County Third In Texas Grain Production

Castro County's grain sorghum production for 1965 was 13,295,000 bushels according to final figures released by Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

This was a gain of 970,000 bushels or a 7.3 per cent in-crease over the 1964 crop which was 12,325,000 bushels.

This ranked it third in grain sorghum production among all counties in Texas according to V. F. Snodgrass, south plains representative GSPA.

Parmer County again led the state and nation in grain sorghum production with 18,- els, 35 percent above last year

683,500 bushels this past year. The trend for the past several years has been increased grain sorghum production in this county and in Texas. Texas, the number one grain sorghum producing state, had a produc-tion of 285,740,000 bushels in 1965 which was 43 percent of the total grain sorghum produced in the nation. All Panhandle counties had increased grain sorghum production in 1965.

The 1965 grain sorghum crop was the largest ever in Texas and the Nation. National pro-duction was 666,062,000 bush-

and 21 per cent above the five year average. The biggest production shift came in the 13county North Plains of Texas area which produced 81,111,600 bushels of grain sorghum in 1965 which was 12 per cent of the national production and 21 per cent of the Texas production. The coastal bend area around Corpus Christi also registered increases in grain sorghum production. Nueces County moved up to the fourth place producer in the state with 12,-784,000 bushels. Even in the heart of the traditional cotton area of the south plains, grain sorghum showed gains. Lub-bock County itself leaped from 4,715,000 bushels in 1964 to 6, 104,000 bushels in 1965.

It is expected that the increasing grain sorghum production trend will continue this year, particularly in the north plains, coastal bend and south plains.

Along with these production increases, utilization of grain sorghum has steadily increased at home and abroad through intensive promotion program by Grain Sorghum Producers Association. When such programs were started in 1956, livestock

use of sorghum was 179 million bushels, now it is 479 million. Exports in the same peiod have moved from 22 million bushels to over 200 million in 1965. The other major uses of grain sorghum, commercial and industrial, now promises to double with the opening of the new wet milling plant to be built at Dimmitt. Castro County grain sorghum

production record is as follows: 1959 -- 13,563,000; 1960--14,-

784,000; 1961 -- 11,772,000; 1962 -- 11,273,000; 1963 -- 14,-190,000; 1964 -- 12,325,000; and 1965 -- 13,295,000.

Lawn Mower Injury Toll Alarms Safety Experts

With 24,000,000 power mowers in use today, and 4,500,000 new ones produced each year, mower manufacturers and safety experts have watched with alarm as the toll of injuries reports Changing mounts, Times, the Kiplinger magazine.

Safety officials estimate that from 55,000 to 80,000 people are injured each mowing season, and almost nine out of ten mower injuries treated involved rotary models. According to Changing Times, many of these accidents are not serious. But many others result in the loss of toes, fingers, eyes and occasional life.

The trend to bigger, heavier mowers is one of the reasons for the rising number of accidents. The American Standards Association has set up safety and design standards which have been adopted by most manufacturers. Over 85 percent of all mowers sold this season will carry the ASA seal. So, if you're in the market for a new mower, be sure it carries the ASA seal. The editors of Changing

Times list these rules which every mower operator should follow:

Know your machine. Read the owner's manual carefully and know how to stop the engine quickly in an emergency.

Before you start to mow, check the mower for cracks, loose nuts and bolts. Fill the gas tank before you start, not after. the motor gets hot, and never while the motorisrunning. Check the lawn for stones,

sticks and other debris that could get hurled out of the mower.

When you are ready to mow, clear the area of children, pets and other bystanders.

Before you sart the motor, make sure all blade and drive clutches are disengaged. As you start the machine, keep your feet well away from the blades.

If you are called away from the machine, shut it off. Stop the engine before pushing the mower over walks and other non lawn areas. Never let a child or some-

ON MEMORIAL DAY Water Accidents Expected


With the approach of the Memorial Day weekend Americans throughout the land already are busy with the spring chores of scraping and painting small boats, in eager anticipation of another summer on the lakes and streams.

And once again the American Medical Association reminds that the Memorial Day weekend will launch a summer of boating and fishing accidents and deaths from drowning. Most of these accidents need not happen. The AMA reminds each spring that most boating and fishing accidents could be prevented if and further damage. outdoorsmen would observe a few simple precautions.

Fishing is highly recommended by your doctor as a air and sunshine, and help to clear away those mental cobwebs left over from home and office worries. Fishing is not particularly hazardous, but there are some pointers to watch to help avoid accidents. Fishhooks are designed to catch and hold fish. They also can snag an unwary finger, hand,

arm or leg. If you're deeply hooked, go to a doctor and ask him to remove it. Don't try to work the hook out backwards. Your doctor has the instruments and know-how to remove the hook with a minimum of pain

Hooks left lying in the bottom of a boat or on a dock are a real hazard. Many fishermen follow a simple rule with hooks: When not in use for fishing, small cork.



On a slope, mow sideways, never up and down. Never pull a running machine toward you.

Don't mow is the grass is wet. This is particularly crucial with electric mowers.

As you turn a rotary mower, the machine mow you lawn, always make lefthad turns (away from the direction in which the grass chute points). Never walk by the chute while the motor is running and never reach in with your hand or a stick to unclog grass while the motor is running.


If you have to work on the cutting blade, disconnect the

spark plug. Merely shutting off the engine doesn't guarantee that it won't start again as you crank the blade around.

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If you have a riding mower, be especially careful on hills and never allow a passenger on board. These machines can and do tip over.

And lastly, pay attention to the job at hand. Perhaps the single greatest cause of accidents is the mental lapse that sends your thoughts wandering when you should be alert.

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A Little Tension Is A Good Thing

What causes tension? Tension is a rather uncomfortable complaint that most everyone suffers at one time or another

or another. "A little tension is a good thing, because it keeps us on our toes," says Mrs. Patsy R. Yates, Extension family life specialist at Texas A&M University, "But too much can be dangerous."

Tension that persists over a period of time can set its victim up for a serious breakdown.

There are many ways that tension can be relieved. Mrs. Yates recommends some of the following solutions based on certain basic rules for handling tension which have been developed by mental health experts:

(1) Tired of the same old routine week after week? Live a little, the experts say -- vary your routine. Go to a good movie or read a good book.

(2) When the children have been noisy and impossible all day, and you've had all you can take, try to refrain from lashing out at them, Instead, release that pent-up energy in

some physical activity -- like scrubbing an already clean floor.

(3) Preparing in advance for common emergencies such as unexpected guests for dinner is a great tension-reducer Coping with minor crises without fuss conditions you to face bigger ones calmly.

(4) When you have several important things to do, by all means get the worst done first. Putting things off -- especially if you dislike doing them -builds up stress; having something pleasant to look forward to reduces it.

(5) After dinner, your husband often spends an hour or so puttering around in the garage. Should you go see what he's doing and perhaps help him? No, say the experts. Companionship is important for a happy marriage, but in today's families, there's often too much "togetherness." Everyone needs some time to himself, to think, to dream maybe just to unwind emotionally without fear of getting on someone else's nerves.

Cemetery clean-up is scheduled May 26, as announced by O. D. Dinwiddie, a member of the board of directors of the cemetery.


