Some Crops Hit Again By Hail

Severe weather brought wind, rain and hail to this area Saturday, leaving crop damages in its path.

Ernest Jones, who farms about five miles south of Hart, reported that the foliage was stripped from his cotton, castor beans, soybeans and grain sorghum on 320 acres. He added that there was "crop enough left to have some kind of a harvest."

Paul Brooks, east of Hart, reported about one-fourth

damage to the castor beans and grain.

Hail damage was also reported at the Bennett farms, southwest of Hart.

East and northeast of Hart, E. L. Jobe and R. J. Murray reported several farms in the area badly hit with cotton leaves stripped off and boll damage. Newlon Rowland also reported heavy crop damage.

Max Stephens, southeast of Hart, reported hail and strong winds.

Catholic Church Will Be Dedicated

Bishop Lawrence De Falco of the Amarillo Diocese will dedicate the new St. John's Catholic Church in Hart, Sunday Oct. 2 at 11 a. m. The new church is located at Seventh Street and Ave. D.

Reverend Raphael Chen is pastor of the church, which is a mission of the Immaculate Conception church in Dimmitt. The Rev. Chen has been pastor of the churches for the past five years.

Building of the mission church was made possible from the funds of the local parishioners and a grant of \$10,000 dollars from the Extension Society of the Catholic Church of Chicago, Ill.

The church is an example of modern liturgical architecture and economical construction, with a seating capacity of 250, with ample room

for future expansion. There are two large Sunday School class rooms and a nursery that are not included in the church proper.

Reverend Chen and the parishioners of the church have extended an invitation to the public to attend the dedication services and open house all day Sunday Oct. 2.

An enchilada or roast beef dinner will be served to the public at the Hart School Cafeteria with serving to begin at 12 noon, following the dedication of the new church.

The ladies of the church will prepare and sponsor the dinner. Proceeds will be used for new pews for the church.

Adult tickets sell for \$1.25 and children under 12, for 75 cents.

Tickets may be obtained from C. O. Burt or can be purchased at the dinner.



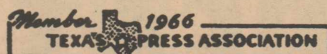

Freeze Branding Tried By Taack

The question is not painless dentistry, but painless branding.

A new method of branding, freeze branding, is being tried on cattle at the Roy Taack farm.

The new method, reported to be painless to cattle, is also inexpensive.

The branding is termed experimental and cattle owners are interested in whether it will control the pigment of the skin and hair on cattle.

Procedure is to clip the hair as short as possible, hold the

branding iron on for 60 seconds and . . . job finished.

When the hair grows back, it is supposed to be permanently white.

Regular branding irons, copper coated, are used along with clippers, denatured alcohol and dry ice.

HART DUMPS MULES

The Hart Longhorns struck swiftly for touchdowns in the first and fourth quarters and then relied on a strong defense to blank the Muleshoe "B" Mules, 12 to 0.

The Longhorn defense had a field day against the Mules, grabbing three fumbles, blocking one punt and allowing the Mules only four first downs in the game and only one first during the second half of play.

The game got off to a slow start as Hart received the kick-off and promptly fumbled the ball on the first play. The Mules could do little better, holding the ball only three downs before fumbling it back to the Horns.

Hart took over the ball on their own 24 and, three plays later, were still at the 24. On fourth, George Ed Bennett booted the ball out to the Muleshoe 47. An off sides penalty against the Mules moved the ball back to their 42 and first and 15.

On first, Quarterback Gary Martin passed to Halfback Johnnie St. Clair for 25 yards and the first down at the Hart 33 yard line.

The Hart defense came to life and allowed the Mules only four yards in four plays and the visitors surrendered the ball at the Hart 29.

On the first play in the new series of downs, the Horns gave the visitors an idea of what was to come as Fullback Tommy Gonzales took the handoff from Gary Rambo and sped downfield for 71 yards and six points. The play was called back and the Horns were penalized five yards for illegal motion in the backfield.

The Mules drew a five yard penalty on the next play and everything was back to the point it had been two plays before with the Horns owning the ball with a first and 10 at their own 29.

On first down, the Horns fumbled the ball and the Mules recovered at the Hart 30.

Again the Hart defense went to work and, four plays later, the Mules again surrendered the

ball on downs, eight yards back of their starting point on the 30.

Tommy Gonzales took the first shot at the Mules but was unable to hang on to the football and teammate David Harris recovered the ball at the line of scrimmage.

On second George Ed Bennett took the handoff and scampered downfield for 62 yards and six points. The point after try, a pass from Gary Rambo to the right end, fell incomplete and the score stood at 6-0 with 3:35 left in the first period of play.

The Mules took the kickoff and made a valiant effort to get their offense moving. They managed to post one more first down before the Horns defense came back to life and forced the Mules to punt from their own 48.

The Longhorns took the kick on their 16 and, three plays later, the Horns were still on their 16. On fourth, George Ed Bennett punted the ball back to the Mules. Johnnie St. Clair took the punt on the 50 and brought the ball back to the Horn's 36 before he was brought down. The Mules drew a clipping penalty on the play and the ball was set back to the Mules 49. Three running plays netted the Mules only four yards and Jim Putman dropped back to punt for the Mules. On the punt attempt, a herd of Horns swarmed over Putman and the kick was blocked, rolling out of bounds at the 44.

Again the Horns got a drive going, rolling up 39 yards in six plays to earn a first and 10 at the Muleshoe 17.

On first down, Gary Rambo fumbled the ball and the Mules recovered at the original line of scrimmage, their own 17.

The Mules were again forced to punt by the Hart defense and the half ended without either team making another serious threat.

The second half started with the Mules again trying to break down the Longhorn defense. Doyle Linville took the kickoff on his own 28 and managed a

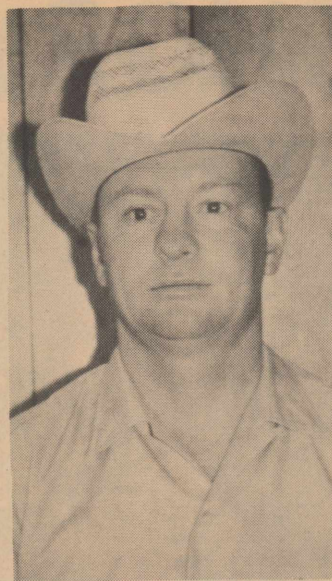
