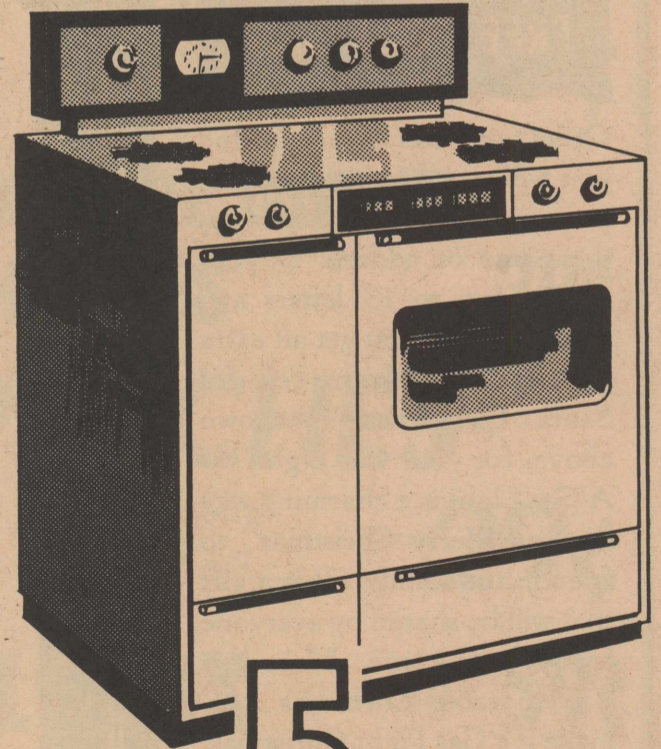

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

In a case involving student demonstrations against war in Vietnam, the Court of Criminal Appeals refused to say whether a district civil court judge can prevent enforcement of a city parade ordinance. Issue now is moot -- no longer a timely legal question -- opinion concluded.

State Supreme Court found British-American Oil Producing Company owes \$3,866 in sales taxes on the purchase of a computer system.

Supreme Court consented to review a case alleging fraudulent collection methods by an Amarillo loan company.

Attorneys for Longview oilman Clark Sample Jr. argued before Supreme Court that State Railroad Commission is without power to cut future oil production to compensate for over-production in past. Commission is seeking to charge about \$1,000,000 worth of oil to operators it claims over-produced.

Hart's Lady Butcher Learned By Watching

Most butchers are thought of as being big burly men, hoisting around sides of beef with ease.

But at least one person in Hart would seem to disprove that image.

Mrs. Lewis Smith, better known to most people as Maureen, has invaded the profession thought to be most of the time as strictly a male occupation.

Furthermore, she's been in the same line of work for the past 11 years.

The Smith's moved to Hart 11 years ago from Clarksville in East Texas.

And that was when Mrs. Smith decided to learn her present job.

How did she learn?

"Just by watching and by actual work," she says with a smile.

That first try at the job was cutting and wrapping meat at the public food locker then located in Hart.

She also worked for Gilmer Grocery (now Harlin's) during the same period.

And she's been doing the same job ever since, except for 14 months, when she ran a cafe.

Mrs. Smith now handles the

meat market at Newsom's Grocery.

For those disbelievers, Mrs. Smith isn't just the person who wraps the meat after it's already been cut up.

She handles a saw and a knife with the ease of any professional.

Of course, sometimes she has a little trouble with an occasional side of beef, which may get a little heavy.

But there is usually someone

present to help in case the weight is just a little too heavy.

And Mrs. Smith learned her profession while raising two children, a son, Jim, now 26, and a daughter, Kay, 16, and a junior at Hart High School.

Meat market operators in most stores may be men, but the woman behind the counter in Hart doesn't seem to be bothered by her unique occupation.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Next year Texans may be able to elect House members under the new redistricting law.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr will urge a federal court at Houston to let voters elect the members, even though the court may believe flitorial districts are not constitutional.

If the court will allow such

action, the 1967 Legislature could pass a redistricting law without flitorial districts.

This year's redistricting law includes 11 flitorial districts resulting in a situation where small counties share representatives with large counties.

Judges believe this discriminates against sparsely-populated counties.

Court could declare the entire law unconstitutional and a special session of the Legislature would be needed to pass a new law.

Except for the flitorial districts, Court indicates new law is constitutional.
