Layout Land May Top 30 Per Cent

More than 30 per cent of cultivated land in Castro County will lie fallow this year, if early signup trends for allotment choices continue.

According to figures released this week by Charley Hill, county ASCS office manager, farmers are going "Almost 100 per cent" the 35 per cent cotton diversion route and the 50 per cent grain diversion choice. Hill said thus far only 22 per

cent of farmers in the county had signed up under the 1966

Rep. Clayton Discusses Voting Bill

State representative Billy Clayton notified the Hart Beat this week that under the voter registration bill proposed by Gov. John Connally, persons who did not pay their poll tax this year would have a special 15-day period in March in which to register.

Clayton said the bill provides for annual voter registration with the time of registration to be the same as the time poll taxes are paid, but without a fee.

Clayton said Connally addressed the special joint session of the legislature Monday, and indicated he did not wish to call other legislation.

The bill was introduced by Rep. Gene Fondern and cosponsored by 84 other members the the house.

The bill was referred to the State Affairs Committee, of which Clayton is a member.

It would take a 2/3 majority vote in both house and senate to approve the bill, and Clayton said a poll of the house members showed 104-105 members allotment programs, but he estimated the majority of farmers would follow the early signees' example.

He said only two farmers had signed up under the Cropland Adjustment Program , with a total of 237 acres being diverted.

Under the program, farmers may elect to lay out land for periods of not less than five years, or more than 10.

Office figures showed a total of 450,592 acres in cultivation in the county, with 245,888 acres of that figure alloted to feed grains.

If all farmers went the 50 per cent diversion plan, 122,944 acres of feed-grain land would not be in use this year.

52,995 acres are alloted to cotton, and if all cotton raisers elected to divert 35 per cent, 18,548 acres would not be in use.

Total for both groups and the CAP acreage would be 141,729 acres not in production out of a total of 450,592 cultivated acres.

That would amount to slightly over 31 per cent held out this year.



There is a term, "Agri-Business", which often is used in reference to all the occupations related to farming.



BY LELA GALLION We usually try to eat some form of fish every week and it seems as though I usually come back to salmon as our

choice. I use red salmon. It seems higher when you buy it, but the flavor is so much better and what other meat can you purchase for the same price that will make enough for a whole meal. SALMON PIE

1 can red salmon (drained and crumbled.)

1 303 size can English peas 2 c. medium white sauce

1 can biscuits or equal in home made biscuits

Put a layer of salmon in buttered baking dish. Cover with some white sauce, add a layer of English peas. Alternate in layers until you use all the ingredients. Top with the bis-cuits; bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes or until golden brown.

1 c. cold water plus juice from 1 c. red sour cherries. Mix above and cook until slightly thick; cool. While waiting for the above mixture to cool, crush 1/2 pkg.

CHERRY ICE BOX PUDDING

l c. sugar

4 egg yolks

l pkg. Cherry Jello

vanilla wafers. Beat 4 egg white. When the first mixture is cool, fold in cherries (which were drained) egg white and nuts if desired. In a layer pan put a layer of vanilla wafers and a layer of Jello mixture alternately until all are used; let stand in refrigerator at least 2 hours to chill. 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


