Bank Announces New Building Plans

Announcement was made this week by Willis A. Hawkins Sr. and Norlan Dudley of Farmers State Bank that plans have been completed for a new bank building and that Ed Harris Lumber Co. was awarded the contract to build the new facilities.

The new addition will be built south of the present quarters on the three lots now used for parking area, and will be connected to present quarters by a vestibule.

Entrance to banking house, when completed, will be by a 12 feet mall running east and west connected to the vestibule, which will give access to both new and old quarters. A paved parking area will be maintained at the rear of the new building.

The new addition will feature a drive-in window and night depository on the south, central heating and air conditioning, and will contain a customer's vault for safety deposit boxes, as well as a money vault and records vault. Plans call for three office, and customer's vault to be located off the main lobby.

The new addition will be 48 x 52 feet in size.

The present quarters will be converted into a community room, with kitchenette, men's and ladies' rest rooms, and storage in the rear.

Contract calls for 120 days for completion of new facility and remodeling of the old quarters.

Funeral service for Dennis Alan McLain, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Laurence McLain, were held Sunday at 2:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church here.

McLain was killed in a one-car accident at 2:50 a.m. Friday April 15 in the city of Hart.

Also dead as a result of the accident is Gene Gobbel, 21, who died at 1:05 p.m. Friday in South Plains Memorial Hospital at Dimmitt.

Services for Gobbel, a former Hart resident, were held Saturday at 10 a.m. in Hart First Baptist Church with the Rev. Dinzel Leonard, pastor, officiating.

Two other youths injured in the accident were Roger Davis, 19, and David Follis, 18.

Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Davis who farm near Hart, has been released from Methodist Hospital in Lubbock and is now at home.

A student at West Texas State University, the youth suffered head injuries in the accident.

Follis, son of Mr. and Mrs. H.K. Follis of Hart, is in a Dimmitt hospital and is expected to be released this week.

McLain was identified as driver of the 1964 automobile which highway patrolmen said was traveling west when it went out of control and overturned several times.

He was pronounced dead on arrival at South Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt.

Gobbel, a U.S. Army serviceman whose parents live at Siloam Springs, Ark., was visiting relatives here, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hawkins and Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Davis.

He was enroute to Oakland, Calif., where he was to report April 18 to be sent to Viet Nam. He had attended Hart schools, living with Mr. and Mrs. Davis.

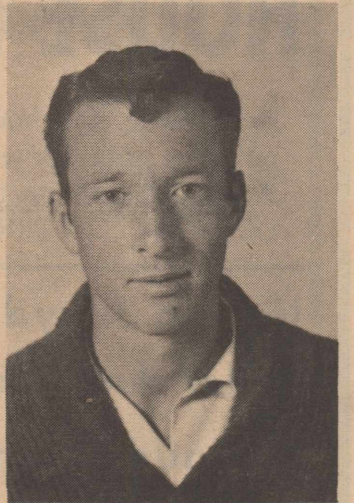
This was the second recent tragedy to strike the McLain family. The youth's sister, Lauren Elaine, 15, was killed in an automobile accident March 12 near Vega.

His mother, who was recently elected to the Hart School board, was injured in that accident.

Martin has played basketball and football four years and volleyball and track three years.

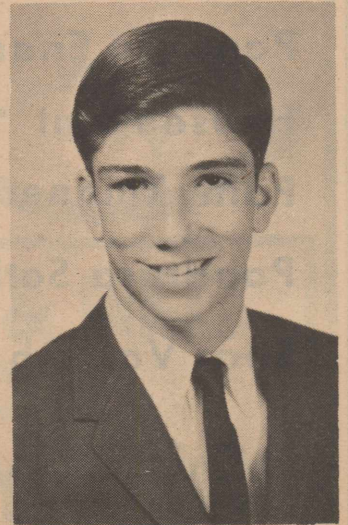
He has been active in FFA, is vice-president of the student council and vice-president of his senior class.

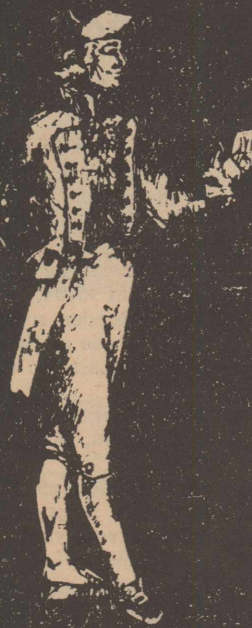

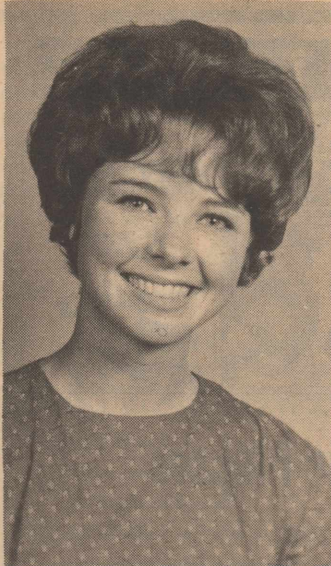

Donald Ewing, Hart Jr. High Coach and Science teacher, has received a National Science Foundation Award from Texas Technological College in Lubbock in the field of science.

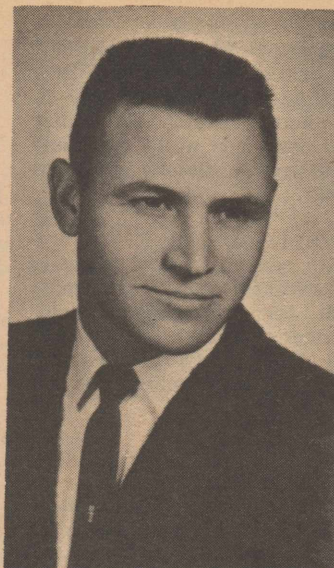

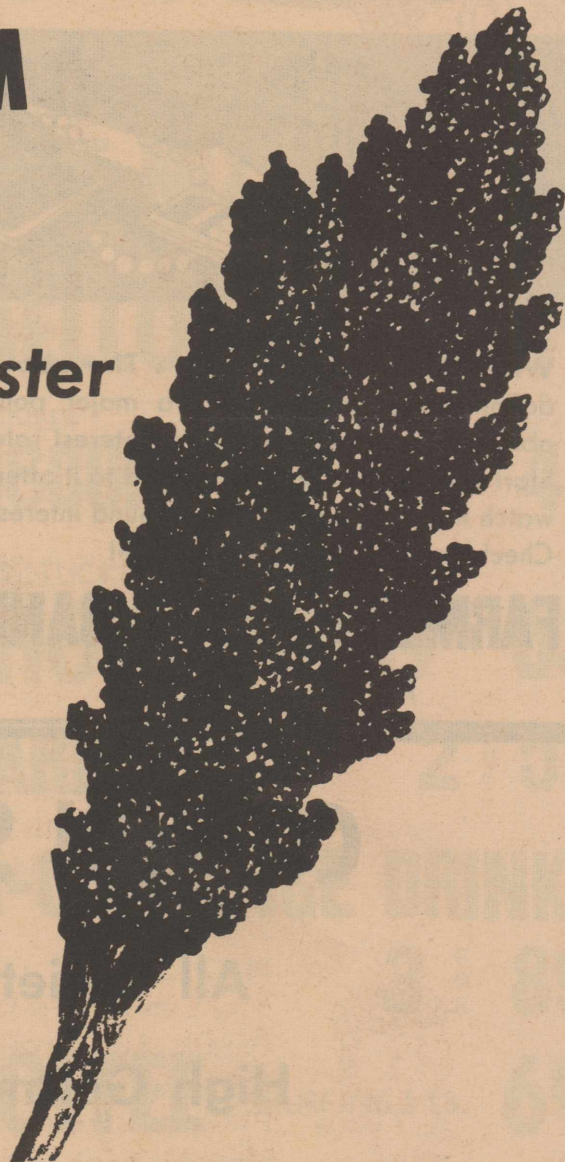

KITCHEN KORNER

BY LELA GALLION

The weather has been so pretty and its almost time to start our outdoor barbecue cooking. Here are a few suggestions you might like to try.

CHICKEN DELECTABLE

1 broiler-fryer chicken, cut into serving size pieces
4 squares heavy duty aluminum foil.
1 envelope dehydrated onion soup.
1/2 cup top milk or cream
1 tsp. paprika
4 T. butter or margarine
1 4-ounce can mushrooms, drain
Rinse chicken, dry and remove small protruding bones. Tear off 4 squares aluminum foil. Place small dab butter, 1 T. onion soup and 1/4 tsp. paprika in center of each aluminum foil square. Arrange chicken over this, sprinkle remaining onion soup and dot with butter. Add mushrooms and cream, dividing evenly among 4 packages. Wrap food sealing edges with tight double fold. Seal other two ends same way, turning them over so juices will not run out. Cook for 45 to 50 minutes on grill over medium heat.

BUTTER ROASTED CORN

4 ears fresh sweet corn
1/2 c. butter, softened
1 tsp. salt
Mix butter and salt. Coat ears of corn. Securely wrap each ear in heavy duty aluminum foil. Grill on coals 15-25 minutes.

SWEET POTATOES

Peel and shoe string sweet potato (one). Place on aluminum foil. Add two tablespoons water and about one-half cup brown sugar. Fold and wrap. Bake approximately seven minutes each side on bed of hot coals.

BANANA-YUM

Cut both ends off a banana in skin (unpeeled). Slice down center and sprinkle with brown sugar. Fold and wrap in aluminum foil, sealing tightly. Bake on hot coals about 6 minutes each side. Serve hot.

Mix sour cream, fruits and coconut. Add marshmallows last. Toss salad until thoroughly mixed. Chill in covered glass bowl before serving.

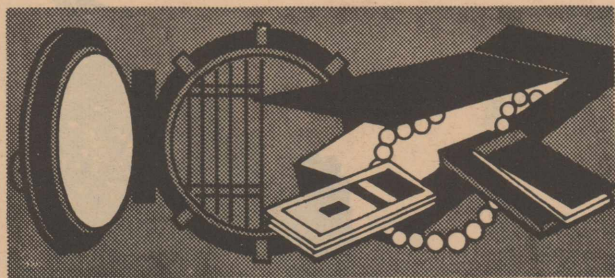

May 2 Deadline For Reporting Wheat, Barley

Farmers who have signed up to participate in the 1966 Wheat and Feed Grain Program must report final wheat and/or barley acreage by May 2 to:

1. Receive diverted acreage or certificate payments, or
2. Be eligible for price support loans or,
3. Be eligible for substitution between wheat and feed grains.

This is required even though their wheat and/or barley acreage is zero, or they have been furnished measurement service by the Castro Co. ASCS office.

The farm operator is required in all cases to certify to his final wheat and/or barley acreage by having such acreage entered on the form he signed for participation and initialing such entry.

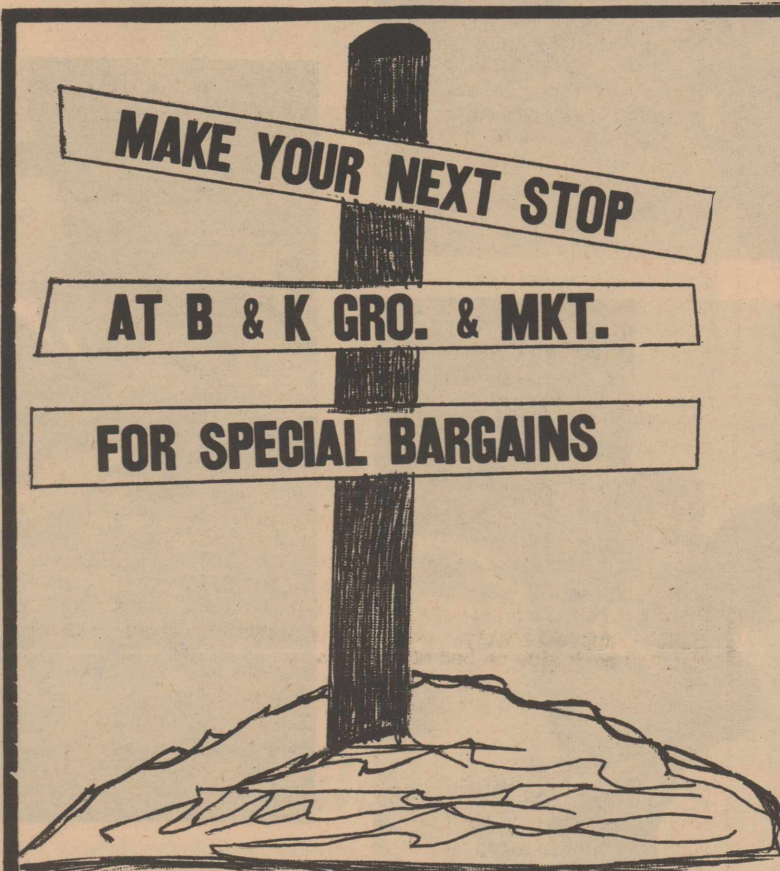
