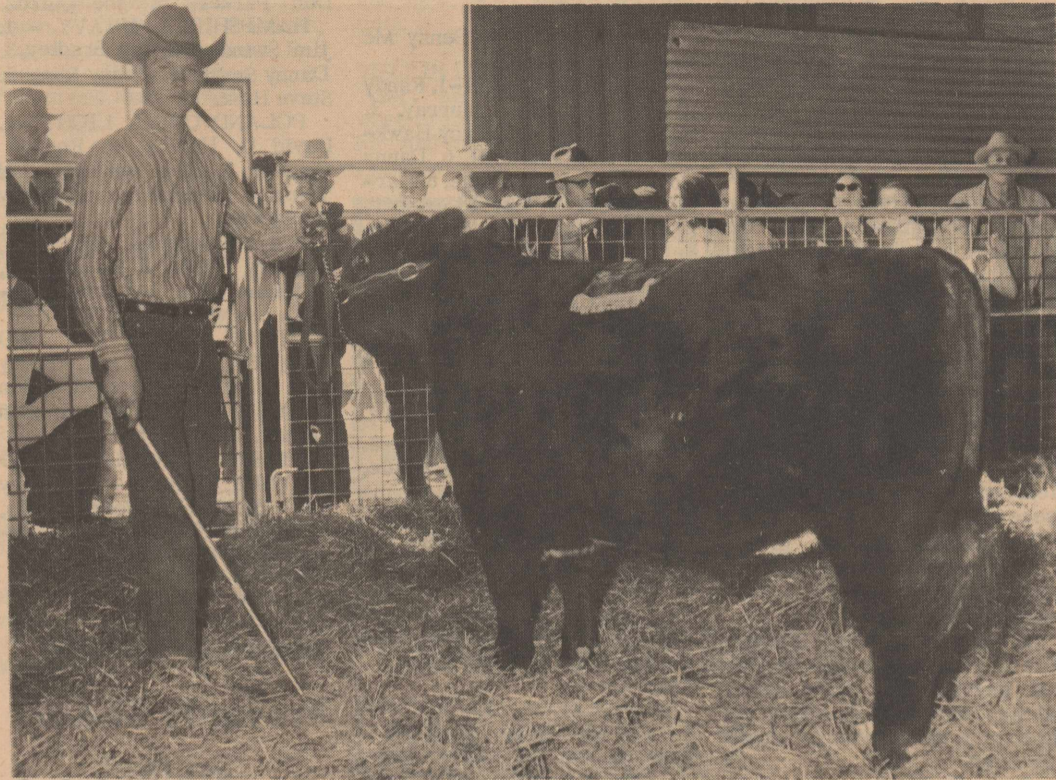

## Hart, Hart All The Way Again At Castro County Stock Show

Some persons might think the Castro County Fat Stock Show should change its name to the Hart Fat Stock Show after final results were tallied Saturday.

The weekend showing once again saw Hart youngsters take grand champion and reserve grand champion in honors in every category, along with two of three showmanship awards and the overall best showmanship award.

During the individual class judging, the group also picked up 11 of 14 breed champion awards.

George Bennett took both top prizes in the steer show held

Saturday. A Shorthorn weighing 930 pounds picked up grand champion honors for Bennett, while a Hereford weighing 879 pounds took the reserve ribbon.

This was the third straight year for Bennett to exhibit the grand champion steer.

In the lamb show held Friday, Jerry Smith showed the grand champion lamb, a 94-pound Southdown heavyweight, while Bob Crick had the reserve animal, an 85-pound light Southdown.

Jerry Parker had the grand champion barrow, a 198-pound lightweight Hampshire, while

Bob Crick also had the reserve grand champion barrow, a 230-pound heavyweight Duroc.

Smith picked up the top showmanship award, while Crick received the swine showmanship trophy, and Jerry Smith took the lamb showmanship contest.

Bennett's grand champion steer sold for 70 cents a pound to Bob's Farm Supply, while the reserve animal was bought for 75 cents a pound by Ed Bennett.

Jerry Smith's grand champion lamb went to Hart Producers Co-Op Gin for \$1.40 a pound, while Crick's reserve

Services were held Tuesday in Hart First Baptist Church for Lauren Elaine (Susie) McLain, Hart High School freshman, who died Saturday from injuries received in a two car crash near Vega.

Joe Brooks, minister of the Hart Church of Christ, officiated, assisted by the Rev. Dinzell Leonard, Hart Baptist Church pastor, and Fred Butler former Hart Church of Christ minister from Dallas.

Burial was in Hart Cemetery with arrangements by Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview.

Graveside services were conducted by Loye Ruckman of Odessa, former minister of the Hart Church of Christ.

Pallbearers were cousins Ricky, George, and Harold Bennett, all of Hart, Randy and Johnny Bennett of Plainview, and Lonnie King of Olton.

Miss McLain died at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo at 6:05 p.m. Saturday following the crash.

Also injured in the crash were her mother, Mrs. Laurence McLain, and Iona Clevenger, 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Deryl Clevenger.

Three other occupants of the McLain car, Janet McLain, Gary Cole and Becky King, were uninjured.

Mrs. McLain, who suffered a broken arm and a cut leg in the accident was reported to be doing well after surgery on her arm Tuesday morning.

Miss Clevenger, also a freshman at Hart High School, is reported to be improving after receiving head, arm and leg lacerations.

The accident occurred about 5:30 p.m. at the intersection of U. S. 66 and Texas 385 near Vega as the group was returning from Dalhart, where the youths had participated in a Church of Christ youth rally.

Highway Patrolmen said Miss McLain was driving south on 385 when her car struck the right side of the other vehicle, traveling west on U. S. 66.

second car, Lula Elizabeth Mobley, 83 and Mabel Hoglund, 54, both of Tucumari, N.M., were treated and released at Amarillo hospital.

Born Feb. 4, 1951, in Plainview, Miss McLain was a freshman at Hart High School. She played on the girl's basketball B-team, was a member of the Future Homemakers of America, and was active in church work.

Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Laurence C. McLain of Hart; two brothers, Dennis A. McLain and Darryl L. McLain, both of Hart; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. I. V. McLain of Hart, and Mrs. G. R. Bennett of Hart.

Waggoner Carr, Texas attorney general from Lubbock, will be the principal speaker at the banquet.

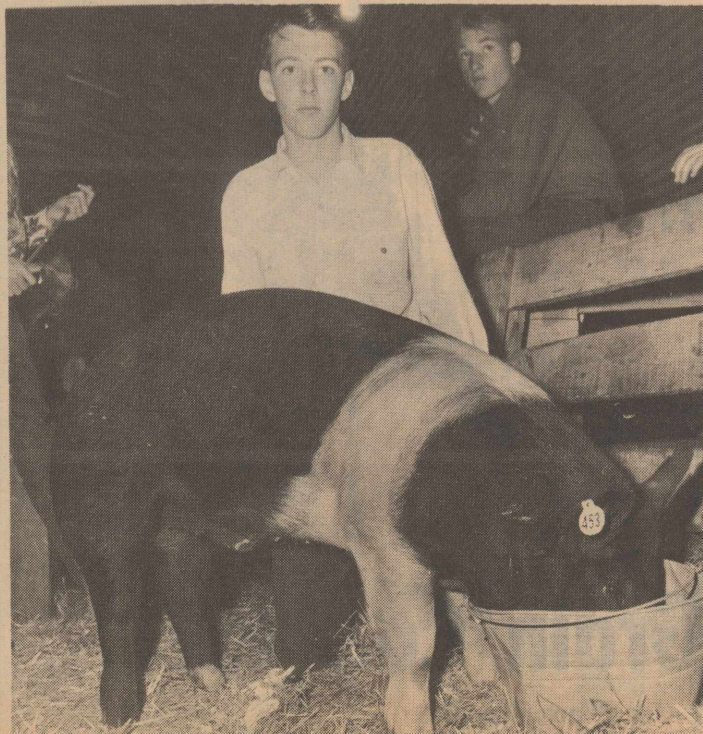
New officers of the chamber are C. W. Anthony, president; and W. F. Bennet vice-president. Retiring President Jack Miller will be in charge of the program.

## Medicare Blanks Are Available At Post Office

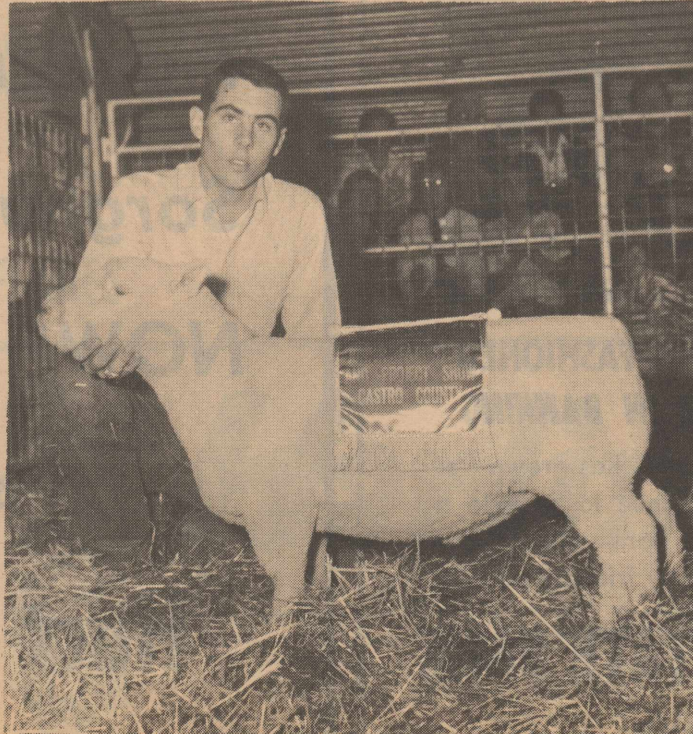
Postmistress Jewel Brooks of Hart announced this week that application blanks for supplemental Medicare benefits are available at the window of the Hart Post Office.

JERRY SMITH and grand champion lamb.

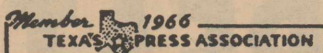

lamb went to Hart Gin for \$1.30 a pound.

Parker's grand barrow was sold for \$1.25 a pound to Farmers State Bank, while Crick's reserve barrow brought \$1.10 a pound from Big N. Fertilizer.

Resale price for steers was \$28.10 per hundredweight, lambs were \$24.50 a hundred and barrows were \$22.25.

Hart's share of the auction following the show was approximately \$8,500.

Hart FFA advisor Lanny Tucker said of the show, "Every merchant and patron is to be congratulated and thanked for their splendid support of the show and sale. The support of the buyers and patrons has certainly helped Hart exhibitors to gain the success they have enjoyed."

In steer judging, Bennett's two calves were the only two Hart entries, with the Short-horn taking first in medium weight classification, and the Hereford first in the lightweight grouping.

In the lamb show, Benny McKay showed the champion fine wool, while Randy Alford had the champion fine wool cross and Richard Murray the reserve champion fine wool cross.

In the medium wool group, Jerry Parker had the champion, with Gary Hart finishing second.

In the Southdown group, Crick's lightweight was reserve champ, while Smith's heavy-weight was champion.

In other breeds and crosses, Crick was again champ with his heavyweight, while Larry McKay was second, taking the honors in the lightweight classification.

Davis Smith took both champion and reserve champion honors in the Berkshire barrow category, while Bob Crick showed the champion Duroc and Steve Cox had the reserve champion in his lightweight Duroc.

Jerry Parker had the champion Hampshire, a lightweight, while Jim Swindle took reserve honors in the class with a heavyweight.

Jerry Smith had the champion Poland China, a heavyweight, while David D. Harris had the reserve Poland in the lightweight class.

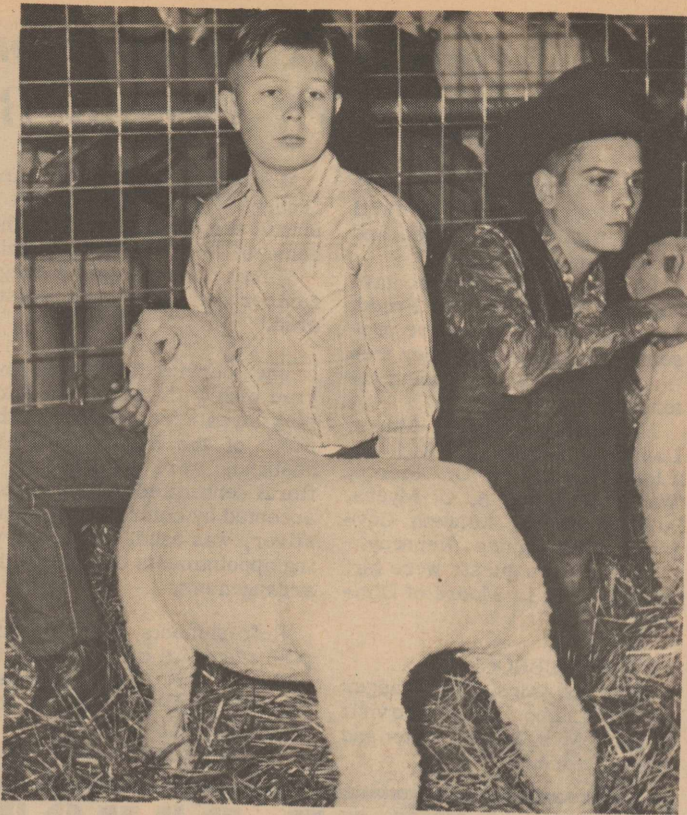

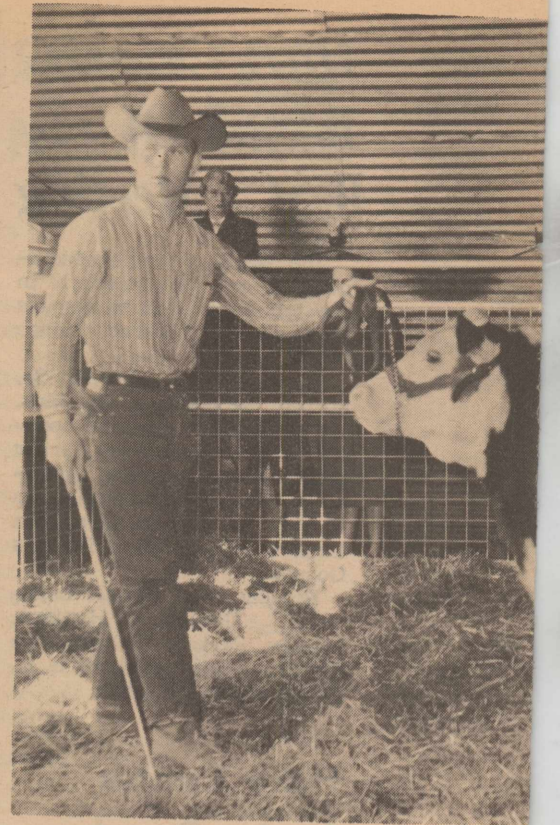

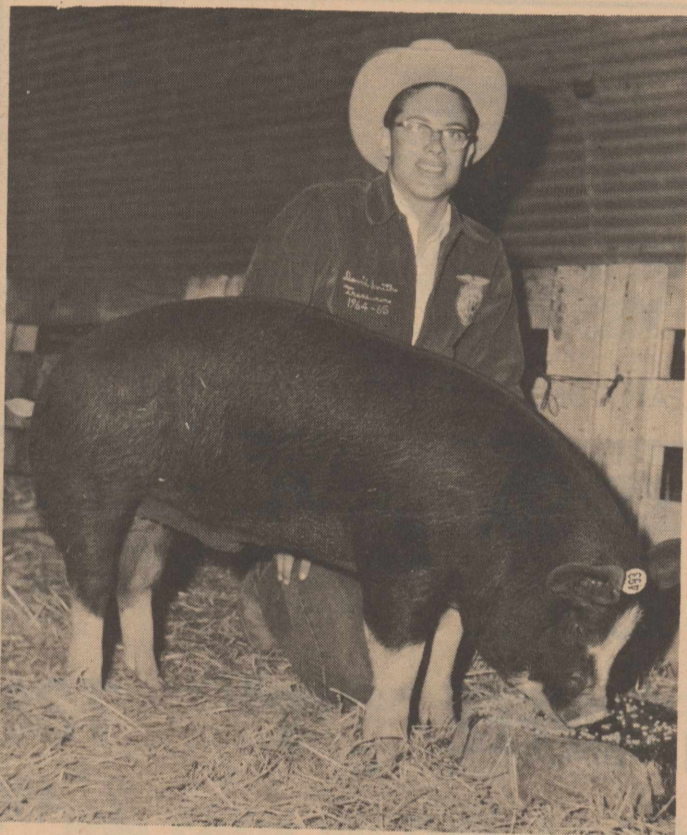

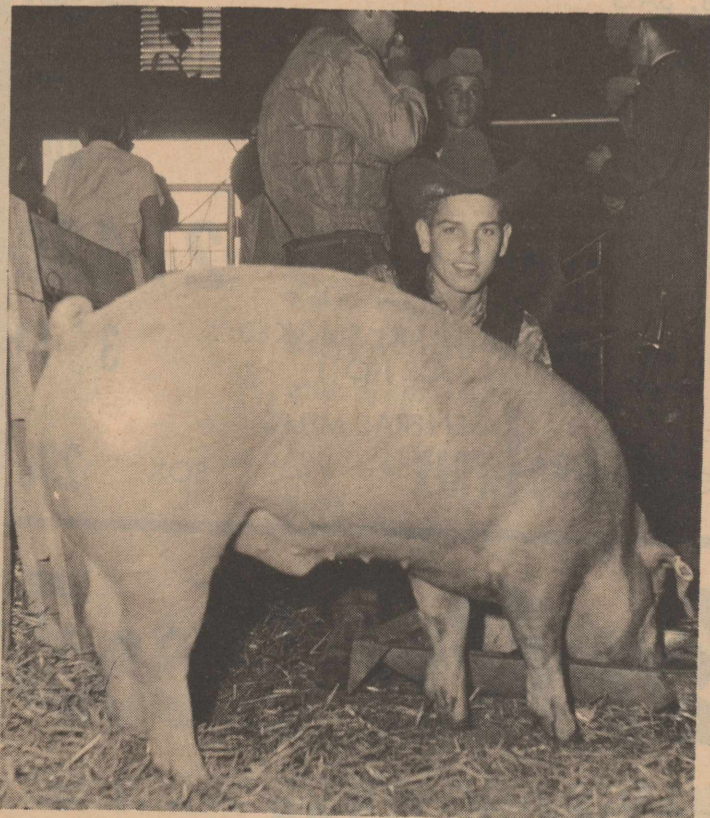

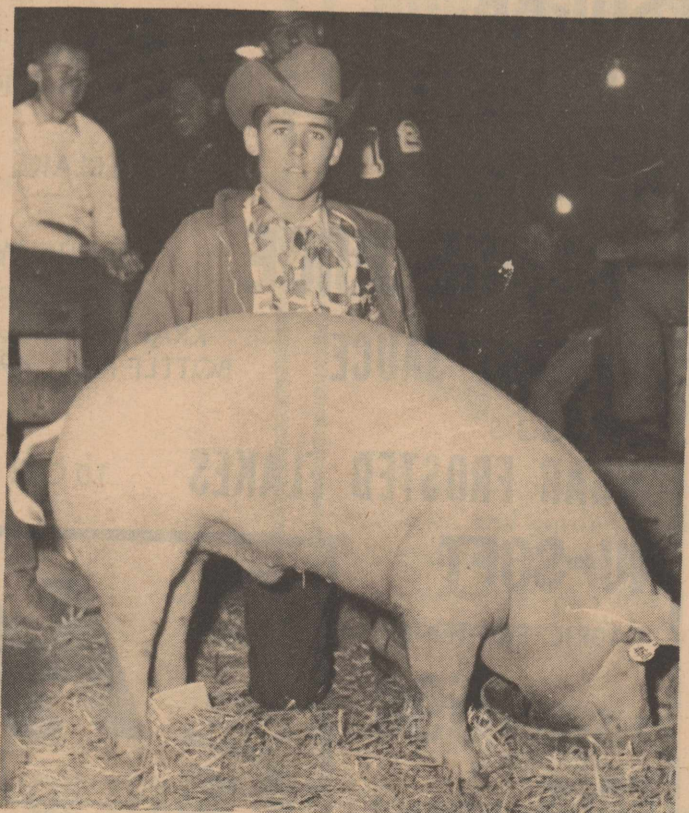

## Hart Show Almost Winnings In County

Hart FFA, FHA and 4-H Club members held their won stock show Thursday preceding the opening day of activities at the county show.

And the results nearly paralleled the results of the county finals.

In the lamb contest, Bob Crick had the grand champion a heavyweight Southdown, and Gary Hart had the reserve champ, a lightweight Southdown.

George Bennett had the only entries in the steer show, with a Hereford placing first and a Shorthorn second, just the opposite of the county show. In the county affair, the mediumweight Shorthorn was named grand champion and the lightweight Hereford was picked as reserve champion.

In the barrow show, Jerry Smith showed the grand champion, a heavy Poland China, while Jim Tucker showed the reserve grand champion, a heavy Duroc.

In the lamb show, Randy Alford had the champion crossbreed, while Benny McKay had the champion fine wool. Marlin Hart rounded out the lamb portion of the contest with his champion other-breeds lamb.

A pair of Davids won the first two rounds of the swine judging, with David Smith taking champion honors in the Berkshire class and David Brooks the champion ribbon with his Chester White.

In Durocs, Tucker took the top spot in the breed, to be followed by Jerry Parker with his light Hampshire in the number one spot in that classification.

Jerry Smith took his grand champion Poland China to the breed championship first, and Bob Crick picked up a champion ribbon with his crossbreed.

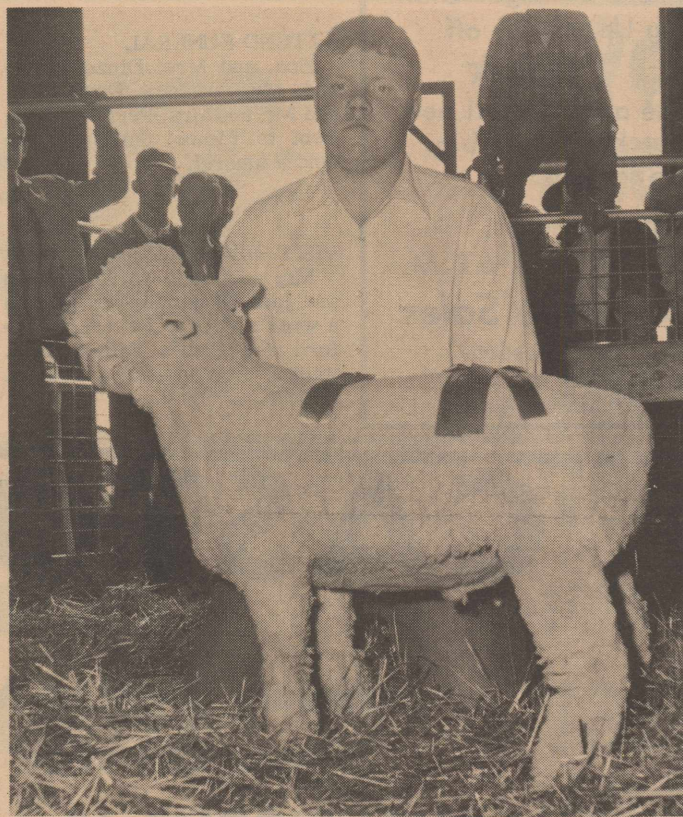

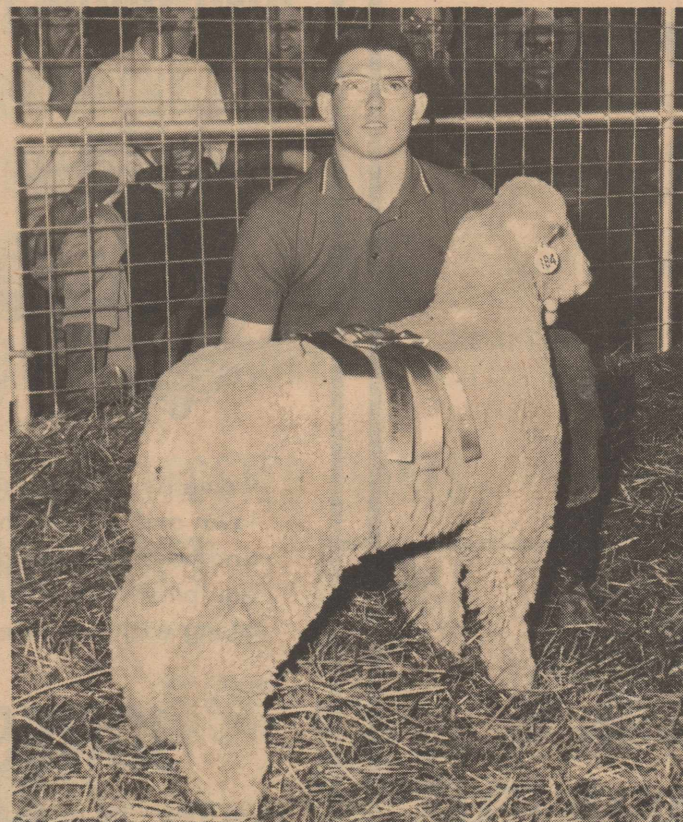

  - 1/4 t. pepper
  - 3 hard boiled eggs chopped fine.
  - 2 T. sweet pickle juice
  - 6 lettuce leaves.
- Cook macaroni until tender. Drain, cover with cold water, drain again. Combine with celery, sweet pickles, onion, and Vienna sausage. Blend mayonnaise with pickle juice, salt and pepper. Add to macaroni mixture. Chill. Heap salad on a large serving plate which you have laid ing plate on which you have laid the lettuce leaves.

Officiating minister was the Rev. Charles Broadhurst, pastor of First Baptist Church in Hale Center.

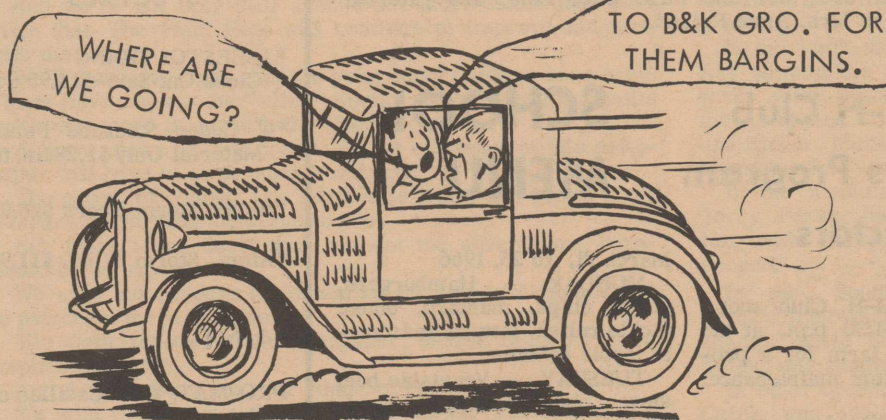
Burial was in Hale Center Cemetery under the direction of Hale Center Funeral Home.
