CATTLE DIPPING COM-PLETED- Dippings of scabies infected cattle in the Texas Panhandle was completed on April 27, according to Dr. S. B. Walker, executive director of Texas Animal Health Commission.

A total of 15,452 head were dipped twice 10 to 14 days apart in an approved manner and sol-ution, while 257 head were dipped once.

Federal quarantine for Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley and Ran-dall Counties still is in effect, though cattle from these counties have undergone state and federal inspection.



1 c. cooked chicken

1 apple 1/2 c. sweet pickles

1/4. c. mayonnaise

Salt, pepper, paprika to taste. Chop chicken, pickles and apples together. Mix with mayonnaise. Serve on lettuce leaf.

COCONUT VELVET CREAM SALAD

1 pkg. orange jello dissolved in 1 c. hot pineapple juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Add 1 c. milk. Chill again. Fold in 3/4 c. whipped cream, add 3/4 c. angel flake coconut, and chill again.

### PARTY PUNCH

2 boxes Jello

- c. boiling water 1/2 c. sugar
- 2 c. cold water

1 8-oz. bottle lemon concen-

trate

46-oz. can pineapple juice l qt. gingerale

Dissolve Jello in boiling water. Then stir in sugar until dissolved; allow to cool slightly and add cold water, lemon concentrate and pineapple juice. Pour into punch bowl and add crushed ice and gingerale. Do not let stand in refrigerator as jello will begin to thicken, however it will thin again when you add the gingerale and ice just before serving. Serves 25. The jello in this punch makes it a real smooth drink.


