## Cars To Be Provided By Company

Superintendent Andy Gardenhire announces that the Hart School Board has approved a car program where Clyde Mace, Oldsmobile Inc., of Plainview, will furnish, at no charge to the School District, driver education cars.

These cars will be exchanged for new ones at the end of each semester.

A new school reading program will begin Jan. 17, at Hart Elementary School. Mrs. Bettie Stephens and Mrs. Shirley Tucker will teach in a regular scheduled class each day these students who qualify and need special reading instruction. This reading class will take care of 10 students per teacher per hour.

This program is financed 100 percent by government aid.

New teachers added to the Hart teaching staff are Mrs. Joel Culp, Ray Graver and Mrs. Shirley Tucker.

Mrs. Culp will replace Mrs. Stephens in the third grade. Mrs. Culp has taught in the Plainview system for several years.

For the last month, she has been helping out in a special class in the grade school while waiting for the new reading program to begin.

Graver, a graduate of Wayland Baptist College of Plainview, will take Mrs. Talley's fourth and fifth grade group starting the second semester. Graver and his wife, also a graduate of Wayland, will make their home in Hart. Mrs. Graver will be going to school to further her education.

## Hart Bale Count Nears 13,000 As End Nears

With cotton season all but over in the Hart area, bale totals topped the 13,000 mark this week.

Three Hart gins reported 13,362 bales over the scales.

One ginner said, "Almost all the cotton is in. There may be a few more come in, but very few."

The count tops last week's total by more than a 1,000, with last week's score coming to 12,317.

## Willis Hawkins Jr. Named As Bank VP

Willis A. Hawkins Jr. was named vice-president and farm representative of Farmers State Bank effective Jan. 3. He was district commander and, in 1960, won the national dis-

in 1960, won the national dis-

He was named to the board of directors of the bank in June of 1965.

Born in Nazareth in 1924, Hawkins started school in Hart and then attended Nazareth schools for six years. He did seventh grade work once again in Hart, attended high school one year at Nazareth and two years at Plainview.

He graduated from high school in 1941 from West Texas State prep school. He then entered John Tarleton State College, where he attended for one semester before enlisting in the Army Air Corps Jan. 26, 1944.

His cadet training included work at Northwestern State Teachers' College, Alva, Okla. Basic air training was done at Keesler Field, Miss. He served at Frederick Army Air Base, Frederick, Okla. and Scott AAFB, Belleville, Ill. before being discharge in 1945.

Hawkins then entered West Texas State College in February of 1946 on an athletic scholarship and G. I. Bill.

He boxed as an amateur while in the army and in college, taking the Golden Gloves championship three years and the AAU championship one year in district. He was a state Golden Gloves contestant for three years and won the Golden Trophy for consolation in 1947. He also was active on the WT track team.

In 1948, he was married to the former Johnnie Ford.

He received a B. S. Degree in agriculture, with minors in economics and physical education, from West Texas State in 1949.

Hawkins started farming in 1946 with a G. I. loan when he rented a section of land.

After his marriage, he moved to the farm in the summer, returning to college in the fall. After graduation, he moved once again to the farm.

He became active in the American Legion in 1953 and was elected Commander of the Hart Post in 1955. He was named vice-commander of the 18th Congressional District of the American Legion in 1958 and was elected Commander of the district in 1960.

He served two years on the state executive committee while

He has served on many state committees of the American Legion as well as four national appointments.

The Hawkins have four children, W. A. Hawkins III, 16; Quincy Hawkins, 14; Gaylene Hawkins, 13; and Suzanne Hawkins, 11.

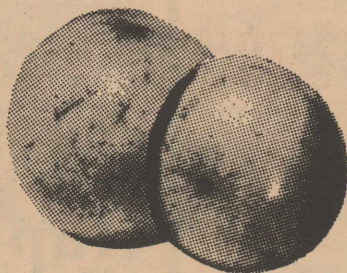

**BAKED SHORT RIBS**

Take 4 lbs. lean ribs, roll in salt, pepper, and flour, brown on all sides. Add 2 cups water. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees. Add 2 onions, 4 medium size potatoes, 6 carrots, 4 turnips. Cover and bake 1 more hour at 350 degrees. (You may have to add more water when you add the vegetables).

1 Halibut steak for each serving  
2 lemons  
paprika  
2 T. butter

Lay steaks on cookie sheet, salt, pepper and squeeze lemon juice over each one. Dot with butter and sprinkle well with paprika. Add lemon juice occasionally. Bake for 45 minutes at 400 degrees.

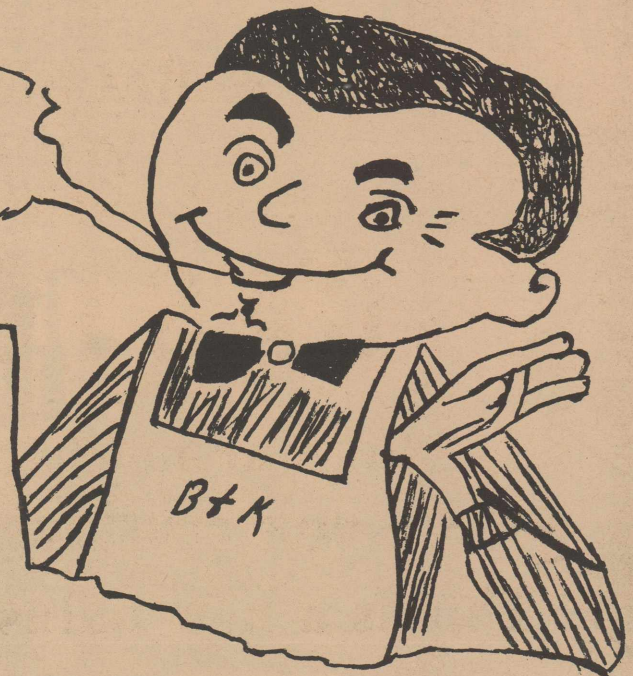
