

STRAWBERRY TARTS

Mix 1 1/4 c. graham crack-er crumbs, 1/4 cup sugar and 1/3 cup melted butter or margarine, and press into eight 3 1/2 inch tart pans and chill. Drain juice from one 12 ounce

package of frozen strawberries that have been thawed. Dissolve 1/2 package plain gelatin in the juice and heat in double boiler until well dissolved.

Blend one 3 ounce package of cream cheese well and add to the juice, mixing well; fold in the berries and 1 cup whipped in the berries and I cup cream which has been whipped. Spoon into tart shells and chill about two hours. (If you do not have tart pans, use muffin tins. The tarts will be smaller but it works just as well.

Bring pineapple juice to a boil, pour over jello, cool. Add pineapple and cottage cheese, fold in whipped cream and nuts. Chill until firm. This salad keeps for several days in the refrigerator.





What are flotorial districts? They are voting areas created 1963-64. by combining counties, or parts of counties, to comply with the Supreme Court's edict that all states must have districts of equal population.

In Texas this has resulted in rural counties sharing representatives with metropolitan

at Houston has just upheld the 1965 Reapportionment Act of the House of Representatives, with the exception of 11 flotorial districts.

These flotorial districts are areas around Austin, Brownsville, Corpus Christi, Tyler, Waco, Sherman-Denison, Lubbock, Abilene, Temple, Odessa and Angleton.

The court gave the Legislature until Aug. 1, 1967, to cor-rect the flotorial flaw.

So, this November, voters will select representatives on the basis of the original reapportionment draft.

Texas' four largest counties ---Bexar, Dallas, Harris and Tarrant -- will gain a total of 16 seats in the House for a total of 51 representatives. Under the new redistricting plan, 12 out of Texas' 254 counties will have a majority of House votes.

Although their power on paper is enormous, as a practical matter representatives of metropolitan areas seldom if ever vote as a bloc. So rural interests aren't likely to be ground under the heel of big city lawmakers.

State senatorial reapportionment never was subject to change.

Congressional redistricting was upheld earlier.


