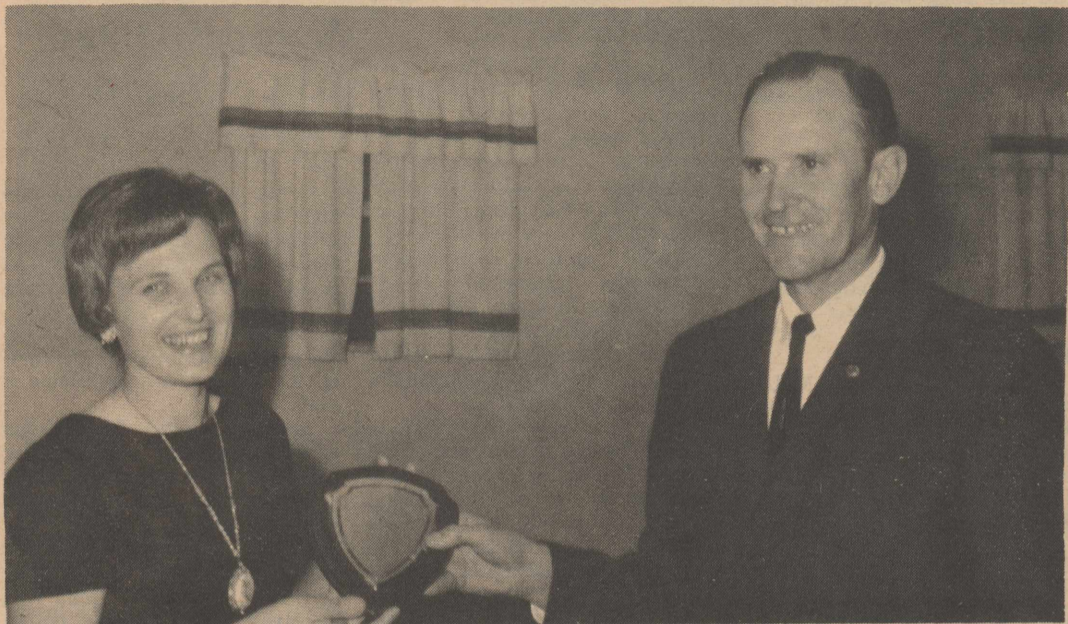

Tucker Named Man Of Year

Hart Lions picked their man of the year Monday night, but the award was accepted by his wife because he was out of town doing part of the job which earned him the award.

Lanny Tucker, agriculture teacher at Hart High School, was the object of verbal bouquets by the Rev. Douglas Gossett of the Hart Methodist Church, who presented the award.

Lion Boss DeWayne Brown presided over the ceremonies, which were a part of the annual Ladies Night sponsored by the club.

Gossett said Tucker best typified the Lion motto of "We Serve."

Tucker, who has taught at Hart nine years, is in Houston this week, where his FFA students are entered in the Houston Fat Stock Show.

Rev. Carl Hudson, pastor of the Kress Methodist Church, installed a new member of the club, Richard Franks.

Speaker for the evening was the Rev. Leon Hill, Baptist minister from Amarillo. The subject of Hill's talk was

"Laughter", and he poked fun at nearly everyone and everything, including himself.

Hill closed his talk by saying those who couldn't laugh in these times were headed for serious trouble. Referring to the American way, Hill said, "Don't let anyone take it away from you."

Gossett said Tucker met the highest aims of the Lions Club, which included:

Faith and interest in God, country and community.

Industrious application of ability to vocation for family and community welfare.

Fairness and friendship in all relationships with others. Careful with criticism, and liberal with praise.

Building up and not tearing down.

Participation as a responsible citizen in good government through liberty under law, and love and loyalty for the good of all.

Gossett said many former and present students of Tucker, "Have greatly benefited from his teaching."

Missionary Recalls Latin America

Van Hughes looks more like a West Texas cattleman than a Baptist missionary to South America.

But beneath the tanned smiling exterior is a mind that remembers 16 years of South American service and hopes to see more.

Hughes works for his father's nursery business in Dimmitt, but on Sundays, he takes over but on Sundays, he takes over the duties as pastor of the local Mexican Baptist Mission.

A native of Kress and graduate of the same high school, Hughes has a smile and a chuckle for every year spent south of the border, 10 of which were consumed in establishing the Baptist Church in Costa Rica.

Hughes' wife is currently teaching school at Richardson near Dallas, and one daughter attends Arlington State College, while the other is a high school student in Richardson.

Hughes hopes to move his family to the South Plains as soon as the school year is up, but until he does, he is kept busy with his work in the Hart area.

Hughes said he first felt the

call to the ministry when he was a senior in high school. He enrolled at Baylor University the next year.

"It was during my freshman year that I felt my duty was working with Spanish-speaking people," said Hughes.

He started running a vacation Bible school during the summers at Milam, near Waco.

After graduation from Baylor, Hughes went to Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth to continue his studies.

After receiving his divinity degree, Hughes and his wife were asked by the Baptist Home Mission Board to travel to Cuba.

"We stayed there a year, then went to Costa Rica, where we actually began the Baptist Church in that country," he said.

"During the time we stayed in Costa Rica, we established 20 churches, and trained 20

pastors in a three year course," he continued.

He came back to the United States after 10 years of service in Costa Rica in 1958. But he didn't stay long before setting out again for five years of evangelistic work throughout South America.

He still conducts revival services about four times a year south of the border, and works as an occasional consultant for business firms with investments in Latin America.

Hughes is a firm believer of teaching by example, and one of his favorite stories is about a family in Costa Rica.

"Captain Frank Spaseck, who was with the Army Geodetic Survey team in Costa Rica, asked me to take a trip with him through a remote jungle part of the country."

"Well, after we finished the survey, we decided to take the boat with the instruments in it and do a little fishing," said Hughes.

"We caught some wonderful fish, and Spaseck gave them to the leader of a local village to divide up among the other people living there."

"They invited us to stay for dinner, and while we were eat-

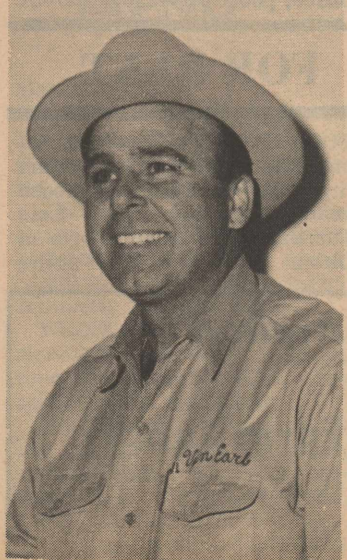
Officers Seek Forgery Suspect After Jobs Here

Except for program hours, regular classes will be held during the week.

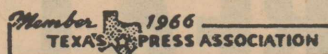

District Superintendent Preaches At Hart Church

The Rev. Dr. J. E. Shewbert, district superintendent of the Methodist Plainview District, preached in the evening service of The First Methodist Church in Hart Feb. 27. His subject was, "The Bible According To You."

"This may be the last time I will get to preach for you here," he said.

He will finish his sixth year May 31, as the leading pastor in this District.

The Constitution of the Methodist Church provides that a district superintendent may not serve more than six years in succession, then he must take other work for at least three years before he is eligible again. He was accompanied by Mrs. Shewbert, who has served as director of children's work.

Shewbert will return to Hart March 9, to preside at the Methodist's Quarterly Conference. Methodist Churches usually have now a first and last quarter Conference.

These usually are held in the first and the fourth quarters of the Church year.

The quarterly Conference is the governing conference of the local Church. It is composed of all members of the official board, and the district superintendent. The official board is the administrative body of the local church. Theron Morrison is the present Chairman of the official board.

The Quarterly Conference elects the officers of the Church for the new year beginning after

the Northwest Texas Conference of Churches meets.

It will meet in Dallas this year, June 6-11, where all the eight conferences in Texas will meet together for parts of their program.

The General Conference will also meet in Dallas later this year to consider uniting the Methodist and the United Brethren Churches.

It is the legislating body for the world-wide Methodist Church.

Lanny Tucker, Hart vocational agriculture teacher, tied for high individual honors in two national swine judging contests.

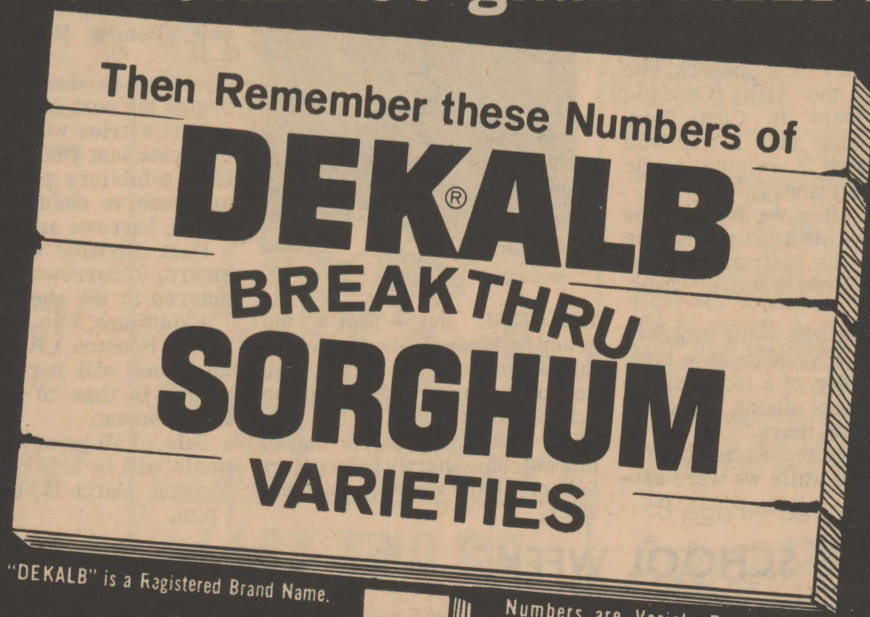

Registration period extends from March 3 through March 17.

So reads the "emergency" provision in the new voter registration act just passed by the Legislature and signed into law by Gov. John Connally.

Hereafter, free registration will take place from October through January each year.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr fears that names of those who sign up during March won't be available for local elections already slated on bond issues, local option liquor questions, etc. He asked the three federal judges who banned the poll tax to put off their order until March 26.

Estimates of the number of Texans who will take advantage of the free right to vote vary widely -- from 50,000 to 1,000,000.

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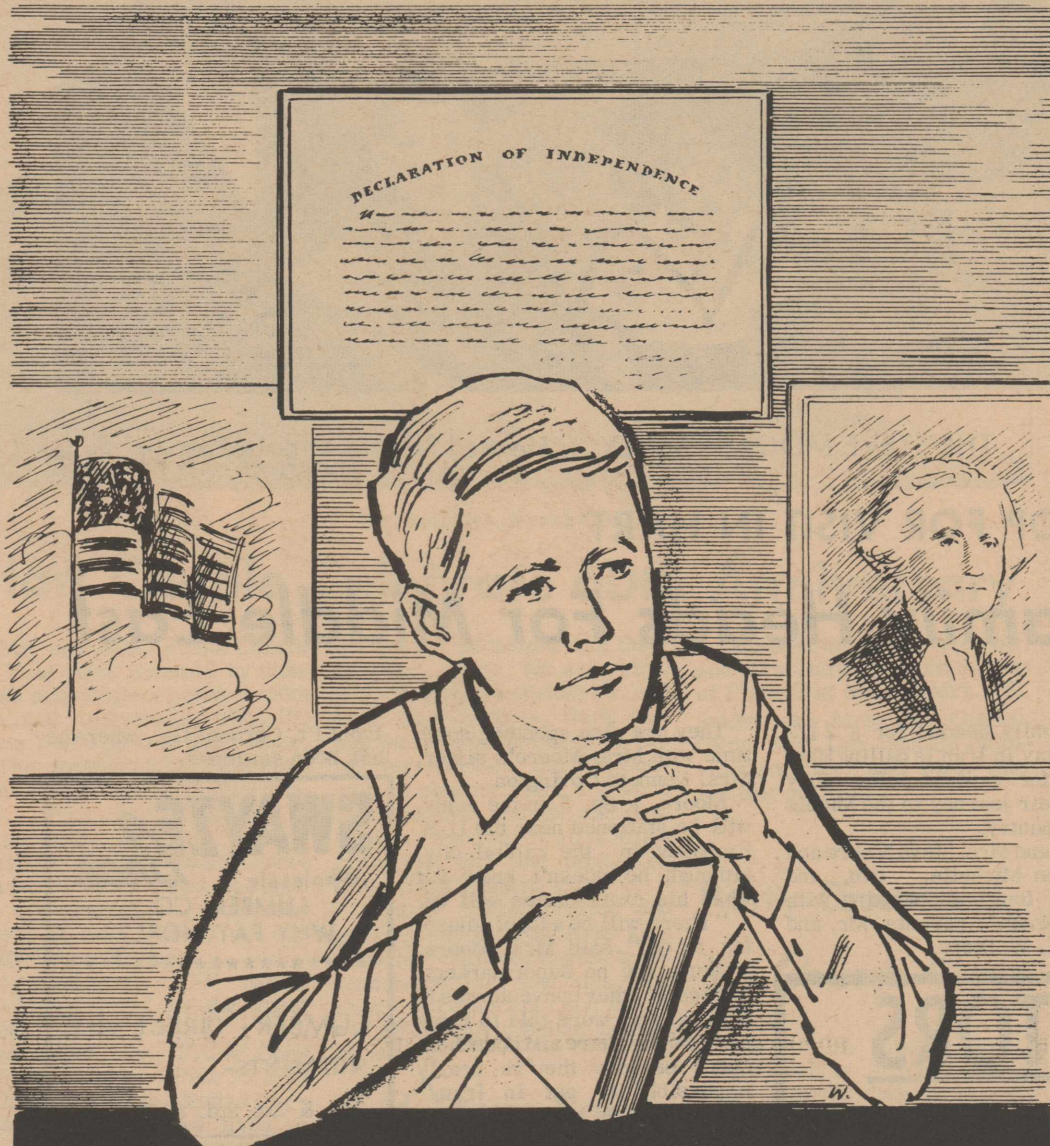

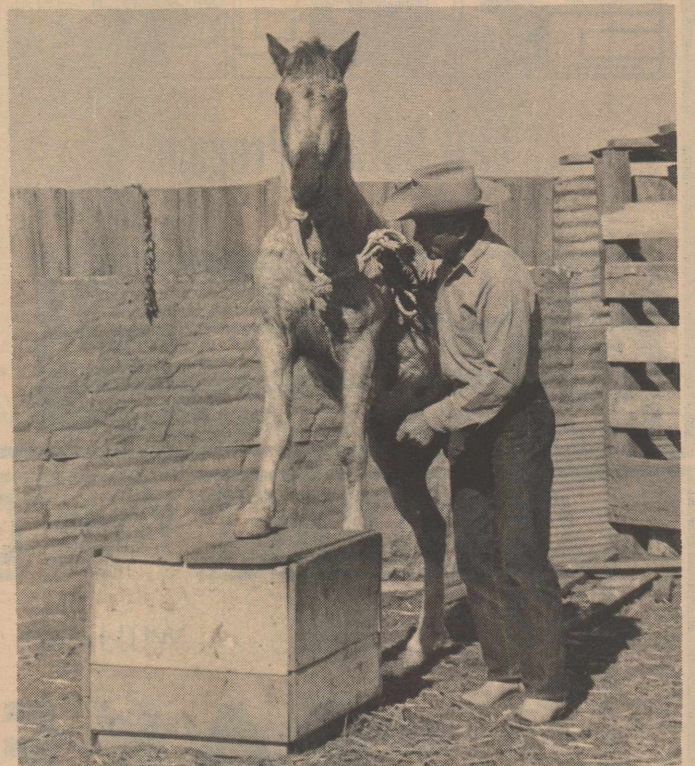

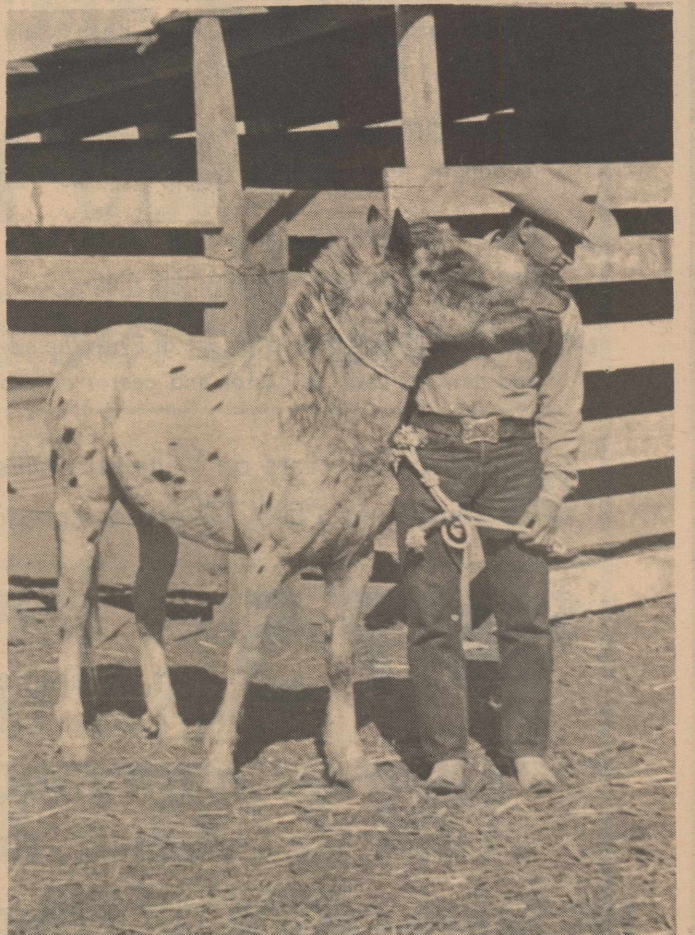

STOP FOR VISIT IN HART

Family Heads For Middle East

A family headed for a 2 1/2 year stay in Iran is calling Hart home for a while before they take their journey to the Middle East country.

Mr. and Mrs. Steve Moore and children Michelle, two, and Roger, four, are visiting with Mrs. Moore's parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Stone.

They are also spending some time with Mrs. Moore's sister, Mrs. Kenneth Covington.

Moore, a Sp. 5 in the army, will be stationed near the U. S. Embassy in the capital city, although he doesn't know yet what his exact duties will be.

"There will be a lot of adjusting to do," said Mrs. Moore. "There are no supermarkets, movies or other conveniences in Iran, and we were told to bring our own furniture and household goods because they're nearly impossible to get in Iran."

Mrs. Moore, the former Betty Stone, said they were shipping their furniture over by boat, and the list leaving on the ship included a kerosene heater.

"We were told that gas pressure in the city was high enough to run a stove, but not enough to run a gas heater, so we were advised to bring the kerosene heater," said Mrs. Moore.

"We don't know exactly when we will leave yet," said Moore, "but we will have to get our passports approved, then we will have to wait until the Army is ready."

Moore, who is from Tulsa, Okla., and his family are moving

from Ft. Gordon, Ga., where he has been stationed.

Recipe Of The Week

This week's recipe comes from Beatrice Ortiz, 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Ortiz. Beatrice is a freshman at Hart High School and has four brothers. She attends the Catholic Church.

TEXAS HAMBURGERS
 3 1/2 lb. hamburger
 2 c. chopped onion
 2 c. finely diced celery
 1 c. chopped green pepper
 2 tsp. monosodium glutamate
 1 tsp. salt
 1/2 tsp. pepper
 3 T. chili pepper
 1 2-lb. can tomatoes
 1 8-oz can tomato paste
 1 8-oz. can tomato sauce

1 can enchilada sauce
 2 c. corn chips
 Grated cheese
 Fry hamburger until well done. Remove meat from pan and saute onion, celery, and pepper in drippings. Add all remaining ingredients except cheese and corn chips and simmer for at least 1 hour. Stir in corn chips; top with cheese.

Bake in 350 degree oven until cheese is melted.
NOTE--Place sauce, corn chips, grated cheese, and minced onion on a buffet table and allow guests to build their own Texas Hamburger if desired. Yield: 6-8 servings.

KITCHEN KORNER

Well, March has come in like a lion so maybe towards the end of the month we will see some calm weather. I have this pie recipe I would like to share with you. Do try it for a very delicious dessert.

PINEAPPLE SOUR-CREAM PIE

3/4 c. sugar
 1/4 c. flour
 1/2 tsp. salt
 1 No. 2 can (2 1/2 c. crushed pineapple, undrained.)
 1 c. dairy sour cream
 1 T. lemon juice
 2 slightly beaten egg yolks
 1 baked pastry shell
 2 egg whites
 1/2 tsp. vanilla
 1/4 tsp. cream of tartar
 1/4 c. sugar

In sauce pan, combine 3/4 c. sugar, flour and salt. Stir in the next three ingredients. Cook and stir until the mixture thickens and comes to the boiling point; then boil two minutes. Stir a small amount of the hot mixture into the egg yolks, then return to the hot mixture, stirring constantly. Cook stirring two minutes. Cool to room temperature and spoon into a baked pie shell. Beat egg whites with vanilla and cream of tartar to soft peaks. Gradually add 1/4 cup sugar, beating until stiff and glossy, then spread atop pie, sealing to edges of pastry. Bake at 350 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes.

RICE SALAD

1 c. cooked rice (drained)
 1 pkg. lemon jello
 1 c. crushed pineapple

1 c. whipped cream
 2 c. hot water
 1 c. confectioners sugar
 1/2 c. walnuts
 1/2 c. marshmallows

Dissolve jello in hot water and let stand until cool, fold all other ingredients in and let stand until congealed.

A garnish has two functions, to decorate a salad and to add to its taste. A garnish should be kept small, should add contrast and added interest to a salad, but should never be gaudy.

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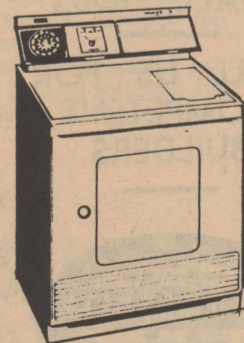

ing, the leader's wife called me over and showed me a very old Bible, which she said she had bought from a traveling missionary 15 years before.

Hughes said the woman told him she wished to learn more about Christianity, but her husband threatened to leave her if she read the book.

"In Costa Rica, everyone knows how to read, no matter how remote most of the country is," Hughes said.

"Well, I brought up the subject, and the man asked if I believed in what the book said."

"I told him I did, and he asked Captain Spaseck if he also believed in the book, and the Captain said he did."

Hughes said the man then told his wife she could read the Bible, since Captain Spaseck was an army officer who did not let his men mistreat or cheat the natives, and if he read the book, it must be all right.

"It didn't matter if I believed in the book," says Hughes, "but Captain Spaseck was a man the leader respected, and if he read the book, then the leader figured it must be all right."

"What was really funny," says Hughes, "was that as we left in our boat, the woman, who was standing behind her husband, put her hands together and raised them over her head to show that she had won the right to read the book."

Other adventures in Hughes' Latin stay were varied. In Cuba, there was a fight over press censorship, and in Costa Rica, numerous missions as an impartial consultant for foreign companies to settle strikes and take care of business questions.

Now Hughes works only part-time as a Mission pastor, but you can see the gleam in his eye when another stint in Latin America is mentioned.
