Light Voter Turnout Goes Along With State

The Hart box went along with the rest of the state on all except three races, going with W. T. McDonald for judge of court of criminal appeals, Andy Rogers for state senator and Franklin Spears for attorney general.

Crawford C. Martin led the state in the attorney general race and now faces a run-off with Spears.

In the only contested race on the county level, Mrs. Robert (Bud) Leinen polled 722 to Mrs. Irene Carpenter's 629 for county treasurer.

Mrs. Leinen took 23 in the Hart box and Mrs. Carpenter had 19.

In the 30th Senatorial District race, Rogers led the county with 796 to Jack Hightower's 317 and James Ray's 232.

Hart voters gave 29 to Rogers, 8 to Hightower and 5 to Ray.

Hightower polled approximately 53 percent of the votes in the entire race.

In the governor's race, John Connally polled 946 in the coun-ty, 24 in Hart; Stanley C. Wood, 363 and 16; and Johnnie Mae Hackworthe, 44 and 1.

For lieutenant governor, Preston Smith had 1157 in the county and 29 in Hart; Bill Hollowell had 281 in the county and 13 in Hart.

For United States senator, Waggoner Carr took 1011 in the county and 29 in Hart; John R. (Jack) Willoughby had 332

in the county and 11 at Hart. In the attorney general race, Crawford C. Martin took 579 in the county, 12 at Hart; Franklin

Clean-Up Scheduled **By City**

Hart Mayor E. E. Foster issued an appeal this week to resi-dents "to help make Hart a cleaner city in which to live by joining in the city-wide clean-up week."

The week is set Monday May

Cotton farmers in Castro County will vote this month to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county, Jim Elder, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced.

The referendum on the question will be conducted by mail during the period May 16 through May 25. Ballots may also be delivered by hand to the ASCS county office.

The only question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next three years to other farms outside the county which are owned or controlled by someone else. Such transfers may be made by sale or by lease. In no case may transfers be made outside the state. Anaffirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers for the next three upland cotton crops, 1967-69.

Cotton Sale-Lease Vote Set

A referendum on the same question was conducted last fall throughout the cotton belt, and growers in 349 counties at that time approved the allotment transfers. The vote this May will be held only in counties which disapproved such transfers in last fall's vote.

The upcoming vote marks a first in program administration, according to Elder. Farmers previously have been able to vote by mail in annual ASC Committeemen elections, but the method has never before been used in a commodity program referendum.

Elder said, "It's easy to vote by mail, and we hope all producers will vote. The vote

should be fully representative of the wishes of cotton farmers in our county."

The chairman said that copies of the ballot are being sent to all cotton producers of record in the county, together with information describing the program's purpose and operation.

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AUSTIN, Tex. -- Next year's State Air Control Board nowhas legislative session may see state employees battling as hard for a pay raise as school teachers.

Furthermore, help is as-sured. Gov. John Connally says that "substantial pay raises for state employees" will be among his "strongest recommendations" to lawmakers.

Indications are that the pay boost could run as high as \$17,-500,000 a year.

According to Connally, state government is slipping farther and farther behind in its efforts to keep qualified workers -- not only in the lowest pay levels but in the higher brackets of professional personnel.

Connally says that: *More than 7,800 of the 45,000 state employees (not including those at colleges and universi-ties) make less than \$3,000 a year, the federal "poverty line."

*Turnover is running 30 per cent per year.

*Lower-bracket hospital aides get as little as \$193 a month.

*There are 313 vacancies in the hospital system, 77 in parks and wildlife operations, 100 in the prison system, 135 in the highway patrol and 148 in the

Texas Education Agencies. "If we do not reverse the trend," warns Connally, "not only will the stability and effiency of our operations be threatened, but we will also weaken our entire system of local self government and re-sponsibility." Salary issue promptly was in-

jected into the governor's race. Stanley Woods, Connally's opponent for the Democratic

nomination, chided the governor for not having spoken out on the subject before election time.

Woods' ticketmate, State Rep. Bill Hollowell, running for lieutenant governor, said Connally should submit the raises to an immediate special session of the Legislature rather than waiting eight months until the regular session opens. GINNERS FIRST ON CONTROL

LIST? Texas' new nine-member



held its second meeting since Governor Connally named the group, whose purpose it is to protect the public from air pollution. Indications are that Texas' more than 1,300 cotton gins will be the first area subject to air control rules and regulations.

Conclusions after a yearlong study of pollutants caused by cotton gins is that smoke emitted from burr burning contains significant quantities of arsenic and tars. These poisons, along with gin dust, have contributed to the 20 to 30 per cent increase in complaints

about respiratory diseases suffered by downwind residents during ginning season. Also, there have been adverse effects on trees and vegetation downwind from aresenic and other eivdences of pollutants. Report states that much of

the increased pollutants from the gins are caused from an increase in trash -- leaves, limbs, immature bolls, and dust -- picked up by mechanical harvesters. Recommendations for curing these problems will be in the report of the Board's staff. WATER QUALITY COSTS GOING UP

Taxpayers, as well as the men who run the sewage treatment plants in growing cities, must get used to the fact that in the future they are going to have to maintain high standards of op-eration of their plants. Higher quality water means higher cost of treatment.

This came out in the Texas Water Pollution Control Board's meeting when the City of Dallas objected to a doubling

of the Board's usual chlorination requirement, arguing it would cost more than it would be worth.

Dave Smallhorst, the Board's executive executive secretary, said: "The cities, including Dallas, have to recognize the fact that an increase in water quality requirements is going to mean an increase in cost." Smallhorst said chlorination is necessary to protect public health and the Board's first concern is the health of the public. COURTS SPEAK

A trial court ruling that Rice University must integrate can be appealed by school alumni, Texas Supreme Court held.

Houston Court of Civil Appeals was ordered to consider the appeal. A provision of charitable trust establishing the school specified that it admit white students. Trial only court said the restriction is invalid and the court of Civil Appeals held that only Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr could appeal.
