

Castro County cotton raisers will have almost the same allotments in 1966 as they received last year according to the county ASCS office.

The allotment for 1966 totals 52,205 acres, only 527 acres less than in 1965, a loss of approximately one per cent.

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



MAKE YOUR OWN ORNAMENTS-Cotton crochet thread is the major ingredient in creating "string-maze fantasies." Soak thread in full-strength liquid starch and wrap around an inflated balloon in criss-cross fashion. When thread is dry, deflate and remove the balloon through the top opening. The lacy-looking globe that's left can be decorated with a variety of holiday trims. Hang it on the Christmas tree or suspend it from the ceiling for a festive touch.

Silver Decorations

Silvered berries, leaves, seed pods and sprays of ivy may be made by pouring a small amount of aluminum paint into a deep container almost filled with water. The paint floats

on the water. Dip the material to be silvered into the water and draw it out slowly. Hold it over the container until it has stopped dripping. Then hang it in a dry place for 24 hours. Aluminum paint for metal surfaces works best.

MINT TREE A small, mint-laden Christmas tree will do double duty by providing a festive centerpiece for the Christmas dinner table and a novel way of serving that finishing touch for the special dining occasionafter-dinner mints. Mints may be attached to the tree easily with cellophane tape, thread or regular ornament hangers.



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Make a Wreath

To make a wreath, use a wire hoop or coat hanger bent into a circle. Wire pine needles to the hoop with short pieces of wire. Add pine needles until the foundation wreath is at

least two inches deep. Then wire on pieces of evergreen and berries. If the foundation is firmly made, the evergreen and berries may be stuck into the pine needles.



Holiday Hazards

The fire hazard posed by the Christmas tree are many. Make certain your tree lights are UL approved and no portion of the electrical wiring is frayed or exposed. Never place candles

or flammable decorations on the tree. It's also wise not to let the tree stand for more than a week. Even if watered faithfully, it tends to dry out quickly in warm room temperatures.





POVERTY PROGRAM ADVANCED

Gov. John Connally announced approval of Community Action Program grants in Kingsville (\$38,234); Comal and Blanco Counties (\$18,649); and Atas-cosa, Karnes and Wilson Counties (\$16,200)

\$223,710 Neighborhood A Youth Corps grant to train 210 youngsters in Falfurrias also received the governor's authorization.

OIL EXPLORATION ENCOURAGED

Texas now is encouraging oil exploration in the Gulf of Mexico on both state and federal leases by adopting a special offshore allowable yardstick giving offshore wells bonus production allowables.

New Texas schedule, effective Jan. 1, matches the special offshore allowable Louisiana has been granting, at least in

general. This was a double Christmas bonus for companies operating offshore, since the Texas Railroad commission announced its decision as it increased regular state-wide production for January to 32.6 per cent of capability, a rise of 69,587 bar-rels in calendar day allowables.

Bonus production allowables will apply not only to state-owned tracts in the Gulf of Mexico, extending out 10.5 miles,

but also to federally-owned lands beyond that point to the

Continental Shelf. State Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, who administers the offshore leases owned by the Texas Permanent School Fund, called the announcement Christmas gift for the Texas schools."

TEXAS 2020

More than 30 million people are expected to live in Texas by 2020, and about two-thirds of them will be living in 15 of the more urbanized counties.

According to a Texas Water Development Board report, seven of the 15 will have a population exceeding a million. Eight counties will have popu-lations ranging from 400,000 to 1,000,000.

This study, directly related to the State Water Plan, is due public presentation in the late spring of 1966. It will be the basis for water requirement projections to 2020.

Counties in the "over-a-mil-lion" category will include Har-ris, Dallas, Tarrant, Bexar, Travis, Nueces and El Paso in that order.

Dominent other counties will be Jefferson, McLennan, Galveston, Brazoria, Smith, Lubbock, Hidalgo and Gregg. These 15 counties are ex-

pected to comprise two-thirds of the population. In 1960, the 15 contained half of the total state population. State Water Plan will pro-

ject water requirements for the expected population growth in each river and coastal basin.

SLEEPER ACT INTRODUCED New discoveries in science and technology valuable to business, industrial and commercial interest will be made available to the state through a federal program. This new act could serve as a boon to the

state's economy.

Gov. John Connally named the Coordinating Board of Higher Education as the state agency an appointed Joe W. Tyson Jr. as state director.

Tyson said his office will work actively to make potential users aware of the wealth of data available. Agency will not keep such data itself, but will direct seekers to the places where data may be found.



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

DRAFT MAY TAKE 35-YEAR OLDS

Texas draft boards soon may quotas. This will be done for stair rail. the first time since World War II.

Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state selective service director, made the announcement to Texas college and university registrars. He urged the education officials to let Selective Service know as soon as draftage young men drop out of school young men drop out of age school or lighten their work load -- as "the nation can provide useful occupations for the perennial students who show no

progress." Actually, raising the age bracket from 26 to 35 won't produce many more eligible men, according to Schwartz's calculations. He estimated there are less than 3,000 in the outside age range due to the number who qualify for deferments because of dependent children or other reasons.

Selective Service, Schwartz emphasized, wants to leave "serious, dedicated students in school" to complete their work, and feels reporting drop-outs or those who study load drops below fulltime will help make this possible.

MAMMOTH JOB TACKLED

State and Federal livestock inspectors are going to inspect all the sheep in Texas, estimated at 6,000,000 head. This to remove the double-dipping requirements placed by other states on the sheep from Texas.


Dipping rules were imposed when two outbreaks of sheep scab were discovered in Texas earlier in the years.

Dr. S. B. Walker, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, said the two agencies should complete the mammoth task by April 1.



Mix 1 cup flaked coconut to 1 cup grapenuts (or chopped walnuts)

Make balls out of round American cheese and roll in finely chopped peanuts.

Three Years Ago In Hart

Hart's population today stands at a little over 750. The year just passed blew into Hart on a rather cold note last January as temperatures dropped to nine below zero. One of the bitterest cold fronts in years hit the area. Bank deposits in Hart set a record when they rose to an all-time high of \$1,535,079.65 at a year-end call Dec. 31, 1962. Average grain yield per acre in the area was estimated at 5,000 pounds.

Saturday, Dec. 21, the area received one inch of dry snow. This was followed by three more inches of wet snow Sunday, Dec. 29.

Carl Ward, end, and James Mitchell, guard, have been named to the All-South Plains Class B second team.


Almost 13,500 bales of cotton have been weighed in at the three area Hart gins before wet fields put a temporary stop on further operatins.

Kissing Plant The festive symbolism of mistletoe goes back to the ancient cults common to the Celts. Mistletoe once was uni-


versally associated with fertility, and is still associated with kissing and courting at winter festivals.
