On first, John Montague drove to the Hart 20 before being jarred loose from the ball, which was grabbed by an alert Hart defender.


Two line plunges by W. A. Hawkins resulted in no gain for Hart.

KITCHEN KORNER

The cooler days make a coffee cake and a cup of coffee a pleasant way to serve your guests and this one is delicious. Try it and see if you don't enjoy it for a change.

1/2 c. chopped California wal-

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon granulated sugar

1/2 c. butter or margarine

l teaspoon vanilla extract 2 cups sifted regular all-purpose flour; or 2 cups instant-

type flour I teaspoon double-acting baking

powder 1/2 teaspoon salt

I teaspoon baking soda

c. commercial sour cream lettuce leaves 1 medium apple

(1) in small bowl mix chopped walnuts, cinnamon, 1/2 cup granulated sugar. Grease well a 9-inch angel-food pan, with removable bottom, also start heating oven to 375 degrees. Then, in bowl, with electric mixer at high speed, beat butter creamy, then gradually add 1 cup sugar, while beating mix-ture till light and fluffy and scraping bowl and beaters now and then with rubber spatula. Now add eggs, one by one, then the vanilla, beating until blend-ed. Now sift regular flour with baking powder, salt, soda; then at low speed, beat this into batter, alternately with sour cream, (if using instant-type flour, stir it up with baking powder, salt and soda, before beating it into batter alternately with cream.)

Spread half of batter in angel-food pan, top it with pared, cored, thinly sliced apple, then top them with half of walnut mixture, next rest of batter, then rest of walnut mixture. Coffeecake bakes 40 min-

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utes or until cake tester, inserted in center, comes out clean.

Then remove coffeecake from oven, and let it stand, in pan, on wire rack, 30 min-utes. Next, with metal spatula, loosen cake all around side. Then, by top of tube, lift cake, still on base, from pan, and let it cool on rack. Then, with spatula, loosen it from tube and base, and lift it to plate.

TWENTY-FOUR-HOUR DES-SERT SALAD

2 cups chilled cooked white rice 1-pound can fruit cocktail,




