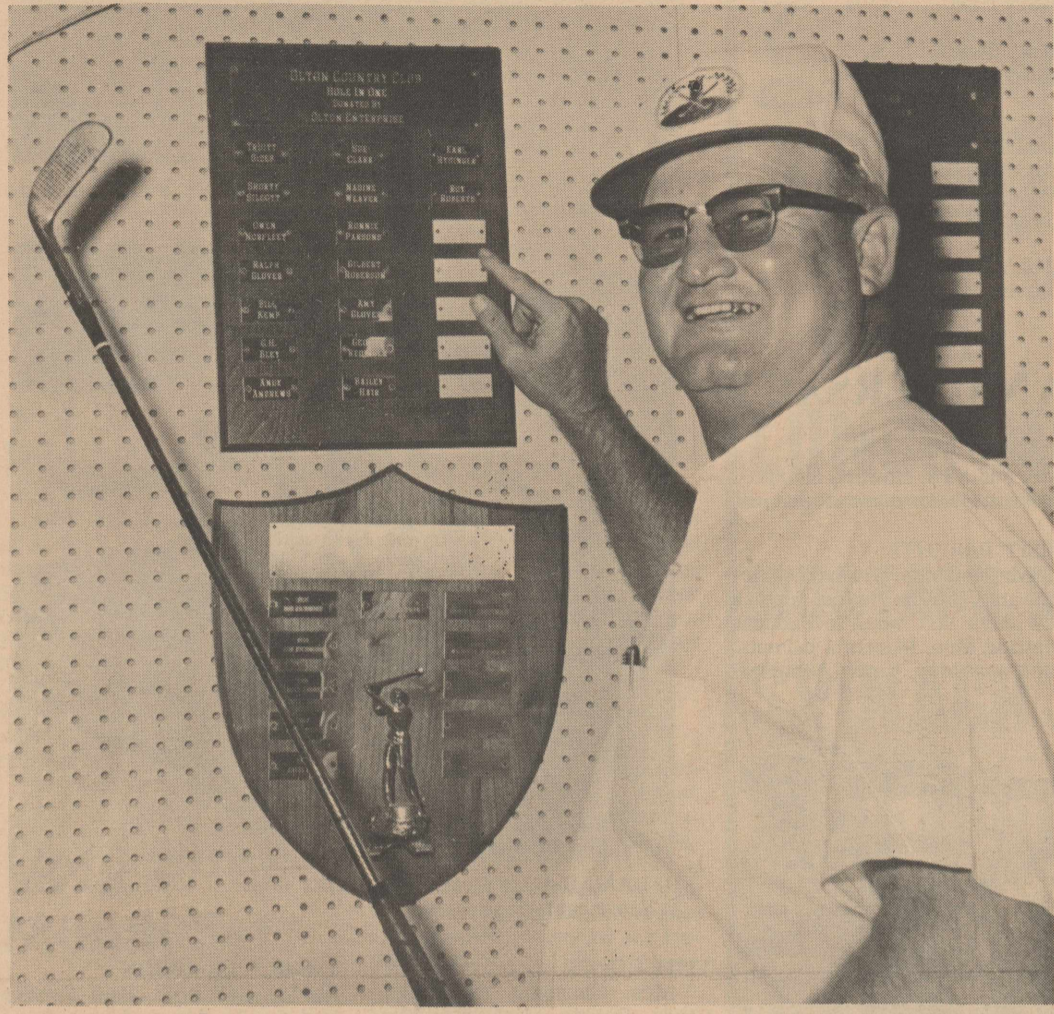

Hart Boy To Get FFA Awards

David Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold D. Smith of Hart, is one of 10 area FFA winners competing for state honors at the state convention in Austin. David also has been named winner of a Santa Fe Railway Educational Award.

Convention started Wednesday and will close Friday. Smith was selected as Lone Star Farmer of Area I in May of this year. Along with other area winners, he will also compete in the public speaking contest, one of the highlights of the convention.

Each of the boys will give a six to eight minute speech on an agricultural topic of their choice.

Boy selected as state public speaking winner will compete in the tri-state speaking contest to be held this year in Dallas.

Smith is one of 15 award winners, three from Area I, who will attend the national FFA convention in Kansas City in October.

There they will join other award winners at a special luncheon with Santa Fe Railway officials. Santa Fe Railway has for the past 25 years provided the educational awards.

Among the 15 are two other Area I youths, Carl Hudson of Groom and Lowell Catlett of Dalhart.

Smith has been active in FFA and agriculture programs under the supervision of Lanny Tucker, FFA advisor.

He served as treasurer and president of his local FFA chapter, member of dairy products judging team, district chapter conducting, won local FFA foundation medal in crops, attended Boys' State, Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar, Mr. Hart High School, Who's Who and was captain of the football team 1965-66.

The youth has a project program consisting of 85 acres of potatoes, 65 acres of cotton,

65 acres of corn, 145 head of commercial steers, Berkshire hogs for breeding and 23 head of market hogs.

With special interests in football, basketball, track and swimming, he plans to continue his education this September at Oklahoma State University to major in agriculture.

Land Bank Month Set

For some 5,000 people who make their living from agriculture in Castro County, July will be a month-long testimony to the fact that they--and most other farmers--have turned out to be good businessmen.

It will be "Land Bank Month", the 50th anniversary of the Farm Loan Act which helped put farming on a business basis in the U. S. for the first time in history. Farmers at last were able to borrow money on reasonable terms and put it to work as a production tool.

Billy Hackleman, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt, said that farmers at the turn of the century were regarded as poor business risks.

"No one would lend them money to operate the way a businessman must if he is going to grow and contribute to his community," he said. "Interest rates for farmers were twice as high as for city business men, and the loans were for very short terms."

"Three Presidents--Theodore Roosevelt, Taft and Wilson studied the problem, and finally the Farm Loan Act was signed by Woodrow Wilson on July 17, 1916. This act created the Federal Land Bank System, through which farmers could make long-term, low-cost real estate loans from their own organization," Hackleman continued.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt was created in 1917. It is one of 73 associations in the Federal Land Bank district of Houston, which in turn is one of 12 Federal Land Banks that serve the 50 states.

"Altogether, Hackleman said, "The Federal Land Bank System nationally has loaned its farmer-members more than \$12 billion. The Land Bank of Houston has loaned Texas farmers more than 1.1 billion dol-

lars. Our own association has loaned millions of dollars over the 49 years it has been in business."

Not only have farmers proved to be outstandingly good loan risks--Land Bank foreclosures are almost unheard of today--but, given money to work with, they have proved to be "production geniuses of a quality rarely found anywhere in American business."

"There are half as many farmers today as there were 50 years ago, and they're feeding a population that has doubled in this century," Hackleman said. "They rank among the greatest users of technology the world has ever known. Anyone who doubts it should visit a modern farm today."

"What goes on there--in new breeding, feeding, and other production techniques--makes many of the rest of us look as if we and not the farmers are living in the horse-and-buggy days."

"I don't know of another industry in the country that is producing today with 1975 methods and selling--for the most part--at 1955 prices."

Hackleman said that 321 farmers currently hold Land Bank loans in this county. Most of the loans have been used to expand, improve and modernize farm land and equipment. The largest category of borrowers are Association members and produce grain sorghum. Second are producers of cotton and wheat. The average size of the loan made by the Association in 1965 was \$18,600.00, compared with an average loan of \$19,200.00 in 1964.

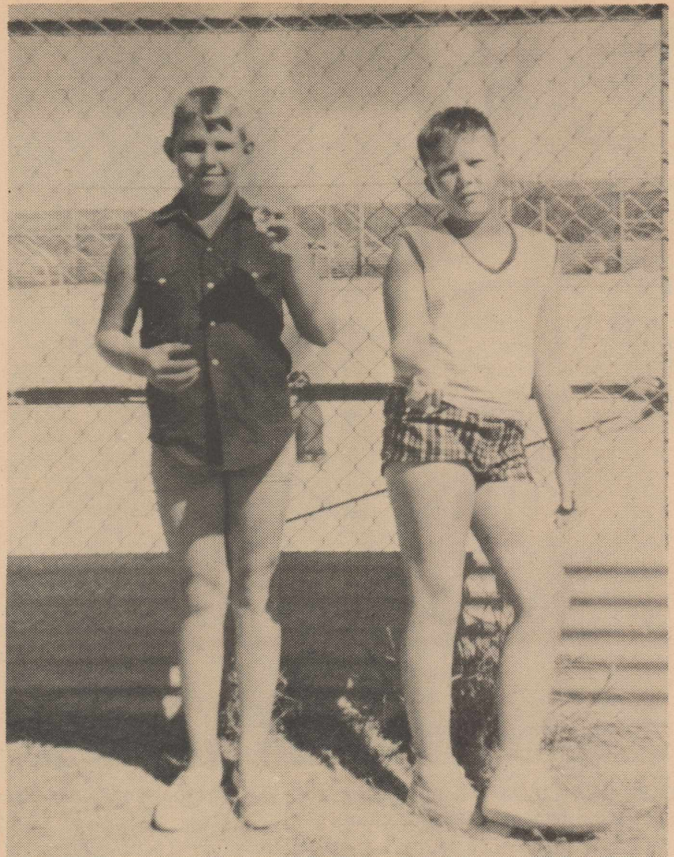

HPRF Plans 10th Field Day

High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway will observe its 10th annual field day on Thursday, Sept 8.

Traditional tours of the Foundation's research and educational facilities will start at 1 p. m. when the visitors will be welcomed at each tour by members of the board of trustees of the Foundation. A feature of the annual field days is the historical observance of West Texas hospitality by greeting the guests arriving for the days festivities with representatives of civic clubs and chambers of commerce of the area. Members of the Young Homemakers Clubs and staff members of the Foundation will greet and register visitors at various registration tents on the grounds of the Foundation and the Halfway community center.

The tours will continue throughout the afternoon. Included in the tours will be the new Moody Memorial Education and Communication building where the visitors will view the administration offices, TV and radio rooms, and exhibits. The Killgore Foundation building tour will include the scientific staff offices and laboratory continuing through the Jim Hill Greenhouse. The shops, seed processing laboratory, and Laboratory Gin, will be another tour available for guests. A feature of growing popularity is the display of the latest in farm equipment put on by 67 business firms last year. Guests touring the farm will unload at this display where free cold drinks will be available. The evening program will

include a free barbecue and a program featuring an outstanding nationally known speaker, entertainment and a drawing for prizes from the registration cards.

Dr. Earl H. Collister, executive vice-president, says he anticipates a large crowd beyond the 6,500 attending the field day last year.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex. --Taxes-- with its what, why, where, who and because--raised its unpopular head in the Texas capitol this week.

Texas Committee on State and Local Tax Policy presented a report to Gov. John Connally and the Texas Legislature.

Everybody's request for more money indicates that the spending program to be presented the 1967 Legislature will eat up the \$75,000,000 state surplus--and require new money to finance.

Higher education, pay raises for teachers and state employees, water development, state park and recreation expenditures, Texas Highway Patrol--all want in on the act. The tax policy committee is

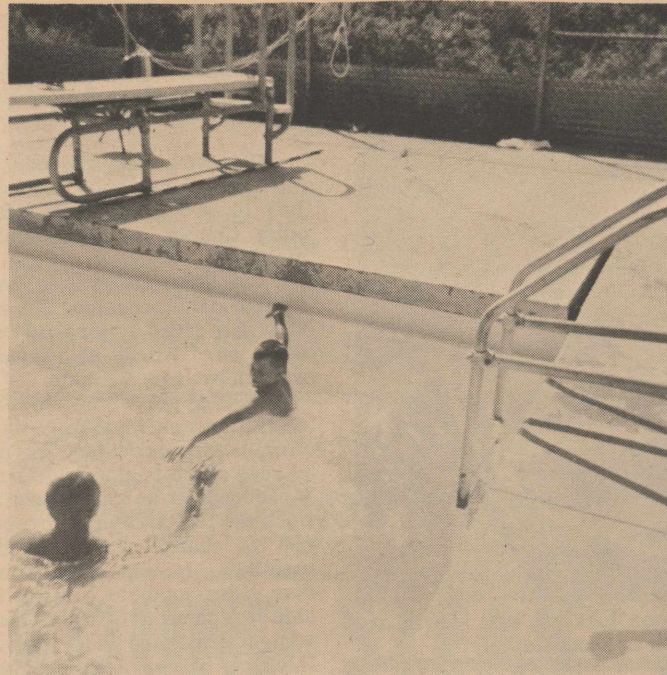
headed by Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas, who asked the Texas Research League to list possible sources for new taxes.

Proposed were:

Increase the state sales tax from its present two per cent to two and a half or three per cent, raising \$72,400,000 to \$144,800,000 a year;

Corporation income tax of 4.4 per cent (average of those in the 37 states which levy it), raising from \$18,000,000 to \$106,00,000 a year;

Graduated personal income tax, raising \$75,000,000 a year. (There are 36 states with personal income taxes.)

KITCHEN KORNER

I wonder if everyone is like I am in the summer I fuss about the heat and in the winter about the cold. Right now, the way our temperatures have been soaring I believe I like cold weather best. Make baskets of crisp vegetables for your barbecue, waffled, carrot and celery sticks, cucumber sticks, lettuce rolls (roll a leaf of lettuce around cheese, ham or carrot.)

Salmon-stuffed Tomatoes
 1 1-pound can (2 cups) salmon
 1 cup pared diced cucumber
 1 tablespoon chopped onion
 Dash pepper
 1 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon chopped pimiento
 1 cup mayonnaise
 6 medium tomatoes, chilled

Break salmon in small chunks, removing bones and skin. Combine salmon with cucumber, onion, seasonings, pimiento, and mayonnaise. Chill. Scoop out centers of tomatoes and make cups.

Fill with salmon mixture. Serve on lettuce. Trim with cucumber slices. Makes 6 servings.

Garlic-butter slices.
 In oven melt 1/2 cup butter or margarine in an 11x7x1 1/2 inch baking dish (if using another size, have butter generously cover bottom). Remove from oven.

Add 1 or 2 cloves garlic,

minced. Arrange six 1-to 1 1/2 inch slices of French or Vienna bread in baking dish, turning once to butter both sides. Let stand about 10 minutes; heat in hot oven (400 deg.) 10 minutes.

If cooking outdoors, melt butter in shallow pan on grill; add minced garlic. Toast bread on grill; dip both sides into butter.

Or for Garlic Rounds, cut hard rolls crosswise in 1/2-inch slices. Fix as for Garlic-butter Slices.

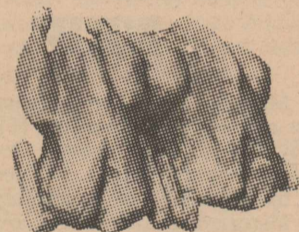
