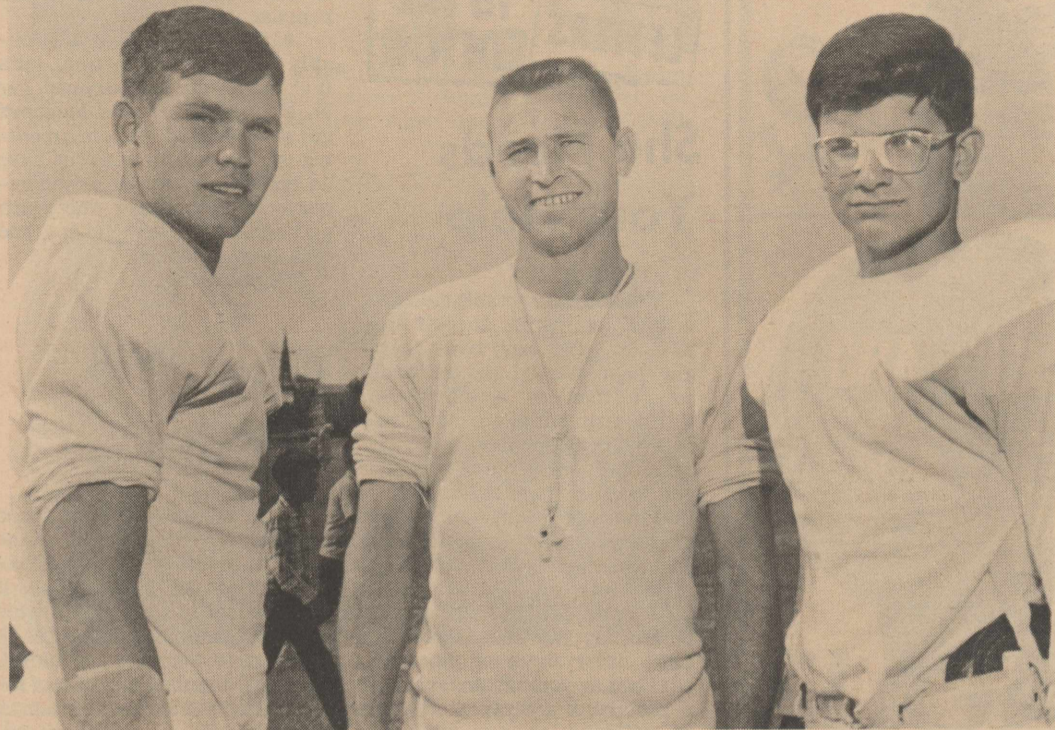

Longhorns Meet Silvertown Owls

Hart's Longhorns, seeking to come back from two straight winless seasons, travel to Silvertown Friday night to open the 1966 football wars.

Game time is 8 p. m. at Silvertown.

Coach Don Ewing, in his first year at the helm, hopes to turn the tide this year and get the Horns back on the winning track.

His hopes are bolstered by the fact that this year's Hart squad is the largest ever, with 36 boys out for the sport.

The team is young and green, however, with sophomores and freshmen making up a large part of the group.

Captains of the 1966 team are George Bennett, a senior end-fullback, and David A. Harris, junior tackle.

The Owls have 17 lettermen back from that team, which was winless except for the victory over Hart.

The Longhorns go into Friday night's game with only one player on the shelf. Guard Andy Rogers, a freshman who was expected to be a starter, is out of the game with a bad toe. Rogers is scheduled to undergo surgery on the toe Friday.

The Class A Owls are, however, supposed to be "much improved" from last year, according to their coach, T. A. Thornburg.

First load of grain in Hart, as well as the first load in the Hart area, were reported here this week.

First load in Hart was brought in Tuesday, Sept. 6, at 5 p. m. by D. L. McLain to Hi-point Grain and Fertilizer.

First load in the area was brought in Monday Sept. 5 at 2 p. m. by Jackie Harris, six miles west of Hart to Hart Grain at Roy Switch.

McLain's load weighed 9,570 pounds with moisture at 16 percent and test weight, 56 pounds per bushel. Hi-Point paid \$2 per cwt.

The grain, PAG 665, was planted the first of May.

The Harris grain, Northrup King 310, was planted April 12. The 15,440 pound load had 13.77 percent moisture content and Hart Grain also paid \$2 per cwt.

City Requests Citizens' Help

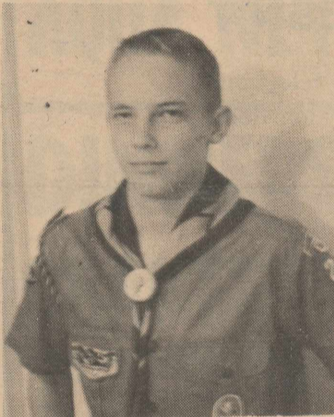
Cut your weeds. Spray around the shrubs on your premises.

Mike Armstrong will receive the Boy Scout Eagle Award at a special court of honor Sunday at 3 p. m. at the Methodist Church here.

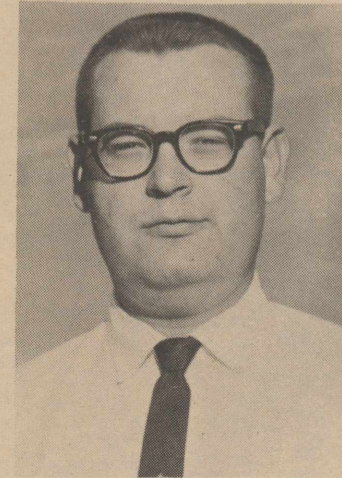
The Eagle Award is the highest award given in Scouting.
