THERE IS A LIMIT

Judge Explains Powers Of Commissioners' Court

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is an article by County Judge Raymond E. Wilson which he submitted after being asked by this paper to explain the powers and duties of the Commissioners Court.)

BY RAYMOND E. WILSON COUNTY JUDGE

The Commissioners Court is the governing body of the county and is composed of the four commissioners with the county judge as presiding officer.

Since the county is a political subdivision of the state, many people think that the commissioners court has unlimited power to manage the business affairs of the county. However, this is not true. The court has very restricted judicial and administrative powers and no legislative authority at all.

In most instances it is lawful for us as citizens to do anything that is not directly prohibited by either the Constitution or the Statutes. This is not true concerning powers of the commissioners court. Its power does not include everything not expressly prohibited but only such specific powers as are conferred upon it by the Constitution or Statutes of this state and by necessary implication therefrom. The commissioners court does have a broad discretion in exercising the powers expressly conferred

I am sure we all understand what is meant by expressed or conferred powers of the court, but at this time I would like to discuss what is meant by the implied powers of the commissioners court.

The Texas Supreme Court defines implied powers as everything necessary to make expressed powers effectual, or the authroity to do all things necessary to accomplish the object of the grant. The grant of an expressed power carried with it by necessary implication every other power necessary and proper to the execution of the power expressly granted.

For the purpose of transacting the usual business of the commissioners court, any three members of the court, including the county judge, constitute a quorum with the exception of the regular meeting at which the annual tax rate in levied. A quorum for levying the tax rate requires all five members or in case a member of the court is incapacitated from any cause, then any other four members of the court constitute a quorum when the member's incapacity is certified in writing by a duly licensed physician and the district court approves the certification.

It is generally thought that the county judge presides over the court and only votes in case of a tie vote. But this is an erroneous impression of the law, for the county judge can make a motion, second a motion, or cast a vote for or against any measure at any time just the same as a county commissioner can do.

I think, too, often people think the first duty of county commissioners is road work. I feel that this is a mistake. You can employ road men to do this kind of work for you.

I think the most important power of the commissioners court is the supervision and administration of the finances of the county. The county is financed by local tax monies, State and Federal monies and various gifts.

Present county valuation is approximately \$12,400,000.00.

I call attention to the tax monies that the commissioners court may assess and collect for county purposes. The maxiimum amount of taxes that the commissioners can levy for the four main constitutional funds is 80 cents per \$100 valuation. In addition to the 80 cents tax for constitutional funds we have a five cent Water District Tax, 15 cent Road and Bridge Tax, 30 cent Special Road Tax, and 42 cent State Tax. This is a total levy of 1.72 per \$100 valuation which is the maximum allowed. By using the maximum rate we save the tax payer a considerable amount in taxes because if the rate was lowered the valuation would have to be raised in order to get the funds necessary for county operational expense. When the valuation is raised it would mean the 42 cents State Tax and the 5 cents Water District ax would also apply to the increased valuation. This would mean that for each \$100 raised for county use would make it manditory that we raise approximately the same additional amount for State and Water District use.

That was the reason for forming a County Wide Hospital District so that we could finance our hospital without sending an equal amount out of the county. A conservative estimate of the amount saved the tax payer over the 16-year period required to pay off the hospital bonds and

Along with the rest of the state, Hart voters will go to the polls Saturday to nominate party candidates for office from the county level to the governorship in statewide primary elections.

On the county level, only one race is contested. Mrs. Irene Carpenter and Mrs. Florene Leinen are both in the race for county treasurer.

Incumbent Mrs. Faye Holland, who has served as county treasurer for 26 years, is retiring.

James A. Joy of Hale County, district judge of the 64th District, is seeking re-election, along with County Judge Raymond Wilson and Zonell Maples, county and district clerk.

This will be the first time in this state that citizens may cast ballots without having paid poll taxes or qualified for exemptions, since voter registration came into effect early this year.

The 30th Senatorial District race has generated considerable interest in the area with two of the three candidates incumbents in districts affected by the reshuffling this year of Texas legislative districts.

Andy Rogers of Childress is the incumbent from the old 30th Senatorial District.

Jack Hightower of Vernon is incumbent senator of the old 23rd District, most of which was joined to the 30th District.

Third candidate is James R. Ray of Hale County. Ray is a farmer and was formerly on the Washington staff of Congress-

man George Mahon.

Billy Wayne Clayton of Springlake, incumbent, is unopposed for state representative, 78th District.

Mae Hagelone Clayton of Caba.

Junopposed For State representative, 78th District.

On the state level, Gov. John Connally is opposed by Johnnie Mae Hackworthe of Washington County and Stanley G. Woods, Harris County.

Connally is seeking his third term as governor.

Preston Smith of Lubbock, lieutenant governor, is apposed by Bill Hollowell of Van Zandt

Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, now state attorney general, is opposed on the Democratic ticket for U. S. Senator by John R. Willoughby of Harris County.

Predictions are for a choice being made between Carr and Sen. John Tower, Republican incumbent, in November general election.

In the race for the attorney general post which Carr will vacate are Crawfod C. Martin of Hill County, Galloway Calhoun of Smith County and Franklin Spears of Bexar County.

Jerry Sadler, incumbent, is opposed by Fred Williams of Val Verde County for commissioner of the general land office

Byron Tunnell, Smith County, railroad commissioner by appointment, is opposed by P. S. (Russ) Ervin of Dallas County and Paul B. Haring of Goliad County.

W. T. McDonald of Brazos County, up for re-election as judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, is opposed by John F. (Jack) Onion of Bexar County. Unopposed are Walter Rogers for U. S. Representative, John C. White for commissioner of agriculture, Robert S. Calvert for comptroller of public accounts, Jesse James for state treasurer, Robert W. Calvert for chief justice of Supreme Court of Texas, Clyde E. Smith for associate justice place 1 of Supreme Court of Texas, Joe Greenhill for associate justice place 2 of Supreme Court of Texas and James G. Denton for chief justice of Court of Civil Appeals, seventh supreme judicial district.

FROSTED APRICOT SALAD 2 T. unflavored gelatin 1 c. cold water l c. sugar

Juice of 2 lemons (opt.) No. 2 1/2 can apricots, drain c. whipped cream 1 small pkg. cream cheese Pinch of salt

Soften gelatin in 1/2 c. water, combine remaining water, sugar and syrup drained from apricots; bring to a boil. Add to softened gelatin. Set aside cup of the mixture to congeal slightly. Strain apricots into the remaining gelatin mixture; pour into 8 x 10 pan. Re-frigerate until firm. Combine whipped cream, cheese and salt. Fold in the cup of slightly congealed gelatin and pour over the firm apricot layer. Serve with argyle dressing.

any deficit in operational expsense was \$453,000.

The sources of revenue for use on county roads are Special Road Tax, Road & Bridge Tax, Lateral Road Money recea ed from the State, and money received from car and trailer registration. These funds cannot be used for any other purpose.

The county receives all of the first \$50,000 received from registration of cars and other vehicles. After that the county receives half of all money received from these registrations until the county has received a maximum of \$175,000. Castro County has never received a maximum of \$175,000. Castro County has never received over \$130,000 from this source. So you can easily see that each time you register your car out of the county you are taking half of the cost of registration out of your own county road fund.

Other powers of the commissiones court:

1. Authority to use county road machinery and equipment in the service of soil conservation and prevention of soil waste through erosion.

2. Authorized to employ such means, and may appropriate and expend such sums of money as may be necessary to carry on extention service work in agriculture and home economics.

3. Provide for the protection, preservation and disposition of all lands granted to the county for education or schools.

4. Audit and settle all accounts against the county and direct their payment.

5. Lay out and establish, change and discontinue public roads and highways.

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
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
