Three teams from the Hart Future Farmers of America Chapter competed in the district leadership contests which were held at Olton this week.

Participating on the Radio Broadcast team were Bob Crick, Jerry Smith and George

In the FFA Quiz were Bill Bledsoe, Jerry Ethridge, Terry Newman and Ricky Mitchell.

The Junior Chapter Conducting Team was composed of Harold Bennett, Mike Armstrong, Donnie Black, Rex Henderson, Andy Rogers, Jerry Heller and Juan Flores.

Results of the contests are as follows:

Senior Chapter Conducting teams - First, Hale Center; second, Abernathy; third, Tulia; fourth, Happy; and fifth, Nazareth. A total of 84 students participated in this contest with 12 teams made up of seven members per team.

Overseas Mail Now Being Sent Air Mail

Postmaster Jewel Brooks of Hart announced last week that from now on all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing five pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under Public Law 89-725 -- The Dulski Military Mail Act -- which was signed by President Johnson on Nov. 2, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Mrs. Brooks explained that parcels weighing five pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail).

This will eliminate the task of reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco Concentration Center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

Mrs. Brooks also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing five pounds and under, though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than Dec. 1. Airmail, she said, should be sent no later than Dec. 10.

The deadline for Christmas packages weighing more than five pounds going to Viet Nam and other overseas military post offices by surface means is Nov. 10.

KITCHEN KORNER

I ate some cookie bars at the home of a friend recently which I thought very good of course they are very rich so guess that is why I thought them so good. Will pass the recipe on to you.

CHOCOLATE COCONUT BARS

Preheat oven to 375. Melt 3 Tbsp. margarine in 9x13 pan, add 1 1/2 c. vanilla wafer crumbs. Work in margarine with fork and press evenly over the bottom of pan. Sprinkle next 3 ingredients evenly in order given 1-12 oz. pkg. chocolate chips, 1 cup pecans, 1 can southern coconut

Next pour 1 can Eagle Brand Milk evenly over top. Bake for 20 minutes at 375.

BANANA BREAD

1/3 c. Crisco
2/3 c. sugar
2 eggs
1 3/4 c. sifted flour
2 tsp. baking powder
3/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. soda
1 c. mashed bananas
1/2 c. chopped nuts
1 tsp. vanilla

Beat Crisco and sugar until creamy. Add eggs, one at a time and beat well after each. Sift dry ingredients together and add alternately with bananas to sugar mixture. Beat until smooth. Stir in nuts. Bake in greased 8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/2 inch loaf pan in slow oven, 325 degrees for 60 to 70 minutes or until done. Cool 10 minutes in pan. Remove and cool thoroughly. Slices better if wrapped and stored for a day.

ICE BOX FRUIT CAKE

1 lb. graham crackers
1 lb. pecans
1 1/2 lb. candied fruit
1 can Eagle Brand milk
1 lb. walnuts
1/2 lb. dates
1 c. raisins
21 marshmallows

Chop fruit and nuts, place in large bowl. Melt marshmallows and milk in double boiler. Roll crackers, mix with fruits, nuts. Pour milk and marshmallow mix over dry ingredients and mix well. Pack into paper lined tube or loaf pan and place in ice box. Will keep indefinitely.

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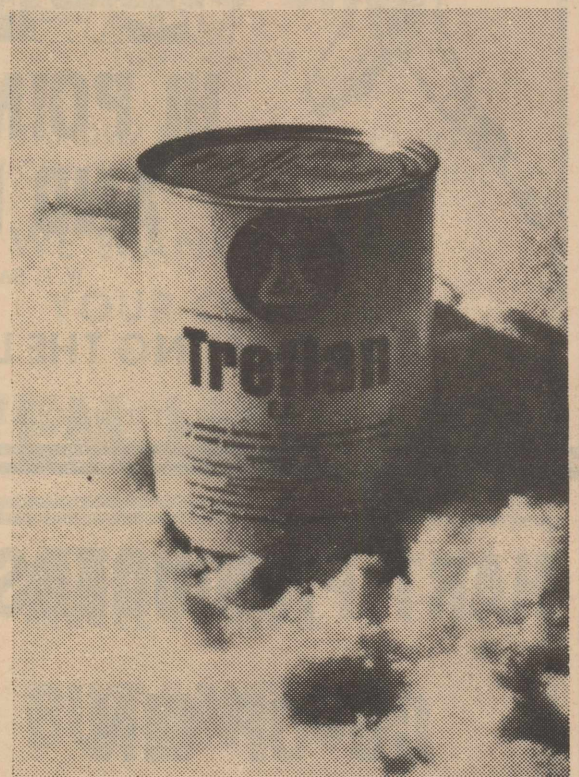
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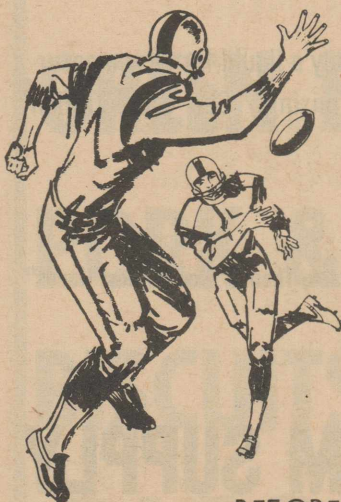

Lazbuddie Drop

In a tight defensive battle here last Friday night the Lazbuddie Longhorns dropped the Hart Longhorns 14-7. The loss dropped the Hart Longhorns into fifth place in the district race while Lazbuddie retained their second place rating, having lost only to district winner Vega.

Bob Crick took the opening kickoff for the Longhorns at the 15 and the Lazbuddie defenders dropped him at the 17. Bob carried the next two tries for Hart and moved to the 22 to bring up third and five needed. George Ed Bennett attempted to pick the first but he was trapped and thrown for a big loss back to the 13. George Ed Bennett got off a short punt that carried only to the Hart 30 but a Lazbuddie player bobbled the ball and Larry Parker fell on the ball for the Longhorns. Danny Smith moved to the 34, Bob Crick added another two before a pass from W. A. Hawkins to George Ed Bennett went incomplete to bring up another punting situation. Bennett's punt carried to the Lazbuddie 40 and T. Foster got back to the Lazbuddie 47 to give the Lazbuddie Longhorns their first chance with the football.

G. Matthews moved to the Hart 41 and then on the next try Matthews romped through the Hart defenders to the Hart 12. Two penalties moved the ball back to the 22 and Foster was thrown for a loss to the 25 and T. Parham was held for no gain to bring up third down and 22 yards needed for a first.

On the next play the roof fell in for the Hart Longhorns as T. Parham passed to Matthews at the one. Matthews and Stienbock both tried for the final yard and were thrown back by the Hart defense but a third down keeper by Quarterback Parham got the six points for Lazbuddie. Matthews' kick for the extra point was blocked by Quincy Hawkins and the score stayed at 6-0 for Lazbuddie.

The Hart Longhorns were unable to move the ball after taking the kickoff and George Ed Bennett punted out to the Hart 36. This time Lazbuddie was also unable to move the ball and the Hart Longhorns took over at the 28. The Longhorns began to move the ball, picking up 18 yards in three plays before a fumble at the Hart 48 was picked up by Lazbuddie to stop the drive.

Lazbuddie could not keep the ball very long as a third down pass by Parham was picked off by Quincy Hawkins at the Hart 35 and returned to the 45. Lazbuddie's defense came to life and forced the Hart Horns back to their own 29 in three tries. Bennett's

kick sailed out to the Lazbuddie 47.

With Foster, Stienbock, Scott and Gleason alternating on the ball handling duties, the Lazbuddie Longhorns began to move the ball toward the Hart end zone again. Lazbuddie moved to the Hart 27 in six plays before Jim Kendrick recovered a T. Foster fumble at the 27 for the Hart Longhorns.

A first down pass from W. A. Hawkins to George Ed Bennett covered 14 yards and a 15 yard penalty moved the ball on out to the Lazbuddie 44. W. A. Hawkins rolled around end and scampered up to the Lazbuddie 31. Bob Crick took the handoff on the next play, burst right through the center of the Lazbuddie defensive line, and raced 31 yards to put the Hart Horns on the scoreboard.

W. A. Hawkins kicked the extra point and the score went to 7-6 for Hart with 4:53 left in the first half.

Lazbuddie took the kickoff from Tommy Gonzales at the 20 and with the aid of a pass interference call against Hart began to drive for another score. Quarterback Parham hit end M. Hinson at the 21 and then fired two to T. Foster that moved the ball out to the Lazbuddie 37 before a second down fumble was scooped up by Bob Crick for Hart at the 37.

W. A. Hawkins fired an incomplete pass to G. E. Bennett and then Bob Crick and Bennett picked up a first at the 27. W. A. Hawkins rolled around end and moved on down to the 11 before he was hauled down. Hawkins again fired another incomplete pass and Danny Smith moved to the 10 before disaster again struck Hart as D. Matthews caught a fumble in mid-air at the 10 and raced back to the Hart 43 to stop another scoring threat by Hart.

Lazbuddie began a desperate aerial battle to add some additional points to the score board but the Hart Horns, led by G. E. Bennett and Larry Parker, stopped Lazbuddie short and the half came to an end with Lazbuddie on the Hart 41.

The second half opened with neither team being able to move the football and both clubs were forced to exchange punts with Hart coming into possession of the ball at their 42 about midway through the third quarter.

George Ed Bennett was held for no gain on first down and a second down fumble by the Horns was scooped up by Lazbuddie at the 35 and a penalty on the play moved the ball back to the 50 where it was Lazbuddie's ball with first and 25 yards to go.

Parham fired an incomplete

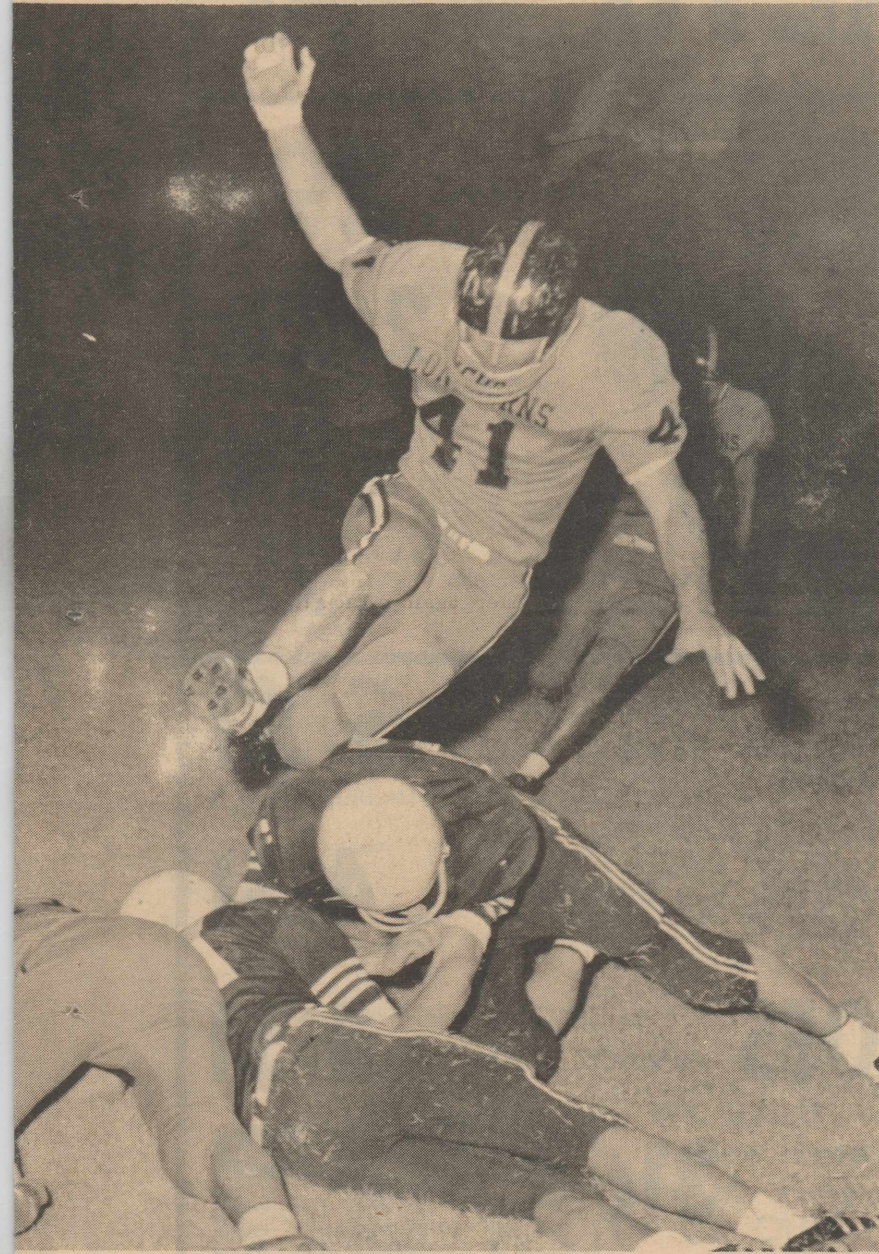

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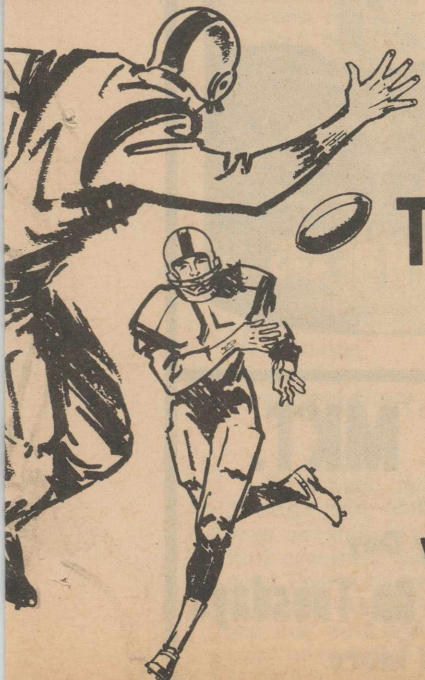

Vaccine Proves Effective

No longer is it necessary for your child to have measles. All that's needed is immunization against this disease that once was taken for granted as one of the hazards of growing up.

A veteran medical expert on communicable disease said this fall that measles could be eradicated in the United States in a relatively short time if all young children were immunized.

Already more than 12 million American children have been immunized against measles since a vaccine was licensed in 1963, and the disease had dropped to a mere fraction of its once high incidence.

Doctors have long known that measles is sometimes a much more serious disease than many parents realized. True, most children recover from measles in a short time and with no ill effects. However, in recent years deaths attributed to measles have averaged more than 400 per year, and other non-fatal effects have caused serious health problems for many more children.

Eventhough deaths and serious after effects are not particularly common among children who get measles, it isn't wise to take a chance. And it isn't necessary to take a chance.

The American Academy of Pediatrics, the professional society of the physicians who specialize in health problems of children, recommends that

the measles vaccine be given at the age of about 12 months. If your infant is routinely under the care of a physician, the chances are he will give measles vaccine at the proper time.

But if your child is past the age of 12 months and hasn't yet been immunized against measles, don't delay. Call your physician and ask his advice about measles shots. There are several different types of measles vaccine available. Your doctor will select the vaccine that will be best for your child.

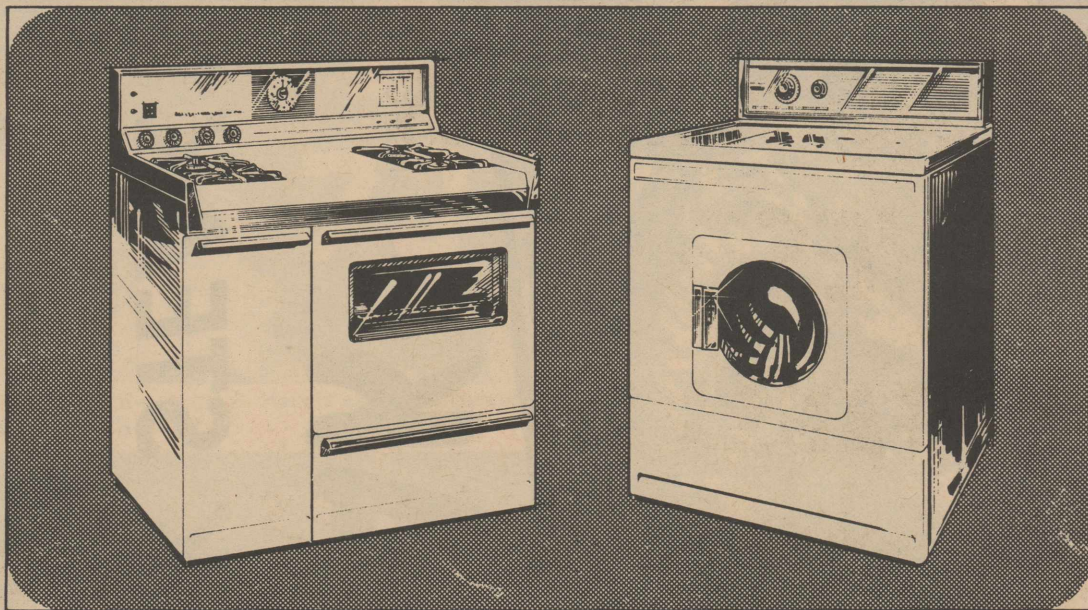
