Soybeans Could Be New Crop

Soybeans may become the replacement crop for cotton in the Hart area this year, according to information from the USDA and the High Plains Research Foundation.

According to Dr. Earl Collister, HPRF director, farmers can plant soybeans on allowable grain sorghum acres this year and receive price support payments, just as if feed had been planted.

In the 1966 feed grain program, producers who divert at least 20 per cent of their base feed grain acreage will receive price support payments of 53 cents per hundred.

The same price support payment will be received when soybeans are substituted for grain sorghum.

For instance, on 100 acres, a farmer can divert the minimum of 20 acres, plant 30 acres to soybeans and 50 acres to feed.

Or, he can divert 30 acres, plant 35 in soybeans and 35 in feed. He can also divert 50 acres and plant 50 acres in soybeans, or he can divert 20 acres and plant 80 in soybeans.

Castor Bean Payment Set

The diversion payment rate will be increased from 30 per cent to 50 percent for the 1966 program where castor beans are grown as an alternate crop on acreage diverted for payment, the USDA announced.

The programs involved are those for wheat, feed grains and cotton. The 50 per cent rate is the same as that paid in the 1965 programs.

The Castro County Fat Stock Show will be held March 10, 11, and 12 at Dimmitt.

Hart FFA and 4-H exhibitors plan to exhibit two steers, 52 barrows and 34 lambs this year, and will be trying to duplicate last year's show when the Hart exhibitors captured all grand and reserve grand champions in sheep, barrows and steers.

A highlight of the county show will be Thursday at 6:30 p.m. when the Hart chapter will have the local show. Only boys and girls enrolled in the Hart schools and who are members of 4-H or FFA will be eligible to exhibit.

The sale of all prize-winning animals will be held Saturday afternoon March 12 at 1 p.m.

All area irrigation gas users are invited to attend.

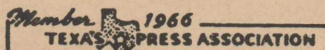

Recipe Of The Week

This week's recipe comes from Paula Jacks, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Jacks. Paula, a freshman at Hart High School, plays basketball in high school, and is a member of the Baptist Church.

CHOCOLATE CHIFFON PIE

- 1 c. milk
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1/4 t. salt
- 2 sq. chocolate, shaved
- 3 egg yolks
- 1 T. gelatin soaked in 1/4 c. cold water
- 3 egg whites, stiffly beaten
- 1/4 c. sugar

Make custard of milk, sugar,

salt, chocolate, and egg yolks. Add soaked gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool. When mixture begins to thicken, fold in egg white to which other 1/4 cup sugar has been added. Pour into baked pie shell or crumb crust and chill in refrigerator until firm.

KITCHEN KORNER

The weather still keeps going from one extreme to the other 'til we aren't sure what we will want to cook from one day to the other. Chicken is usually always a good bet on either kind of day.

ESCALOPED CHICKEN

- 1 canned whole chicken
- 1 can Cream of Chicken Soup
- 1 can milk

DRESSING

- 2 qts. bread (cubed)
- 3/4 c. melted butter
- 1 tsp. sage
- 1/4 c. broth
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 T. onion chopped
- 1/2 tsp. celery salt

Mix dressing lightly with a fork. Put the chicken which you have cut as a fryer in large baking pan on one side; the dressing on the other. Mix the soup and milk together and pour over chicken and dressing. Dot with butter and bake until a golden brown, about 30 minutes.

BUTTERMILK PIE

- Mix:
- 2 c. sugar
- 3 rounded T. flour
- 1/2 tsp. ginger
- 1 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. allspice
- 1 tsp. butter
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 c. buttermilk

ADD:

- 3 beaten yolks
- 1 cup cooked raisins

Cook in double boiler until thick. Cool; pour into a baked pie shell. Top with egg whites beaten very stiff. Brown in oven.
