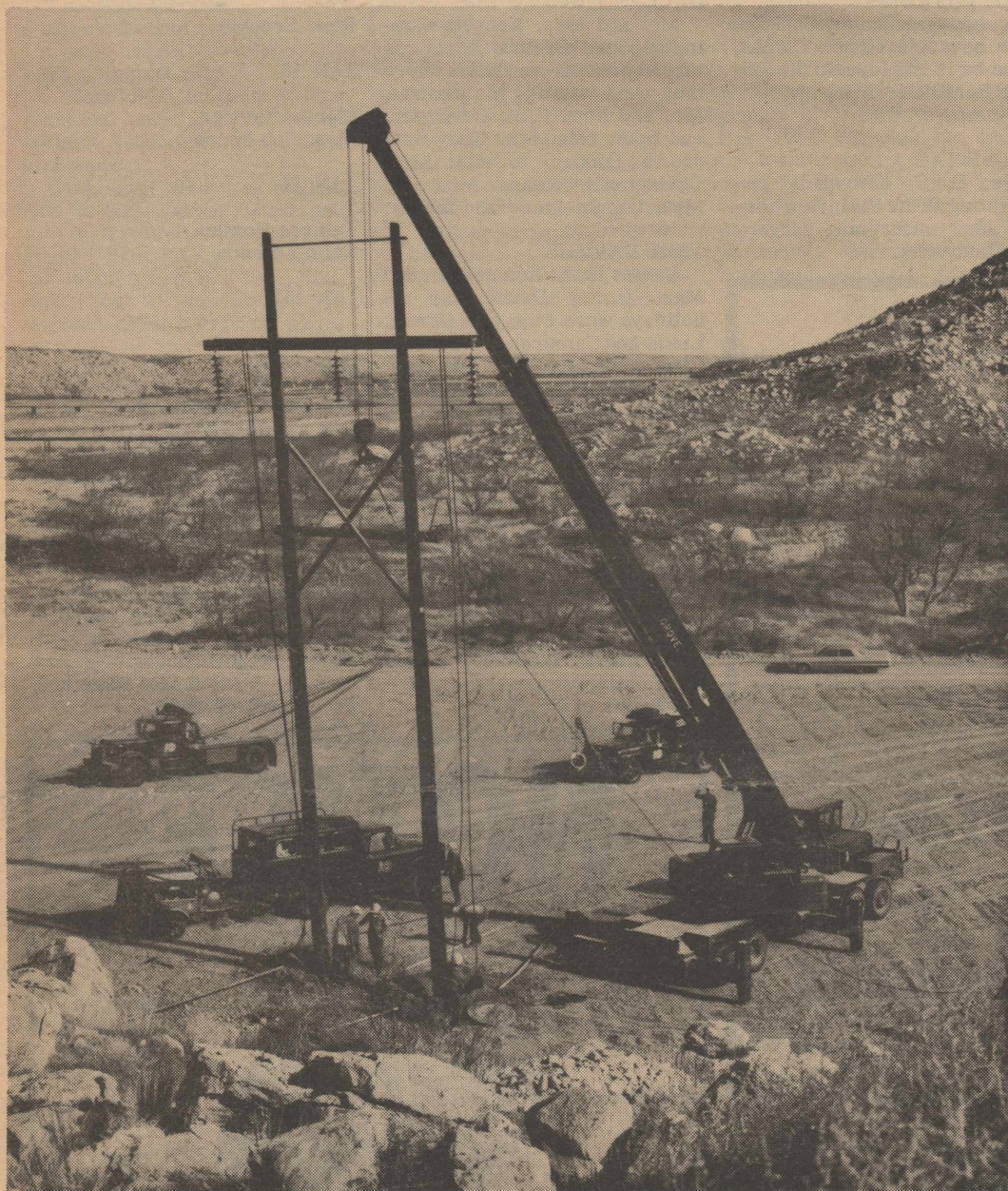

NEW SERVICE CRANE—An 80 foot electric transmission line structure can be lifted and set into place in eight and one-half minutes with Southwestern Public Service Company's new hydraulic crane. The unit, the second one to go into service in the nation, was specifically designed for use in the electric utility industry. Southwestern Public Service Company has announced a 1966 construction program calling for the investment of \$19,353,000 in new facilities, with a large portion of the additional investment to be in transmission lines.

SWPS Announces 1966 Plans For Construction, Improvement

A 1966 construction and improvement program which calls for the investment of an additional \$19,353,000 in new facilities throughout the company's service area was announced today by A. R. "Lon" Watson, president and general manager of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"Comparing our construction plans with a military operation, 1966 could be described as a year when we are going to strengthen and consolidate our position. In other words, this is a year when we are going to build into an already strong interconnected electric system new facilities which will provide even greater service dependability for our customers," Watson said.

New transmission lines, and related equipment, are the largest single investment in the 1966 program, with nearly \$7,-

500,000 of the total construction program designated for the construction and improvement of the electrical highways which bring the power from the generating stations to the areas served by the electric company.

A principal result of this new construction will be that the "backbone" transmission line, or principal electric artery linking the three largest generating stations will become a 230,000 volt line. Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, Plant X, in Lamb County, and Cunningham Station, west of Hobbs, N.M. are the three generating stations.

This means that early next year, it will be possible to move four times more power than it is now possible to transmit between these three major plants.

"Let me emphasize that this conversion to 230,000 volts of the 'backbone', or main, line is an addition to existing facilities, and means there will be one more way to move power throughout our system. In other words, there are other transmission routes, in addition to this new one, which can transport the power between all of our 11 generating stations and carry the load in the event of an emergency," Watson reported.

Watson went on to point out that the generation and trans-

County ASCS Tells Revisions

The Castro County ASCS office recently announced several revisions in the farm programs available to Hart area farmers in 1966.

The office announced that application for released cotton acreage may be filed with the Castro County office now, and any person having 1966 cotton allotment acres which they desire to release to the county ASCS committee for reapportionment may do so.

On transfers into the county, the office announced that 19 applications had been filed transferring approximately 260 acres to Castro County for the 1966 crop year.

Charley Hill, office manager, reminded wool growers that sales receipts for 1965 must be turned in by Jan. 31, 1966, in order to receive incentive payment.

Hill explained the provisions of a bill passed recently by Congress, which is similar to the old soil bank program.

Hill said to be eligible for the program, land must have been

under the same ownership for three years before entering the program.

He said all of at least one type of allotment must be retired for the entire length of the contract, which can run no less than five years or more than 10.

Under the terms of the contract, the land cannot be grazed or harvested, and the land must be put to an eligible conservation use. Hill said cost will be shared by the government for establishing approved conservation uses.

Under the plan, the following prices would be paid for retired land each year of the contract:

For wheat acreage -- 50 cents per bushel times the yield per acre.

For grain sorghum acreage -- 34 cents per bushel times yield per acre.

Barley acreage -- 33 cents a bushel times yield.

Corn acreage -- 44 cents a bushel times yield.

Cotton acreage -- six cents a pound times yield.

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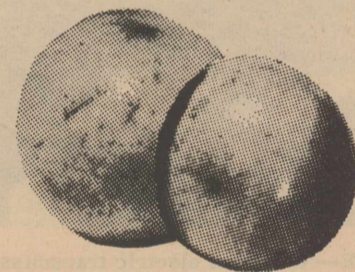

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KITCHEN KORNER

The holidays are gone and I'm sure everyone like me has had enough sweets and rich foods to last for quite a while. The casseroles and roasts will taste pretty good for the next few months. Here is a beef casserole which is real good.

BEEF STROGANOFF

1 T. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 lb. round steak (cubed)
4 T. butter
1 c. mushrooms (thin sliced)
1/4 c. green pepper (chopped)
1/2 c. onion (chopped)
1 can mushroom soup
1 c. sour cream
1 1/3 c. instant rice

Combine flour, salt; dredge meat and brown in 2 tablespoons butter. Add mushrooms, onions and pepper.

Cook until onion is tender. Add 2 tablespoons butter and mix until melted, add mushroom soup. Pour into a casserole. Add sour cream and rice, mix. Bake for 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Yield: 4 to 5 servings.

BEEF STEW WITH CORNBREAD TOPPING

3/4 lb. beef cut into lynch cubes
3 T. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 T. fat
water
1 medium onion (cut up)
3 potatoes, (cut up)
1 turnip (cut up)
1 stalk celery (diced)
cornbread batter

Dredge beef in seasoned flour, brown in fat, cover with water. Simmer until meat is tender. Add the vegetables. Continue cooking until the vegetables are almost tender. Remove to buttered baking dish, cover with cornbread batter made from your favorite recipe. Bake 25 minutes at 350 degrees or until topping is done.

Casseroles can be frozen for a short period, so why not fix a double amount and freeze one for later serving.

MEXICAN DINNER

1 c. chopped onions
2 T. fat
1 lb. ground beef
1/2 tsp. chili powder
1 tsp. salt
1 T. Worcestershire sauce
10 1/2 oz. can tomato soup
1 c. water

Quick corn bread batter

Heat oven to 450 degrees (hot). Brown onions in hot fat; add meat, brown until crumbly. Add seasonings, soup and water; bring to boil, stir occasionally. Pour quick corn bread batter over meat in skillet. Bake 20 minutes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

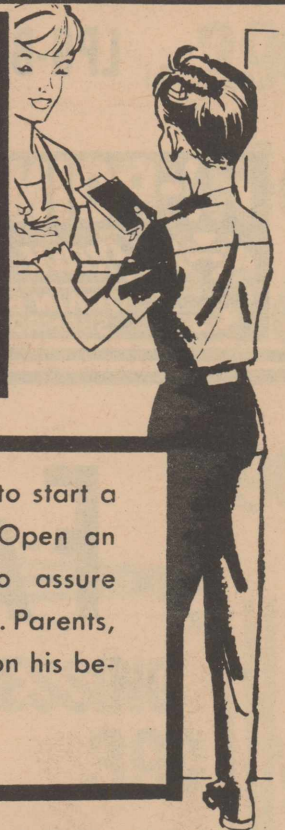
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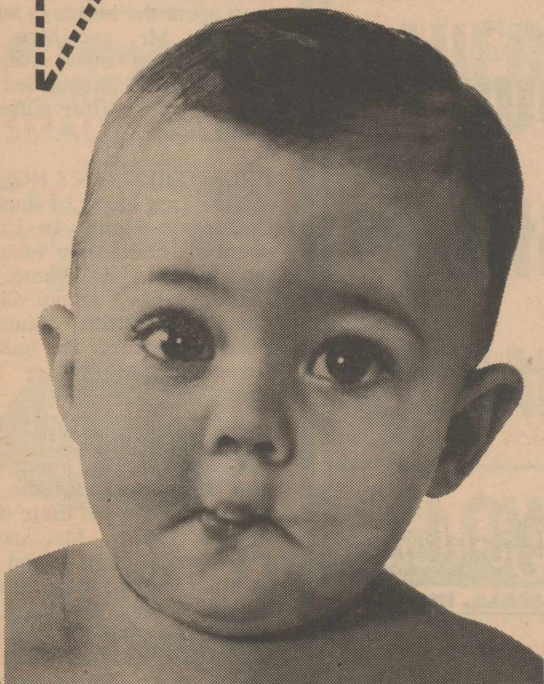

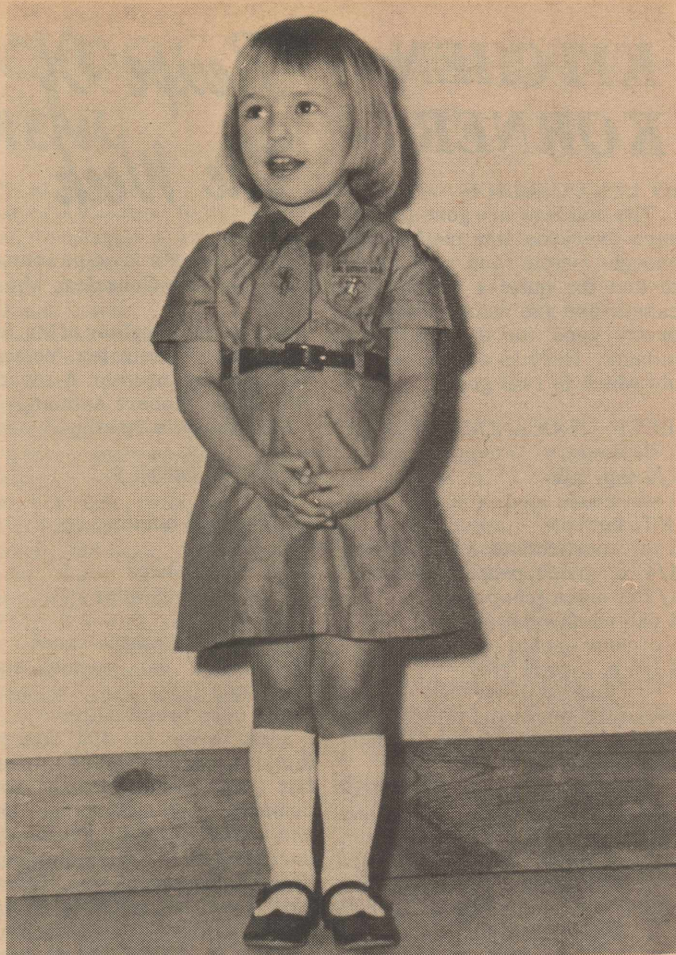

mission of electric power is controlled automatically insofar as the principal transmission lines are concerned, and that the changeover to an alternate route is accomplished instantaneously in most cases.

Major construction will begin during 1966 on another 210,000 kilowatt steam-electric generating unit at Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo. This will be the third generator installed since 1960 at this location and will increase the capability of the plant to 435,000 kilowatts. Completion of the new unit is scheduled for mid-1968.

"The continued installation of major electric generating units is, of course, the best kind of evidence of our confidence in the future of our service area. There are many opportunities to attract small industries to this region, and a number of communities are actively engaged

in well-planned industrial development programs. The advantages of this area are obvious, with our excellent climate, the optimism of our people, and good local governments. All of these will lead to new progress for the region," Watson said.

Electric power's role in meeting the municipal water needs of the region are a part of the 1966 improvement program. A 115,000 volt transmission line will be completed during the year to provide the power to pump the water from Lake Meredith to a storage reservoir near Amarillo. The Lake Meredith water is scheduled to be distributed to the 11 member cities of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, beginning in late 1967.

"1965 was another year in which the average cost of our service to all of our customers was lower than the previous year. As a matter of fact, it was the 13th consecutive year


for a decline in the average cost of electricity used on our customers' homes. Our customers have helped make this possible by using more of our service. This enables us to install new and more efficient equipment, the type that will go into service as a result of this 19-million dollar improvement program in 1966. Reddy Kilowatt is still the servant who charges less for each hour the more hours you work him," Watson concluded.
