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IN OPERATION TEENAGER

Students Hear Convicts

A quiet audience of Hart Junior High and High School students heard four convicts from Huntsville discuss crime and its effects at a special

assembly Tuesday afternoon. The four were part of "Operation Teenager", a program sponsored by the Texas Department of Corrections.

They were introduced to the students by Charles Lovell, assistant to the director of education for the department.

Lovell said the program was presented because "more than 20 per cent of all prison inmates are under 21, and more than 40 per cent are in the 17-24 age group."

Lovell saidhe hoped the group might learn something from the prisoners' talk because, "Someone here may hear the doors of prison close behind him."

He said if the quartet's prison sentences were totaled, they would amount to 324 years of prison life, and their crimes ranged from petty theft to mur-

Identified only by a number, each of the prisoners described his life and how he ran afoul of

Postal Rate Hike Starts Saturday

New rates for special Post Office services go into effect Saturday, according to Hart Postmistress, Jewel Brooks.

Included in the new rates will be a hickel increase for all classes of domestic money orders, and the elimination of the \$5.01 to \$10 COD classification.

Money orders up to \$10 will cost 25 cents beginning Saturday. Up until that date, they will be sold at their old rate of 20 cents.

Between \$10-50, the hike will be from 30 to 35 cents, and from \$50-100, the increase will be from 35 to 40 cents.

International money order rates will increase at the same rate, with the \$0-10 rate going from 40 to 45 cents; the \$10-50 from 60 to 65 cents, and the \$50-100 from 70 to 75 cents.

Eliminated will be the \$5.01 to \$10 COD classification, which did cost 40 cents. Under the rates, anything from one cent to \$10 in valuation will cost 60 cents to mail.

In insured mail, the one cent to \$10 class will be eliminated, and all mail insured up to \$15 will cost 20 cents. The old rate up to \$10 cost a dime.

All other insured mail will increase a dime. New rates will be 30 cents for \$15–50, 40 cents for \$50–100, 50 cents for \$100–150, and 60 cents for \$150-200.

In registered mail, the pre-sent charge of 60 cents for mail valued from \$10-100 will increase to 75 cents for all mail up to \$100, but other registered rates will be unchanged.

Certified mail which now costs 20 cents, in addition to postage, will go up to 30 cents, with an additional dime to be charged when a return receipt is requested.

On return receipt requested mail which shows when, where and to whom the mail was delivered, there will be a special

The Challenge Of Growth Today

(EDITOR'S NOTE -- The following article is an essay with which Jim Steiert of Nazareth took first place in the Castro County Soi! Conservation District essay contest.)

THE CHALLENGES OF GROWTH, AND WHAT WE CAN DO ABOUT THEM

By Jim Steiert With increasing momentum, America is moving along uncharted avenues of growth. Our expanding population is at the heart of this growth. Numbering more than 190 million today, it will reach 360 million by the end of the century.

This headlong growth is unleasing new and difficult problems. Foremost among these are tremendous pressures on the nation's natural resources --- our land, water, forests, wildlife, and open space.

For examples: By the year 1980, we will need 600 billion gallons of water a day. We now use 350 bil-

lion gallons daily! By the year 2000, our food requirements will double! And yet our most fertile farm lands are being diverted to other purposes--at the rate of a million acres a year!

Production of wood from the forest resources of the U. S. will have to be doubled by the

By the end of the century, the demand for recreation will at least triple!

To meet these demands, Americans must practice good management. We must conserve, use, and develop our God-given natural resources more wisely and imaginatively in

years ahead. Every citizen is responsible -for every citizen is involved.

Stewardship of natural resources must aim at the greatest good of all the people. Land damage must be controlled in town and country. We must rid our streams of pollution and protect our forests from disease and fire. must search for the best and wisest uses of each acre, and each stream.

These are the aims of America's 3,000 oil and Water Conservation Districts. Managed by citizens who contribute their time and efforts, they are responsible under state laws for planning and carrying out conservation work and resource development programs for the benefit of all.

Districts draw up community conservation plans, provide services to land owners, and help coordinate the conservation work of the government agencies.

You can help. This being mainly a farming community, each farmer can consider how well he and his neighbors are using the land, water, and wildlife resources at his disposal.

In this locality, soil and water are especially valued resources, and people have been continually taking steps to preserve these resources.

People fought with nature to win their land, and they know the stakes are too high to lose such vital resources. So, they continually strive to keep them. If everyone in this nation will meet this challenge with the same degree of determination, we can rest assured that the future generations will enjoy the same plenty which this generation is producing, with the aid of Conservation.

2 egg yolks, beaten

1/2 tsp. vanilla

Mix sugar and flour in top
of double boiler. Add chocolate, salt and milk. Set over

hot water and cook until very thick and creamy. Add a little of hot mixture to egg yolks, then add this to chocolate mixture. Cook about 3 minutes longer. Add vanilla, cool, and pour into baked pie shell. Cover with meringue and bake in 325 degree oven for 12 to 15 minutes.

out easy and good.

Heat to boiling point in a sauce pan 1/2 c. water and 1/4 c. oleo.

Stir in all at once 1/2 c. Your and 1/3 tsp. salt, stirring constantly over heat until mixture leaves sides of pan and forms into a ball when you are stirring or about 1 minute. Cool slightly. Beat in one at a time 2 whole eggs, beating until smooth after each addition. Drop by teaspoon on a baking sheet. Bake in a moderate oven for 50 minutes. Allow to cool away from drafts. Cut small slit in side and fill with your favorite pudding mix.

VANILLA CREAM FILLING 2/3 c.sugar 1/2 tsp. salt 2 1/2 T. cornstarch 1 T. flour 2 1/2 c. milk 3 egg yolks 1 tsp. vanilla 2 T. oleo

Put 2 cups milk in saucepan on low fire to heat while mixing all other ingredients in a bowl. Add the 1/2 cup milk to dry ingredients and blend well. Pour this into the hot milk stirring constantly until thick. Remove from fire and add oleo. Cool. Add 1 tsp. vanilla.



Medicare Blanks Are Available At Post Office

Postmistress Jewel Brooks of Hart announced this week that application blanks for supplemental Medicare benefits are available at the window of the Hart Post Office.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 3.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the Medi-

care law.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National
Medicare Enrollment Month". He urged all federal agencies. and all citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the program.

Initially, some two and one-half million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,-000 main post offices through out the 50 states, Additional forms are available as needed.

Through direct mailings and other means, the Social Security Adminstration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million said they did not want to sign up for the supplemental pro-

The supplemental program cost \$3 a month and provides doctor bill and other benefits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.

A copy of the application is displayed on the lobby bunetin board of the Hart Post Office.

Senior citizens who reached 65 before 1966 face a two year delay if they do not sign up by March 31. The application forms are pre-addressed to the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland.

the first time and joined a was then 17, with him on their

church.
"But I started drinking again,
and my wife and I separated."

He said he began work in a night club, and during the time, tried to talk his wife into living with him again.
"But she just laughed at me,

and now I won't ever be able to talk to her again."

The second man said his father was a minister, and he felt restricted. He said he "began to want things, so I took a part time job."

He said he still didn't make enough money, so he began to steal church funds before they were counted.

He said he dropped out of high school and joined the air force. He got married, but began running around on his wife. "I wanted a home, but I wanted complete freedom with it," he

said. He said his wife finally divorced him, and he began drinking more and more, until he was finally discharged.

"I was again faced with the need for more money, and here I am." he concluded.

The third speaker said he was one of seven children in his family, and he began running away from home when he was 13.
"The police picked me up and

kept me in jail overnight, and that made me a big man with the other kids."
"When I was 15, my father

died, and I dropped out of school."

He said he made \$35 a week at a grocery store, and his friends came around and made fun of him for working for that

"I quit work and began steal-Then I had plenty of time to ride around at night and drink."

"At 17, I met an even sharper But I got caught crowd. for forging checks. When I got out of prison, I was on probation and was leading a normal life."

He said he fell back in with the same crowd, however, and this time took his brother, who

crime raids.

Both were caught and sent to

prison. "My brother began then to try to change, but I didn't want to change my life. When we got out of prison, my brother went back to high school. I decided to be a professional thief. Today, my brother is inhis second year in college and I am back in prison."

The fourth speaker said he was popular in high school, and

tried anything to stay popular. "When everyone started going steady, so did I. Then my girl and I decided to get and everything married changed."

He said he and his wife were no longer included in activities in any group.

"I began stopping at a bar on the way home from work and finally began running around on my wife."

But she got even by doing the same thing. So I bought a pistol...."

The second prisoner summed up the feelings of the group in a plea to students present.
"Please don't be soft on your-

selves. It's very true when adults say this is the most important part of your life, because now is when you decide what you want to do later."

He said they all agreed that crime was not a sudden thing, but the results of years of hab-

"Not one of us had a worth-while goal in life," he said. He concluded the program by

saying, "it's funny, but we don't miss the big things in life, but the small things which we spent out life running from."


